Proceedings

The Thirtieth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Hcliness Church of the Southern District met in annual business session at the Winston-Salem Church on October 8, 1940, at 10:00 a. m. District Superintendent S. M. Stikeleather opened the Assembly. The song service was led by Rev. T. C. Vaughn, of the Thomasville Church. Rev. Stikeleather read parts of the 133d Fsalm and the 13th of Hebrews. Many special requests came in for prayer and we were led to the Throne by Rev. W. A. Way, of the Edgeville Church.

Superintendent Stikeleather presented Rev. L. W. Sturk, Assistant General Superintendent to the Assembly, as presiding officer of the Assembly, in the absence of General Superinterdent Surbrook, who is ill at this time. In taking charge, Bro. Sturk mentioned several things that we should be thankful for this morning: That we have health and strength, which we owe to the Lord, and that our nation has not been plunged into war. He said he hoped the Assembly would be saturated with prayer; the anointing of the Lord be upon us; that we may honor the Holy Ghost; and, that all personal ambition be set aside. Bro. Sturk then gave a strong talk on the place, purpose, and progress of our Church, after which the following business was transacted:

The roll was called, showing an almost perfect attendance, and the Assembly bar was fixed to take in all the Church, except a part of the Sunday School rooms, which will be reserved for visitors.

The following visitors were brought forward and presented to the Assembly: Rev. H. C. Kiser, from Kannapolis, a former member of the Missionary Methodist Church, who is casting his lot with us; Rev. D. T. Grout, Sunday School worker, from California; Rev. J. H. Felter and wife, from Pennsylvania, who spent a part of his boyhood days at Ramseur, when his father was pastor there; Rev. A. J. Wilcox, from Kentucky, singer; Rev. R. G. Canary, evangelist, from Indiana; Rev. C. M. Muse, pastor of the Pilgrim Holiness Church at East Radford, Virginia; and Rev. Pliny Cox, who has been laboring in Indiana for some time, but who is coming back to our District.

The times for meeting and adjournment were set at 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 M., and in the afternoon from 2:00 to 4:30, Rev. Sturk to bring a message in the evening at 7:30.

District Superintendent Stikeleather, who was empowered by the Assembly last year to appoint the committees, appointed Rev. U. N. Freeman on the Reception Committee in the place of Rev. J. A. Grout, who will be busy with the Ways and Means Committee.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent appoint a new committee to be known as a Committee on Memorials for the General Assembly. He appointed the following: O. L. Ruth, William S. Deal, W. J. Smith, J. A. Grout, H. B. Barger, J. W. Covington.

On the Committee on Memoirs, the District Superintendent appointed: Mrs. W. S. Gallimore, Mrs. J. B. Fulp, Mrs. W. B. Walker.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read and accepted by the Assembly.

The Auditing Committee's report was called for, read and accepted.

The District Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

By expiration of time the Assembly stood and sang, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds", after which the Assembly recessed for lunch.

Tuesday Afternoon

After song and prayer, Bro. Sturk admonished the Assembly along the line of doing business in a Christlike way.

The Reception Committee brought forward Rev. and Mrs. Norman Nation, who have been laboring in another district, but who are now taking charge of our mountain work; Rev. Hegepeth, of the Wesleyan Church at Mt. Airy, and Rev. Joseph Finger, who has been laboring in Ohio and Indiana, but who is now taking our Church at Durham.

Since the roll is complete and the Assembly bar is filled, motion carried that we dispense with the calling of the roli.

The minutes of last session were read and approved.

The Statistical report was called for, read, totals only, comparing these with the totals of last year. The report was accepted by the Assembly.

As it is very difficult to ascertain the correct number of tithers, and, as many of the Churches have not reported any we are sure the number reported is very incomplete, motion carried to instruct the local secretary of each Church to do his best to find the number of tithers in his Church.

A letter was read from Rev. G. A. Schoombie, a member of this District, who is Field Superintendent of our work in South Africa. (This letter appears elsewhere.)

The Assembly received thanks from the Elkin Church through their representative, Charles Williams, for the help financially which has been sent to them on their indebtedness. He announced that they now have a plan which will enable them to meet their payments in the future.

The Committee on Resolutions made report and the following were discussed: (These appear in full on another page.)

No. 1.

(Regarding election of pastors.) Carried. (Church Extension Committee.) Carried. No. 2.

(Regarding changing date of Assembly.) No. 3. Lost.

No. 4. (Ministerial Convention.) Carried.

No. 5. (Regarding Camp Meeting.) Carried.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent appoint a committee to bring in somthing definite in regard to the Camp Meeting proposition. The following were appointed:

O. L. Ruth, T. C. Vaughn, L. B. Gallimore, W. F. Page, W. R. Phillips, J. A. Grout, T. R. York.

As the time had expired, the session adjourned with prayer.

Wednesday Morning

The opening service was in charge of Rev. W. A. Way. "His Eye Is On

the Sparrow", was sung very feelingly by A. Price. Motion carried that the Assembly send greetings by night letter to General Superintendent Surbrook.

The Assembly took up the Camp Meeting proposition and the Secre-tary of the Committee, Bro. Phillips, read the following resolution which was adopted: Ayes, 114; Noes,-

We recommend to the Assembly that whereas we need a Bible School for the training of our young people, and a place for our assemblies, as well as a Camp Meeting:

We, therefore, recommend that we purchase with the thought of tying the three interests together, and that, whereas this Assembly has gone on record as desiring a Camp:

This Committee recommends that the District Superintendent appoint a committee who will report to the District Council, who,

iu turn, will have authority to take definite action in purchasing such property, and develop the project in proportion to the finances available.

District Superintendent Stikeleather appointed this Committee:

Lloyd B. Gallimore, O. L. Ruth, Wray J. Smith.

The Committee on Ways and Means reported and the following recommendations were discussed:

No. 1. (Recommending 12 per cent. budget.) Lost.

(Regarding Delegate Fund.) Carried. No. 2.

Motion carried that we proceed with the election of officers and extend the time fifteen minutes, at which time a photographer would be on the grounds to make a picture of the Assembly.

The following tellers were appointed:

Wray J. Smith, W. B. Walker, D. R. Saunders, U. N. Freeman. William S. Deal.

After proper balloting the following were declared elected:

District Superintendent: Rev. S. M. Stikeleather.

Assistant District Superintendent-Rev. W. A. Way.

Secretary—C. Adelaide Anthony. Treasurer—William Roy Phillips.

Motion carried that the District Superintendent appoint all standing committees.

Rev. David Wilson and wife, evangelists, of New York, were recog-nized, brought forward and presented to the Assembly; also Rev. L. M. Burgess and wife, evangelists, singers and musicians, of Ramseur.

The Assembly adjourned for lunch by expiration of time, with prayer by Rev. David Wilson.

Wednesday Afternoon

After a song service, Rev. G. A. Castevens, of Danville, Virginia, led us to the Throne of Grace "You'll See Me Standing By", was beautifully rendered by Rev. and Mrs. Felter, of Pennsylvania. Bro. Weston of the People's Christian Movement, was brought forward and presented to the Assembly.

The Ways and Means Committee made further report and recommendation No. 3 was accepted.

The Committee on Resolutions also continued their report and No. 5 was adopted.

Motion carried that the Council appoint three evangelistically inclined pastors as a committee for the Home Missionary Work.

The joint report of the Committees on Education and Examination was heard, and the following recommended for ordination: For the Ministry: W. L. Cockman; Miss Bertha Lapish; For Deaconess: Miss Cornie Caudle.

An important motion from the floor provided that a Home Missionary Association be formed made up of members to be secured as the District Superintendent makes his rounds, each member to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls be made per year. Carried.

Motion carried that this Assembly empower the District Council, if the

Council sees fit, to give the Churches money out of the loan fund, according to Recommendation No. 3, of last year.

Motion carried that Resolution No. 3, of last year, be revoked.

The Committee on Memorials to the Dead read their report, which was accepted by the Assembly.

A very precious dedication service was held when Bro. Stikeleather dedicated three girl babies and one boy, children of our ministers.

The Assembly was then open for invitations to entertain the Assembly next year, provided our new camp meeting ground is not yet available. Thomasville's invitation was accepted, subject to the proviso above.

A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the pastor of the Winston-Salem Church, his splendid people and many friends for the wonderful entertainment they have given us this year.

Another vote of sincere thanks was extended to Bro. C. B. Way, who has reported for us in this Assembly through the papers.

A letter of thanks was sent to Rev. W. Wilbur Hutchins, pastor of the Southside Baptist Church, for the use of his Church for our evening service, our Church being entirely too small to hold the crowd.

A very impressive ordination service was then held, with Bro. Sturk giving the charge.

Motion carried that Bro. Stikeleather be given a two weeks' vacation with pay.

We extended to our precious Bro. Sturk a rising vote of thanks for his splendid services in presiding at our Assembly.

A vote of thanks was given the Statistical Committee for the splendid work shown by the report.

Bro. Sturk commented on the work of the Assembly, saying that it had been a wonderful Assembly because of the spirit which had been demonstrated. He commended the people because they came for the first and stayed for the finish. He said that the leaders of the District are to be commended for the way the reports have been brought in. "You have done business with expedition. God's blessing is certainly on the District. You have a fine, splendid, refined set of people. I am sure you love the Lord and we hope to meet some day where the sun never sets and the storms never come."

There being no further business, the Assembly adjourned, with prayer by Bro. Sturk.

District Superintendent's Report

Greetings to the Thirtieth Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District:

We have come to the close of another year's work, which has been marked with many hard battles, but thank God, He has given us some very blessed victories. The victories won have been through the splendid cooperation of our excellent pastors, evangelists, special singers, our loyal lay-members and many friends.

Many splendid gains have been made in the different departments of our Church, for which we give Him praise. We have had five Young People's Rallies during the year, the last of which was the very best of all. Gracious revivals have been conducted in many places throughout the District, some of which have been the best we have had for many years. The wonderful spirit of harmony manifested in many places is very outstanding, which has brought great delight to my heart. Numerical gains in many of our Churches and Sunday Schools have also been very gratifying. Many material improvements have been made during the year in the District. One new Church has been completed, three others enclosed so they can be used, and three others are under construction, which we hope to have ready for use soon. We are very sorry, however, to have to report the loss of one of our Mountain Churches this summer, which was washed away by the worst flood in the history of that part of the State. This was at Whittier, N. C., and the loss was a total one. Prayer and a helping hand will be greatly appreciated at this time by the good people of Whittier.

We have fifty-three Church buildings, twenty-four parsonages, one Bible School building and two vacant Church lots with 2 vacant parsonage lots, with a total valuation of around \$300,000.00, and an indebtedness of less than \$20,000.00. In at least three or four places building funds are being accumulated for the purpose of either building or enlarging the present buildings.

During the year I have traveled 23,016 miles in my own car, right at 500 in others, and 1,300 miles by train. My traveling expenses have been \$286.59. Have visited practically all of the Churches in the District four times; have bought 956 gallons of gas and 20 gallons of oil; have made two trips to Indianapolis for the General Church; preached 175 times, prayed in 224 homes, conducted or assisted in two funerals, assisted in seven revivals, and saw many saved or sanctified and 11 definitely healed. Have conducted 141 business meetings and dedicated and baptized 25 babies and little children, and three others just dedicated. Have double-tithed all I have received. God has taken good care of me and given me the best of health, supplied all my needs and I haven't a single complaint to bring. AMEN!

I hope to be a better man this coming year, by the grace of God, if Jesus tarries and I live, and I am trusting Him absolutely for the future.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions

No. 1. Since sometimes there is agitation in the local Church at the time of calling a pastor and in some instances the progress of the Church is retarded, be it, therefore, resolved that no Church meeting for the purpose of calling a pastor be held earlier than 90 days prior to our Annual Assembly. Carried.

No. 2. WHEREAS, This District has no Home Missionary organization and the need is obvious, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED That this Assembly create a Church Extension Committee of three evangelistically gifted pastors, with the District Superintendent as its chairman. The duties of said Committee shall be: To prospect for and decide upon suitable places for revival campaigns with a view of organizing new Churches; to secure workers; to supervise such meetings; to act as evangelists themselves, where suitable; and, to take newly organized, or prospective work, under their care until a worker can be secured. Said Committee shall be amenable to the District Council for both the conduct of its work and its expenditures. Carried.

No. 3. WHEREAS, we have no camp meeting in our District and the assemblies are of such short duration, giving little time for worship, praise, and evangelistic services; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That our District Assembly shall convene on the first Thursday following the first Sunday in October, and shall continue through the following Sunday, which day shall be devoted to worship and the advancement of Christ's cause. Lost.

No. 4. WHEREAS, There has been heretofore no definite date for our Ministerial Convention, in consequence of which revivals, etc., are arranged for at an inopportune time for the Convention; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Assembly. Carried.

No. 5. WHEREAS, There is a great need of a camp meeting in the Southern District; and WHEREAS, our General Superintendent has urged it, there is also a great desire for it on the part of our laity; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED That immediate steps be taken toward securing land to erect a large tabernacle and buildings suitable to entertain such camp. Carried.

Report of the Committee on Ways and Means

No. 1. WHEREAS the 10 pe cent. of our offerings have for the last two years failed to meet our needs, leaving an overdraft of \$631.73, we recommend a 12 per cent budget. Lost.

No. 2. WHEREAS over half of the period in which to raise our General Assembly Delegate fund is passed, we recommend that each pastor take up the matter at once and catch up all that is past due. Carried.

No. 3. We recommend an 11 per cent. budget to keep from going further into the red, and we also recommend that we reduce the Bible School offerings from \$60.00 to \$30.00 per month. Carried.
