REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION SECRETARY

To the Eleventh Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greetings in the name of our Blessed Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

In 1951 when the eagle's nest was shaken up and the Southern Indiana Pilgrims set forth on their own wings as a new district, the average Sunday School attendance was 4,804.

Like our National economy, with its progresses and recessions, during the past decade, the history of our district shows its ups and downs with some years of almost phenomenal gains and some of recession. But at the end of the current conference years we are pleased to announce a new apex for Southern Indiana with an all time high average weekly attendance of 7,151 as compared with the afore-mentioned 4,804 or approximately an average gain of 5% per year.

The average Sunday School attendance for the year of 60-61 was 7,151 as compared to 6,658 average attendance last year or a gain of 7.4%.

We owe a debt of gratitude to two of our churches in Evansville for 47% of this gain, and in spite of the exodus of many factory workers due to recession and industries moving to other cities, the Evansville Trinity Church and the Evansville East Side Church had a numerical gain of 166 per Sunday. What these two churches have done in the face of obstacles, with proper leadership and vision, all our churches can do.

The District had an average attendance this year of 7,168 as compared to 6,658 last year—a gain of 7.6%.

Forty-two Sunday Schools had a gain over last year, thirty-one of which amounted to 10% or more.

The Rally Day attendance for 1960 was 8,487 as compared to 8,264 in 1959—a gain of 223.

The Easter attendance this year was 10,964 as compared to 8,689 last Easter.

32 Churches conducted a Vacation Bible School.

6 Churches had a Teacher Training Program.

27 Churches conducted Organized Visitation.

15 Churches had regular Monthly Worker's Conferences.

20 Churches reported a Decade of Progress Score.

During the past year the District Sunday School Committee, together with our District Superintendent, Rev. Mark Storey and our General Secretary of Sunday Schools, Rev. John Abbott, toured the district conducting six zone Sunday School Conventions. These conventions were better attended than any thus far.

"The Decade of Progress" was the theme of the conventions and seemed to be taken with much interest and enthusiasm.

Monthly, quarterly and annual reports, together with special Rally Day reports and for the seven Sundays of the Sunday School Crusade were mailed out to all our pastors and superintendent. In addition, a new District News Bulletin, "The Pilgrim Visitor" was edited and published by your Promotional Secretary.

We have enjoyed the sweet Christian fellowship that exists between our committee members and District Superintendent and pastors that we have worked with and pray God's choicest blessings upon them.

Objectives and Goals

1. The pastors of all our churches who have not yet entered into the "Decade of Progress" hold a special staff meeting during the month of September and adopt the program outlines in it.
2. That every possible effort be made to get every officer and teacher to attend the 2nd National Sunday School Convention at Allentown, Pennsylvania.
3. That all our Sunday Schools adopt the "Sunday School Standard of Excellence" this year.
4. That an intensified organized visitation be inaugurated in all our churches with emphasis on "Personal Contact".
5. That we give every teacher an opportunity to attend a "Teacher Training Course" during the year.
6. The Sunday School officers and teachers meet together at least once a month for a staff prayer meeting for the salvation of the scholars.
7. That this conference take under advisement the possibility of having a full time Promotional Secretary in the not too distant future.
8. No less than a 10% gain in attendance for the 1961-62 conference year.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Church Government

1.

We recommend that when a pastor is changing pastorates, that he be responsible for his new church the second Sunday after camp.

2.

Whereas many of our members are not familiar with the actions of the Conference, therefore:

Be it resolved that the pastor shall have a special meeting of his church at the earliest possible date, for the purpose of familiarizing his people with their responsibilities for the Conference year at which time the pastor shall promote sale of Conference Minutes:

3.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on June 30th of each year.

4.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, utilities, and where parsonages are not equipped with heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings that provisions be made for the same by the local church.

We further recommend that the District Superintendent on his first visit to the churches call the local church board's attention to this matter.

5.

We recommend that the addresses of churches and parsonages appear in our Minutes. We further recommend that the name and phone number of the pastor and church be listed in the phone book.

6.

We recommend that no church board endorse for Conference license anyone who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's work.

7.

When a District Superintendent is to be elected, we recommend that he be elected from the ordained ministers of our District.

8.

We recommend that each Zone be responsible for the promotion of their Home Missionary work, under the direction and advisement of the District Superintendent.

9.

We recommend that the District Council be the District Parsonage Committee.

10.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees which has resulted in some poorly constructed buildings, therefore:

Be it resolved that before constructing church buildings, parsonages, or camp buildings that plans and specifications be approved by the Conference Council or by a committee appointed by same.

11.

We recommend that the time of voting of the church on its pastor be May 1st-30th.

12.

Inasmuch as many churches outside our denomination are substituting movies for religious services, be it resolved that we go on record as opposed to the use of film strips, slides and movies in the church.

13.

Whereas the need for ministerial training is great in our District, we recommend that we have Ministerial Institutes.

14.

Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements, therefore:

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

15.

We recommend that our District Superintendent take a three weeks vacation with pay.

16.

We recommend that the District have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the second Tuesday of April each year.

17.

Inasmuch as many of our evangelists are either leaving the field because of insufficient finance, or are forced to injure their health by taking too many meetings without the proper rest in order to make ends meet, therefore be it resolved that our churches take more care in determining the evangelist's offering and not have any more revival meetings than they can adequately finance, nor call a larger evangelistic party than they can properly pay.

18.

Be it resolved that the pastor of any church that fails to pay their District Budget or their United Stewardship Fund, be required to appear before the examining board with a written statement from his local church board explaining why they failed to pay same.

19.

We recommend that a standard ballot form be used for voting on the pastor and that this ballot be provided by the District.

20.

Be it resolved that a chart giving information concerning visitation and church activity be provided by the Conference. Said chart to be drafted by the District Superintendent.

PASTORAL

1.

We recommend that each pastor take a two weeks' vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors or church secretaries of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the Obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the District Superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each pastor keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.

5.

Be it resolved that the Conference Secretary notify all pastors of Conference Ministers whose name has been dropped from the roll.

6.

Whereas it seems inconsistent from the commercial viewpoint, and for the sake of our influence, we recommend that when possible pastors be paid on a week day rather than Sunday.

7.

Whereas ministers are now eligible for Social Security and many of our pastors are already participating at their own expense, we recommend that churches that are financially able give special attention to this added expense of their pastors.

EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

1.

We recommend that those ministers who desire to pursue the ministerial study course with the thought of receiving credit from Frankfort Pilgrim College, take their studies through the extension service of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Those desiring to take the ministers study course leading to ordination see Section 222 in the Manual.

2.

Whereas the Conference has set the ordination service for Monday evening before Conference, therefore be it resolved that all candidates who are to appear before the educational and examining boards shall meet between the time of 1:00 P. M. Thursday, and 7:30 P. M. Saturday night preceeding Conference at which time the boards shall complete their work and receive no more candidates.

3.

We recommend that all licensed ministers that fail to meet their educational requirements and fail to meet the Educational and Examining Boards, as required in our Minutes, be referred back to their local church Board for Local License.

CAMP MEETING

1.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a Camp Meeting Board which shall supervise the functional work of the camp and the same shall be ratified by this District Council.

2.

We recommend that our District Camp convene on the fourth Friday of July.

3.

Inasmuch as our Superintendent is very busy with the spiritual interests of the camp and administrative duties of the district at camp meeting time:

Be it resolved that the Assistant District Superintendent advise all department heads of their duties, and responsibilities of their departments.

Be it further resolved that he be the assistant chairman of the camp meeting board.

4.

Camp Regulations: No smoking. No profane language. No shorts, slacks, or other forms of immodest dress. All parking shall be in the parking lots. Campers may unload their cars at their tents or cottages, after which their car is to be removed to the parking lot provided for them. No promenading on the camp grounds during the three main services of the day. All attending camp meeting must attend these services or stay in their tent or cottage. (Workers performing their duties of the work of the camp are excluded.)

All campers are to keep the area clean around their tents or cottages and to see to it that they are left tidy when checking out.

Be it resolved that \$1.00 deposit be made, the same to be refunded if their respective area is left tidy when checking out.

5.

Inasmuch as God has seen fit to give us this beautiful camp grounds, and we have fully dedicated it unto God:

Therefore be it resolved that for safety and health reasons we allow no pets upon the grounds during all religious services during the year.

6.

Be it resolved, in behalf of the spiritual interest of our camp meeting, that no cottage construction be permitted on the camp ground during the three main services of the Camp Meeting.

7.

Be it resolved that the following resolution be read at our Conference:

Be it resolved that all able bodied ministers, both stationed and unstationed, remain long enough after camp meeting to help clean up the premises.

Be it further resolved that if they are unable to do so, they shall either obtain permissions from the chairman or secretary of the Camp Meeting Board to be excused, or get a lay member to serve in their place.

8.

We recommend that we maintain a caretaker with residence on the camp grounds.

We further recommend that the District Council shall have full charge of hiring, designation of duties, and setting of salary of said caretaker.

9.

Whereas the leases for cottage lots on our camp grounds clearly states that no lease be bought, sold, or transferred without approval of the District

Council, and whereas our Camp is non-taxable, therefore be it resolved that no cottage shall be bought, sold, or rented for the sole purpose of making a profit.

10.

Be it resolved that a prophet's hour be included in the camp meeting schedule of services.

11.

Be it resolved that the Conference elect a unified camp treasurer,, the same to be elected from three nominees presented by the District Council. Said treasurer shall be responsible for all receipts and disbursements in the operation of our four annual camps.

This treasurer shall report to the annual conference.

Be it further resolved that said treasurer shall become a member of the Camp Meeting Board, and also that the Three Youth Camp chairmen shall likewise have a seat on the Camp Meeting Board.

12.

Be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Board be empowered to set the policies for the administration, the work detail, dining room, etc.

Be it further resolved that the Conference Council approve all action of this board.

13.

Inasmuch as our children are the church of tomorrow and need the best of training and supervision and should be encouraged to attend Camp Meeting, therefore be it resolved that we give more emphasis to the Childrens' Services during Camp by obtaining a Children's worker in advance and publicizing same on the camp posters.

Be it further resolved that there be a talent display service the last Saturday of camp just prior to the evening service for children.

Be it further resolved that we also provide a well supervised recreational period or periods between the three main services.

14.

We recommend that camp advertisement be made available to the churches one month prior to Camp, and such advertisement shall be displayed in other Holiness camps which are held prior to our camp.

15.

Be it resolved that each pastor if called upon be required to give (40) forty hours on the camp ground or forty (40) dollars.

16.

Be it resolved the Camp Meeting Treasurer's books be closed on September 30th.

17.

Be it resolved no custom laundry be permitted in the Camp laundry room. Furthermore, let a sign directing campers to the nearest automatic laundry be placed on the door.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The Sunday School Committee shall present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

- a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

2.

The Council shall instruct the Conference Treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

3.
Note: For all other duties of the Sunday School Board, see Manual, Page 39, Section 80.

4.
We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer Vacation Bible School.

5.
Inasmuch as the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary has been sent to the National Sunday School Convention each year for the past five years, and inasmuch as we feel that it is a most valuable and informative recourse that is well worth the cost and the practice of sending the Promotional Secretary should be continued, therefore be it resolved that this be done each year.

ZONE WORK

1.
Inasmuch as the Zone Meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

2.
Be it resolved the District be divided into four zones for Senior zone work, with three non-conflicting zone meetings per year, the first of said meetings to be held in October.

Be it further resolved that each of these zones have a chairman, secretary, and treasurer. The same to be elected from the pastors of the zone. All zone officers are to be elected by the ministers and Conference delegates of their respective zones.

CONFERENCE

1.
We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to their entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during Camp Meeting.

2.
We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointed members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

3.
We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3 where it speaks of the wearing of gold to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

4.
Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee, therefore:

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the Conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the Conference to be read and the same to be recorded in the Conference Minutes.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each Conference.

5.
We recommend that upon the death of a Conference minister or his wife, that the Conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all Conference pastors and evangelists within reasonable distance, by telephone or telegraph.

We further recommend that the Conference treasurer order flowers for same.

6.

We recommend that each candidate for ordination shall be given a Bible by the District Conference. This Bible shall have the names of the Ordination Committee in it and shall be used during the ceremony

7.

We recommend that all annual reports be sent to the Statistician by July 10th.

8.

We recommend that all material to be audited shall be brought to the Auditing Committee on Saturday prior to Conference.

9.

We recommend that the Conference buy 800 copies of the District minutes this year.

10.

We recommend that Conference convene on Monday following Camp Meeting at 8:30 A. M.

11.

We recommend that the Ordination Service be on Monday night of Conference at 7:00 P. M.

12.

We recommend that all Conference ministers and their wives who have reached the age of 65, be given a guest meal ticket at camp and not be required to work.

13.

Inasmuch as the Manual states that pastors receive first consideration, we recommend that our District Superintendent also receive first consideration and that his salary be paid weekly and his travel expense monthly.

14.

Whereas Owosso has been made our General Church Senior College, we recommend that Frankfort Pilgrim College be made a Zone School.

15.

Inasmuch as the Conference has adopted a group insurance program, be it therefore resolved that our churches continue assuming responsibility for the premium of their pastors.

16.

Be it resolved that the District Insurance Committee include a Chairman, secretary, treasurer, and two advisory committee members at large.

We further recommend that this committee be appointed by the District Council.

17.

Inasmuch as other departments have the power to visit our local churches for special offerings, be it resolved that our District Superintendent be given the same privilege for emergencies of the district.

18.

Be it resolved the Conference take a project of establishing \$1,500.00 Pastor's Salary Supplement Fund.

The purpose of said fund is to supplement a pastors salary to the point of \$75.00 per week so that he can give full time to the work of his ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The fund shall operate through a three way agreement between the said pastor, his local church board and the District Council and the District Superintendent.

The fund will begin with the churches who pay less than \$75.00 per week for pastor's salary.

The pastor must agree to give his full time to his pastoral duties in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and report monthly to the District Superintendent.

The District will agree to pay one-half of the amount needed and the local church will agree to pay one-half or more, the amount needed to make

the pastor's salary \$75.00 per week. The local church will also furnish parsonage and utilities.

Within one year or less according to the churches financial strength the district fund will be withdrawn and will move on to the next eligible church or churches.

Churches must pay a minimum of \$50.00 per week to qualify.

This fund shall be supervised and put in operation by the District Council.

19.

Inasmuch that it has been six years since there has been a pictorial issue of the minutes, we recommend that the 1962 minutes be a pictorial issue.

We further recommend that each person eligible furnish a glossy print of a recent photo, not more than two years old.

20.

Be it resolved that we petition the Northern Indiana District to unite with the Southern Indiana District in a group insurance plan, operated by the two districts.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent appoint a committee to serve jointly with a similar committee from the Northern Indiana District, should they approve this resolution. Said committee to make a study of the possibility of such a plan, and report to the next Conference.

MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference the Secretary mail an itemized notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year in duplicate to each pastor. The pastor shall give one copy to the church treasurer. The treasurer is to read the same at the first board meeting after receiving the list.

2.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept, and

Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our church, therefore,

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference call attention to page 3, section 65 of our Manual which reads "whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts."

Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved, that we as a district go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television.

Furthermore not only opposed to television, but also opposed to preachers appearing on television programs.

3.

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana District provide two Ministerial Scholarships at Frankfort Pilgrim College, per semester.

Said scholarships shall be made available only to students preparing for the ministry, or missionary work.

Students must attend our zone school, Frankfort Pilgrim College.

The Scholarship shall be in the amount of \$100.00 per semester, payable directly to the school on student's account.

No one student shall receive this scholarship for more than five years.

4.

Be it resolved the District Treasurer supply a monthly District report of financial receipts to each pastor, and said report to be posted on the church bulletin board.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all raised by the local church Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society, except that raised for missions, General Budget, Building Funds, and all funds raised for Special Conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and church and money paid on contracts of the same. Said amounts are to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference Year's District Budget and that each church make every effort to pay on this amount monthly.

2.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be prorated as follows: Conference Funds 76%, Old People's Home 2%, Frankfort Pilgrim College 15%, Home Missions 5% and General Conference 2%.

3.

We recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 1% of their annual gross income of the local church treasury up to and including \$3,000.00 and 2% for all churches with an annual income over \$3,000.00. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury. And that said amount be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference Year.

DISTRICT FINANCIAL

1.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate for those working or traveling in the interest of the District be fixed at five cents per mile.

2.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$100.00 per week plus mileage at the rate of five cents per mile.

3.

We recommend that our Assistant District Superintendent be paid at the rate of \$10.00 per day plus mileage for each day's service.

4.

We recommend that our Conference Secretary be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

5.

We recommend that our Conference District Treasurer be paid \$62.50 per month for services for the year.

6.

We recommend that our regular Conference Statistician be paid \$50.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that our regular Conference Stenographer be paid \$20.00.

8.

We recommend that our District Sunday School Promotional Secretary be paid \$75.00 for his services during the year.

9.

We recommend that the insurance on the car of the District Superintendent be purchased and paid by the Conference.

10.

We recommend that each church raise fifty cents per member per year for operating expense of the Old People's Home. And that said amount be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference year. Said amount to be paid on monthly.

11.

Whereas, there is a great appreciation for the response in the loyalty drive from the Northern and Southern churches for the liquidation of Frankfort Pilgrim College debt, which has greatly helped the College Administration to pay off accounts payable, and whereas, we desire to continue the progress and improvement of Frankfort Pilgrim College, and Whereas the Music Hall has been a student project for the past four or five years and is in desperate need of completion, which will take approximately \$4,000.00, therefore, we recommend that each church take an offering similar to the loyalty drive offering of last year, on September 18th or the nearest that date possible. The same to be sent in immediately to the District Treasurer to be forwarded to Frankfort Pilgrim College for the completion of the Music Hall.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

Memorial No. 1—

Inasmuch as our church is in deed of qualified ministers, and since this is essential to the survival and progress of our church:

Be it resolved that this General Conference of 1962 initiate measures to establish a school for the training of ministers, in the same manner as we have done for the Liberal Arts College.

Memorial No. 2—

Substitute for Sec. 149 Paragraph 1 of the 1958 manual.

There shall be a United Stewardship Fund, the amount of which shall be fixed by the General Conference. This fund shall be assessed upon each district's financial ability to pay. This assessment shall follow this plan:

An average of the totals of the previous quadrennium shall be drawn from each of the following items: (1) Pastor's salary. (2) Pastor's expense allowance. (3) Miscellaneous expense. (4) Evangelists offerings. (5) Pilgrim Pension Plan Payments. (6) Cash on hand less cash brought forward.

These six averages shall be added together for each District of the church and they shall receive their proportionate amount of the United Stewardship Fund for the coming Quadrennium on this basis.

Paragraph 2. The United Stewardship Fund shall be divided as follows: Foreign missions 20%, administration 36%, church extension loan fund 3%, church extension 14%, Senior College 21.4%, Sunday School and youth 2.6%, contingent fund 3%.

Memorial No. 3—

Amendment for paragraph 8 section 222 of the 1958 manual.

The Bible Schools of our church shall establish and maintain departments to conduct study courses for the benefit of the ministry of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

1. Such agency shall be known as the Ministerial study course agency.
2. It shall exist for the purpose of assisting unordained ministers and deaconesses in completing the study courses required by our church.
3. These agencies shall provide a list of study course books as authorized from time to time by the General Board.
4. These agencies shall maintain contact by mail with each enrollee, throughout each course of study and shall provide study outlines, examination questions and other appropriate information.
5. These agencies shall maintain adequate educational records for the use and benefit of the enrollee and the church.
6. It shall be understood that these agencies shall in no manner supplant the work of the examining and educational boards of the several districts, but shall cooperate with them by reporting annually on the progress of student ministers and deaconesses within their jurisdiction.
7. These agencies shall provide suitable transcripts and issue certificates upon the satisfactory completion of the work assigned.
8. These agencies shall report to the General Board as may be required by this body.
9. These agencies shall be authorized to take all necessary steps for the conducting of its work as indicated by this resolution and as may be approved from time to time by the General Board.
10. All licensed ministers and licensed deaconesses of the Pilgrim Holiness Church who are taking the study course work shall be required to enroll and carry on their studies with the School agency within their zone.

Memorial No. 4—

Section 45 of the 1958 Manual changed to read:

The annual church meeting shall elect one delegate for each 25 members or less, and an additional delegate for each additional 25 members or major fraction thereof, to the annual meeting of the District Conference.

Section 92, Paragraph 1 changed to read:

In every district there shall be an annual Conference which shall consist of the District Council, Lay delegates—according to section 45—Pastors, and a sufficient number of licensed and/or ordained ministers, and/or deaconesses chosen by the district council to make the total ministerial delegation equal to that of the lay delegation but not to exceed it. No two persons of one family shall be elected to serve in the annual conference.

Section 116, paragraph 2, changed to read:

The lay delegates shall be chosen from the local churches of each district at the ratio of one to every 200 members or major fraction thereof.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the Executive Youth Committee be given authority to establish the date for the Annual Youth Convention subject to the approval of the District Council.

2.

Be it resolved that zone youth leaders plan the program and date of the Youth Zone Rallies.

3.

We recommend that each zone young people's president give opportunity to the District Youth President to present the program of the District at a convenient date.

4.

We recommend that Junior Youth Camps be held during the summer months on our Camp Grounds with the following set-up:

1. Separate camps would be held for boys and girls age groups from nine through thirteen.
2. Camps would be run Monday through Friday, beginning at noon on Monday and closing at noon on Friday.
3. Camps would consist of classes and institutes, supervised recreation and classes in handicraft during the day and a strong evangelistic program at night.
4. A committee composed of the District Sunday School Board and the Executive Youth Council work out complete details and promote said camps. This committee to elect a Youth Camp Chairman from their own group, the same to be ratified by the District Council.

5.

We recommend that each Young People's President submit a written report quarterly to their Zone Youth Leader. And that each Youth President be notified by their particular zone.

6.

We recommend that the District Youth Treasurer see that the Executive Youth Secretary's expenses be paid when attending Youth Leaders' Conference at Indianapolis, Indiana.

7.

We recommend that the Youth Project for the coming year be paying the balance of the debt incurred through the installation of the tabernacle floor.

8.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Such day shall be set aside for the various zone youth to bring their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the school.

9.

Be it resolved that as a zone project, the youth of each zone shall endeavor to establish at least one branch Sunday School in their respective zones.

10.

All Zone Youth Presidents elected will be expected to come at the request of the District Youth President to help prepare for the District Youth Camp. If one is nominated and does not think he can fulfill this obligation, let him state such before the election.

11.

We recommend that the Zone Youth Leaders oversee Junior-Senior Banquets in their zones in consultation with the executive youth committee.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the District Young People's financial obligation be raised as follows:

- All churches with membership under 40, \$1.00 per month.
- All churches with membership 41 through 60, \$2.00 per month.
- All churches with membership 61 through 80, \$3.00 per month.
- All churches with membership 81 and over, \$4.00 per month.

This amount is to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference year. Said amount to be paid on monthly.

2.

In as much as our last year's project is not paid for, we recommend that the unpaid balance be prorated to each church according to their membership and that the amount be printed in the minutes.

We recommend that the youth zone chairman's report to the conference is to include the treasurer's report.
