RULES GOVERNING REPORTS

Quarterly Reports

One copy of the quarterly report from each church in the Conference shall be sent each quarter to the District Superintendent, Rev. Mark Storey, Box, 167, Bedford, Indiana.

Annual Report

One copy of the annual report shall be sent each year from each church in the Conference to the Conference Statistician, Rev. Russell Manship, Marengo, Indiana. Said report shall be in the hands of the statistician by June 10 of each Conference year.

All unstationed ministers, evangelists, song evangelists and ordained deaconesses shall send an annual report to the statistician.

All report blanks shall be received from the statistician.

MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST SITTING

The 14th Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle at Orleans, Indiana, August 3, 1964, at 8:30 a.m.

Rev. Ralph Oden led the Conference in singing "The Cleansing Wave."

Rev. Cecil Brown led in prayer.

Rev. Ray Williams read Psalm 27 and gave a short devotional message.

Rev. Mark Storey, District Superintendent introduced Dr. P. W. Thomas, General Superintendent, who will act as chairman of the Conference.

The General Superintendent, Rev. Thomas, called the conference to order.

The Ministerial Roll was called by the Secretary, Rev. E. A. Poe. There were 61 Ordained Ministers answered the roll call, 8 Licensed Ministers, and 1 Ordained Deaconess.

The lay delegate roll was called by the District Secretary, Rev. E. A. Poe, with 71 churches reporting delegates.

The Chairman, Rev. Thomas, read the standing rules in the Conference Journal establishing the Conference Bar.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, and Rev. Mark Storey read his report. It was moved and seconded that Rev. Storey's report be accepted and passed with a standing vote and a hearty "Amen".

The report of the Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Leonard Fletcher was read and accepted.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read by Mr. Kendall Hayhurst, and accepted.

The Ways & Means Committee and the Resolutions Committee asked to be excused.

The District Treasurer being absent, the report of the President of Frankfort Pilgrim College was called for but due to necessary interference by the Jasper Music Store from Jasper, Indiana, coming to remove the organ they had so graciously loaned to the camp without charge, a fifteen minute recess was called.

The Conference reconvened at the call of the Chairman, Rev. Thomas.

The Chairman, Rev. Thomas, invited Rev. R. A. Beltz to the platform.

The report of Frankfort Pilgrim College Corp., was given by the President, Rev. James Hertel, who prefaced his report with words of appreciation for the financial support and contributions in the Annual Harvest Home offering. The report was accepted.

The Chairman, Rev. Thomas, requested this report appear in the minutes immediately following the District Treasurer's report.

The District Treasurer's report was read by Rev. E. W. Wright, and accepted.

The report of the Camp Meeting Treasurer, Rev. Marvin Hughes, was read and accepted.

The report of the District Group Insurance Committee was read by the Chairman, Rev. Noel Taylor, and accepted.

Rev. Storey presented the name of Rev. W. W. Wilson to the conference to be lifted from local ministers status and granted first year Conference license. Rev. Wilson gave his testimony.

Rev. R. A. Beltz, Director of the Pilgrim Pension Plan was introduced to the Conference and spoke about the Ministerial Benefit Association and the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

The time of the sitting was extended to allow Rev. Beltz to finish his speech.

The session was dismissed with the benediction by Rev. Chester Swayzee.

SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle at 1:30 p.m.

Rev. Angus Jeffers led the congregation in singing "He Took My Sins Away."

Rev. Ralph Conner led in prayer.

Rev. Rollie Schell read the 91st Psalm for devotions.

Rev. Storey asked that Rev. Lewis Daniels who had transferred from the Ohio District be accepted by this Conference so he could move within the Conference Bar. It was moved and supported that he be accepted and after giving his testimony moved inside the bar.

The report of the Educational Board was read by the chairman, Rev. Marvin Jewell, and accepted.

The report of the Examining Board was read by Rev. Angus Jeffers and accepted.

Rev. Alfred Case, District Statistician read the Statistical Report. A motion that the totals only be read of local church finances was made, seconded and carried.

After the report was read, a suggestion from Dr. Thomas that a careful check be made of those churches not reporting and the additional figures be included in the totals. A motion to accept the report with Dr. Thomas's recommendation was seconded and carried.

The Chairman, Dr. Thomas, called for individual pastors reports. Ministers reading reports were: Kenneth Greves, E. R. Weekly, Owen S. Miller, Howard Lane, Marvin Jewell, Oscar Felsburg, James Buckles, Oscar Terry.

The Conference Secretary, Rev. Poe, read Rev. Robert Hawkins report. Others reading reports included: W. W. Wilson, Pauline Karns, Augusta Hastings, Lewis Daniels, and Donald Rohner.

The Conference Secretary, Rev. Poe, read the report mailed in by Robert Stuart, pastor of Concord Church.

Also reporting were: Maurice Cole, Velma Manual, Delbert Winters, Ray Williams, Robert Winkel, Noel Taylor, Alfred Case, and Clyde Dupin.

A motion was made and properly supported to take a ten minute recess. Motion carried.

Conference re-convened and Mrs. Mark Storey, President of the District Missionary Society, read her report. A motion to accept this report was properly supported and carried.

Report of Rev. William Oden, District Youth President, was read and accepted.

Rev. Oden also announced to the Conference a new activity instituted this year known as a "Youth Retreat" to be held at Orleans Pilgrim Camp in the late fall for all teenagers.

The report of the Junior Youth Camp for Boys was read by Rev. Noel Taylor and received.

The report of the Junior Youth Girl's Camp was read by the director Rev. C. M. Swayzee, and this report was accepted.

Rev. C. M. Swayzee read the report of the Southern Indiana Youth Treasurer, which also was accepted.

The Junior Youth Camp Treasurer's report was read by Rev. James Storey, and received.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Clyde Dupin read his report, which was accepted.

A question was raised from the floor as to whether the Youth Conference had the authority to change the make up of Junior Youth Camps that the District Conference set up.

The chair ruled that it was definitely under the jurisdiction of the District Conference.

The Secretary, Rev. Poe, was asked to read names of more pastors to report to the Conference. The following pastors reported: Doyle Sharp, Marvin Hughes, Bence Miller, Paul Knight, Hobart Whittinghill, Ralph Oden, James Storey, Tracy Crowder.

A motion to extend time to 5:00 p.m. seconded and carried.

Other pastors reading their reports included: Russell Manship, Paul Wright and Nelson McCullough. A standing vote of appreciation for Rev. McCullough's fine report was called for by Rev. Mark Storey, with an enthusiastic response.

Rev. Harvey Seviars report was read by the Conference Secretary, Rev. Poe. Also reading their pastoral reports were: John Flowers, William Oden, Richard Beard, E. A. Poe, Ray McCrary, Lester Smith, W. T. Spoonamore, Ralph Mayo.

The Financial report of the Shoemaker Memorial Old People's Home Treasurer was read by the Conference Secretary, Rev. Poe. A motion to receive the report as read was seconded and carried.

The Ordination service was postponed unless all candidates could be here at 7:00 p.m. (time set for Ordination service).

Adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. Mark Storey.

THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Conference opened at 7:00 p.m. with the order of the day being the Ordination service.

Rev. Leonard Fletcher led the Conference in singing "Rock Of Ages". Rev. Mark Storey led in prayer. Rev. E. W. Wright read First Timothy chapter 3, Rev. W. A. Frye read Second Timothy, chapter 4, and Rev. Clarence Hamilton read Second Timothy, chapter 3:1-11.

Rev. Storey presented two candidates to Dr. Thomas for Ordination. They were Hubert D. Brown and Arthur Dilk.

Dr. P. W. Thomas delivered a very challenging and forceful address from Matthew, chapter 24, verse 11; "And this gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all Nations; and then shall the end come".

The secretary read the minutes of the previous sitting, which were received.

Rev. Storey asked the privilege of presenting a new church to the Conference, the Bealview Church at Richmond, Indiana. Rev. A. L. Nugent and his lay delegates Charles Davis, were called forward and a motion was made and seconded to receive the church into the Conference. Rev. Nugent and Brother Davis both gave their testimony.

The chairman, Rev. Thomas, called for a report from the Resolutions Committee.

A mimeographed copy of the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee was passed out to all delegates.

The secretary of the Resolutions Committee, Rev. James Storey, was requested to read the entire report before we pass on any item.

A new Resolution #6 was read dealing with changing the District Conference to be held on the Tuesday and Wednesday of the third week of June.

The chairman suggested the Resolution be amended to request the District Council to change the date, of the District Conference inasmuch as the Manual so specified.

A motion to amend the resolution to insert the words "we recommend to the District Council, that our Conference next year be held on Tuesday, Wednesday of the third week of June". The amendment was seconded and carried.

It was called to the attention of the Conference that this date in 1965 would interfere with the National Youth Convention date—and that the District Council take this in consideration when setting the date of Conference for 1965.

A motion to extend the time for thirty minutes was seconded and carried.

A motion prevailed that the words "The same to be listed in the Minutes under Boards and Committees" be added to Resolution #9 page 33.

Motion prevailed that Resolution #15 on page 34 be changed to read "We recommend that the District have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the fourth Monday of February each year, for a two day convention".

A motion to change Resolution #1 under Camp Meeting to read "We recommend that the District Council appoint a Camp Meeting Board. This Camp Meeting Board shall have the authority to disburse funds, the selection of Camp Meeting workers, and any other business that would duly be termed Camp Meeting business".

This Board shall be composed of: District Superintendent, Chairman; Work Coordinator; Conference elected Camp Treasurer; Conference elected Camp Secretary; and all heads of various departments". Motion seconded and carried.

A motion prevailed that Resolution #8 under Camp Meeting be changed to read: "We recommend that we maintain a caretaker for the District Camp Grounds".

A motion to delete Resolution #11 under "Camp Meeting" was seconded and carried.

Motion prevailed to change Resolution #9 under Conference to buy 600 copies of the District Minutes instead of 800.

Rev. James Storey next read a new resolution calling for the Conference employment of an administrator for Southern Indiana Group Insurance. A motion to adopt same was seconded and carried.

A new resolution that the District Building Committee formulate plans for a 20 room dormitory and that when said plans are prepared, there be a joint meeting of the Camp Board and District Council for ratification and implementation of these plans, was moved to be adopted and seconded.

A motion to amend the resolution to include the Building Committee in the joint meeting was seconded and carried.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Mark Storey.

FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Conference of the Southern Indiana District convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle August 4, 1964, at 8:30 a.m.

Rev. Russell Manship led the Conference in singing "On Christ The Solid Rock I Stand."

Led in prayer by Rev. Wilkes Ragsdale.

Rev. Chester Swayzee read the third chapter of First John.

The minutes of the third sitting were read and approved.

Dr. Thomas spoke to the Conference on "Organization & Fellowship", reading his scripture from Isaiah 54:2.

The Resolutions Committee continued with their report.

New Resolution #2 was again taken up.

An amendment to delete the words "Twenty rooms" was seconded and carried.

A second amendment was offered that the words "construction shall begin only when half the estimated cost is pledged", be added.

An amendment to the amendment was offered that the term "one half" be changed to "one third" seconded and carried.

The amendment as amended carried.

The entire resolution as amended carried.

A new resolution to delete No. 1 on page 33, since it will be taken care of in new resolution #6, carried.

An additional amendment was offered by the Resolution Committee to add the words "the District Council shall nominate persons for Camp Treasurer and Camp Secretary" to the resolution dealing with the Camp Meeting Board, under "Camp Meeting". Resolution as amended carried.

New Resolution #3 was read and a motion to adopt was properly supported.

An amendment to strike out the words "highest" and "second highest" be deleted, was offered and seconded.

Upon recommendation of the Chairman, it was moved and supported to send the resolution back to the committee for redrafting. Motion carried.

New Resolution #4 dealing with a committee to administer the Junior Youth Camps was read by Rev. James Storey and he moved the adoption of same.

A motion to return the Resolution to the Committee for redrafting was carried.

New Resolution #5 read and it was moved to adopt, but died for the want of a second.

New Resolution #7 was presented and a motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Resolution #18 under "Conference" was read to the Conference by the Resolutions Committee Chairman.

A motion to take a 15 minute recess and extend the time of the fourth sitting until 11:50 a.m., seconded and carried.

Conference reconvened and Rev. Don Rohner, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee read the report of said Committee.

The Committee recommended that the Resolution #2 dealing with District Budget for Frankfort Pilgrim College under "Local Church Financial" be changed to 2% of the gross income for all churches instead of 1% of the gross income for all churches whose income is \$3,000.00 or less.

Dr. P. W. Thomas ruled that the resolution was out of order since it dealt with Missionary funds and the General Church funds.

A motion to delete Resolution #3 under "Local Church Financial" dealing with the fifty cent per member per year assessment for the Old People's Home, was seconded and carried.

Changes in Resolution No. 1 under "District Financial" changing the proportions as follows: Conference Funds from 66% to 64%; Frankfort Pilgrim College from 15% to 16%; District Home Missions from 11% to 8%; Pastor's Salary Supplement Fund from 5% to 4%; and General Conference Funds from 2% to 7%; and eliminating the Frankfort Pilgrim College Ministerial Scholarship Fund; motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Resolution No. 2 that would fix the mileage rate at 7c a mile instead of 5c was seconded and lost.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

Benediction by Rev. Ray Williams.

FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of Conference opened at 1:30 p.m. August 4, 1964 in Decker Memorial Tabernacle.

In lieu of the devotional service, Rev. Clyde Dupin, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, was in charge. Rev. Ralph Oden, a member of the Sunday School Board, led the Conference in singing "I Belong To The Pilgrim Sunday School".

Rev. Noel Taylor, another Sunday School Board member, led in prayer.

Rev. Dupin presented the awards to the different Sunday Schools, with Rev. Kenneth Greves, pastor of the Aurora Church receiving the plaque for having the highest numerical gain.

Rev. Dupin awarded the "Decade of Progress" ship to the Sunday School Superintendent, O. C. Clements, Superintendent of his own Sunday School at Evansville, Trinity.

Rev. Mark Storey was asked by Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth, to present the Sunday School of the Year in the entire denomination with a plaque. This honor went to Rev. Clyde Dupin, pastor the Evansville Trinity Church.

Certificates and ribbons were then presented to other Sunday Schools of the Conference.

Minutes of the fourth sitting were read and accepted, with one correction.

The Reception Committee presented two guests to the Conference. They were Rev. and Mrs. Vard Van Briggie, who each gave their testimony.

It was moved, properly supported and carried that they be granted an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

The Ways & Means Committee reported and the Committee Chairman, Rev. Don Rohner offered a motion to delete No. 4 under "District Financial" paying the trade-in allowance in the amount of \$600.00 on the Superintendent's car, was seconded and carried.

A re-draft of Resolution #2 was read, prefaced with the following sentence. "As a means of determining each church's share of responsibility to Frankfort Pilgrim College".

A motion to adopt the entire resolution with the Pre-emble was seconded and carried.

Rev. Rohner then proceeded to explain how the amount of each church's budget, that will appear in the Conference Journal, is figured, and concluded by leading the Conference in singing the Committee's theme song "Participate".

The Resolution Committee reported on a re-draft of Resolution #3, with the words added "The three directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Conference from nominations from the District Council". Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

The re-draft of Resolution #4 was read and a motion to adopt same was seconded and carried.

Rev. Edith Smith, chairwoman of the Committee of Memoirs, read their report. A motion to receive this report was supported and carried, followed by a moment of silent prayer. Then Rev. Leonard Fletcher offered a memorial prayer, after which Dr. Thomas led the Conference in singing a verse and chorus of "Shall We Gather At The River".

The Examining Board read their report of Evangelists to recommend to the District Conference. The following were recommended: Harry Adams, Frances Clark, B. H. Colen, W. S. Dean, William Malott, Clarence May, Wilbur McGinnis, Charles Riggs, Rollie Schell, Nolen Stroud, W. E. White. The following song evangelists: Barbara & Dewey Deckard, Mildred & Mae Hamilton, Geraldine Peach, Rev. & Mrs. W. E. White, and Pauline Watson.

Resolution #3 under "District Financial" was read, changing the District Superintendents salary to \$125 per week, plus 7c a mile traveling expense. This resolution was adopted.

Election of officers was declared the order of the day by chairman Thomas.

The District Superintendent appointed tellers, then Dr. Thomas led the Conference in prayer.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed no election.

Motion to vote on the three highest was seconded and carried.

Ballots were cast again for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed no election.

The Chairman ruled that the next balloting on the Assistant District Superintendent would be an open ballot, and ballots were again cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Leonard Fletcher elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer.

Report of tellers showed E. A. Poe elected as District Secretary.

Report of tellers showed no election for District Treasurer.

Mr. Kendall Hayhurst was elected as District Treasurer on the second ballot.

Ballots were cast for the five Advisory Members of the District Council.

Ballots were cast for District Missionary Society President.

Report of tellers showed three elected as Advisory Members of the Council. They were: Rev. Chester Swayzee, Rev. Orace Willis, and Rev. Clarence Hamilton.

A motion to vote on the four highest was made and seconded. A motion to amend the motion to vote on all who had more than thirty votes was seconded and carried.

The main motion as amended was seconded and carried.

Ballots were cast for two advisory members.

Rev. James Hertel asked the Chairman for a special privilege which was granted. Rev. Hertel made a motion that we show our appreciation for the fine way Rev. Ralph Mayo had kept the Camp Grounds by a rising vote of thanks. Motion seconded and carried.

Report of the tellers of ballots cast for District Missionary Society President showed Mrs. Mark Storey elected.

A motion to reconvene at 6:30 p.m. was properly supported and carried.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

Rev. E. W. Wright pronounced the benediction.

The sixth sitting of Conference opened at 6:30 p.m. with Rev. Russell Manship leading the Conference in singing "Amazing Grace".

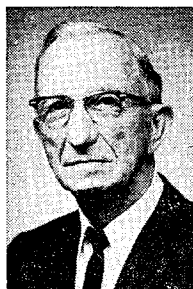
Led in prayer by Rev. Alfred Case.

Ballots were cast for three District Trustees.

Rev. E. W. Wright asked for a special privilege and was granted same by the Conference Chairman. Rev. Wright expressed his warmest appreciation for the sweet fellowship he has enjoyed and the privilege he had of serving the church these many years.

The chairman asked that we all stand, and led in singing "Blessed Be The Tie That Binds" and Rev. Mark Storey presented Brother Wright with the love offering taken.

Rev. Mark Storey read the Placement of Pastors Report and the appointed committees.

Invitations for the Ministerial Convention were asked for by the Chairman.

Rev. Chester Swayzee invited the Convention to Shelbyville, First Church, and it was carried to accept the invitation.

It was moved and seconded that the Council take care of all unfinished business and ratify the minutes of the last sitting. Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn was seconded and carried. Rev. Mark Storey dismissed the Conference with prayer.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Fourteenth Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in the interest of larger and better Sunday Schools on our District.

With a quick and sobering glance at the past year, let us look forward with new zeal and determination to do more for Kingdom Building in the year which lies ahead, if Jesus tarries. As we observe the facts, figures, and trends of the past year, we see many encouraging things and some areas which need much improvement. In these days of crisis, fear and uncertainty, Pilgrim Sunday Schools have a golden opportunity to tell the unchurched of our nation, that there is an answer to the baffling problems of life in Jesus Christ.

We submit the following report not only as a review, but as a challenge for improvement.

The average weekly attendance for this year was 7,191 as compared to 7,054 last year, showing a gain of 137.

Thirty-three Sunday Schools had a gain over last year, twenty-three of which were 10% or over.

Our Rally Day attendance this year was 7,240 as compared to 7,021 a year ago, or a gain of 219.

Eighteen of our Sunday Schools reported for the Sunday School Standard of Excellence. There were six 1-star Sunday Schools; two 2-star Sunday Schools; seven 3-star Sunday Schools; two 4-star Sunday Schools and one 5-star Sunday School.

The attendance award will be presented to the Aurora Pilgrim Sunday School for their fine numerical gain of 24 over the previous year. Rev. Kenneth Greves is the aggressive pastor of this growing church.

Our District had 24 Sunday Schools that conducted Vacation Bible School; 23 Sunday Schools had organized visitation; 10 had monthly worker's conferences; and 4 had a teacher training program.

Emery. I attended the District joint-committee of the District Sunday School Board and District Youth officers held at Mitchell. In October, with the assistance of the Sunday School Board, we planned and promoted a District-wide Sunday School Convention at Bedford which was attended by more than 250 pastors and Sunday School workers. With the assistance of my secretary, I compiled and mailed out monthly, quarterly, and annual reports to all pastors, the District Superintendent, and General Secretary of Sunday School and Youth.

In conclusion, I express my sincere appreciation to Rev. Mark Storey and the wonderful men on the Sunday School Board for their assistance and help in the efforts of Sunday School work on the District. To the many pastors and layity who have been faithful in sending in reports and cooperating with the Sunday School program, I express my appreciation.

It appears that, in the light of the favorable health and accident experience, the present H & A rate structure will be the same for the coming year.

The Life insurance rate has been recalculated, and according to the present enrollment, the rate will be adjusted to \$2.76 per thousand. The present rate is \$2.59. This represents an increase of 17c per thousand.

Should the present favorable experience continue until September 1, we should receive a credit refund again this year.

We recommend that the Southern Indiana Group Insurance retain an Insurance Administrator, who shall send the monthly premium notices, receive the premiums, handle all claims, and take care of all matters pertaining to the operation and administration of the group insurance. Said Administrator shall be paid \$25.00 monthly, plus mileage at the rate of 5c per mile. Said amount to be paid from the refund credit of the group insurance premiums.

We further recommend that we continue this group plan.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on May 31st of each year.

2.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, utilities, heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings.

3.

We recommend that the addresses of churches and parsonages appear in our minutes. We further recommend that the name and phone number of the pastor and church be listed in the phone book.

4.

We recommend that no church board endorse for Conference license any candidate who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's work.

5.

When a District Superintendent is to be elected, we recommend that he be elected from the ordained ministers of our Conference.

6.

We recommend that each Zone be responsible for the promotion of their home missionary work, under the direction of the District Superintendent.

7.

We recommend that the District Council be the District parsonage committee.

8.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees, which has resulted in poorly constructed buildings, therefore:

Be it resolved that before construction of church buildings, and parsonages or camp buildings, that plans and specifications be approved by a three man building committee to be appointed by the District Council. The same to be listed in the Minutes under Boards and Committees.

9.

We recommend that the time of voting of each local church on the pastor be April 15th to May 1st, or as the District Superintendent deems essential for an earlier meeting.

10.

Inasmuch as many churches outside of our denomination are substituting movies for religious services, be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to the use of film strips, slides and movies in the church.

11.

Whereas the need for Ministerial training is great in our District, we recommend that we have ministerial institutes.

12.

Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements; therefore;

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

13.

We recommend that our District Superintendent take a three weeks vacation with pay.

14.

We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the Fourth Monday of February each year, for a two day convention.

15.

Inasmuch as many of our evangelists are either leaving the field because of insufficient finance, or are forced to injure their health by taking too many meetings without the proper rest in order to make ends meet, therefore be it resolved that our churches take more care in determining the evangelists' offering and not have any more revival meetings than they can adequately finance, nor call a larger evangelistic party than they can properly pay.

16.

Inasmuch as our current method of electing three members annually to one year terms for the Frankfort Pilgrim College Board creates the possibility of instability in the operation of the school,

Therefore be it resolved that we elect directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College in the following manner:

The three directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Conference, from nominations from the District Council.

The one receiving the highest vote on first ballot shall be elected for three years, the second highest vote to two years, and the third highest vote to one year terms. In subsequent years, only one board member will be elected annually, as the term expires.

17.

Whereas all major committee's are either appointed by the District Council or elected by this Conference, and

Whereas this policy should be followed for the unifying of our District Youth programs,

Therefore be it resolved that there be a committee consisting of: the District Youth President, who is elected by the Senior Youth Conference from nominees made by the District Council; the District Promotional Sunday School Secretary, who is appointed by the District Council; and two Directors of the Junior Youth Camps, who shall be elected by the Conference from nominees presented by the District Council.

Said committee is to administer the Junior Youth Camps

PASTORAL

1.

We recommend that each pastor take a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors or church secretaries of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee of Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the district superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each secretary keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.

5.

Be it resolved that the conference secretary notify all pastors of conference ministers whose name has been dropped from the roll.

6.

Whereas it seems inconsistent from the commercial viewpoint, and for the sake of our influence, we recommend that when possible pastors be paid on the week day rather than Sunday.

7.

Whereas ministers are now eligible for Social Security and many of our pastors are already participating at their own expense, we recommend that

churches that are financially able to give special attention to this added expense of their pastors.

EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

1.

We recommend that those ministers who desire to pursue the ministerial study course with the thought of receiving credit from Frankfort Pilgrim College, take their studies through the extension service of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Those desiring to take the ministers study course leading to ordination see Section 210 in the Manual.

2.

Whereas the conference has set the ordination service for Tuesday evening of Conference, therefore be it resolved that all candidates who are to appear before the Educational and Examining Boards shall meet on Monday preceeding Conference at which time the Boards shall complete their work and receive no more candidates.

3.

We recommend that all licensed ministers that fail to meet their educational requirements and fail to meet the Educational and Examining Boards, as required in our Minutes, be referred back to their local church board for local license.

CAMP MEETING

1.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a camp meeting board which shall supervise the operational procedure of the camp.

This Camp Meeting Board shall have the authority to disburse funds, the selection of Camp Meeting workers, and any other business that would duly be termed Camp Meeting business.

This board shall be composed of: District Superintendent, Chairman; Work Coordinator; Conference elected Camp Treasurer; Conference elected Camp Secretary, and all heads of various departments.

The District Council shall nominate persons to be elected as Camp Treasurer and Camp Secretary.

2.

We recommend that our District Camp convene on the fourth Friday of July.

3.

Inasmuch as our superintendent is very busy with the spiritual interests of the camp and administrative duties of the district at camp meeting time:

Be it resolved that the assistant district superintendent advise all department heads of their duties, and responsibilities of their departments.

Be it further resolved that he be the assistant chairman of the camp meeting board.

4.

Camp Regulations: No smoking. No profane language. No shorts, slacks, or other forms of immodest dress. All parking shall be in the parking lots. Campers may unload their cars at their tents or cottages, after which their car is to be removed to the parking lot provided for them. No promenading on the camp grounds during the three main services of the day. All attending camp meeting must attend these services or stay in their tent or cottage. (Workers performing their duties of the work of the camp are excluded.)

All campers are to keep the area clean around their tents or cottages and to see to it that they are left tidy when checking out.

Be it resolved that \$1.00 deposit be made, the same to be refunded if their respective area is left tidy when checking out.

5.

Inasmuch as God has seen fit to give us their beautiful camp grounds, and we have fully dedicated it unto God;

Therefore be it resolved that for safety and health reasons we allow no pets on the ground during all religious services during the year.

6.

Be it resolved, in behalf of the spiritual interest of our camp meeting, that no cottage construction be permitted on the camp ground during the three main services of the camp meeting.

7.

Be it resolved that the following resolution be read at our Conference:

Be it resolved that all able bodied ministers, both stationed and unstationed, remain long enough after camp meeting to help clean up the premises.

Be it further resolved that if they are unable to do so, they shall either obtain permission from the chairman or secretary of the Camp Meeting Board to be excused, or get a lay member to serve in their place.

8.

We recommend that we maintain a caretaker.

We further recommend that the District Council shall have full charge of hiring, designation of duties, and setting of salary of said caretaker.

9.

Be it resolved that a prophet's hour be included in the camp meeting schedule of services.

10.

Be it resolved that the adult camp monies be handled by the camp meeting treasurer and that the monies of the three youth camps be handled by the regular district youth treasurer and boys and girls camp treasurer.

Furthermore that the utilities be prorated to each camp.

11.

Be it resolved that the camp meeting board be empowered to set the policies for the administration, the work detail, dining room, etc.

Be it further resolved that the Conference Council approve all action of this board.

12.

Inasmuch as our children are the church of tomorrow and need the best of training and supervision and should be encouraged to attend camp meeting, therefore be it resolved that we give more emphasis to the children's services during camp by obtaining a children's worker in advance and publicizing same on the camp posters.

Be it further resolved that there be a talent display service the last Saturday of camp just prior to the evening service for children.

Be it further resolved that we also provide a well supervised recreational period or periods between the three main services.

13.

We recommend that camp advertisement be made available to the churches one month prior to camp, and such advertisement shall be displayed in other Holiness camps which are held prior to our camp.

We further recommend that the calendar sign board, display the date and workers names for the District Camp Meeting, and dates of other events. This sign to be prepared not later than the first week of June.

14.

Be it resolved that each pastor if called upon be required to give forty (40) hours on the camp ground or forty (40) dollars.

15.

Be it resolved the camp meeting treasurer's books be closed on September 30th.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The Sunday School Committee shall present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

- a. A statement of work accomplished during the year.
- b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

2.

The Council shall instruct the conference treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

3.

Note: For all other duties of the Sunday School Board, see Manual, section 69.

4.

We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer vacation Bible School.

5.

Inasmuch as the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary has been sent to the National Sunday School Convention each year for the past five years, and inasmuch as we feel that it is a most valuable and informative resource that is well worth the cost, therefore be it resolved that this be done each year.

ZONE WORK

1.

Inasmuch as the zone meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

2.

Be it resolved the District be divided into eight zones for Senior zone work, with not less than three meetings per year, the first of said meetings to be held in October.

Be it further resolved that each of these zones have a chairman, secretary, and treasurer. The same to be elected from the pastors of the zone. All zone officers are to be elected at the last zone meeting of the conference year.

CONFERENCE

1.

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to their entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during camp meeting.

2.

We recommend that there be a Publishing Committee composed of the Conference Secretary and two appointed members. It shall be the duty of this committee to publish the Conference Minutes.

3.

We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3 where it speaks of the wearing of gold to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

4.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee, therefore:

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the Conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the Conference to be read and the same to be recorded in the Conference Minutes.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This in-

formation is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each Conference.

5.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference minister or his wife, that the Conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all Conference pastors and evangelists within reasonable distance, by telephone or telegraph.

We further recommend that the Conference Treasurer order flowers for the same.

6.

We recommend that each candidate for ordination shall be given a Bible by the District Conference. This Bible shall have the names of the Ordination Committee in it and shall be used during the ceremony.

7.

We recommend that all reports be sent to the statistician by June 10th.

8.

We recommend that all material to be audited shall be brought to the Auditing Committee on Monday prior to Conference.

9.

We recommend that the Conference buy 600 copies of the District Minutes this year.

10.

We recommend that the Ordination Service be on Tuesday night of Conference at 7:00 p.m.

11.

We recommend that all Conference ministers and their wives who have reached the age of 65, be given a guest meal ticket at camp and not be required to work.

12.

Inasmuch as the Manual states that pastors receive first consideration, we recommend that our district superintendent also receive first consideration and that his salary be paid weekly and his travel expense monthly.

13.

Inasmuch as the Conference has adopted a group insurance program, be it therefore resolved that our churches continue assuming responsibility for the premium of their pastors.

14.

Be it resolved that the District Insurance Committee include a chairman, secretary, treasurer, and two advisory committee members at large.

We further recommend that this committee be appointed by the District Council.

15.

Inasmuch as other departments have the power to visit our local churches for special offerings, be it resolved that our District Superintendent be given the same privilege for emergencies of the district.

16.

Be it resolved the Conference take a project of establishing \$1,500.00 Pastors' Salary Supplement Fund.

The purpose of said fund is to supplement a pastors salary to the point of \$75.00 per week so that he can give full time to the work of his ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The fund shall operate through a three way agreement between the said pastor, his local church board and the district council and the district superintendent.

The fund will begin with the churches who pay less than \$75.00 per week for pastor's salary.

The pastor must agree to give his full time to his pastoral duties in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and report monthly to the district superintendent.

The district will agree to pay one-half of the amount needed and the local church will agree to pay one-half or more, the amount needed to make the pastor's salary \$75.00 per week. The local church will also furnish parsonage and utilities.

Within one year or less according to the churches financial strength the district fund will be withdrawn and will move on to the next eligible church.

Churches must pay a minimum of \$50.00 per week to qualify.

This fund shall be supervised and put in operation by the district council.

17.

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Church preaches and teaches the leadership of the Holy Ghost and that it is the desire that our Conference be directed by the Holy Ghost;

Be it resolved that at the beginning of the session when the election of officers is the order of the day, that all voting members of this conference shall refrain from referring to the Conference Minutes.

Be it further resolved that the chair call the conference to a special session of prayer, urging each person to seek Divine leadership in this weighty matter of electing conference officers.

18.

Since Southern Indiana Conference is nearly the last of all Conferences, thereby creating a hardship relative to obtaining pastors from our school, therefore be it resolved, that we recommend to the District Council that our Conference next year be held on the Tuesday and Wednesday of the third week in June. Furthermore, we recommend that the Educational and Examining Boards meet on the Monday preceeding Conference and that all candidates who are required to meet those Boards, shall do so at that time.

We further recommend that when a pastor is changing, he be responsible for his new charge the second Sunday after Conference.

19.

Be it resolved that three Conference Trustees be elected by this Conference. Also that the District Council provide not less than six nor more than nine nominees.

The nominee receiving the highest number of votes be elected to a three year term, next highest two years, and next highest to a one year term. Each year thereafter the Conference shall elect one trustee.

MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference, the Secretary mail an itemized notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year in duplicate to each pastor. The pastor shall give one copy to the church treasurer, the other copy to be posted on the bulletin board.

2.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept, and

Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference call attention to page 3, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar

garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts."

Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit, and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved, that we as a District go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television.

Furthermore not only opposed to television, but also opposed to preachers appearing on television programs.

3.
Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana District provide two Ministerial Scholarships at Frankfort Pilgrim College, per semester.

Said scholarships shall be made available only to students preparing for the ministry, or missionary work.

Students must attend our zone school, Frankfort Pilgrim College.

The scholarship shall be in the amount of \$100.00 per semester, payable directly to the school on student's account.

No one student shall receive this scholarship for more than five years.

4.
Be it resolved the District treasurer supply a monthly district report of financial receipts to each pastor, and said report to be posted on the church bulletin board.

5.
Be it resolved that this Conference employ an administrator for Southern Indiana Group Insurance.

The duties of this administrator shall be: the sending of monthly premium notices, the handling of all claims, and the care of all matters pertaining to the operation of the Group Insurance Plan.

Said administrator should be paid \$25.00 monthly, plus 5c per mile. These expenses are to be paid from refund credit of the Group Insurance Premium.

This administrator shall be appointed by the District Council.

6.
Be it resolved the Building Committee formulate plans for a 20 room dormitory.

When said plans are prepared, there is to be a joint meeting of the Camp Board and Building Committee and District Council for ratification and implementation of these plans.

Construction shall begin only after one third of estimated cost is pledged.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.
We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church and Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society except that raised for mission, general budget, building funds, and all funds raised for special conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and church and money paid on contracts of the same. Said amounts are to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past years report and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference Year's District Budget and that each church make every effort to pay on this amount monthly.

2.

As a means of determining each church's share of responsibility to Frankfort Pilgrim College, we recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 2% of their annual gross income, except monies borrowed which shall be excluded from this assessment. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury. This amount is to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming conference year.

3.

We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming conference year. Said amount to be paid on monthly.

District Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference Budget be pro-rated as follows: Conference Funds 64%, Frankfort Pilgrim College 16%, Home Missions (District) 8%, Pastor's Salary Supplement Fund 4%, General Conference Fund 7%, Old People's Home 1%.

2.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate for those working or traveling in the interest of the District be fixed at five cents per mile.

3.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$125.00 per week, plus 7c per mile traveling expense.

4.

We recommend that the insurance on the car of the District Superintendent be purchased and paid by the Conference.

5.

We recommend that our assistant district superintendent be paid at the rate of \$10.00 per day plus mileage for each days service.

6.

We recommend that our conference secretary be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that our conference district treasurer be paid \$62.50 per month for services for the year.

8.

We recommend that our regular conference statistician be paid \$50.00 for his services for the year.

9.

We recommend that our regular conference stenographer be paid \$20.00.

10.

We recommend that our district Sunday School promotional secretary be paid \$75.00 for his services during the year.

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the Thirteenth Annual Youth Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

I am deeply grateful to God for His many blessings over the past year and for the privilege to be in another Youth Conference. I feel it has been an honor to work with the youth of our district another year; but with this honor, a tremendous responsibility.

I am thankful for the spirit of co-operation there has been among the youth leaders. My personal thanks to my good District Superintendent for enthusiastic backing of our youth work. Also, thanks to my assistant, Rev. James Storey, and the other members of the Youth Council for their help throughout the year.

As I view the youth work across the district, I am thankful for the progress that has been made; but I am also conscious of some glaring weaknesses to which we need to face up to.

I am in doubt if our youth zone rallies are meeting the needs of our youth. I want to suggest that we do some thinking along this line to see what can be done to help us here. I have made some suggestions to the Resolutions Committee along this line.

Further, I feel that something must be done to strengthen the local society. This seems to be a desperate need. Let me suggest that much time be given to help our teenage group in the local churches. We must provide them with a real challenge.

On behalf of your committee, let me thank you for your response to last year's emergency offering. The Treasurer informs me that about \$873.00 of it came in. This was very good and may God bless you.

Due to this special offering, we did not feel like making a pull for the project; therefore, no money was raised for housing. However, there is about \$800.00 on hand that had been raised previously.

We were very gratified with the success of our first District Junior-Senior Banquet. There was a total of 151 who enjoyed the beautiful banquet in one of I. U.'s loveliest banquet rooms. The variety of the program was enjoyed by all. It is my hope that this shall be continued and will grow to be one of the outstanding events in the lives of our Juniors and Seniors.

We have just witnessed what most felt to be the most outstanding youth camps yet. It had a spiritual tone and depth that had not been reached previously. It seemed from the beginning that the theme of the camp was the need of workers for full-time Christian service. There was a sweet spirit in the camp from the first day on, and we witnessed some real times of victory. The service on Thursday night was one of those never-to-be-forgotten services; and then on Friday night some 33 campers came forward to express the fact that they had either received a definite call or felt God was dealing with them about one. Another 65 joined to say that though they didn't know what God wanted them to do, their lives were in His hands. I believe we're going to hear from this camp.

I have endeavored with God's help to fill this office as best I could. I have tried to promote the general, district, and local programs. I attended and benefited from the General Youth Leaders Conference at Denver, Colorado. I have visited and spoken in an attempt to promote the youth work in seven of our zones, attended a number of youth council and committee meetings, and mailed out about 3000 pieces of promotion material. In the performance of my duties, I have traveled about 4500 miles.

I have served as your youth leader these past five years and, for the most part, it has been a very wonderful time. I am happy for what God has enabled us to accomplish, but I realize that there is still so much to be done in this great work of youth. When we look at our youth, such as we have seen the past week, it ought to bring a challenge to our hearts to do more to save them for God.

Let us leave this grounds to go back to pray, work, and plan for our youth as never before. If we can just catch the vision, the work of youth in Southern Indiana can and will go forward. The challenge is here; let's be real men and accept it.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the Executive Youth Committee be given authority to establish the date for the Annual Youth Convention subject to the approval of the District Council.

2.

Be it resolved that Zone Youth Leaders plan the program and date of the Youth Zone Rallies. Be it further resolved that at least one Youth Rally be held each quarter.

3.

We recommend that each Zone Young People's Chairman give opportunity to the District Youth President to present the program of the district at a convenient date.

4.

We recommend that our summer youth camp program be set up to correspond to the new Christian Youth Crusaders program of our denomination.

1. A camp for boys and girls aged nine through eleven. This camp shall be called the Cadet's Camp.
2. A camp for boys and girls aged twelve through fourteen. This camp shall be called the Crusader's Camp.
3. A camp for boys and girls aged fifteen years and up to be called the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp.
4. Camps would run Monday through Friday, except for the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp, which would have the Annual District Youth Conference on the Saturday following the camp.
5. The Christian Youth Crusaders camps would be co-ordinated with the Christian Youth Crusaders program, and the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp would consist of classes and supervised recreation. All camps would maintain a strong evangelistic program.
6. A committee composed of the District Sunday School Committee and the District Executive Youth Council shall work out complete details and promote these camps. This committee is to elect a Youth Camp Chairman from their own group.

5.

We recommend that all normal expenses of the District Youth President be paid when attending Youth Leaders Conferences.

6.

We recommend that the Youth Project for the coming year be the continuance of the development of camp meeting housing. The goal for the year is \$1,500.00. We further recommend that the \$800.00 collected last year be placed in the fund and when the executive committee feels the fund is adequate to begin construction, they will proceed. The specification for the building and final cost will be subject to district council recommendation and directives.

7.

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Such day shall be set aside for the various zone youth to bring their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the school.

8.

Be it resolved that as a zone project, the youth of each zone shall endeavor to establish at least one branch Sunday School in their respective zones.

9.

All zone presidents elected will be expected to come at the request of the District Youth President to help prepare for the District Youth Camp. If one is nominated and does not think he can fulfill this obligation, let him state such before the election.

10.

We recommend that the district youth council formulate and execute plans for an annual District Junior-Senior Banquet.

11.

Be it resolved that the District Youth Executive Committee co-operate with the F. P. C. Action Day.

12.

Be it resolved that a Youth Spiritual Retreat be planned by the Executive Youth Committee to be held in the fall. Plans and details to be effected by the Executive Youth Committee.

13.

We recommend that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed May 31.

14.

We recommend that the Zone Youth Officers be listed in the Youth Directory of the Conference Minutes and further that the secretary and treasurer of each zone be elected at the last regular youth zone meeting of each zone for the coming Conference year.

15.

We recommend that the District Youth Executive Council be requested to plan, develop and supervise activities for the youth that attend adult camp.

16.

Be it resolved that each zone youth leader work with his local pastors and youth leaders in an effort to organize chartered youth societies in churches which do not have them.

17.

Whereas the District Youth President expends much energy and time in behalf of district youth without compensation, we recommend that a gratuity of \$100.00 be given annually as an appreciation for his services, retroactive.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the district young peoples' financial obligation be raised as follows:

All churches with membership under 40, \$1.00 per month.

All churches with membership 41 through 60, \$2.00 per month.

All churches with membership 61 through 80, \$3.00 per month.

All churches with membership 81 and over, \$4.00 per month.

This amount is to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming conference year. Said amount to be paid monthly.

2.

We recommend the goal of \$1,500.00 be raised during a District Youth Week established by the Executive Committee. We further recommend the goal for each church be set by the Executive Committee.
