## In Memoriam

### REV. MRS. WILLIAM S. DEAN

The Rev. Mrs. Pearl Dean was born May 29, 1885 at Cyle, Indiana, and passed away Dec. 16, 1955. In the year 1905, April 29th, she was married to William S. Dean, a widely known evangelist in our church.

Sister Dean was a charter member of the Apostolic Holiness Union which later became the Pilgrim Holiness Church. She was present in the home of the Rev. M. W. Knapp at the time of its organization and acted as Secretary of that organizational meeting.

Sister Dean preached her first sermon in 1903 at Moores Hill, Indiana, and was ordained in July 1905 at Hutchinson, Kansas, by Rev. Seth C. Rees.

Sister Dean assisted Brother Dean for four years in evangelistic work and assisted Brother Dean in pastorates at Orleans, Cory, Bicknell, and Anderson, Indiana; Battle Creek, Michigan; Rossburg, Spencerville, and Cambridge, Ohio.

Sister Dean later served as Pastor for some thirty years at the following: Middleton, Providence, Scott City, Shelburn, Linton, and Merom, Indiana. She succeeded in erecting new church buildings at Merom and Scott City.

Funeral services for Sister Dean were conducted by Rev. M. H. Snyder, Dec. 18, 1955, at Scott City with about 30 ministers present.

The body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Farmersburg, Indiana.

### GEORGE EDGAR HUFF

The Rev. George Huff was born May 30, 1880 at Sullivan, Indiana, and departed this life March 9, 1956 at Shelbyville, Indiana.

Brother Huff served for more than 50 years in the active ministry serving 19 churches which include: Hartsville, Gaynorsville, Hope, Holton, Sullivan, Letts, Benham, Graysville, Carlisle, Merom, Terre Haute, Frankfort, Elwood, Indianapolis, Shelbyville, all in Indiana, and Robinson, Ill.

Brother Huff served as District Supt. two years, as Assistant Supt. 10 years, as a council member 15 years and as a member of the General board for eight years.

Two new parsonages were constructed under his direction and one new church was launched.

Funeral services for Brother Huff were conducted at Shelbyville, Ind. and at Georgetown, Ill., where his body was laid to rest. Officiating ministers were: Rev. M. H. Snyder, Rev. F. J. Goins, Rev. Mark Storey and others of the Indiana Conference.

### REV. THOS. PORTER

Rev. Thos. Porter went to his eternal reward February 7, 1956, having reached the age of sixty-eight. His funeral service was conducted at the Gillis Funeral Home. Rev. Dennis Barber gave the funeral message. He was assisted by Rev. Aaron Hayhurst and Rev. E. W. Wright. There were thirty ministers present at the service.

He was saved at West Terre Haute under the ministry of Rev. W. A. Frye. In 1940 he and Sister Porter took charge of Beulah Mission in Terre Haute. He faithfully served the Mission until his death, a period of almost twenty years. During those years he saw many souls bow at the altar and find victory through the blood of Jesus Christ.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Sixth Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

#### Greetings:

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God for His infinite mercies and marvelous grace that we undertake to give you a brief resume of the work of the conference throughout the past twelve months.

#### Our Times

We meet today in the midst of the greatest temporal prosperity that our nation has even known. Employment is at an all time high and people everywhere are enjoying luxuries and physical comforts never dreamed of a generation ago. These times over which many are rejoicing constitute our greatest peril. The worldliness of materialism can grip our souls like a creeping paralysis in almost insensible degrees until God is crowded out. Unless we live prayerfully and give sacrificially these times can be our ruin. Let us resolve here and now that the coming year will find us more devoted than ever before.

#### The Forward Movement

The Forward Movement launched back in January at the Church Leaders Conference has been felt throughout the entire church. The meeting was characterized by a remarkable unity of spirit and a deep resolve to carry through at any cost. I strongly urge that this conference take definite and practical steps to push all four points outlined by the committee. The fields are white unto harvests and we must put in the sickle now and reap the ripened grain ere the sun goeth down.

#### The General Church

As many of you now knew, Dr. William H. Neff, our General Superintendent, has been seriously ill for some months. As a result, the General Board in its regular May session elected your District Superintendent as full time Assistant to the General Superintendent and also the Director of the Forward Movement. Therefore, our work on the district has almost been totally suspended since the middle of May. We have kept up the correspondence and made a few calls. However, Reverend Mark Storey, my able assistant, together with other members of the Council have taken hold with real heart and hand. The churches have also been most cooperative. For all of this we wish to express our heart-felt appreciation. After all we have a wonderful people and they know how to take hold in an emergency. We are also happy to report that latest word from Brother Neff indicates that he is now making a speedy

recovery and hopes to be back in the office by the first of September. For this we are most grateful to God as it will enable us to give most of our time to the great FORWARD MOVEMENT of the church.

### **Our Camp Grounds**

The District Youth Convention under the direction of Reverend Boone Murphy and our Boys and Girls Camps under the direction of Reverend E. A. Poe have already been held on these beautiful grounds. Four new cottages have been built during the summer and others are making plans to build. The need for housing has become most acute and something must be done at the earliest moment possible. Let us pray that our Sixth Annual Camp will be one of much blessing and fruitfulness.

### **Our Indebtedness**

The treasurer's report will reveal the fact that our camp ground's indebtedness has been reduced substantially. However, because of an emergency in the Foreign Missionary Department occasioned by the severe storms which destroyed a number of our churches, we did not feel clear to push the drive to liquidate our indebtedness as was suggested at our last camp. As you well know, plans have been initiated for an intensive drive to lift the indebtedness during the coming year. Some churches took hold last year without any urging and have paid in full their part or at least a substantial amount. If every church will do its part no one will be overburdened and we will be able to rejoice a year hence because of this accomplishment of faith. Our people are not over-giving. Percentage-wise the most of our people are not giving as much now as they did in the days of dire depression. Let us be done with pitying ourselves and push forth sacrificially to see the cause of God prosper.

### **Church Extension**

Three new churches have been organized this year. The Reverend Dorsey Schenk is pastor of our new church at Franklin which was organized with twelve charter members. A church building value at \$12,000 and located in a growing section of the city has been purchased. The work gives promise of becoming a strong church in this community. The work at Mount Vernon under the direction of Reverend Lloyd Lamar, pastor, was brought to the point where it was thought wise to organize and this we did with nine charter members. The small group is really sold on our church which is clearly demonstrated by the fact that they meet in a small garage building and there worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness. This would be a good place for someone whom God has entrusted as a financial steward to make a real contribution to the cause of God and holiness. The Reverend Olive Todd has been doing splendid work at Clinton, Indiana and some weeks ago this fine home missionary group was organized. They have already outgrown the hall in which they meet. Here again a substantial gift from someone whom God has blessed financially would mean an increase in the work and the salvation of many precious souls.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Zone Presidents for their wonderful cooperation in presenting to the churches the Drive to liquidate the camp indebtedness. Because of the rush of other duties I have not been able as yet to tabulate the results. In fact, some just recently came in. This material will be turned over to your new superintendent.

### **New Church Buildings**

Two new church buildings have been completed this year, Bedford, under the fine leadership of Rev. Kenneth Greves and Evansville, First under the able leadership of Rev. Willis Clock. Both Hulman Street and Greenwood Street in Terre Haute has been so completely remodeled and added to that to all intents and purposes that they have new churches. These wonderful improvement and enlargement programs have been carried forward under the able leadership of Rev. Forrest Adams and Rev. E. A. Poe, respectively. The

detailed information on these churches and other improvements will be given in a supplemental report.

### Personal Report

In the performance of my duties I have preached 202 times, made 109 visits to the churches, 17 business trips, had part in two ministerial conventions, one ministerial institute, attended 5 School Board meetings, 9 District Council meetings, 4 Committee meetings, 8 Zone meetings, 3 General Board meetings, 5 Executive Council meetings, 3 weddings, 3 funerals, 3 Camps, dedicated two churches, one commencement address, one baccalaureate sermon, ordained 7 to the ministry, ordained 5 deaconesses, held three week-end meetings, had one meeting with the Zone Chairmen, gave three lectures on the Holy Land, attended one Old People's Home Board meeting, had part in 10 Sunday School Conventions, and spoke at the home-coming services at Pilgrim Bible College, Kernersville, N. C.

I have received my salary in full, except for the time I have been off the District. Brother Storey, my assistant, and others who have helped in my absence have been paid from my salary account.

May I say in closing that it has been more than a pleasure to labor among you during the past several years. Your gracious acceptance of my humble and imperfect labors, your daily prayers, your cooperation, and your kindly remarks from time to time have strengthened my faith and enlarged my heart. In my opinion a more gracious people could not be found. Since in a strange and rather unusual providence I find a number of General church duties thrust upon me which makes it impossible for me to serve you further as district superintendent, it falls my lot to bid you farewell in that capacity. In the words of Jude's benediction, I leave you: "Now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy. To the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever, Amen."

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT

### New Church Buildings

**Bedford:** Reverend Kenneth Greves, pastor. The new church completed this year is conservatively valued at \$40,000. Construction is of Waylite block with Bedford stone veneer. The laminated arches and Western Cedar ceiling add much to the beauty of this fine church. Golden oak pews and pulpit furniture with deep green accordion doors to the overflow rooms make it a most attractive auditorium. The main section of the church measures 32x65 plus an ell addition which includes entrance, nursery, pastor's study and rest-rooms. There are six Sunday school rooms and a youth auditorium. The debt on the church is approximately \$18,000.

**Brazil:** Reverend Boone Murphy, pastor. This building is swiftly nearing completion. It will be of brick construction, containing seven classrooms, two rest rooms, study and an auditorium with a seating capacity of 220. The overall size of the building is 50x70 feet. The building has been appraised as having a completed value of \$22,000. The present debt on the building is less than \$6,000.

**Lawrenceburg:** Reverend Raymond Simpson, pastor. This church took a real step forward when they sold the old parsonage which was very inadequate and purchased a lovely new parsonage next door to the church facing the main street of the city. This lovely home is a real asset to the church.

**New Albany:** Reverend John Stewart, pastor. This new church now under construction will be 40x60 plus a 10x22 entrance which will also include the

nursery and an extra room in the basement. The building is being constructed of Kenlite Block and will be Bedford Stone veneered. The estimated cost of building and church furniture is \$20,000. There will be about a \$6,000 indebtedness when the construction is completed.

**Terre Haute—Greenwood Street:** Reverend E. A. Poe, pastor. This new church is of block and Bedford Stone construction with a seating capacity of approximately 300. There is a full basement containing thirteen classrooms, pastor's study, nursery and secretary's office, and a spacious youth auditorium. A business man, who is not a member of the church, engineered the purchasing and installation of an air conditioning unit for the sanctuary and gave \$1,000 toward cost of same. The church, valued at \$40,000, will have an indebtedness of approximately \$14,500.

**Franklin:** Reverend Dorsey Schenck, pastor. A church building of building tile construction was purchased by this new church at a cost of \$9,000. It is an attractive building of about 40x60 floor area, located in a growing section of the city. The present indebtedness is approximately \$5,800.

#### New Parsonages

**North Vernon:** Reverend Lester and Edith Smith, pastors. This church has erected a modern, six room, ranch type parsonage. It has a full basement and is conservatively valued at \$15,000.

**Evansville, Forest Hills:** Reverend Mark Storey, pastor. This modern eight-room home contains two and one-half baths with one room and bath prepared especially for the entertainment of workers. The basement provides room for a two-car garage, large family room, and laundry. The indebtedness is approximately \$15,000.

**New Albany:** Reverend John Stewart, pastor. This church has purchased a modern seven-room house with full basement at a cost of \$11,000. It is just across the street from their new church which is in the process of construction.

**Rodney:** Reverend Walter Johnson, pastor. A lovely little four-room parsonage has been constructed next door to the church. Through the sacrificial labors of both pastor and people this parsonage is completed free of debt.

#### Additions and Improvements

**Terre Haute, Hulman Street:** Reverend Forrest Adams, pastor. A new addition of 13x55 feet to the front of this church together with a complete remodeling of the entire church make it to all intents and purposes a new church building. The corner entrance has been moved to a center indoor entrance and the exterior of the building has been veneered with beautiful Indiana Limestone. The entire church has been replastered and the old drop lights replaced with indirect lighting. Hardwood floors, rest rooms, nursery and beautiful stained glass windows were included in the remodeling program. New paint and new carpeting on the platform, in front of the altar, and down each aisle, are all included in the redecoration of the church. A large portion of the work was donated and as a result the approximate cost is only \$18,000.

**Columbus:** Reverend Charles L. Felsburg, pastor. The parsonage has been painted on the outside and four rooms redecorated. The parsonage premises were also landscaped. The church basement has been painted, a parking lot prepared to accommodate approximately 19 cars, tables were built for the Kindergarten, Primary and Junior Divisions of the Sunday school, and fifty chairs purchased all at a cost of \$1,261.90.

**Coalmont:** Reverend Stella Critchfield, pastor. The floor space of the church has been increased by 300 square feet. A new addition to the pastor's living quarters of 12x22 feet was added.

**Seymour:** Reverend Eula Kennedy, pastor. New pews have been purchased for the church, new carpeting for the pulpit, and new all metal folding chairs at a cost of \$1,434.93.

**Greenfield:** Reverend Lester Mayhew, pastor. The church has been re-decorated and paint purchased for the outside. Four Sunday school rooms have been built in the basement together with a complete decoration of the entire basement. Siding has been ordered for the parsonage and all at a total cost of \$1,000.

**Hartsville:** Reverend D. W. Bunting, pastor. The church and parsonage both have been painted inside and outside. Material to finish two Sunday school rooms has been purchased.

**Terre Haute—South Central:** Reverend V. E. Halt, pastor. This church built last year has now been stone veneered at a cost of \$3,000.

**Scott City:** Reverend W. W. Ragsdale, pastor. The church has been painted, new doors and venetian blinds installed and carpeting laid at a cost of \$350.00. Cabinets and pressure pumps have been purchased for the parsonage at a cost of \$300.00.

**Shelburn:** Reverend Basil Hays, pastor. The floors have been sanded and varnished, new woodwork installed, and walls painted. The outside of the church has been painted and two doors and metal awnings installed, all at a cost of \$811.88.

**Princeton:** Reverend C. E. Jones, pastor. New floors have been installed and the pulpit remodeled making entrance to parsonage level with church floor.

**Birdseye:** Reverend Elmer Winkel, pastor. The church has been redecorated inside and metal roof painted.

**Austin:** Reverend C. Jay Reiff, pastor. The church and parsonage were both painted and considerable work done inside the church. Twenty-five loads of fill dirt were brought in for grading and finishing lawns. All finishing touches were given to the church and it was dedicated by Reverend R. G. Flexon. An offering of cash and pledges in the amount of \$1,300 was received.

**Hope:** Reverend Walter Sloan, pastor. Four Sunday school rooms have been added in the basement, hardwood floors in the auditorium and the old pews replaced with good used pews, all at a cost of \$560.

**Harvey Flats:** Reverend Nettie Waggoner, pastor. A five acre tract of land with a small house on it has been purchased at the cost of \$1,700. Services at present are being held in this small building. Later a new church is to be constructed and additional rooms built on the present building for a parsonage.

**Medora:** Reverend Hobart Whittinghill, pastor. The interior of the church has been papered and three Sunday school rooms painted.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN OF JUNIOR YOUTH CAMPS

Southern Indiana District, Pilgrim Holiness Church

Two Junior Youth Camps, one for boys and one for girls, between the ages of 9 and 13, were conducted again this year at Orleans Pilgrim Camp in Southern Indiana.

The Girls' Camp began on Monday, July 9th, with 74 girls registered, an increase of twenty over last year.

The Boys' Camp was held from Monday through Friday the following week with 80 boys registered, making a total gain of 39 over last year.

Her enthusiastic spirit and ability to teach hand work, soon won the hearts of every Junior Girl. Also to be commended, was Mrs. Mark Storey, who taught the class on "Good Manners" and Rev. Donald Rohner who taught the Catechism Class. To hear these children say "No thank you," and "If you please" or "I beg your pardon," after a lesson or two in "Good Manners" and to hear them recite the Ten Commandments, the Books of the Bible; Our Church Motto; The Apostle's Creed, etc. could not help but make us realize the eternal value of such camps.

The evening services were most inspirational and evangelistic. The altar was lined with boys and girls seeking and finding the Lord, while others were engaged in personal work, refusing to give up until everyone had at least sought Christ.

It is our earnest desire that these Camps be continued and that our pastors promote them constantly, and above all, give some of their time to help conduct them. It is one of the best ways we have found possible to get our boys and girls from unsaved homes to Christ and give them a guarded Christian vacation.

## REPORT OF FRANKFORT PILGRIM COLLEGE

To the Southern Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greetings in the blessed Name of Jesus:

Changes come in all walks of life, in individual lives, in homes, in churches, in governments, and in Schools. Frankfort Pilgrim College has just recently had a change of Administration making only the third time this has happened to the School.

Since this change has come, naturally I will not be able to give the entire picture of the situation. However, I will try the best I know how to portray the present standing of the College. It is to be understood that this is an eleven month report instead of the regular twelve month report since there has been a change in date for the closing of the year from July 31 to June 30.

Spiritually, the past year was a good one for it was during this year that a great revival broke out when School work was set aside and place given to the Holy Spirit. Sinners prayed through, backsliders reclaimed, believers were sanctified and the saints blessed. Allow me to add right here that these manifestations are essential elements in the operation of a Bible College if it remains a God-honored institution.

Numerically, the past year was fair with a student body of around 220 enrolled. This was considerably below what it has been at times in the past. Financially it was a hard year as the auditors report will show. But through it all God did help and send in excellent support for which we are most grateful. Records will substantiate that the Conferences gave the best offerings ever, this past year. We want you to know that we sincerely appreciate this and do trust that you will continue this spirit of sacrifice and giving. God bless you for every dollar you have given and may He, in return, give you in basket and in store.

In this regard Rev. Tommy Holshouser, Public Relations Director, has performed excellent service and was partially instrumental for the increase of offerings coming from the conferences. This was true because of a concentrated effort and visitation program to a large number of churches.

### Prospects

From my limited knowledge and experience it would appear to me that the enrollment for the coming year would remain about the same as last year with the possibility of an increase. We are getting a goodly number of inquiries from across the country from persons interested in what Frankfort Pilgrim College stands for and advocates. This College is in an excellent position to grow and reach out and become a real strong holiness center greater than it has ever know.

Since this is my first report to you as President I want to pledge to you as a Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church my best effort in maintaining a spiritual School scholastically efficient preparing workers for the vineyard of the Lord. May I urge your continued prayers and cooperation in this tremendous task before us.

## REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Sixth Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greetings:

Another year has swiftly rolled by and once again we find ourselves taking a retrospective view of the District Sunday School work, and as we reminisce we cannot help but praise God for His goodness, divine guidance, and blessings that we as the Sunday School Committee have enjoyed in this most essential department of our Church. It is with a deep sense of responsibility and duty to our loving Saviour that we wish to submit the following report.

The average weekly attendance for this year was 6,419 as compared to 6,637 for last year, or just a fraction over 3%.

Forty-five Sunday Schools had a gain over last year, thirty-four of which were 10% or over.

This year there were seven "Gold Ribbon" Sunday Schools (50% or more gain). They were:

Coalmont .....	300%
Petersburg .....	176%
Cannelton .....	119%
Liggett .....	63%
Terre Haute, South Central .....	53%
Clinton .....	50%
Franklin .....	50%

We had two "Red Ribbon" Sunday Schools (25% gain or over) and thirty-six "Blue Ribbon" Sunday Schools (10% or more gain).

### Sunday Schools of the Year

The Terre Haute, South Central Church under the leadership of Rev. Virgil E. Halt was the Sunday School of the year in numerical gain with a net gain of 39 in average attendance.

Rev. Stella Critchfield and her fine flock at Coalmont, Indiana, led the district in the percentage gain bracket with an increase over last year of 300%. Mr. Ora Rhemel is their Sunday School Superintendent.

Our District had: Six 4-star Sunday Schools.

21 Sunday Schools had a Daily Vacation Bible School.

22 Sunday Schools had a Teacher Training Program.

20 Sunday Schools are conducting lay visitation.

59 Sunday Schools participated in the Sunday School Revival.

29 Sunday Schools take the Sunday School Advance.

During the past year the District Sunday School Board held eight Zone Sunday School Conventions, with 77 of our churches participating. Seventy-one pastors, fifty-nine Sunday School Superintendents, 408 other teachers and officers and 504 interested laity.

We were also privileged to have two Regional Sunday School Institutes conducted in our District this year by our General Sunday School Department, headed by Dr. Paul F. Elliott. These were held in our Evansville Trinity Church and the Greenwood St. Pilgrim Holiness Church in Terre Haute, Indiana. These institutes were well attended and we feel that our district was benefitted beyond words by the stirring messages from some of our outstanding General Church Sunday School leaders and the work shops conducted by our most competent Sunday School workers.



Your Promotional Secretary attended the National Convention at Providence, R. I., the State Convention at Marion, Ind., the S. S. Promotional Secretaries conference at Indianapolis; and assisted in two Regional S. S. Institutes and conducted eight Zone S. S. conventions and as a member of the Planning Committee for our general Sunday School Secretary.

We have mailed monthly, quarterly and annual reports, as well as weekly reports during the S. S. Revival, to all pastors in the district as well as to the promotional secretaries of our other thirty-eight districts.

We, the District Sunday School Board feel that God has great things in store for our church that can only be obtained as we develop and strengthen our Sunday Schools. We keenly feel the need of "The Forward Movement" in our Sunday Schools and pray that God will open our eyes to the ripened fields and go forth to reap as never before.

The cooperation and fellowship the Sunday School Board has enjoyed during the year will long be remembered and each takes this opportunity to express their appreciation to all our pastors and laity who have helped in any way to lighten our load.

#### REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE CHURCH GOVERNMENT

1.

We recommend that the pastor be responsible for his new church the second Sunday after Camp.

2.

Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of the Conference, therefore:

Be it resolved that the Pastor shall have a special meeting of his church at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with their responsibilities for the Conference year.

3.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on June 30th of each year. We further recommend that the conference treasurer's books be closed June 30th of each year.

4.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, utilities, and where parsonages are not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

We further recommend that the District Superintendent on his first visit to the churches call the local church board's attention to this matter.

5.

We recommend that where churches and parsonages are located in cities that the location of the church and parsonage appear in our Minutes. We further recommend if possible, that where parsonages are equipped with phones, that the name of the pastor and Pilgrim Holiness Church be listed in the Phone Book.

6.

We recommend that no local church board endorse for Conference license anyone who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's word. We further recommend that the Examining Board not pass candidates for Conference license who fail to give evidence of a Divine Call to the ministry or a willingness to give full time to the same.

7.

Whereas, we have many able-bodied licensed and ordained ministers, who are employed in other than ministerial work, and seldom if ever preach, we recommend that the Examining Board be instructed to draw the lines closer on such individuals and that no one who is not active in the ministry be recommended for ordination.

8.

We recommend that the District elect an Assistant Superintendent from the pastors of the District.

9.

We recommend that each individual zone be responsible for the promotion of their Home Missionary work, under the direction and advisement of the District Superintendent.

10.

We recommend that the District Council be the District Parsonage Committee.

11.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees which has resulted in some poorly constructed buildings, therefore

Be it resolved that before constructing church buildings, parsonages, or camp buildings that plans and specifications be approved by the Conference Council or by a committee appointed by same.

12.

We recommend that the time of voting of the church on its pastor be May 1st-30th.

13.

Inasmuch as the Resolutions Committee has been approached with the matter of the use of lantern slides and motion pictures in our churches, therefore

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference go on record as opposed to the use of the same.

14.

Whereas the need for Ministerial training is great in our District, we recommend that we have Ministerial Institutes.

We further recommend that this meeting or meetings be arranged by our District Superintendent.

15.

Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

16.

Whereas the Southern District is large and the need for Church Extension is great, we deem it best for the interest of the District that our Superintendent devote his time to the District.

We further recommend that he be granted two weeks with pay off the District during the year.

17.

We recommend that the District have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the second Tuesday of April each year.

18.

Inasmuch as many of our evangelists are either leaving the field because of insufficient finance, or are forced to injure their health by taking too many

meetings without proper rest in order to make ends meet, therefore be it resolved that our churches take more care in determining the evangelist's offering, and not have any more revival meetings than they can adequately finance, nor call a larger evangelistic party than they can properly pay.

19.

Whereas our present system of changing of pastors, and the placing of pastors is quite frequently working to the disadvantage of both the church and the minister, and inasmuch as our next conference will pass the memorials for the next general conference we therefore recommend that a committee be appointed by the conference upon a nomination by the council for the purpose of making a study of the question with the view of drafting a memorial to the next general conference. Said committee are to consider various plans of other denominations, take testimony from many of our districts and others if necessary and otherwise explore the field thoroughly so as to present to us next year something that will constructively improve our present system should the committee decide it can be improved. They shall be limited to \$100.00 in case they should need any expense money for this work.

### PASTORAL

1.

We recommend that each pastor be granted a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors or church secretaries of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the Obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate in the vicinity of the pastorate.

We further recommend that each pastor endeavor to secure subscriptions equivalent in number to his membership roll.

5.

Inasmuch as some of our Ministers who have had their conference license revoked because of their character or conduct and inasmuch as they have continued preaching after such action has been taken by the District Council, Be it resolved that the District Secretary notify all Pastors of such action.

6.

Whereas it seems inconsistent from the commercial viewpoint, and for the sake of our influence we recommend that pastors be paid on a week day, rather than on Sunday.

7.

Whereas ministers are now eligible for Social Security and many of our pastors are already participating at their own expense, we recommend that churches that are financially able give special attention to this added expense of their pastors.

### EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

1.

We recommend that those ministers who desire to pursue the ministerial study course with the thought of receiving credit from Frankfort Pilgrim College, take their studies through the extension service of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

We further recommend that those who pursue the course of study with the thought of ordination only, take the courses from the ministers elected to the Educational Board.

2.

We recommend that those who are to appear before the Educational Board and Examining Board must bring their recommendation in person or send a written reasonable excuse why they cannot appear.

We further recommend those who fail to do so after one year shall be dropped from the conference roll.

Each student pursuing our course of study should conscientiously read the material in the text book. The student may search out the answers to the study questions using the text book.

The student should write his examination in the presence of his pastor, or in case of a pastor taking the examination, he should write the examination in the presence of an ordained minister. The paper must be signed by the person under whose supervision the examination was taken. All examination questions must be returned with the examination.

The student shall mail fifty cents (50c) with each request for questions or one (\$1.00) dollar for each subject taken.

All examinations must be in the hands of the instructor 15 days prior to the Camp Meeting. Books used in this study course may be purchased at the Pilgrim Publishing House, 226-230 East Ohio Street, Indianapolis 4, Indiana.

3.

Inasmuch as many of our pastors are pursuing the study course for preachers:

And whereas many of them are forced to work and have very limited time to engage in the study course:

Be it resolved that our district plan a one week (five days) school in which several courses comparable to the study course will be offered. These could be ten hour courses under qualified teachers. The expense to be provided for by a tuition fee.

## CAMP MEETING

1.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a Camp Meeting Board which shall supervise the functional work of the Camp and the same shall be ratified by this District Conference.

2.

We recommend that our District Camp convene on the fourth Friday of July.

3.

Inasmuch as our Superintendent is very busy with the Spiritual interests of the Camp and Administrative duties of the District at Camp Meeting time

Be it resolved that the Assistant District Superintendent advise all Department heads of their duties, and responsibilities of their Departments.

Be it further resolved that he supervise the department heads during the Camp Meeting.

Be it further resolved that he be the Assistant Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board.

4.

Camp Regulations: No smoking. No profane language. No shorts, slacks, or other forms of immodest dress. All parking shall be in the parking lots. Campers may unload their cars at their tents or cottages, after which their car is to be removed to the parking lot provided for them. No promenading on the camp grounds during the three main services of the day. All attending camp meeting must attend these services or stay in their tent or cottage. (Workers performing their duties of the work of the camp are excluded.) 11:00 p. m. curfew.

All campers are to keep the area clean around their tents or cottages and to see to it that they are left tidy when checking out.

5.

We recommend that all camp policemen be adults or ministers.  
We further recommend that they be 21 years of age or over.

6.

Inasmuch as God has seen fit to give us this beautiful Camp Grounds, and we have fully dedicated it unto God:

Therefore be it resolved that for safety and health reasons we allow no pets upon the grounds during all religious services during the year.

7.

We recommend that we maintain a caretaker with resident on the Camp Grounds.

We further recommend that the caretaker be amenable to the Executive Committee of the Council.

8.

Be it resolved, in behalf of the spiritual interest of our Camp Meeting, that no cottage construction be permitted on the Camp Ground during the three main services of the Camp Meeting.

9.

Be it resolved that all able bodied ministers, both stationed and unstationed, remain long enough after camp meeting to help clean up the premises.

Be it further resolved that if they are unable to do so, they shall either obtain permission from the chairman or secretary of the Camp Meeting Board to be excused, or get a lay member to serve in their places.

10.

We recommend that we maintain a caretaker with residence on the camp grounds.

We further recommend that the District Council shall have full charge of hiring, designation of duties, and setting of salary of said caretaker.

11.

Whereas the leases for the cottage lots on our Camp Grounds clearly state that no lease be bought, sold or transferred without approval of the District Council and whereas our Camp is non taxable, therefore be it resolved that no cottage shall be bought or sold for rental purposes or for the sole purpose of makin a profit.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The Sunday School Committee shall present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

- a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

2.  
The Council shall instruct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

3.  
Note:—For all other duties of the Sunday School Board, see Manual, Page 39, Section 80.

4.  
We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

## ZONE WORK

1.  
Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference we recommend they be continued.

We further recommend that the Zone Chairmen be elected by secret ballot by the ministers and lay delegates.

2.  
We recommend that each Zone Chairman be required to give a report quarterly to the District Superintendent.

We further recommend that quarterly reports be compiled for an annual report to appear in the Conference Journal.

3.  
We recommend that the Petersburg Church be placed in Zone 8.

## YOUNG PEOPLE

1.  
We recommend that the Executive Youth Committee be given authority to establish the date for the Annual Youth Convention subject to the approval of the District Council.

2.  
Be it resolved that each of our zones have at least nine youth rallies in the conference year. We further recommend that the program and date of these services be worked out by the zone Youth Leaders.

3.  
We recommend that each zone Young People's President submit a written report of the year's activities to the District Youth Conference.

4.  
We recommend that each zone Young People's chairman give opportunity for the District Executive Secretary to present the program for the year at a date convenient to the Executive Secretary.

5.  
We recommend that Junior Youth Camps be held during this Summer months on our Camp Grounds.

1. Separate camps would be held for Boys and Girls.
2. Camps would run from Monday through Friday, beginning the week following the District Young People's Convention.
3. Camps would consist of classes and institutes in the morning, supervised recreation and classes in woodcraft, etc., in the afternoon, and a strong evangelistic program at night.
4. Age groups would be from 9 through 13.

5. A committee composed of the District Sunday School Board and the Executive Youth Council work out complete details and promote said camp. This committee to elect a Youth Camp Chairman from their own group, the same to be ratified by the District Council.

6.  
Be it resolved that the Executive Youth Council nominate two or more for the office of Zone Youth Leader in each Zone.

Be it further resolved that the Zone Youth Leader in each zone be elected from these nominations at a Zone Youth Meeting within 15 days after the District Camp.

7.  
We recommend that each Young People's President submit a written report quarterly to their Zone Youth Leader.

8.  
We recommend that the newly elected Zone Chairman call a Zone Youth meeting within 15 days after Conference for the purpose of electing a Zone Youth Leader.

9.  
We recommend that the Southern Indiana Youth elect an assistant to the Executive Youth Secretary.

10.  
We recommend that the District Youth Treasurer see that the Executive Youth Secretary's expenses be paid when attending Youth Leaders' Conference at Indianapolis, Ind.

11.  
Inasmuch as wash rooms and showers are badly needed on the Camp Ground, we as a committee recommend that our project be shower rooms for the next year.

We further recommend that such shower rooms be built with the location prescribed by the District Council.

12.  
We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Such day shall be set aside for the various zone youth to bring their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the School.

## CONFERENCE

1.  
We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to this entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

2.  
We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointed members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

3.  
We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3 where it speaks of the wearing of gold, to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

4.  
Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee, therefore

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the Conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the Conference to be read and the same to be recorded in the Conference Minutes.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each Conference.

5.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference minister or his wife, that the Conference Secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all Zone Chairmen, who in turn shall notify all Conference pastors and evangelists within reasonable distance, by telephone or telegraph.

6.

We recommend that each candidate for ordination shall be given a Bible by the District Conference. This Bible shall have the names of the Ordination Committee in it and shall be used during the ceremony.

7.

We recommend that all annual reports be sent to the Statistician by July 10.

8.

We recommend that all material to be audited shall be brought to the Auditing Committee on Monday prior to Conference.

9.

We recommend that the Conference buy 1,000 copies of the District minutes this year.

Be it resolved that each Church purchase copies for each member of their Church board.

10.

We recommend that Conference convene on Tuesday at 7:30 p. m. prior to our Annual Camp Meeting.

We further recommend that all Committees meet on Monday at 1:00 p. m. prior to Camp Meeting.

11.

We recommend that those who are to appear before the Educational and Examining Boards, must appear Monday afternoon, or Tuesday prior to Conference.

12.

We recommend that the Ordination service be on Wednesday night of Conference at 7:00 p. m.

## MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail to each pastor an itemized postal notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year.

2.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept and  
Whereas our Officials and Ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our Church, therefore

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference call attention to page 35 section 65 of our Manual which reads "whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing the immodest forms of dress so current today; such as sun suits, shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks, or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts."

Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in American,



Therefore be it resolved, that we as a District go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television.

Furthermore not only oppose television, but also opposed to preachers appearing on television programs.

## REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

### Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church, Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for Missions, General Budget, building funds and all funds raised for Specific Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and church and money paid on contracts of the same.

2.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Funds 76%; Old People's Home 2%; Frankfort Pilgrim College 10%; Home Missions 10%; and General Conference 2%.

3.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of their annual gross receipts of the local church treasury up to and including \$3,000.00, and 2% for all churches with an annual income over \$3,000.00. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury.

### DISTRICT FINANCIAL

1.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate for those working or traveling in the interest of the District be fixed at 5 cents per mile.

2.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$90.00 per week plus mileage at the rate of 5 cents per mile not to exceed \$1,500.00 for the conference year.

We further recommend that his fuel and utilities be supplied.

3.

We recommend that our Assistant District Superintendent be paid at the rate of \$10.00 per day plus mileage for each day's service.

4.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

5.

We recommend that our District Treasurer be paid \$62.50 per month for his services during the year.

6.

We recommend that the Conference Statistician be paid \$50.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that our regular Conference stenographer be paid \$20.00.

8.

We recommend that our District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid \$75.00 for his services during the year.

9.

We recommend that the insurance on the car of the District Superintendent be purchased and paid by the Conference.

10.

We recommend that a resident caretaker be paid a salary of \$1,040.00.  
We further recommend that his fuel, lights and telephone be furnished.

11.

We recommend that all spending on the Camp Ground and District Parsonage be curbed, and that no debts be made for the District, large or small, except for emergency, and that already provided by Conference.

12.

Whereas there is an emergency in regard to our electrical wiring on the Camp Grounds, and whereas the 5th Annual Conference voted, page 40, recommendation No. 7 of our minutes, to have the electrical wiring made adequate, Therefore

We recommend that sufficient funds be transferred from the District Church Extension Fund to the District Funds to take care of this emergency.

13.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for operating expense of the Old People's Home.

## YOUNG PEOPLE

1.

We recommend that the District Young People's financial obligations be raised as follows:

All churches with membership under 40, \$1.00 per month.

All churches with membership 41 through 60, \$2.00 per month.

All churches with membership 61 through 80, \$3.00 per month.

All churches with membership 81 and over, \$4.00 per month.

1.

## SPECIAL SECTIONS FROM THE MANUAL

Those entering a ministerial office shall immediately enter upon the prescribed course of study and pursue same until completed. To this end they shall place themselves under the direction of the District Educational Board, which has charge of this work, unless the same course, or its equivalent, is taken in school.

Examinations required by the District Educational Board shall be submitted in writing and shall be conducted at the time and place of the annual conference or during the year upon completion of a book or subject, either personally or through the mails.

The passing grade of any study shall not be less than an average of 70 per cent.

#### Section 154:

No person shall be eligible for ordination until first having served at least two years in active ministry.

#### Section 155:

The licentiate who has held his license at least three years, and has successfully completed the required course of study, shall be eligible for ordination as a minister of the Gospel, unless the District Council will have deemed it wise to have ordained before the expiration of the three year period.

#### Section 156, Paragraph 1:

All licensed ministers failing to complete and report on at least two subjects a year in their required course of Study for two consecutive years, will automatically forfeit their licenses unless in the judgment of the Educational Board an exception shall be made. The District Council shall have power to review and pass upon such action when it deems advisable. (Section 112, paragraph 3.)

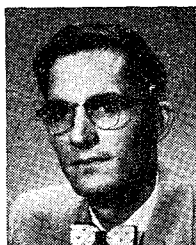

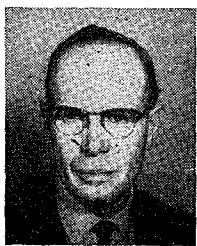
