Minutes of the First Annual Assembly of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District.

The first session of the International Holiness Assembly of the Pennsylvania and New Jersey District was opened at East Stroudsburg. Pa. on the morning of March 10th 1920. With a nicely assembled number of the pastors and delegates gathered in the comfortable little auditorium of the International Holiness Church of which Rev. W. J. Crider is pastor, the session was called to order by the General Superintendent, Geo. B. Kulp, promptly at the announced hour of 9 o'clock.

The opening song, "Honey in the Rock," was sung with such a gusto, relish and holy enthusiasm as to warrant the conclusion that the singers actually knew what they were singing about, from a joyfully conscious and fully convincing experience of the same. Like Samson with both hands full of the nectared sweets, they too "went on eating" honey from this point onward throughout the whole Convention. Thus the opening song became at once a revelation of present grace, and also a prophecy of future grace which should so signally characterize the whole Assembly

Scripture Lesson—Rom. 5: 1-11, read by State Supt. H. A. Saneholtz. Invocation by Geo. B. Kulp, Singing—"I will Praise Him." Enrollment of preachers and delegates. Reading of the Minutes of the last year's Assembly dispensed with.

Determination of the Conference bar—The first five rows of seats agreed upon. Bro. John V. Coleman, from the Maryland District and Bros. Ford and Wisegarher of the Methodist Church being present, they were hereupon given seats as honorary members in the Conference bar.

It was decided to have the Minutes of the Assembly printed as heretofore, and expenses raised as formerly by the sale of the same at 10c. per copy. In order to ascertain the number of copies we should have printed, it was decided that we wait till Wednesday morning when the remainder of the pastors and delegates would be present, and then solicit the Assembly for their orders for the same.

In order to give the Assembly a working knowledge of the proceedings of last year's Assembly, the Secretary was instructed to order 40 copies of the Minutes of the same from Bro. Owen at Milton, Pa., and have him forward them immediately by parcel post, special delivery.

As it was desired by the Assembly to have our General Supt. with us during our election, and as his engagements elsewhere required his leaving us on Wednesday, it was decided that we hold the election of our officers on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock.

The Chairman was authorized by the Assembly to appoint all Committees. The sessional hours for the business of the Assembly were fixed at 9 to 11 o'clock a. m. and 2 to 5 o'clock p. m.

At this juncture the Gen'l Supt. Rev. Kulp, took the chair, and proceeded to the hearing of reports.

The State Supt. H. A. Saneholtz reported first. The report was accepted, ordered spread on the Minutes, and follows:

Another year has passed into history in the work of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey district of the International Holiness Church. This has been a year of battles and victories. New classes have been organized and many souls that a year ago were in sin and darkness are now rejoicing in the consciousness of real Salvation. Praise the Lord!

Eleven tent meetings have been held and a number of revival meetings in the churches that have been reported as very successful. Four new churches: two of them as a result of tent meetings. Five ministers have been placed as pastors, and one change has been made. Two ministers and their wives have gone to the mission field, (one of the wives also an ordained minister). This gives us representatives in Korea and the British West Indies.

Owing to the fact that we have taken the pastorate at Reading, Pa., and God has blessed the work it is in a prosperous condition, thus in need of close attention, we regret very much that we are unable to give as much time to the District Work as it really needed or as we would have liked to.

It will be remembered that in our Assembly a year ago, that we adopted a resolution to be sent to the General Assembly, requesting that our name be changed. This request was based upon the fact that our church was hindered because of a deceived sect of the "Tongues" movement that had used the word 'Apostolic" in their name. This request came to the General Assembly and also from other Districts, and after a thorough discussion in which it was learned that not only was our church hindered in the homeland but also the Mission Fields. The decision came and we are now the International Holiness Church.

Wonderful opportunities and prospects lie before us in this District and we need to walk very humbly before the Lord. There are vicinities in which a tent can be pitched and without the stricking of a bill to announce the services, a congregation can be had that are hungry for the Gospel. Calls are coming from various places wanting meetings. Then there is also a profession of holiness in some places that does not meet the need of hungry hearts, and when that crust is once broken through God does give glorious victory.

God has a mission for us right here in this District and we need to stand together and push the battle for God and souls. The obligation is upon us and let us be true to God so that no souls will miss heaven because of a lack of what God wants us to be in this District Work.

Francis Lishman, pastor of Glen Iron Church, next reported.

Accepted by acclamation.

A letter from Bro. Owen, pastor of the Milton Church, was then heard, the import of the same being that the Milton Church had rejected the name "International Holiness Church," and would retain their former name, "International Apostolic Holiness Church." Following the reading of the letter, it was moved and supported that a committee be appointed to consult with the Milton Church, both in reference to the deeding of the property and the changing of the church name, which committee should report to the State Council.

It was next moved and supported that the State Supt. appoint a committee on State Camp Meeting.

Bro. Bingaman, delegate from Glen Iron, reported, accepted.

Following Bro. Bingamau's report, a motion was made and passed that the reports of both pastors and delegates be entered upon the pages of the Convention Minutes.

The delegate from the Augustaville Church, Bro. C. R. Wolf reported. Report accepted.

J. R. Gardner reported as delegate for the Ashland class, after which he rendered his report as pastor. Accepted.

Bro. S. J. McIntyre, the newly stationed pastor of the Bethlehem Church, then rendered his report which was unanimously accepted with a hearty "Amen!" Recommendations from the Bethlehem Church for the ordination of Bro. McIntyre were then read.

The delegate for Bethlehem, Sister Siglin, reported. Accepted. Sister Maude Daley, delegate from Howard and Summit Hill, reported for the Howard Church.

H. A, Saneholtz, pastor at Reading, reported.

The Supt. Bro. Saneholtz, then announced the appointment of the Camp Meeting Committee:

Sister Carrie Yoder, Bro. John Wagner, Bro. J. E. Wolf.

Also the Auditing Committee:

S. J. McIntyre, F. L. Bingaman, C. C. Rose.

A motion was then put on the floor to the effect that hereafter the offerings specified on the report blanks for Convention expense be paid over to the Treasurer of the church which entertains the Convention.

The hour of adjournment having arrived while the question was still before the house, it was carried over for decision till the afternoon session. Closing prayer by Bro. Coleman.

Adjournment at 11:30.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, MARCH 9, 1920.

Afternoon session opened to-day at the appointed hour of 2 o'clock by singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Prayer by Bro. Sutton.

The motion pending from the morning session, concerning the application of the Convention expense offerings to the local church entertaining the Convention, was then passed.

Further registration followed.

By motion the Camp Meeting committee was excused for a few minutes in order to prepare their report.

- Bro. W. J. Crider, pastor at Stroudsburg reported, followed by the delegate's report for the same—Sister Lydia A. Palmer.
- J. L. Sutton, pastor at Philadelphia, reported. Sister Davis of Philadelphia, reported for the church.
- Wm. E. Straub, pastor at Sunbury, reported. Sister Zimmerman, delegate from Sunbury, reported for the church.

The Superintendent announced the committee on Resolutions: Charles Slater. Frank Morris. J. L. Sutton.

Also the Minute Committee:

J. R. Gardner, W. J. Crider, W. E. Straub.

Sister Gallagher then reported for Glassboro, N. I.

Charles L. Slater reported as pastor of the McKeesport church, followed by C. C. Rose reporting as delegate from same.

Sister Maude Daley reported for the Summit Hill church.

Sister Bessie Hatcher reported as pastor from Trenton, N. J. Sister Young, delegate from Trenton, followed.

Above reports were all accepted by acclamation.

The Assembly then heard the report of the Camp Meeting Committee which follows:

In view of the fact that the Borough of Milton, Pa., is straightening the creek, and putting in the street, thus requiring that we move the house on the Camp Grounds which will mean an expense of about \$800.00, and because there has been a sentiment among our people in the State, that the ground there is not a suitable place for our State Camp Meeting, we as a committee recommend to the Assembly that we sell the State Camp Ground at Milton.

After discussion, the report was adopted by the Assembly.

Bro. Joseph Diehl rendered a verbal and written report as pastor of White Deer, and also as delegate. Both reports were accepted.

Following Bro. Diehl's report, a few timely remarks by way of personal testimony were made by Bro. Ford, in respect to personal benefit received through the labors of the same.

A motion was put to the effect that we now adjourn in order to give the Directors of Beulah Park, time to formulate their report. The motion carried and the Assembly adjourned at 3:50.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, MARCH 10.

Session called to order at 9 o'clock, by Gen'l Supt. Kulp.

Singing, "I Will Praise Him." Prayer by Rev. Slater. As a devotional Scripture lesson, the Assembly recited the 23rd Psalm in unison.

Reading of the Minutes and approval and adoption withheld until the Camp Meeting Committee alter the wording of their report.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

STATE SUPERINTENDENT .-

A motion was made to instruct the Secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for H. A. Saneholtz. Lost by one vote in the negative. The vote was then taken by ballot, resulting in the nomination of Bros. Saneholtz, Crider, King and Sutton. There being no majority for either nominee, the latter three brethren withdrew in favor of Bro. Saneholtz. A motion was then made to instruct the Secretary to cast the ballot unanimously for Bro. Saneholtz, and was carried by a majority.

While the tellers were counting the ballot for Secretary, the Camp Meeting Committee reported with their altered recommendation, which was accepted.

The Minutes of Tuesday afternoon session were then approved.

TREASURER—

The report of the first ballot cast showed no election. While the second ballot was being counted, the Assembly was treated to a special song by Bros. J. E. Wolf and W. E. Straub entitled, "Goodbye Pharoh." The second ballot showed no election. While the third ballot was being counted, Rev. Slater favored the Convention with his favorite song, "Give Me Jesus," which was made a blessing and inspiration to all who heard. The third ballot showed Bro. Slater elected for Treasurer.

A motion was made to extend Bros. Kuhlick and Wisegard the courtesy of a seat in the Conference bar, carried.

The report of Sister Adlena Behrent was read by the Secretary and accepted.

Report of tellers on ballot for Advisory Board showed Bro. King elected as one member.

Report of Wm. R. Munson read and accepted

Ephraim Weller, delegate from Reading, reported.

Report of tellers for the remaining two members of the Advisory Board, showed Bros. Straub and Crider elected

It was decided next by the Assembly, that we have a Missionary Board the coming year, and that the three Advisory members on the State Council constitute that Board.

A subsequent motion was put and passed to the effect that Charles Slater, the State Treasurer, be included in the Missionary Board as chairman.

The Resolution Committee submitted a report concerning the

election of the Trustees, which follows:

Whereas, we have hitherto elected our Trustees annually, RESOLVED, That we now elect them - One for 7 years, one for 6 years, one for 5 years, one for 4 years, one for 3 years, one for 2 years, one for 1 year, and then one annually for 7 years.

The resolution was accepted.

J. E. Wolf, Colporteur and Home Mission Worker reported. The report was accepted, and followed by a motion that Bro. Wolf be our Colporteur and Home Mission Worker for this coming year.

The report of Edmund Cortez was read and accepted.

The reports of Bro. and Sis. Ives were also read and accepted. The desired number of preachers and delegates being now present, it was decided to take up the motion concerning the number of minutes to have printed, which was laid on the table during the first session, and that we proceed to ascertain the number desired by each one present. Over 300 copies being ordered, it was decided to have 400 printed.

The report of the tellers on the ballot for trustees showed Bros. Wagner, Saneholtz, Rose, Straub, Wilkinson and Rabuck elected

for seven, six, five, four, three and two years respectively.

Daniel Dubendorf, Pastor at Colyer, reported.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the session was dismissed with prayer by State Supt. Saneholtz.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MARCH 10.

Session opened at 2 o'clock. Singing, "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow." Prayer by Rev. Dubendorf.

Election of Trustees continued: Bro. Leddick of Philadelphia, chosen. One member on the Examining board elected—Rev. King to serve 3 years.

Resolution Committee reported as follows:

WHEREAS, This District Assembly needs a great centrally located State Camp Meeting, be it

RESOLVED, That this District Assembly make Beulah Park of the Eastern Pennsylvania Holiness Association, our District Camp Meeting; that its jurisdiction come under the District Council and that every efort on the part of each preacher and layman be put forth for its success.

The Resolution was adopted.

The Beulah Park Camp Meeting Association then submitted

their report:

At a called session of the Board on Tuesday afternoon, it was moved and seconded and carried, that the Eastern Pennsylvania Holiness Association be dissolved, and that the Beulah Park Camp Ground, be handed over to the District Council.

The report was accepted.

The Resolution Committee further reported:

WHEREAS. It is essential for the best interest of our work, for our

District Council to meet together, be it

RESOLVED, That the said Council meet at the Annual Assembly,
and at the State Camp Meeting, Further, that our District Superintendent have power to call the Council together whenever the need arises.

SIGNED: FRANK MORRIS, J. L. SUTTON, CHAS. L. SLATER.

The resolution was adopted.

The appointment of a committee to prepare a resolution covering the ground of Home Mission moneys, was ordered by a motion properly made, seconded and carried.

Resolution No. 3 was then heard:

WHEREAS, This Assembly having recognized Bro. J. E. Wolf, as our Home Mission Colporteur,

RESOLVED, That the District give him the book stand priviledges of our Camp Meeting, with instructions; and further, that the District be encouraged to assist Bro. Wolf in his work.

SIGNED BY THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE.

The resolution was adopted.

Resolution No. 4:

WHEREAS, We the District Assembly of Pennsylvania and New Jersey, keenly appreciate the fatherly council, Godly advice and spiritual help of our General Superintendent, Geo, B. Kulp, be it

RESOLVED, That this District Assembly express its appreciation by

a standing vote of thanks, wishing him our hearty God-speed as he goes on his way, and that we extend him an invitation to meet with us again next year.

SIGNED BY THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE.

Adopted unanimously.

Singing followed, "Blest be the Tie that Binds." An offering

was lifted for General Supt. Kulp from the Assembly floor.

After listening to the closing address of our beloved General Superintendent, in which he brought us a short, but timely messsage, befitting both the occasion and his office as General Superintendent, the Assembly was permitted to enjoy another soul-enriching message in song, as brother Slater sang, "Some Day 'Twill All be Over."

The hour of 3 o'clock having now arrived, the Assembly proceeded with the Ordination Service, which was appointed for that

hour. At this service, by an Ordination Council properly appointed by the General Superintendent, with brother Kulp presiding, brother Simon Jesse McIntyre of Bethlehem, Pa., was regularly ordained to the Christian Ministry. The sermon was preached by brother Kulp. The entire service was favored with God's peculiar blessing. Bro. McIntyre was commended to the God of all grace. not only by the General Superintendent and the Ordination Council but by the entire Assembly as they expressed with over flowing hearts and out-reached hands, their recognition of his high calling of God and His special blessing and sanction upon the same.

After the ordination service, the Assembly continued with its

unfinished business.

An insertion into Resolution No. 4, was accepted by common

consent, and appears therein.

The place for the holding of the next Annual Assembly was next considered, and after hearing the invitations of several of the churches, it was decided that we accept the invitation of the Sunbury church, and go there next spring. The date fixed for the Assembly was set at from March 8—13, beginning at 9 o'clock of the 8th.

The report of R. M. Harding, Treasurer of the Eastern Pennsylvania Holiness Association, was then heard, and being attested as correct by the Auditing Committee, was accepted by the Assembly with a hearty vote of thanks, and ordered placed upon the Assembly Minutes.

The Superintendent announced the Committee on Home Mis-

sion money, as J. L. Sutton, D. A. King, C. A. Yoder.

Adjournment by motion at 4:45. J. R. GARDNER, SEC'Y.

THURSDAY MORNING, MARCH 11.

Owing to a special meeting of the Council and Trustees this morning, the Assembly was not called to order for regular business until the late hour of 11 o'clock.

Opening Song, "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow." Prayer by the Secretary. Minutes of the previous session read

and approved.

The Treasurer of the Mission Board, Bro. D. A. King then rendered his report, which after being certified by the Auditing

Committee as correct, was accepted.

Inasmuch as some of the churches sent out Missionary money directly which could not be included in the Treasurer's report, it was moved and accepted that the report which shall appear on the Minutes shall include the amounts stated on the report blanks of the several churches.

J. E. Wolf was accepted to serve on the Home Mission Committee. Adjournment followed by the expiration of time. J. R. GARDNER, SEC'Y.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, 2 O'CLOCK SESSION.

Opening Song, "Down at the Cross. Prayer by Sister Yoder. Minutes read and approved.

After discussing the matter of getting out a new and more ade-

After the manner concerning our Beulah Park property and its obligations was properly placed before the Assembly, there followed one of the most interesting, as well as one of the most intensely practical discussions that were heard upon the Convention floor. It was a time of re-organization as it were, to discharge the responsibility resting upon us. It was a time of girding up of the lions of our minds. Balancing the material liabilities of the property against the spiritual and material possibilities of a future succession of ever-enlarging Camp-meetings and the on-coming Bible School besides, the former were so far outweighed by the latter that the little doubts and petty discouragements which had crept in during the year past, were swept away as with a flood, before the over-flowing tide of faith and inspiration which seem to charge and surcharge the hearts of the Assembly. Promise was mingled with exhortation, and exhortation mingled with prayer, singing, and praise. The Lord was manifestly in our midst to lead us on to certain victory. Bless His Name! The discussion needed not to be closed with a verbal resolution, but was closed with many a mental one that we stand by unanimously our Beulah Park Camp, and our Beulah Park Grounds.
