JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Thirty-First Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District met in annual business session at the Thomasville Church on October 7, 1941, at 10:00 a. m. The song service was led by Rev. U. N. Freeman, of the Albemarle Church. After singing "There Shall Be Showers of Blessings", and "Just Over the Glory Land", prayer was offered by Rev. Maxey Walton, returned missionary. The District Superintendent, Rev. S. M. Stikeleather, introduced our General Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Surbrook, who presided throughout the assembly.

Rev. Surbrook announced that God's blessing is upon the Pilgrim Holiness Church; that we have had the best summer our Church has ever had; that there were good camp meetings and good assemblies. He then read a portion of I Cor. 9, beginning at the 7th verse. Taking as his subject "Helpful Hints to Clergymen", using three P's: Your Preaching, Practice, and Punctuality. We are giving a few of the sparks that flew from his anvil: "Live your convictions, but preach the Word. Do you preach the Gospel, or do you try to preach everything and hit nothing?" "Is your preaching unctious, alive, blessed? Nothing will kill our Church quicker than mechanical preaching." "Do you have the seal of God on your ministry and the zeal of God burning in your life, and have people gone out into the work of the Lord because of your ministry?"

"Your Practice: Do you push your Church paper? Do you tithe and teach tithing? When you leave a charge do you really leave it, or do you hold on to it? When folk take you into their confidence do you keep your mouth shut? Do you say things that reflect on your leaders and on the intelligence and loyalty of your people? Be practical and to the point in your announcements."

"Your Punctuality: You can generally tell if a man is interested in his work if he is on time. If you are punctual it has a wholesome effect on the people."

Rev. T. C. Vaughn, host pastor, welcomed the assembly and made announcements.

The roll was called and the assembly bar fixed to take in the fifth seat on each side and the chairs placed at the front of the auditorium.

The following visitors were brought forward and introduced to the assembly: Rev. H. V. Yates, who is coming to us from the Nazarene Church; Rev. G. C. Craven, from Ramseur; Rev. Ben. Milliken, of the Quaker Church in Staley; and Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Felter, evangelists, of our Church in Pennsylvania.

The hours for meeting and adjournment were set: 9:00 to 12:30, and 2:30 to 5:00, with Rev. J. Maxey Walton speaking on Missions at 7:30.

The District Superintendent appointed Mrs. W. S. Gallimore as chairman of a Committee on Memoirs, with privilege of selecting her assistants.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, read, and accepted.

The Statistician's report was read and accepted.

The assembly adjourned for lunch.

Tuesday Afternoon

The conference reassembled with a song service. Many requests were made for special prayer. Rev. A. R. C. Howard led us to the Throne in prayer.

The General Superintendent talked on subscriptions to the Advocate, the "Stringing of Fish", the need of more earnest Sunday School work, and need of a catechism for the children. "Let us take advantage of the prosperity," he said, "and pay off our debts. Be out of debt when the crash comes. Also let the salary of each pastor go up."

The Auditor's report was read and accepted.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted.

The following visitors were introduced: Rev. and Mrs. Terry P. Ragland, of the Emmanuel Missionary Movement; Rev. A. R. C. Howard, one of our ministers from the Tennessee District; Rev. J. Maxey Walton, missionary from the West Indies and South America, and Bros. Durham and Weston, from the People's Christian Movement.

The roll was called and each minister answered with the number of subscriptions he will endeavor to get for the Advocate. (Six hundred and eighty-nine were promised).

THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS brought in the following:

No. 1 was sent as a request to the General Council.

No. 2 was referred to the District Council.

No. 3 tabled until the date of the camp was set.

No. 4 accepted.

THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS to the General Assembly presented:

Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, were all accepted.

Motion carried that we have Election of Officers at 9:00 in the morning.

The session adjourned by expiration of time.

Tuesday Evening

An educational and inspirational feast was spread in the evening service by Rev. J. Maxey Walton, who has spent a number of years in the West Indies and South America. The time was made more enjoyable by special singing of groups from different Churches.

Wednesday Morning

The session opened by singing "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus". Rev. D. E. Snow, District Superintendent of the Virginia District, led in prayer. General Superintendent Surbrook read from the Fiftieth Psalm. He gave a graphic description of the thrilling experiences and the power of God which an outgoing missionary, Miss Thompson, experienced when the vessel on which she was sailing (the Zamzam) was sunk by a German raider.

By a majority vote the roll call was dispensed with for the remainder of the conference.

The minutes of last session were read and approved as read.

The assembly welcomed Rev. and Mrs. Muse, and their sister Pilgrims, of East Radford, Virginia, also Rev. D. E. Snow, District Superintendent of Virginia.

The order of the day was the Election of Officers for the coming year.

Rev. Surbrook gave a strong exhortation on filling the offices of the Church with spiritual people.

While the ballots were being counted, Mrs. J. H. Felter sang very beautifully, with accordion accompaniment, "He Did Not Fail Me Then".

Ballots were cast and Rev. J. A. Grout was elected as Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association. Slips of paper were passed and each one who wished to join the Camp Meeting Association were asked to give their names and addresses. One hundred and five members were secured at this time.

THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS to the General Assembly presented the following:

Wednesday Afternoon

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with a burst of praise and glory, as many shouted aloud the praises of God. Rev. W. L. Cockman, of the Randleman Church, led in prayer.

THE DISTRICT COUNCIL reported that they had decided to begin our Camp Meeting on Friday before the first Sunday in September. As there was some question about many young people and children who might not be able to attend on account of the opening of schools, this was amended by the assembly to have the camp open on Friday night before the next to the last Sunday in August. The assembly was voted to convene immediately following the camp.

It was voted to close the conference year the last Sunday in July.

THE BOARDS OF EDUCATION AND EXAMINATION made joint report. They recommended Joseph Finger, W. B. Walker and L. L. Lange for ordination. The report was accepted by the assembly.

Rev. O. L. Ruth made a very clear verbal report of the needs and the amount that it will be necessary to raise to open school in the fall of 1942.

Motion carried that the Secretary-Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association write to each member of the association before the camp opens, advising them of the time of the opening, the names of the evangelists and singers, and ask them for their dues.

Motion carried that we accept the invitation of the Virginia brethren for a Joint Ministerial Convention to be held in Virginia.

Motion carried that we give a hearty vote of thanks to the Thomasville Church and pastor and their many friends for their splendid entertainment.

Motion carried that we give our General Superintendent Surbrook a rising vote of thanks for his splendid messages and the excellent way in which he presided over our assembly.

Motion carried that we authorize our District Council to plat and sell some lots between the two highways at the camp ground, and that this sale be made by auction on Thanksgiving day upon the occasion of the Young People's Rally, which has been moved from High Point to the Bible School and Camp Meeting ground. Every one is invited to come and bring a well-filled basket and have dinner on the camp ground.

Motion carried that we give the District Council authority to take care of any emergency that may arise.

Motion carried that we give our District Superintendent and also ask the Churches to give the pastors a two weeks' vacation with pay.

The report of the COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS was read and accepted.

Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Russell, ordained ministers, who have been over in the Louisiana District, were received back into our District. Also Rev. and Mrs. Terry P. Ragland, of the Emmanuel Missionary work, were received by motion of the assembly, as one of our licensed ministers.

A suggestion was made that if any ministers have books which they have completed and have no further use for, that they bring them to the assembly and exchange them for others.

It was also suggested that those who have canned fruit for the school, bring it on Thanksgiving to the camp ground; it can be stored in the basement of the building to be kept for the school next year.

Motion carried that the District Council approve the minutes of the last two sessions.

The assembly closed with a very sacred ordination service—Joseph Finger, W. B. Walker and L. L. Lange were ordained for the ministry, General Superintendent Surbrook giving the charge. He stressed spirituality, a clean moral record and keeping alive mentally.

The assembly closed with prayer by the General Superintendent. We all felt that we had had a very gracious time and that the work of the Lord is moving on. To Him be all the glory.

District Superintendent's Report

Greetings to the Thirty-First Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the Southern District:

We have come to the close of another good year in the work of the Lord for which we bow our heads and give Him praise and gratitude for His marvelous love to us the children of men.

God has seen fit to bless our humble efforts in the District as we have labored together for the advancement of His most worthy cause, and we are mighty happy to report at least some splendid victories all along the line. Amen! Among some of which we will mention briefly as follows: The last Young People's Rally of only a few weeks ago was simply wonderful and very largely attended. Many splendid revivals have been conducted which have been a wonderful Spiritual uplift to the District. Gains have been made in many places in spite of the confused condition of this war-torn world. Three new parsonages have been built: one at Fayetteville, which is practically out of debt; one at Hemp, and one at Franklinville. The first two are already occupied and the last one will be ready for occupancy in about another week. Two parsonages have been remodeled or enlarged, which has greatly enhanced their value. Three new church buildings have been erected and five have been remodeled or enlarged. One large tabernacle with lot 100x100 has been deeded to us free of debt. Four new churches have been organized, three of which have been running as missions for a year or so, and the other is a new church which has been dug out this year by Bro. F. R. Cooper and other workers in West Reidsville. Three new Sunday Schools have been organized and are going good. Besides the above, numbers of churches have done more or less painting inside and out.

According to action taken at our last assembly, the District Council has purchased an unusually fine Camp-meeting, Bible School and Assembly property which is in easy reach of eighty to ninety per cent. of our people in the District. There are four buildings on the property, one brick and three frame structures, all of which have been put in splendid repair. Approximately \$7,000.00 has been raised for this property during the year, besides several hundred dollars in pledges that have not yet been paid. This property has two fine mineral springs which have been put in excellent condition, with a splendid new pump installed which furnishes an abundance of water right up in the buildings with eighty pounds pressure.

During the year, I have travelled 24,000 miles—19,000 for the District, 1,800 for the General Church, and 3,200 for myself. At three cents per mile my expense for the District has been \$570.00. The Lord has enabled me to put back into His work, \$544.08, leaving me a balance for myself and family of \$685.92. I have preached 150 times, prayed in 215 homes, conducted 132 business meetings, held five District Council meetings, dedicated fifteen babies and assisted in numbers of revivals, but left the pastor or evangelist to count the numbers of professions. I have helped secure quite a large number of subscriptions for Pilgrim Holiness Advocate. Have given at least one full month in hard work on our new camp and school property, and am real happy for the privilege He has given me to fill a little corner in His vineyard. Praise God!

Your unworthy servant, desiring His whole will in my life above every thing else.

Report of Committee on Resolutions

No. 1. WHEREAS: There are now districts in our denomination farther south than the Southern District, and name might appear misleading, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED: That this District be known as the North Carolina District. (Referred to the Executive Council).

No. 2. WHEREAS: It is necessary to slate evangelists ahead; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That this assembly set a date for the camp meeting. (The assembly set the date for the camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August, which will make the camp begin next year the 21st of August, and run through the 30th).

No. 3. BE IT RESOLVED: That we equip our building at the Bible School camp ground and that our District Assembly be held there following our camp meeting. (The assembly was voted to convene immediately following the camp. The conference year will close the last Sunday in July).

No. 4. BE IT RESOLVED: That this conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the camp opens, advising them of the date of the camp, the evangelists and singers, and ask them for their dues. Carried.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee

No. 1. Since our present financial system is working satisfactorily, we recommend that our financial set-up remain the same for the coming year. (Passed, with the amendment that our financial system be reprinted in this year's minutes).

No. 2. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when travelling in the interest of the District. Carried.

Our District and General Financial Program

The General Budget is set by the General Assembly at the rate of \$3.00 per member per year. The District Budget is raised on the percentage basis, 11 per cent. of all regular Church and Sunday School offerings are to be sent to the District Treasurer, once each month. The District Treasurer is to reserve 1 per cent. in the District Building and Loan Fund. This program adopted by Assemblies of '38, '39 and '40.

Memorials to the General Assembly

No. 1. WHEREAS there are independent tabernacles being built over the country for the purpose of worship and which yet have no standards, but invite members of many denominations to become affiliated with them and at the same time to retain their membership in their own church; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That paragraph 4 of Section 37 of our Church Manual read, "As soon as any member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church unites with another denomination, or independent tabernacle, his membership in the Pilgrim Holiness Church will automatically be discontinued.

No. 2. WHEREAS: Our pastors are called by a two-thirds majority, and

WHEREAS: All the officials need the full co-operation of at least a two-thirds vote of any body they serve, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That all General and District officials be elected by a two-thirds vote.

No. 3. WHEREAS: There is a visible weakness in our Young People's Society, and as our Church of tomorrow must come from our Church of today, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Southern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in session in Thomasville, N. C., October 7-8, 1941, ask that a revision be made in our Manual so as to make the president of the Young People's Society in each local Church a member of the official Church board.

No. 4. WHEREAS: There is much agitation at many places over the Church in general relative to the recalling of pastors; and, since so many of our pastors are remaining longer terms in their pastorates; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That when a Church calls a pastor for the first year, he shall be called for one year, and that thereafter he may be recalled for a period of from two to three years.

No. 5. WHEREAS: A District Superintendent would have greater advantage in planning District work and Home Missionary campaigns with a longer term of office, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That when a District Superintendent is elected for his first term of office he shall be elected for one year, as heretofore, and thereafter for a term of two years each time he is re-elected.

No. 6. RESOLVED: That this portion of Section 63, page 47, be removed from the Manual:

"And if it be known that a candidate for an office is a divorced person and is living in a state of wedlock with another party, or is married to a divorced person of such state."

No. 7. Since the problem of dealing with delinquent members is one of our greatest ones and that in some instances hasty removals have proven injurious, both to the individual member and the local Church, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That for minor offenses, or acknowledged backsliding, such persons be dealt with as prescribed in the Manual, and if they fail to repent and line up with the Church program, that their names be placed on an inactive list for a period of not less than one year before final dismissal, or at the discretion of the local board; also

BE IT RESOLVED: That while persons remain in this list the local Church shall not be required to pay General budget for them.

No. 8. We recommend that all District Treasurers be bonded, the amount of bond to be determined by each District Council.

No. 9. WHEREAS: Section 188, paragraph 7, of our Manual was supposed to have been corrected by the General Assembly 1934, but through an oversight the correction failed to be made; and

WHEREAS: The Virginia District, through a memorial to the General Assembly in 1938 called again for this correction and it is still unmade, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That we, the Southern Assembly, respectfully request the General Assembly to make the proper correction of this section according to the action recorded in the minutes of the 1934 General Assembly.
