

Proceedings

The Twenty-Ninth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District met in annual business session at the Albemarle Church on October 3, 1939, at 10:00 a.m., with General Superintendent W. L. Surbrook presiding.

The song service was led by Bro. Salvador, of Evansville, Ind., with Sister Salvador at the piano. The oldest minister in the District, Bro. Baldwin, led us to the throne in prayer, asking that the will of God be carried out in our conference and that we be brought closer together.

Bro. Surbrook, in opening the session, said that it was good to be saved, glorious to be sanctified, and that he was happy to be here. He brought greetings from the other districts and said that God has given splendid assemblies and fine camps, and he was looking for a great time here in the Lord. He thanked the District for its co-operation in the general work.

Supt. Surbrook read from the sixth chapter of II Corinthians and dwelt especially on the fact that we are co-workers with God. He stressed the different admonitions of the apostle to holy living as ministers of God, in the characteristic, strong, Surbrook manner.

The pastor at Albemarle, Bro. Saunders, greeted and welcomed the Assembly.

The following business was transacted:

The roll was called and the Assembly bar was fixed to include all the church except the four rear seats and the rear Sunday School room. The hours for meeting were set: 9:00 to 11:30; 2:00 to 4:00; 7:15 in the evening, the General Superintendent to preach.

The report of the District Superintendent was called for, read and accepted. The General Superintendent, in commenting on it, said that he appreciated the fact that the Southern District is always consistently going forward.

The session adjourned for lunch.

Tuesday, 1:30 P. M.

After singing, "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story," many requests were brought in for prayer, especially for Bro. Deal, chairman of our committee on Education, who is stricken with something like malarial fever. Bro. McCluskey led, under the power of God.

The District Superintendent appointed Bros. Vaughn and Avery on the Reception Committee.

Our host, Bro. Saunders, was requested to see if he could secure the M. E. Church for the evening service, as our Albemarle church is rather small. He reported later that the Methodist pastor would be delighted to have us. The District Superintendent appointed Bro. McCluskey and Sis-

ter Anthony as a committee to send the M. E. pastor a letter of appreciation and thanks, which they did, as follows:

Rev. J. S. Gibbs, Albemarle, N. C.,

Dear Bro. Gibbs: The Twenty-Ninth Assembly of the Southern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in regular session at Albemarle, N. C., in appreciation to you and your Church for your magnanimous offer of your building for the evening service, extend our heartiest gratitude and thanks.

The Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District, By Cary A. Anthony, Sec'y.

Bro. Surbrook delivered a strong admonition to our ministers and workers on "Approved Ministers", using three Ls: Your Life, Your Loyalty, Your Leadership. (We give some short excerpts.—Ed.):

Your prayer life —nothing more important. Do you really pray, or do you just say words? Your study life—a call to preach is a call to prepare. Study will keep you fresh, informed, and in demand. Your ministerial life—are you really ministering to the spiritual needs of your people? A man without God and without grace can build sermons. Another thing—your empty pews are the most expensive things in your church. Contacting people is the most important phase of your ministry. The most successful pastor is the one who will do the most visiting and praying and inviting people to the Church.

Your loyalty—Is your devotion such that you can say, "Follow me as I follow Christ"? If every member of your Church had your kind of loyalty, what kind of a church would you have? Every Church should pick out its best laymen, members of the Church board, as delegates to the Assembly.

Loyalty—Are you spiritually balanced, or do you go up like a balloon or off like a cannon? A leader must have spiritual and mental poise. Does your loyalty attach your congregation to God, or to yourself? Does your leadership lead your followers to deeper piety and holy love, and all for God, and to tithe into the Pilgrim Holiness Church?

The roll of ministers was called, each one answering with the number of subscriptions they will try to get for the Advocate—466 were promised.

The Reception Committee brought forward:

Bro. and Sister Grout, from California, father and mother of our pastor at Troy; Rev. Donald DeWare, evangelist, who is working in the District; Rev. R. Wingrove Ives, missionary from the West Indies; Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Walker, from Elkin; Rev. and Mrs. Roy Rummage, from the Bethlehem circuit; Rev. and Mrs. Layton L. Lange, from Salisbury; Rev. G. A. Castevens, from the Virginia District.

Bro. and Sister Salvador favored the Assembly with a duet, "I'm On the Battlefield For My Lord."

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

A new Church at Denton was presented to the Assembly and accepted with gratitude to our workers who made it possible, and to God.

The statistical report was called for and read, totals only, and accepted.

Motion carried that we instruct the statistician to place the same evaluation on our Church property which was placed last year by the Council, adding this year's improvements.

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

Motion carried that the time be extended until five o'clock.

The District Superintendent appointed the following committee on Memoirs: Mrs. J. B. Fulp, Mrs. W. B. Walker, Mrs. Clyde Morrison.

The Ways and Means Committee reported. Nos. 1 and 2 accepted.

The committee on Resolutions reported.

No. 1. Whereas many of the commercial programs on the radio are not in harmony with the teachings of the Bible, therefore, be it resolved that none of our ministers broadcast their services except when the program is sponsored by the local Church, or ministerial association.

Substitute motion: Resolved: That our Churches and ministers refrain from commercial advertising in their radio programs on the Sabbath day.

The substitute motion was carried.

The session adjourned by expiration of time.

Tuesday Evening Service

- Rev. W. L. Surbrook preached to a large and appreciative audience on the subject, "Desiring Things of the Lord." Text, Luke 11:24. "Therefore I say unto you, whatsoever things ye desire when ye pray, believe that ye receive them and ye shall have them." Pray until you believe that you receive them and you shall receive them. There are three inseparable links in the lives of Christians forged and welded together.
 - 1. Consistent prayer life.
- 2. Enjoys a clear spiritual vision. He lives in the light, walks in the light, and the Blood keeps him clean.
- 3. He enjoys an internal urge, an automatic desire to see things accomplished for God. A man that does nothing has quit praying. If we can get the Church to desire things as the world desires things we will accomplish something. When the world desires, it spares neither men nor means. I wish we had Pilgrims who will weep all night like Samuel did over Saul. We are too quick to condemn. If we could get the Church to pray like they prayed for Peter, we would see things done.

Wednesday, 9 A. M.

After singing, "Rock of Ages," prayer was offered by W. L. Cockman.

As had been innounced Pev. R. Wingrove Ives, from the West Indies, gave a wonderful missionary address on "The Gospel on Wings."

First wing—Consecration. Is your consecration deep enough to send you anywhere in the will of God? If this is true, we would have a different story to tell another year. Charles Spurgeon told his son that if God had called him to be a missionary he would be ashamed of him if he shrivelled down to be the king of England.

Wing of Devotion—opposite the wing of consecration. We need men and women so devoted to their work that in every and all conditions they will spend and be spent in the service of the King.

We need that touch of sympathy. Unless our hearts bleed over the lost of the earth, we will do nothing. We need the Master's spirit and compassion to girdle the globe.

Wing of Faith—If we had more faith in God, our officials would not have so many problems. It doesn't take much grace to criticize, find fault and see weaknesses. There are one thousand million souls dying without the Gospel. Does it mean anything to us?

Wing of Prayer—How often we are hindered by the low tide, the low prayer life among our people.

The Wing of Sacrifice—I think the devil has clipped our wings, but if we can put this wing to our Gospel it won't be long until we can go to the ends of the earth.

Wing of Ambition—Let us have the ambition to be the man or woman God wants us to be. As the man who was exhausted in saving men and women shipwrecked went out again to save others said, "How can I stay here when they are dying out there?" Then after saving more, with his last breath asked, "Did I do my best?" Let us do our best to get the Gospel to the ends of the earth.

The Reception Committee brought forward Sister Ruth Heim, from Ohio, singer, who has been laboring in our District; and Bro. Rahenkamp, who comes to us from the Friends' Church.

The committee on Resolutions brought in a resolution concerning an organization to raise funds for building new churches. It was discussed at length, amended, then referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

A report from the committee appointed to take some steps in the organization of a District Camp Meeting was called for. Bro. Stikeleather, as chairman of the committee, reported that nothing satisfactory had been found to locate this work.

Motion carried that the District Council provide a place for a District Camp for this coming year.

W. B. Walker, Roy Rummage, Layton L. Lange, and William T. Rahen-kamp were received as ministers into our Assembly.

Motion carried that we have election of officers. District Superintendent appointed as tellers: Bros. Vaughn, Freeman, McMasters, York. Smith, Farlow, Avery, Cockman, Brown. After prayer, the following officers were elected:

Bro. Ives favored us with a solo, "Pearls By the Way."

Motion carried to give our District Superintendent a two weeks' vacation.

The session adjourned.

Wednesday, 1:30 P. M.

After song, "I Will Sing of My Redeemer," a number of requests came in for prayer, especially for Bro. Ives' son, who is afflicted at this time. Bro. Ruth led us to the Throne.

Bro. Surbrook gave a strong talk on the dangers of the times in which we are living and exhorted us to remember our motto, "In essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty, in all things charity." He said, "Let us stand together like we never have."

Bro. Barger called attention to Bro. Sturk's prayer last year, recorded in last year's minutes and said that he would be very ungrateful if he didn't thank every one who had prayed for him. He is practically well today.

The Reception Committee brought forward Rev. and Mrs. Horne, pasters of the Church of the Nazarene at Concord, and Sisters Cloer and Morgan, our girls, singers, who are doing splendid work in meetings in the District.

The District Superintendent appointed the same standing committees who have served so faithfully the past year, with the addition of J. A. Grout and Chas. L. Stout, on Reception Committee.

The Ways and Means Committee brought in a redrafted recommendation in place of the resolution referred to them in the morning session. This was amended and passed, No. 3, Ways and Means.

The committee on Memoirs made report which was accepted.

A rising vote of thanks was given to both the General Superintendent

and the District Superintendent for the splendid manner in which the Assembly has been conducted.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the energetic and enterprising pastors of the Albemarle Church, Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Saunders, and to the members and friends of the Church for their fine entertainment and royal hospitality shown to us throughout the Assembly.

The business of the Assembly closed with a very impressive ordination service in which the five recommended candidates placed themselves upon the Church's altar, and were ordained and set apart for service.

(We quote from the District Assembly minutes of 1931, Randleman, N. C.: "An urgent request came to the Assembly from Ramseur for an unsaved boy who had fallen from a bridge and broken his back. Business was suspended while we prayed that the Lord might particularly touch his soul, and, in His wisdom, his body also." We are happy to say that the Lord touched both, and this young man, well, in both body and soul, was among those ordained.—Ed.)

The Assembly closed with prayer by Bro. Surbrook:

"Heavenly Father, we thank Thee for this good Assembly. We do not remember any time when we have been here when there has been more tenderness and the presence of the Lord has been with us more than at this time. We appreciate Thy holy fellowship and the fellowship of the brethren. As we launch out on the new year, smooth out the rough places and give us grace to go down into every valley and meet every enemy.

"Oh, God, bless our District Superintendent. Give him a humble heart and a strong spirit. Give him souls and churches and Sunday schools. And what we pray for him, we pray for his Assistant also, and the Secretary, and the Treasurer, and the other members of the Council. God bless the Council! There are so many problems which filter through to them which other people don't know anything about and they have to worry over them.

"As pastors go back to their pastorates, don't let them get into a rut and be satisfied to just do a little. Give us labors more abundant.

"Help us to win souls. Bless every pastor and every Church and all our evangelists and workers, and when we meet next year, if we are not all in heaven, may we meet with new visions, to rejoice over new churches and new duties.

"As these people leave for their homes, don't let any tires blow out nor any drunken drivers run into them; get us to our homes in the fulness of the blessing of the Lord, without accident. Bless us and protect us. In Thy Name. Amen!"

District Superintendent's Report

Greetings to the Twenty-Ninth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District:

We have come to the close of another year of glorious victory for which we give God all the praise. The victories won have been through the splendid co-operation of our faithful pastors, evangelists, special singers and our loyal Pilgrims generally.

There have been splendid gains made in many places in our Churches and Sunday Schools, also among our Young People's Societies. We have had four District Young People's Rallies which have been largely attended and greatly blessed of the Lord.

Many material improvements have been made during the year. At the following places additions or improvements of various kinds have been made: High Point has built a \$14,000.00 addition, which makes it the largest church in our entire connection. Siler City has done inside finishing work which has added much to the property there. Ramseur has built a splendid addition besides other improvements, which have greatly enhanced the value of their property. Kernersville is now building a splendid addition that will enable them to do much better work. Winston-Salem has enlarged and refinished the main auditorium, which gives them a splendid plant. Brown's Chapel has been brick-veneered also a splendid hardwood floor has been put in. Fayetteville has put in a new floor, new seats and other inside improvements. Mt. Zion, in Davidson County, has built a nice Sunday School room.

Mt. Zion, in Moore County, has painted outside, also Staley and Bryson City. Mt Olivet has bought a piano, painted inside and finished their seats ricely The following Churches have installed electric lights during the year: Brown's Chapel, Liberty, Kildee, High Falls, Staley, Mt. Olivet and Mt. Zion in Davidson County.

Parsonages enlarged, improved or painted, are: Salisbury, St. Paul, High Point, Winston-Salem, Thomasville Kannapolis, Hillsboro, Burlington, Randleman and Bryson City. Mt. Zion, in Davidson County, has built a beautiful new parsonage which is also equipped with electric lights.

Troy is completing a splendid new brick building that would be a credit to any community. Oakboro Mission has also erected a nice frame structure. Lumber is being placed on the ground for new churches at Sawyersville and Thurman which we hope to have erected in the near future.

A new Church has been organized at Denton with fifteen charter members and plans are being made for the erection of a new Church there at the earliest date possible. Members have been received into fellowship at Ballard's Mission, Oakboro Mission and Thurman. These places are looking forward to church organizations in the near future. Prospects are good for an organization in Union County, where a tent meeting was held this summer by some of our workers from Albemarle, who are holding regular services there.

Your unworthy servant has had the privilege of conducting four revivals in which 273 professed to be either saved or sanctified. One of these was one of the very best I have ever witnessed in my thirty-seven years' experience. The power and demonstrations of God's Spirit in this revival cannot be described with human words. Have helped in several other revivals which were greatly blessed of the Lord. Have preached 208

times, conducted 149 business meetings and prayed in 205 homes. Have witnessed several cases of definite healing, one or two of which have been really miraculous. Have travelled 22,000 miles for the District, and 6,100 for the General Church and myself. At three cents per mite my expenses for the District have been \$660.00. Have received my salary in full, and the Lord has enabled us to turn back into His work, \$380.28. I am conscious of His Divine approval and can sincerely say this has been the best year of my life. Praise the Lord.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions

1. Resolved: That our Churches and ministers refrain from commercial advertising in their radio programs on the Sabbath day.

Report of the Committee on Ways and Means

- 1. We recommend that the Churches which failed last year to pay the five cents per member on delegate expense to the General Assembly, pay ten cents per member the coming year. Adopted.
- 2. We recommend that, whereas the payments on our Bible School building are now finished, we set aside \$60.00 per month from the District funds to be used for equipment and operating expenses for the school, which is expected to open in the fall of 1940. Adopted.
- 3. We recommend that we donate to any new church that needs help dollar for dollar out of the District funds up to \$100.00, and then make them a loan as funds permit.
