Proceedings

The Twenty-eighth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District met in annual business session at the High Point Church on October 4, 1933, at 10:00 a. m., with Second Assistant General Superintendent L. W. Sturk, of Cincinnati, Ohio, presiding.

The session opened by singing "At the Cross" and "Blessed Assurance." Rev. G. A. Schoombie, superintendent of our work in Africa, led us to the Throne in prayer.

Rev. O. L. Ruth, our host, who has been pastor of the High Point Church for twenty-six years, made an address of welcome. He said that he hoped God's Kingdom would be advanced and our fellowship strengthened by our meeting together.

Rev. H. D. Dieter, president of the Allentown, Pennsylvania, Bible School, read parts of the 14th chapter of Romans.

Bro. Sturk spoke, greeting all in the name of the Lord. He then gave a lesson from the Scripture just read, using four "Cs."—"Charity" for others in regard to their convictions. "Conviction"—Let every one have definite convictions of his own from the Lord and he will have something definite to stand upon. "Caution"—Let us not criticize each other any more because we never know the motive of the soul. To our own Master we rise or fall. If we develop a harsh spirit against our brother we will be criticized by our brother; and, "Conclusion"—Let us have confidence in each other, majoring on the essential things to vital godliness, living up to the motto of our Church: "In Essentials Unity, in Non-essentials liberty, In All Things Charity."

The following business was transacted:

The roll was called.

By motion the assembly bar was fixed to take in the first seven pews across the Church, the platform and the pews to the left.

By motion the hours for business were fixed: 8:30 to 11:00 a. m., reassembling at 1:30: evangelistic service at night, Bro. Sturk preacher.

Rev. R. W. Wolfe, secretary of Home Missions, was rec-

ognized in the audience, asked to come forward, presented to the Assembly and asked to take a seat at the front.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent appoint some one to fill the vacancy on the Ways and Means Committee. J. A. Grout was appointed.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent appoint a committee on Condolence. Mrs. Gallimore, Mrs. Fulp and Mrs. Kenyon were appointed.

Upon motion the District Superintendent was asked to appoint a Reception Committee. He appointed C. C. Mc-Masters, J. B. Fulp and W. L. Cockman.

Bro. Sturk urged the committees to work as fast as possible in order to facilitate the work of the Assembly.

The Assembly recessed for lunch. Bro. Wolfe was asked to pronounce the benediction and pray especially for Bro. Barger, who has not been well for some time, and also for Bro. Ruth's mother, who is ill.

Tuesday, 1:30

After singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," and "Amazing Grace," Bro. Baldwin, our senior member, led in prayer with the blessing of God upon him.

The Albemarle Ladies' Trio sang in the Spirit of the Lord, "My Father is Looking Out for Me," and were made a blessing to the Assembly.

Bro. Sturk requested that as we go forward with business if any one felt like getting blessed, to go ahead.

Bro. Dieter read parts of the third and fourth chapters of II Corinthians. He exhorted the preachers to fearless preaching. "Don't be afraid of the truth," he said. "We need moral strength as well as physical strength. In the council meetings, and board meetings, have you moral strength? The devil is still going around seeking whom he may devour, and that means preachers as well as laymen. We should stand by the things that uphold the Word of God and not our own ideas and notions. And, too, if some one can preach better than you. don't let that keep you from doing your personal duty. It is the spirit of the preacher that is effective, more than what he says."

(We are sorry that we can't print all of the addresses, but are endeavoring to give some of the high spots in each.--Ed.)

The minutes of last sitting were read, corrected and approved.

The Chairman expressed, not only his surprise, but amazement, he said, over the fact that the statistical report was ready at the first sitting; that the Chairman of the committee usually has to beg and scold before he can get all the reports in and then is able to go ahead with his work, but here was a report ready the first thing. The report was called for and read, totals only, and accepted by the Assembly.

Motion carried that the Council be allowed to change the valuation of property where same does not seem to be correct.

Our Statistician was commended for his good work.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read, and accepted.

The Reception Committee brought forward and introduced to the Assembly—Bro. Boyd Kissler, from Ashboro; Bro. and Sister Wert, Pilgrims, from Pennsylvania Bro. Freeman, of High Point; Bro. William Armstrong, from People's Bible School; Z. A. Faison, from Roanoke Rapids, and Rev. C. B. Way, an M. P. preacher from Kernersville. These all gave their personal testimony.

The Committee on Resolutions reported. Nos. 1 and 2 were brought before the Assembly, discussed and adopted.

The following resolution was presented from the floor, discussed and referred to the Committee for revision:

Whereas: We fail to get in touch with each other in Sunday School work, therefore

Be it Resolved: That the Council divide the District into zones, and that Sunday School conventions be held on the fifth Sundays, making it a Quarterly Meeting. The officers shall be chosen under the direction of the pastors of said zones.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported, and Nos. 1 and 2 were accepted.

Bro. Davis and Sister Whitley, of Albemarle, were requested to sing, and rendered, very beautifully, "I Have Found Him."

Motion carried to have the Ordination Service the first thing Wednesday afternoon.

Motion carried that we have election of officers as soon as the committees have reported that have any bearing on same.

Motion carried to adjourn.

Evening Service

Bro. Sturk preached in a great service to the Christian ministry, on "A Passion for Souls." He said, "How do we get this passion? By realizing the value of souls; by realizing the machinery put in motion for the salvation of men. It costs tears and blood to win souls, but we are looking for the reward."

Wednesday, 8:30 a. m.

After song and prayer, Rev. R. W. Wolfe, Secretary of Home Missionary work of our Church, gave an impassioned talk on Missions, with Scripture reading on "Cure for Troubled Hearts." "There is a great load for our Church to bear," he said. "Lord, give us strength to bear it. These days are evil. These times are tragic, and it will blur our vision if we don't live in the heavenlies. We have to keep the dust out of our eyes if we are to do what God wants us to do. You can't be at your best until you can wet your cheek with tears of compassion for a lost world. If we have the Holy Ghost we will have all the power we need to take us up the hill. We need to start our missionary work on a spiritual foundation."

By common consent, the roll call was omitted.

The minutes of last session were read, corrected and approved.

Motion carried that the explanation of the General Budget, brought us by Bro. Wolfe, be printed in the Minutes.

Bro. Sturk gave a short talk on the qualifications and dignity of the Christian ministry: First, Spirituality—absolutely necessary; second, Education—needed; although it may seem hard to get, but it is necessary; third, Experience. We should stand by our older preachers. Experience is worth more than many other qualifications.

Bro. Sturk also commented on some of the reports that were to his mind very encouraging :

First, That there has been a gain of \$3,000 last year in pastors' supports.

Second, That there was a gain of 135 in membership. Though not a great gain, it was good. It was encouraging, when you consider that many churches are losing.

Third, That in the Sunday Schools there was a net gain in average attendance of 265.

Fourth, That the District Superintendent turned back into God's work over \$600. He said, "I am glad he was able to do that. Our work was born of prayer and sacrifice and it is necessary to carry it on. I believe God's blessing is on the District. The success of our Districts depends upon leadership. My advice is to give your leaders a free hand by giving them proper support."

The combined report of the Examining and Educational Committees was given. W. F. Page and C. C. McMasters were recommended for ordination.

Gurney Laws comes to us from the Friends' Church as a regularly ordained minister.

Bro. Freeman, from the M. P. Church, and Bro. Laws, from the Friends' Church, were formally received into the Conference.

Bro. Grady Castevens, who has recently moved to the Virginia District, was brought forward and welcomed into our midst.

According to a former motion, the election of officers was the order of the day.

Upon motion the District Superintendent appointed Bros. Vaughn, York, Grout, and Smith, as tellers.

Motion carried that we use the blackboard for tallying votes.

S. M. Stikeleather was elected District Superintendent.

The District Superintendent was empowered to appoint the Standing Committees, which he did, as follows:

Ways and Means: W. R. Phillips, O. L. Ruth, J. A. Grout, T. R. York, D. R. Saunders.

Statistical: L. E. Schendel, R. I. McCluskey, Mrs. L. E. Schendel.

Auditing: R. I. McCluskey, Mrs. D. R. Saunders, Cary Adelaide Anthony.

Editing: Cary Adelaide Anthony, R. I. McCluskey.

The sitting adjourned by expiration of time. Benediction by Bro. Schoombie.

Wednesday, 1:30 p. m.

After a good song and testimony service, C. C. McMasters and W. F. Page were ordained, Bro. Sturk giving the charge, assisted by the brethren of the Council in reading of the Word and prayer. (We give elsewhere the main points of the charge).

The Assembly resumed business. The report of the Auditors was read and accepted. The Treasurer's report was then read and accepted.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported, recommending Nos. 3 and 4. No. 3 was lost and No. 4 adopted.

Attention was called to the resolution of last year regarding a camp meeting and assembly ground (page 9, last year's Minutes). This seems to have been understood by the District Superintendent and Council to have been connected with the sale of the Bible School building. The District Superintendent explained that there had been no satis-

factory offer for the building; that it is now rented by the WPA for a sewing room, etc., and that the rent is being used to pay a large street paving assessment.

Motion carried that our District Council take some steps in organizing a District Camp Meeting.

The list of appointments was read.

Bro. Schoombie expressed his appreciation of the letter of sympathy sent him by the Assembly last year after the death of his wife.

Motion carried that we give a rising vote of thanks to our Chairman, Rev. L. W. Sturk, for the fair and impartial way in which he has conducted our Assembly. He responded with an expression of thanks for this appreciation and commended the Assembly for the good spirit and the intelligent way they have done business.

As there seemed to be some misunderstanding regarding our financial plan, the Treasurer was called upon to explain. He explained that the 10 per cent. from the Church offerings, the five cents per member for delegate expense to the General Assembly, and the birthday offerings for our Mountain work, was all there was to be sent him, except the \$3.00 per member per year for the General Budget, which goes to Home and Foreign Missions and administrative expense. "And aren't you glad," he said, "that there will be nothing more said about the fund for the Bible School, if you come up with your 10 per cent.?"

Announcement was made that we were ready for invitations to entertain the Assembly another year. As none were made, motion carried that we leave the matter of place in the hands of the District Council.

Motion carried to leave the printing of the Minutes in the hands of the Editing Committee, 800 to be printed.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent get 100 of the General Assembly Minutes, which he promised to do, carry them around and sell, if possible.

Motion carried that we leave any unfinished business to be handled by the Council.

The minutes of the last two sittings were read, corrected and approved.

Motion carried to adjourn. The Assembly closed with the song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds Our Hearts in Christian Love." Prayer by Bro. Sturk:

“Our Heavenly Father, we thank Thee for this time of fellowship and love and unity which we have enjoyed so immensely. We thank Thee for the unity of these brethren. While in some matters we have not agreed, but there has been no evidence of bitterness, nor anything of the kind that we have discovered. Thou hast been good to us during the past year. Not a preacher has died, and we thank Thee for these things.

“Now, Lord, bless dear Bro. Stikeleather as he takes hold of the work again for the new year. Undergird him with the Everlasting Arms. May he feel that these preachers are behind him with their prayers and interest and support. Bless every member of this annual meeting and be very near.

“Bless Bro. Barger, we pray. Touch his body and grant that when next year rolls around he will be here with more vigor and be better than he has ever been before—we ask in the name of Jesus, who promised that if two agree as touching anything it shall be done. We trust that we have prayed in the Holy Ghost for the recovery and perfect healing of this dear brother. What we ask in faith, believing, you have promised to do.

“If the Master should come in the year that is before us, may we enter into the glory of the Lord. In Thy worthy name, amen.”

District Superintendent's Report

To the Twenty-eighth Annual Assembly of the Southern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Greetings:

We are coming to the close of another year which has been filled with many hard-fought battles, but, thank God, He has given us victory in the midst of battle.

Our pastors have worked hard and a large part of the credit is due them for the victories won. The evangelists and special singers have contributed much also to the success God has given us. However, had it not been for the co-operation of our splendid Pilgrims and many friends throughout the District we would have come far short of the victories we are now enjoying.

There has been splendid increase on many lines, especially in our Sunday Schools and numbers of our Churches. Many material improvements have been

made in the way of painting building additions, finishing up Churches, remodeling, etc., etc.

Many splendid revivals have been held in the District, quite a number of which were in new territory. In some of these new places prospects are good for permanent organizations. We must go forward in our District, but it is going to take hard work, co-operation and finances to do it.

One more year will put us out of debt on our Bible School property, for which I am sure we are all very grateful, but it is going to take every Church in the District working at the job to accomplish this. While I am on the Bible School subject, it is my honest conviction that one of the great needs of our Southland is a good live, wide-awake Bible Training School for our young ministers and missionaries.

Your superintendent has visited the Churches of the District three times, and a number of them four or more times; has conducted one District Assembly, attended two General Board meetings and our General Assembly at Owosco, Mich.; has conducted two revivals and helped more or less in several others; has seen many souls pray through, but has left the reporting to the pastors; has traveled about 22,000 miles, and my actual traveling expenses for the District has been \$271.22; has preached 184 times; prayed in 268 homes; conducted 143 business meetings. I have received \$1,800 for District work; \$55 for revivals, and \$150 as General Secretary. I have returned in gifts and tithes into the Lord's work \$661.50 during the year.

I believe the dear Lord has helped me to grow in grace, and my greatest desire is to be a better man and to please and glorify Him.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions

1. Whereas: There is no recognition given to our members who have died, therefore,

Be it Resolved: That a half hour be set aside at some time during our District Assembly for a Memorial Service for our membership who have died during the year, and that their names appear on the page of Memoirs in the Minutes. Adopted.

2. Whereas: The major contact of our Church with the unsaved is through the Sunday School, and proper teaching is of immeasurable value, therefore,

Be it Resolved: That our District Superintendent, on his first round, take up the matter of a Teacher Training Class for each Sunday School. Adopted.

Report of the Committee on Ways and Means

1. We recommend that we change the wording of the standing Recommendation No. 2, Page 18, 1937 Minutes, dropping the words, "District Evangelists' offerings," making it read, "Revival offerings." Adopted.

2. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Expense Fund to the General Assembly. Adopted.

3. Since considerable time is required by the general office which our present District Superintendent holds, we recommend that the District pay him \$1,600 per year. Lost.

4. Since the general budget is set by the General Assembly at \$3.00 per member per year; we, therefore, recommend that the District funds be raised on the percentage basis, and that 10 per cent. of all regular Church and Sunday School offerings be sent to the District Treasurer for District expense and that one per cent. of said amount be reserved for the Building and Loan Fund. Adopted.

IMPORTANT MOTIONS FROM THE FLOOR

1. Motion carried that the District Council take some steps in organizing a District Camp Meeting.

Qualifications of a Pilgrim Preacher

L. W. STURK (Ordination)

1. The Pilgrim preacher should have a real experience in grace. Know your standing and right relationship with God.

2. The Pilgrim preacher should regard his task in the highest sense. We are representatives of the government of God, ambassadors of the Kingdom of God.

A Pilgrim preacher should preach the Word, not his own convictions in regard to non-essentials and personal matters. Much havoc has been brought to God's Church because little men persist in trying to lay upon the shoulders of others things that are their own. You should have convictions, but don't attempt to line up others with your convictions.

Preach the Word, don't preach your own experience; that is, don't hold your own experience up as a standard. The Word of God is light and life—you must know the Word. "Study to show thyself approved unto God." You are called to please God and not the people. Hold a high standard.

4. A Pilgrim preacher must not compromise. Our only hope is in high standards and experience. High standards alone will make legalists out of us, but a good experience will keep you steady. Keep a good experience.

5. The Pilgrim preacher should keep out of debt. You should hate dirt, debt, and the devil. It is unfortunate when preachers have to move from church to church and leave behind them a string of debts.

6. The Pilgrim preacher should keep clean, not only morally, but physically clean. Filth and godliness don't hook up together, nor will it commend itself to the people to whom we minister.

7. A Pilgrim preacher should be loyal to his Church. I have heard preachers full of criticism against the leaders and the policies of the Church. If your Church is worthy of your membership, it is worthy of your loyalty, but if you don't like this one, the country is full of churches. If you are going to preach it, stand by its policies. I have very little respect for any preacher who will accept credentials from any denomination and then criticize the Church.

8. The Pilgrim preacher should have a passion for souls, a real burden that will make him spend hours alone with God weeping over the lost.

9. The Pilgrim preacher should have the anointing of the Spirit. There is no substitute. A preacher who keeps the anointing will succeed. Christ would not let the early Church go out until after they had tarried and the

Holy Ghost came upon them. Keep the anointing and the glory in your souls and you will have gladness in your heart. Be men of prayer. Victories are gained by waiting on God.

10. Remember that the Rewarding Day is coming by and by. Let your consuming desire be the salvation of souls.

The General Budget

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. Question: What is the General Budget?

Answer: General Budget is the term used to designate the finances of the General Church.

2. Question: What interests are included in the General Budget?

Answer: The interests included in the General Budget are three in number, namely (1) Foreign Missions, (2) Home Missions and Church Extension, and (3) General Administration.

3. Question: What is included in General Administration?

Answer: General Administration includes the salaries of the General Superintendent, General Treasurer (in part) and General Secretary (in part), the upkeep of the Headquarters property, the General Office expense, and the expenses of the General Board.

4. Question: How are the Districts to know the proportionate amount of the General Budget each District is to raise in a year?

Answer: The General Assembly of 1938 adopted the following measure:

"Resolved, That the General Board be empowered to set a General Budget of not more than three dollars (\$3.00) per member to cover Missions (Foreign Missions and Home Missions) and Administrative Expenses—BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the General Board pro-rate the said Budget to the Districts according to their membership." (Minutes of the General Assembly, Tenth Sitting.)

5. Question: How are the local Churches to know how much of this General Budget each one of them is to raise?

Answer: From the Districts the local Churches will learn their apportionment which is on the same basis, namely, at the rate of \$3.00 per member, per year.

6. Question: How are the General interests represented in the \$3.00 per member?

Answer: According to the action of the General Assembly of 1938 it is provided that "For the year 1938-39, \$2.00 for Foreign Missions, 50c for Home Missions and 50c for Administrative expense. For the years 1939-42, \$1.90 for Foreign Missions, 60c for Home Missions and 50c for Administrative expense."

7. Question: Did the General Assembly and the General Board mean that this \$3.00 per member should be an assessment of the members?

Answer: Decidedly no. These amounts are simply to guide the Districts and in turn the local Churches to know the total amount each District and each Church should raise. In raising the quotas, Churches will find that some members cannot give as much as \$3.00, while others can and will give much more.

8. Question: Is the amount of \$3.00 per member the maximum or the minimum amount to be raised?

Answer: It is the minimum amount. Every Church should give as much more as possible. The Pilgrim Holiness Church is not just trying to raise a certain amount of money, it is engaged in world evangelism.

9. Question: When are local Churches allowed to specify? That is, when may they say where their funds are to be applied?

Answer: The General Assembly of 1938 provided: "That when a local Church has raised the quota asked of it by the District, that said local Church shall be permitted to stipulate the interest or interests, to which said surplus shall be directed."

10. Question: Why are local Churches asked to refrain from specifying funds until after the minimum quota for all General Budget interests is raised?

Answer: Because the General Church is obligated to its missionaries at home and abroad, its officers, and other responsibilities in the same ratio as the divisions of the General Budget are indicated in Question No. 6. This same ratio in giving needs to be maintained at least until the minimum (\$3.00) is given.

11. Question: Is any provision made for the handling of special gifts from outside friends who wish to designate their funds for certain missionary interests? Or for our own people, some of whom, at times, have larger amounts to be used for specified purposes in the General Church?

Answer: There is no General Assembly legislation that attempts to cover the action of individuals, as such, at this point. But inasmuch as Churches are composed of individual members, it is rightfully expected that all members will contribute to their Church's quota until it is paid. What they do in addition and as individuals the Church recognizes as being a matter of their own conscience before the Lord.

Friends who are not members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, are, of course, in no way responsible for its maintenance. However, if any such friends feel constrained to give of their means on the Church's quota or otherwise, such contributions should be gratefully and readily received and the donor's wishes concerning the contribution faithfully carried out.

12. Question: How are the General Budget funds to be raised?

Answer: The General Assembly of 1938 provides, "That each District shall raise said Budget according to its own plans."

13. Question: Does any General Church agency recommend any plan for the raising of such funds?

Answer: Yes. The Stewardship Committee of the General Board, created by the General Assembly of 1938, strongly recommends that Foreign Missionary money be raised under its own head and that Home Missionary money be raised under its own head, and that this be done in connection with special services held separately, one in the interest of Foreign Missions and the other in the interest of Home Missions. The Stewardship Committee also recommends that the Districts raise their share of the General Administration fund along with the District administration funds.

The raising of the General Administration funds should have first consideration in the raising of the General Budget.

14. Question: Why does the Stewardship Committee recommend the raising of the Foreign Missionary money and Home Missionary money separately?

Answer: Because experience has proved that the people need the inspira-

tion and instruction received in such special services; that the missionary interests of the Church are too many and too varied to be successfully presented at the same time; and that when each is presented under its own head both the Church and the missionary interests prosper to a greater degree.

15. Question: Why does the Stewardship Committee say that in raising General Budget funds the General Administration fund should have first consideration?

Answer: Because of the nature of such funds. See Question No. 3. Our Headquarters, General Board, General Officers, Headquarters Office must be maintained. Sometimes people think these things are all secondary. They are secondary to salvation but they are of primary importance in an organization such as ours. A wheel cannot run without its hub.

16. Question: What is the District Treasurer to do about allotting funds received to the three interests of the General Budget?

Answer: Since the General Assembly left the subject of methods used in raising the General Budget to the Districts, the District Treasurer will need to be governed by the legislation of his own District.

17. Question: What does the General Treasurer do when he receives General Budget money from the District Treasurer? Does the General Treasurer arbitrarily divide all funds received?

Answer: No, the General Treasurer does not arbitrarily divide funds received, for this would involve the division of special gifts from friends and the surplus giving of local Churches that have met their quotas and wish to specify. The General Treasurer places monies received according to the instructions received from the District Treasurer at the time remittance is received.

18. Question: What is the best things that pastors can do to promote a proper interest in the General Budget?

Answer: Those pastors will have good success who remember that true worship and service in giving has its source in two things: (1) New Testament spirituality and (2) in right teaching.

19. Question: By whom is this bulletin of Questions and Answers about the General Budget issued? Is it official?

Answer: Yes, it is official. This bulletin is published and circulated by the Stewardship Committee, which Committee is authorized by the General Assembly to do work of this kind.
