

Proceedings

The Twenty-Third Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District convened at 10:00 a. m., October 24, 1933, at the Kildee Pilgrim Holiness Church. A large delegation of ministers and delegates were present for the opening session. The song service was led by David Wachtel, the Scripture lesson was read by General Superintendent Surbrook, and Brother Stikeleather and others led us to the throne of grace.

Our General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook, took the chair, assisted by our District Superintendent, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather. The conference bar was fixed to take in the sixth pew from the front.

The following committees were appointed:

Our General Superintendent spoke to us regarding the work of our general church and the appreciation our general officials have of the work in our District. He said to us, "It is only as you cooperate with 25,000 other Pilgrims that we are able to go forward as we are. Our church has made greater gains in the last three years than in the six years previous. I believe that our people are more spiritual and that we have better churches and better preachers than any church on top of the ground. We have loya!, Godly men, who know how to pastor. They can start from the ground and build up and do it successfully. Everything in the church rests upon the pastors. Our brethren have weathered the storm of depression. There are just two ways of going through things. One is to get sour, stiffen up and become hardened in your own spirit and become critical. The other way is to take it from the Lord, let your heart melt under it and become tender, and God will bless you. I find that our brethren have become tender and kept spiritual. I do not believe the condition of our country will clear up until after the Lord comes, but He will take us out of it.

"The district superintendents are the key men. Each district superintendent is in contact with every pastor in his district. They can plan for the church. They have problems in common and they know the problem of the church as a whole and I believe our General Board should be

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composed largely of these men. When these superintendents sit for hours and hours going over the problems of the church they get it into their system, carry it back home and it filters right back to the churches. If a district is not going forward as it should and the superintendent of that district gets in conference with other superintendents, it will encourage him to press forward more vigorously.

"There is talk of a stationing committee, not only for pastors, but also for district superintendents. However, if we adopt a different system, we must be careful not to swing into a drastic episcopal form. If we arrange so we can pull a man out of one place and put him in another, it may work all right, but I see danger. If we have a stationing committee, let it be made up of men who have no axe to grind, and who are not out for a pastorate.

"I hope at the next General Assembly there will be two or three general superintendents elected. The Pilgrim Holiness Church is too large for one man to supervise. Our foreign missionary work is suffering for lack of supervision. If you think we cannot support them, we should cut the salary until we can. Haven't we men who will work like the rest of us on a small salary? Let them hold a few camp meetings and revivals."

The report of the District Superintendent was read, bringing before the Assembly several resolutions which he had already brought before the District Board for consideration and approval and which are now brought to the attention of the District Assembly.

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REPORT OF S. M. STIKELEATHER DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

Through the providence of God we have come up to the Twenty-Third Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District with blessings untold upon us all that should call forth the deepest appreciation of our hearts and cause us to worship Him, the Giver of every good and perfect gift, with sincere humility and thanksgiving.

The year has been one of many battles, but, thank God! of some of the greatest victories we have ever witnessed. The united effort, cooperation and earnest prayers of our District officials, pastors, evangelists, and our people generally, have brought us increases on every line. Great revivals, which are outstanding with respect to attendance, demonstration and power, have brought results within the bounds of the District that are not usually witnessed. Hundreds have sought God at our altars for pardon or purity and many have been happy finders. Splendid membership gains have been made, with some of our churches doubling their membership during the year. Practically every Sunday School in the District has made gratifying progress with gains nearly everywhere. One new church has been organized and others that were at a very low ebb have been wonderfully revived. At present we have forty-two church buildings, forty-three church organizations, with forty-one Sunday Schools, and thirteen parsonages. Many improvements have been made during the year, most of which have been paid for and the indebtedness of our District has been decreased considerably.

Your humble servant has preached 205 times, held four revivals, assisted in a number of others, made four quarterly visits through the District and conducted 130 business meetings, visited and prayed in 255 homes of our people and friends, attended one General Board meeting in Indianapolis, and traveled about 15,000 miles for the District. The District has paid me \$1,500.00. My traveling expenses for the District has been \$450.00 at three cents per mile for my car.

Having studied the District needs from different angles and taking in the different conditions, as your superintendent, I would like to submit the following for your serious consideration:

- 1. Resolved that all of Sections 89-94 in our Manual on pages 52-54 be eliminated.
- 2. Resolved, That changes in Chap. 5, Sec. 151, page 80 of the Manual be made as follows:

"The ministerial delegation shall be selected at the ratio of one

to seven from actively engaged, ordained ministers," striking out the remainder of this paragraph to the following:

"The lay delegation shall be chosen from the local churches of each district at the ratio of one to every four hundred members, or fractional part thereof, by the District Assembly on the nomination of the District Board, no district to have less than one."

- 3. Resolved, That we have a uniform system of electing officers—local, district, and general, and that our present system of nominating and electing pastors be the basis of this system.
- Resolved, That in the election of our General Board each zone nominate eight men from which the General Assembly shall elect four.
- Resolved, That the General Board be given power to nominate men for District Superintendents, and where, in their judgment the need arises, they may cross boundary lines to get capable men.
- 6. Whereas, we have an overplus of good evangelists and a great need of more good pastors:

Be it resolved, That we urge as many of our evangelists as possible to take pastorates and, where needed, their support be supplemented from a fund created for the purpose by the District organization.

- Resolved, That the name of any minister, or lay member, who has been repeatedly guilty of insubordination or disloyalty be automatically dropped from our records without trial.
- 8. Resolved, That ministers, church officers, Sunday School teachers and officers, and officers of Young People's Societies be tithers, placing their tithes in the local church treasury.
- 9. Resolved, That our District Assemblies reject any recommendation from any local church board for the licensing of any minister who does not tithe and teach tithing into the local church treasury of which he is a member.
- Resolved, That any Sunday School Teacher who refuses to cooperate with the church and pastor be dropped at once as teacher and some one elected to fill the vacancy.
- Resolved, That no local church be allowed to call or retain a pastor who does not tithe and teach his people to tithe their income into the local church treasury of which they are members.
- 12. Resolved, That no licensed or ordained minister shall serve on any local church board except where a church hasn't enough members to choose from without electing a minister.

The budget system which was adopted by our last Assembly has met with the hearty approval of the great majority of our ministers and churches, so much so that many of our ministers and people have urged me on my last quarterly round to do everything I can to hold to the program adopted, as it has worked better than anything we have ever had. By further agitation and cooperation this District can not only raise double the amount for the District and general work of the church, but within the next two or three years, if Jesus tarries, we should be second to none according to our numerical and financial strength in our entire church connection. Agitation, cooperation, and determination will put the program of our church over with glorious victory.

May Heaven's richest blessings rest upon every minister and lay member, as well as our many friends throughout the bounds of this District.

The report of the District Superintendent was accepted by the Assembly.

It was decided that all statistical reports be turned in to the committee on statistics for compilation and report later in the Assembly.

The hours for business sessions were set at 9:00 a. m. to 11:30 a. m., and 1:30 to 4:00 p. m., evangelistic meetings to be held at 7:30 p. m.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

After the song service Brother Ruth prayed effectually and Sister Surbrook favored us with a beautiful solo which blessed the Assembly. Brother Surbrook read a part of the second chapter of Philippians and gave good counsel and admonition along the lines of Communion, Courtesy and Cooperation. We have only space for a brief synopsis of his talks. We wish we could give them in full.

"When I speak of communion, I have in mind, First—Our fellowship or communion with God. There is nothing in the world so important to us individually, and to us collectively as a church, and as a district, nothing so important in our progress as our communion and fellowship with God. The great, world-famous piano player, Paderewski, said: 'If I miss my practice one day, I notice it; if I miss it two or three days, my friends notice it; if I miss it a week, everybody else notices it.' If that is true of a piano player, how much more true it is with us in our fellowship and relationships with God. If I miss prayer for one day I notice it, I find a leanness in my soul. If I miss it two or three days my friends notice it, I am not quite as smooth as I have been, get ruffled a little easier. If I miss it a week, everybody else notices it.

"The greatest danger that faces us as a church is spiritual decay. We are trained how to do things while we are spiritual, then we get careless and travel on the momentum that we have gained while we were spiritual. We know how to do things because we have done them in the past and will continue to do them the same way from force of habit. It is so essential that we keep up our communion and fellowship with God, that in our own hearts we may enjoy day after day a bubbling, buoyancy of spirit.

"Communion with each other is also essential to our success. There never was a time in the life of our church when we needed camp meetings and revivals more than we do right now. The indifference and sleepiness of the last days is preying on us like a creeping paralysis. We need to be thrown together that our spirits may mingle; that we may get blessed together, and labor together in the work of the Lord. If we do not have it we will backslide.

"Courtesy. There is a proper pulpit courtesy that belongs to the ministry. Nobody ever backslides by being courteous. We all like to go to camp meetings where courtesy is extended to us. We know of a camp that is stagnating and dying because of lack of courtesy. We do not need to recognize Seventh Day Adventists, Russellites, Roman Catholics, or other false doctrines, but any minister whose reputation is all right, who belongs to any orthodox church should be shown proper courtesy. 'But,' you say, 'suppose he is not spiritual.' You should have fire enough in your own soul so that you could carry the meeting right over the top of his head. Somebody loves him and has confidence in him. The less you respect their minister, the more you add to their prejudice and I cannot help them so long as they are prejudiced.

"There is proper courtesy in speech, as well as action. Not only do we need to keep our communion clear and be properly courteous, but we need to have full cooperation. It does not pay a pastor to contend with his board over a lot of non-essentials, If there are no moral issues at stake, I would not put my brains up against their ideas. The pastor should have the full cooperation of his board. And the board should not pull more than one way. Neither can we succeed if the Sunday School superintendent pulls in one way and the class leader in another, and the remainder of the board holds to the pastor. We will never succeed unless we all put our shoulders to the wheel and all pull together. No local church can succeed without the fullest cooperation from the whole church. Neither can a district succeed unless it has the cooperation of every church in the district. How long would this district council succeed if two or three stood by the district superintendent and the others pulled off? I have never heard of anything but the finest cooperation in this council. I maintain that no pastor is loyal who is not standing by the district program. If you sit in the assembly and let legislation be passed without registering a protest, it is your part to stand by it. Tomorrow and the next day is the time to vote your convictions. If we don't stand by our laws, that is Bolshevism and it will not get us anywhere.

"If I am a loyal Pilgrim, I will take the church paper. It is the only paper in the world that carries the work of the Pilgrim Holiness

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Church. If I want to buy books, Bibles, mottoes, or anything we carry, I will patronize the Pilgrim Book Room. Even a song book that is not published by our people, we will send to our own office and give them a little margin of profit.

"Our Sunday School literature nets us approximately \$3,000 a year if all our churches send to the Advocate office. We publish the Advocate at a loss, and this profit makes up a part of this deficiency.

"If I am loyal, I will not send a dollar direct to the foreign field, but send it to the office and let it go from there and let the church as a whole get the credit. If I don't, I may support some servant girl who is posing as a native worker, as one lady in this country found she was doing.

"The local church is the underpinning of the whole church. One of our districts thought they could not support a superintendent. I suggested that they take a certain percentage of every offering that comes into the local church, except foreign missions, building funds, and some one wanted to except evangelists' offerings. Later I received a letter from that district stating that offerings have never come in as they are coming now. The District Treasurer could then support the District Superintendent with two-thirds, say, and send in the other third for the general work. I know a district doing that and having success when for years they could not support a superintendent.

"I am burdened over the fact that we are going forward so slowly in some of our districts. We used to blast out churches with tents. We don't have many tents, do we? How can be buy tents? The Holy Spirit made this suggestion to me: Ask each Sunday School in the district to give ten cents each Sunday. Let it flow into the hands of the church treasurer and when he sends in his offerings to the District Treasurer, let it be included. This District has 41 Sunday Schools. That would mean \$4.10 each week, or \$213.20 a year. When the fund becomes large enough, take from it and buy a tent. We would never miss it. Some Sunday Schools may want to chip in a little more."

The Reception Committee brought forward Rev. J. W. Covington, who is coming to us from the Virginia District; Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Russell, who have come from Kentucky to take charge of our mountain work; Rev. and Mrs. V. G. Story, from California, who are expecting to take work in our District.

Brother Surbrook made mention that it was under the ministry of Brother and Sister Russell that Sergeant York, of World War fame, was converted.

Motion carried that we rescind the action of the last District Assembly on page 12 of last year's minutes in sending two memorials to the General Assembly and send others which are clearer.

Motion carried that the election of officers be the order of the day as soon as the different committees have made report in the morning.

The Committee on Resolutions made report and the following memorials were passed to be sent as memorials to the General Assembly: 1. Resolved, That all of Sections 89-94 in our Manual, pages 52-54 be eliminated.

2. Resolved, That changes in Chap. 5, Sec. 151, page 80, of the Manual be made as follows:

"The ministerial delegation shall be selected at the ratio of one to seven from actively engaged, ordained ministers," striking out the remainder of this paragraph to the following: "The lay delegation shall be chosen from the local churches of each District at the ratio of one to every 400 members, or fractional part thereof, by the District Assembly, on the nomination of the District Board, no District to have less than one."

6. Whereas, we have an overplus of good evangelists and a great need of more pastors:

Be it resolved, That we urge as many of our evangelists as possible to take pastorates, and, where needed, that their support be supplemented from a fund created for the purpose by the District orgganization, and that this fund also include the needy pastors.

8. Resolved, That ministers, church officers, Sunday School teachers and officers, and officers of young people's societies be tithers, placing their tithes in the local church treasury.

9. Resolved, That our District Assemblies reject any recommendation from any local church board for the licensing of any minister who does not tithe and teach tithing into the local church treasury of which he is a member.

10. Resolved, That any Sunday School teacher who refuses to cooperate with the church and pastor be dropped at once as teacher and some one elected to fill the vacancy.

11. Resolved, That no local church be allowed to call or retain a pastor who does not tithe and teach his people to tithe their income into the local church treasury of which he is a member.

12. Resolved, That no licensed or ordained minister shall serve on any local church board, except where a church has not enough members to choose from without electing a minister.

The Assembly adjourned for the day.

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The Assembly reconvened at 9:00 o'clock with song and prayer. Our General Superintendent read a part of the 12th chapter of Romans, and commented on the sixth verse, "Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us." He again brought us wise counsel and advice under the headings of Talent, Trouble and Time.

Brother Phillips was called upon to explain a chart he had made showing what the churches had done regarding the General and District budgets. This chart was very illuminating and Brother Phillips was highly congratulated on his splendid work as Treasurer, the Assembly giving him a rising vote of thanks, especially for the chart.

The Committee on Resolutions continued their report and the following memorials to the General Assembly were passed:

13. Resolved, That we strike out Sections 83 and 84 of our Manual.

14. Resolved, That no member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall join another Pilgrim Holiness Church without a letter showing that he is in good standing.

15. Resolved, That no Pilgrim Holiness Church be organized and that no Pilgrim Holiness minister hold, a meeting within a radius of ten miles of any Pilgrim Holiness Church without the full cooperation of the local pastor, District Superintendent and the District Board.

16. Resolved, That any minister or lay member who has been repeatedly guilty of insubordination or disloyalty, after having been sufficiently dealt with, be dropped without trial.

17. Resolved, That each church revise its membership prior to the District Assembly.

The Ways and Means Committee reported the following recommendations which were adopted by the Assembly:

That Section 49, paragraph 3, be strictly enforced by the District Superintendent on his first quarterly round.

That the salary of the District Superintendent remain the same as last year, \$1,500.00, with an addition of \$200.00 for traveling expenses, making a total of \$1,700.00.

Since our ocphanage has been discontinued, we recommend that the birthday offerings be sent to the District Treasurer to help the struggling pastors and churches, and that the District Superintendent and Council disburse same.

That each Sunday School give ten cents each Sunday for the purchase of District tents, same to be held by the District Treasurer for this purpose.

Motion carried that all money on hand which has been given for District tents be held as a trust fund for this purpose.

Rev. Loudermilk, pastor of a nearby Christian Church, was recognized in the congregation, brought forward and presented to the Assembly. Mr. Leo F. Hinshaw, business man, of Elkin, who has been instrumental in the organization of our church at Elkin, was also introduced to the Assembly.

As all other business on hand had been disposed of, the election of officers was gone into, resulting in the election of Rev. S. M. Stikeleather as District Superintendent, and Rev. H. B. Barger as Assistant. The rules were set aside and Miss Cary Anthony was elected Secretary by acclamation, also Rev. W. R. Phillips, as Treasurer. Additional members of the Council were elected as follows: W. A. Way, O. L. Ruth, and R. I. McCluskey.

The Assembly adjourned for dinner.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Assembly reconvened at 1:30 and after song and prayer, Brother and Sister Russell, who have charge of our work at Bryson City and western North Carolina, gave an account of their work in this State and Tennessee.

Rev. Cox, a member of the Christian Church, was recognized in the audience, brought forward and introduced to the Assembly.

As our General Superintendent is now receiving as salary from the General Church just what they are able to pay him, an offering in pledges amounting to \$62.00 was taken for him on the Assembly floor.

The roll of preachers was called, answering to their names with the amount of subscriptions they would try to obtain for the Advocate during the coming year. Fifteen five-year subscriptions were taken and 340 one-year subscriptions promised.

The election of officers was resumed. Rev. H. B. Barger was reelected for a period of three years on the Board of Examination, and Rev. R. I. McCluskey was elected for three years on the Board of Education. H. B. Barger and O. L. Ruth were elected on the Board of Trustees for three years.

Motion carried that the District Council fill the vacancy on the Board of Trustees caused by the resignation of J. T. Kenyon.

It was found that we are entitled to nine ministerial delegates in addition to the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, the Secretary, and Rev. O. L. Ruth, who is a member of the Polity Committee. Motion carried that nomination of ministers be made from the fioor and elected by acclamation. The following were elected: W. A. Way, William R. Phillips, R. I. McCluskey, T. C. Vaughn, T. R. York, F. W. Henry, W. B. Creech, C. A. Brown, G. A. Castevens. Alternates: L. E. Schendel, G. C. Avery, J. B. Fulp, J. A. Grout, J. W. Covington.

The District Council was empowered to elect the lay delegates. As we have 1830 members in the District, they will be required to select ten delegates.

Motion carried that the District Superinendent appoint a standing Statistical Committee for the coming year. As our books close 30 days before the date of the District Assembly each year, and as the reports should be in the hands of the committee within a reasonable time, it will relieve this work from being done during the District Assembly. Brother Stikeleather appointed on this committee: Rev. and Mrs. Schendel and Rev. and Mrs. Storey.

The Ways and Means Committee recommended that our financial system remain the same as the past year, which the Assembly adopted. Motion carried that our pastors send their quarterly reports to the Treasurer, instead of to the District Superintendent, so that in his quarterly reports to the churches he may give credit proportionately to

every department of the work.

The Assembly adjourned for the day.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

After song, Bible verses by different ones, and prayer by Brother Avery, our Gen. Superintendent spoke to us on the maxim, "The door of opportunity will open as large as your preparation."

Brother Surbrook has been doing some figuring with road maps and told the Assembly that it was as much as 750 miles to Owosso, Mich., where our next General Assembly will be held, going through Winston, N. C., Charleston, W. Va., Columbus, O., etc. The General Board has figured five cents per mile for a car; that each car should carry four or five persons; that he thought our 23 representatives might be carried in five cars; and that, figuring on 1,500 miles for the round trip, or \$75.00 per car, \$375.00 should take care of the bare traveling expenses, figuring it at the minimum. As the expenses are to be prorated at the Assembly, this should bring down this figure somewhat. Those who are not delegates will be expected to pay their expenses at the Assembly: lodging 25c per night, breakfast 20c, dinner 25c, and supper 20c, or 90c per day and night. Each district will be asked to carry its share of this expense for its delegates.

As several of our young preachers had brought their wives and babies to the Assembly, a dedication service was held and our hearts were melted as Brother Surbrook held Patricia Joy McCluskey, Marilyn Ruth Aslin, Maxey Philip Avery, Peggy Jeanne Barger, and Mary Charlotte York in his hands, carried them to a throne of grace in prayer and gave them to the Lord. He said that he attributed his call to preach to the fact that his mother gave him when a child to God to be a preacher. He said that in his young days he did not know the way, as he was brought up in Seventh Day Adventism, but that he never rejected light.

The Committee on Resolutions reported and the following resolutions were adopted:

That our District Assembly convene on Tuesday after the last Sunday in September each year at 10:00 a. m. (This will cause our next Assembly to convene on October 2, 1934).

That this Assembly go on record as being absolutely opposed to the repeal of the 18th Amendment.

(Memorial to the General Assembly): Resolved, That a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church who has been dismissed by the local board may make a final appeal to the District Council if he, or she, feels that he, or she, has not been scripturally dealt with.

Liberty Hill gave an invitation to the Assembly to meet at that church another year. Accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee, together with the Committee on Resolutions, were excused at this time to work out a schedule to meet the expenses of the delegates to the General Assembly.

The Committee on Education reported the following names for ordination: T. E. Aslin, L. E. Schendel.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was read and accepted.

The Auditing Committee reported that the books of the Treasurer were in excellent shape. The Treasurer's report was read and accepted with thanks. Our General Superintendent commented on the good report and the gains that are being made, the efficient work of the Treasurer and also of the District Superintendent and other officials of the District, and all the faithful Pilgrims. He said in part, "If we can keep a burden on all our souls for others and keep pushing out for other souls it will keep us from picking flaws with each other. It will help us to live better, testify better, and pay better. I hope several of our churches will release their pastors from the Sunday evening service by getting some good man to take charge and also the midweek prayer meetings and let him blast out some other churches. Life is too short, souls are too precious for us to waste time. Let us reach out for others who are lost. Unless we do this, I cannot believe we are having Pentecostal experience in our churches. The door of opportunity is now open to us. It may soon be closed forever. A few years ago if we could have put a thousand missionaries in Mexico, we could have saved Mexico for God and the Gospel, but now whole sections are closed. The country is filled with Communism, Bolshevism. Atheism, and Russellism,

The combined committees (Ways and Means, and Resolutions) brought in the following which was adopted by the Assembly:

Resolved that the expenses of the delegates to the General Assembly be raised by an assessment equivalent to 25c per member, and that this amount be raised within eight months and sent to the District Treasurer.

The report of the Statistical Committee was read and accepted.

The General Superintendent suggested that in this day of shortage of money many people have supplies of provisions and it would be a good idea for the churches to set apart a certain prayer meeting night in each month to make donations to the pastor, the following resolution was adopted:

That each church give the pastor a pounding once a month.

Brother Surbrook, commenting on this, said, that as the pastor would not feel like going forward with this himself, the delegates

present should carry this matter home and tell their local church board that the District Assembly provided for it; that the board should appoint some one who is wide awake and will agitate it; that the board should decide what prayer meeting night to have it, and that the board should set it the prayer meeting night following pay day. The pastor should keep an account of the worth of these things so that his church will get credit for it. Some one may say that they don't know what to bring in. Well, the pastor eats like eveybody else. Bring in a peck of potatoes, or five pounds of sugar, or canned goods. The one appointed to look after this should mention the different things. Many outsiders will bring in things, and what the people bring in, the pastor does not have to buy. Some one should stir up the church about the time to buy the license for the pastor's car. You delegates should do this. Go out with a pad and paper, put down your own name for a dollar and go to others and say, "What will you give?" Surprise your pastor, for you don't know how long he has been praying for money to buy his license tags. Why don't you surprise the pastor by filling up his car when he comes to see you? Surprise your District Superintendent some time by putting a ham of meat in his car. His family has to live.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

After song and prayer Brother Surbrook brought to our attention the fact that one of our young missionaries to Jamaica, Brother George Pennypacker, had been obliged to return home for an operation; that his fare home had been at full rate because he had no missionary credentials; that Brothers Ford and Bingham spoke very highly of him and his work in Jamaica; that he is not a member of our church in the homeland, but that Brother Stikeleather has his letter of transmission to the United States from Jamaica where he is a member of our church, and that if this Assembly would grant the District Council permission to give him license, it would save the whole situation.

Motion carried that this Assembly grant power to the Council to give license to Brother George Pennypacker after he is a member of one of our churches.

Brother Barger suggested that his church very likely would like to have him as a member at Kannapolis.

The church at Thomasville and also the one at Asheboro extended an invitation to entertain the Ministerial Convention. After voting it was found that Thomasville obtained the greater number of votes.

Motion carried that the Ministerial Convention be held at Thomasville April 3-6. And the Assembly also empowered the Council to prepare a program for this Convention.

The appointments to the various churches and work were read.

An offering of \$10.04 was taken in the Assembly for Sister Anthony for her services as District Secretary.

Brothers Schendel and Aslin were ardained at this time, the charge being given by General Superintendent Surbrook with timely and weighty advice, with warning of serious pitfalls and full of helpful suggestions.

The main points of the minutes of this session were reviewed by the Secretary and approved by the Assembly.

A sweet spirit of unity prevailed throughout the entire conference for which we praise Him, the God of unity and strength, and press forward to glorify Him more during the coming year because of the strength we have obtained from our association with each other and the commingling of our prayers during these three wholesome days of true conference. We enjoyed the h lp and fellowship of our General Superintendent Surbrook and his sweet and gentle wife, who used to be one of our most promising North Carolina girls. We miss her from our midst, but rejoice that she has entered a larger field of usefulness. We enjoyed Brother Surbrook's messages in the evening services, especially the one on prophecy, or "The Signs of the Times," and also the message in song by Mrs. Surbrook and her sister, Mrs. Hinshaw. We also appreciate the royal hospitality of the good people at Kildee Pilgrim Holiness Church. May God bless them richly.

The Assembly adjourned to meet at Liberty Hill, Greensboro, October 3, 1934.
