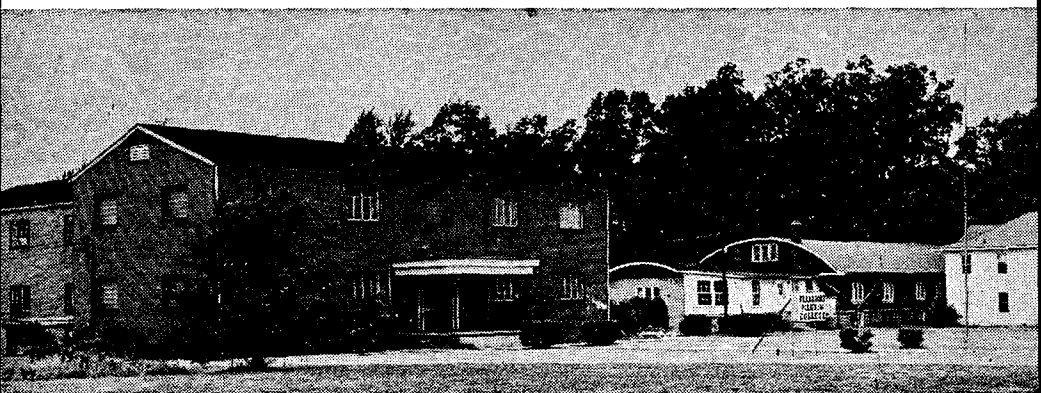

## Annual Report

One copy of the annual report shall be sent each year from each church in the Conference to the Conference Statistician. Said report shall be in the hands of the statistician by June 10 of each Conference year.

All unstationed ministers, evangelists, song evangelists and ordained deaconesses shall send an annual report to the statistician.

## MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

### FIRST SITTING

The 15th Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle at Orleans, Indiana, June 15, 1965, at 8:45 a.m.

Rev. Ralph Oden led the Conference in singing "The Cleansing Wave".

Rev. Chester Swayzee led the Conference in prayer.

Rev. O. W. Willis read First Corinthians, chapter one, verses 1 thru 18, and gave a brief devotional message.

Rev. Mark Storey, District Superintendent, introduced Dr. P. W. Thomas, General Superintendent, to preside as chairman of the Conference.

After words of greeting and personal testimony, General Superintendent Thomas called the Conference to order, and called our attention to a standing rule establishing the Conference bar.

The Ministerial Roll was called by the secretary, Rev. E. A. Poe. There were 65 Ordained Ministers who answered the roll call; 16 Licensed Ministers, and 1 Ordained Deaconess.

The Chairman asked the District Superintendent to present the names of new pastors coming to our District. They were invited by the Chairman to come forward and give their testimony. They included: Revs. Hopper, C. L. Oden, R. K. Storey, Rev. Rex Bebers, Oscar Terry, L. N. Culeson, Samuel Hawn and Floyd Dunn.

A motion carried to receive these ministers into our Conference.

Rev. Thomas read the standing rules in the Conference journal concerning the adgendum.

The District Superintendent's report was called for, and Rev. Mark Storey read his report. It was moved, properly supported, to accept the report of Rev. Mark Storey, and passed with a standing vote and a "God Bless You".

The report of the Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. Leonard Fletcher was read and received with a hearty "Amen".

The Chairman asked for presentation of any new churches. Rev. Storey presented the pastor, Rev. Walter Johnson, and lay delegate Brother Albert Hendershot, of the Gnawbone Pilgrim Holiness Church. Each gave their testimony. A motion to receive the Gnawbone Pilgrim Holiness Church was seconded and received with a hearty "Amen".

The Auditing Committee's report was called for, but the chairman was informed they were not yet ready to report, and members of the committee were excused to complete their work.

Rev. Storey asked for the privilege of presenting some more ministers just arriving to be received by the Conference. Rev. Donald Karns was welcomed back from Africa, and gave his testimony and greetings from his field of labor.

Rev. David Felter and his wife, transferring to our District from the Pittsburg District, were introduced and gave their testimony. Rev. Karns was welcomed back with a hearty "Amen", and the Felters were received by a motion that was seconded and carried.

The Chairman called for a ten minute recess. A motion to recess was seconded and carried.

The first session reconvened with Dr. Thomas leading the conference in singing "This Is My Storey".

The Auditing Committee report was read by Rev. Don Rohner and accepted.

The report of the District Treasurer, Mr. Kendall Hayhurst was read and accepted.

Rev. Rohner asked for the privilege to include the report of the Insurance Administrator as having been audited by the Auditing Committee. No object was heard and the Chairman ruled the aforementioned report is to be included in the Auditing Committee's report.

The report of the Conference Statistician was read.

After the above report was read, the Chairman, Dr. Thomas, gave a brief exhortation and all who were concerned to be more careful and faithful in preparing their reports; also that records and reports of the Ministers changing districts, were often reviewed by the General Superintendent.

A motion to receive the report was seconded and carried.

The report of the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. Clyde Dupin, was read and accepted.

Rev. James Buckles, District Youth Treasurer, read the District Youth Treasurer's report. A motion to receive same was seconded and carried.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer's report was read by Rev. Marvin Hughes, Camp Treasurer. A motion to accept was seconded and carried.

Rev. Noel Taylor, District Insurance Administrator, read the report of the District Insurance Committee. A motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

The Resolutions Committee was given time by the Chairman to pass out the duplicated copies of their report to the Conference delegates.

Since the Junior Youth Camps will be held after the District Conference this year, the Chairman ruled that the reports of the Junior Youth Camps shall be included in the unfinished business and approved by the District Council.

The financial report of the District Youth Camp was read by Rev. James Storey and accepted.

Dr. Thomas invited Rev. James Hertel, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College to the platform to say a few words. Rev. Hertel responded with an oral report, since their books will not close until June 30, 1965, and the financial report will not be forthcoming until after that date. President Hertel did inform us that Frankfort Pilgrim College was now operating in the black, and the future looked very promising with new Harry Shepherd Memorial Library and a much needed Student Union Building. Also, he spoke of a very urgent need of a new dormitory for girls, that plans for construction were shaping up.

The Conference expressed their appreciation for Rev. Hertel's work in our College, with a hearty "Amen".

Adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Mark Storey.

## SECOND SITTING

The second sitting of the Conference convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle at 1:30 p.m.

Rev. Ralph Oden led the congregation in singing "The Comfortor Has Come".

Rev. David Felter led in prayer.

Rev. John Church, pastor at Shoals, read from the 39th Psalm, verses 1 thru 7.

Minutes of the first sitting were read by the secretary, and were received by motion, with corrections and editing.

All late coming Conference Ministers and lay delegates were asked to stand so the secretary could record their presence.

Mrs. Mark Storey, District Missionary Society President, read her report. She reported 43 organized societies in the Southern Indiana District. It was moved and supported to receive the report. Motion carried.

The report of the Examining Board was read by Rev. John Church. He first read the names of the Ministers passed on for Conference license. Motion to receive this report was seconded and carried. The names of the candidates recommended for Ordination were read and passed on by the Conference.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was called for. Rev. Marvin Jewell reported that the Educational Board report was ready to be given, and Rev. Jewell read the report, which was accepted.

Rev. James Storey was requested to read the entire report of the Resolutions Committee before any were passed upon.

A motion to adopt Resolution No. 10, which would change the reading as follows: "Inasmuch as many churches outside of our denomination are substituting movies for religious services, be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to the use of religious movies".

A vote was taken and the Chairman was in doubt as to the results, and asked for a standing vote. The results showed 61 for and 116 against. The resolution was lost.

Rev. James Storey read the Resolution to delete No. 12 regarding the District Superintendent giving special attention to churches meeting their financial requirements. Motion to adopt was seconded and again the chair was in doubt as to the voice vote taken and called for a standing vote. The motion to adopt was lost.

A Resolution to add to No. 14 the words "we further recommend that the pastors expenses be paid by the local church". Motion to adopt was seconded and the vote was indecisive. A standing count was taken and the motion carried with 75 for, and 53 against.

A motion to adopt Resolution placing the New Albany Church in Zone No. 5 was seconded and carried.

A motion to adopt Resolution calling for deletion of No. 2 under "Conference", dealing with a Publishing Committee to publish the Conference minutes, was seconded and carried.

Motion to adopt the Resolution calling for the purchase of 800 copies of the Conference Journal instead of 600 as now recommended in Resolution No. 9 under "Conference", seconded and carried.

Motion to adopt amending Resolution No. 16 reading, "The fund shall operate through three way agreement between the said pastor, his local church board and under the direction of the District Superintendent" was seconded and carried.

Motion to amend the amount to read \$85.00 instead of \$75.00 seconded and carried.

Motion to delete Resolution No. 1 pertaining to the use of Conference Minutes as reference during the time of election of officers was seconded and carried.

A motion to amend Resolution No. 4 under "Miscellaneous" to read "Be it resolved the District Treasurer supply a monthly tabulated, report of financial receipts to each pastor, and said report to be posted on the church bulletin board.

It was agreed by common consent to add the word "accumulative" after the word "tabulated."

Motion to adopt the Resolution as amended was seconded and carried.

A report of the Ways and Means Committee was called for.

Rev. Don Rohner, chairman of that committee, read his report. He first pointed out to us that this years proposed budget was the same as last year except a slight change in the percentage of Conference Funds from 63% to 67%, and cutting District Home Missions from 8% to 6% and the Pastors Supplement Fund from 4% to 3%. Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Rev. Rohner requested the pleasure of leading us in the "Participation Song."

The Reception Committee presented Lt. Comm. Raymond Fitzgerald to the Conference, and he was asked by Dr. Thomas to give us a word, and Chaplain Fitzgerald gave his testimony.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time. Benediction by Rev. Leonard Fletcher.

### THIRD SITTING

The third sitting of the Conference opened at 7:00 p.m. with the order of the day being the Ordination service.

Rev. Russell Manship led the Conference in singing "A Charge To Keep I Have".

The seven candidates for Ordination were then ushered down to their respective seats directly in front of the platform and podium while the congregation stood and remained standing while Rev. Leonard Fletcher led in prayer.

Rev. Manship then led the congregation in singing "Rock Of Ages". Rev. E. W. Wright read from First Timothy, chapter 3. Rev. W. A. Frye read Second Timothy, chapter 4, 1 through 8, and Rev. Clarence Hamilton read Titus, chapter 3, 1 thru 11.

Rev. Mark Storey presented seven candidates to Dr. Thomas for Ordination. They were: Marie Browning, Irvin Bevis, Russell Meek, Frances Clark, Harvey Severs, Ernest Thompson, Lewis F. Daniel.

Dr. P. W. Thomas then delivered a very forceful Ordination address on the subject of "Faithfulness", selecting the 12th and 13th verses of the second chapter of Revelation for his scripture, and calling special attention to the words of the 13th verse "antipas was my faithful martyr". In this address Dr. Thomas stressed Faithfulness to God, Faithfulness to our church and its standards, and Faithful to the task appointed.

The secretary read the minutes of the second sitting which were received as corrected.

The financial report of the Shoemaker Memorial Old People's Home Treasurer was read by the Conference Secretary, and accepted.

The report of the Committee on Memorials for the 1966 International Conference from the Southern Indiana District was called for by the chairman, and duplicated copies of the Memorials were distributed to the Conference delegates.

After a number of announcements, the Conference stood adjourned by expiration of time.

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. John Church.

#### FOURTH SITTING

The fourth sitting of the Conference of the Southern Indiana District convened in Decker Memorial Tabernacle, June 16, 1965 at 8:30 a.m. with Rev. Bence Miller in charge of devotions.

Rev. Ralph Oden led the Conference in singing "Satisfied". Rev. Maurice Cole led in prayer. We were favored by a special song by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Manual singing "Jesus Knows".

Rev. Wilbur McGinnis read the scripture lesson from First Thessalonians, fifth chapter.

The minutes of the third sitting were read by the secretary and were approved as read.

The Chairman asked the Examining Board for any recommendations they had for Conference Evangelists and Song Evangelists.

Dr. Thomas called for the report from the committee on Memorials to the 1966 International Conference.

The secretary read Memorial number one, which would amend Section No. 138 of the Manual.

A motion to amend Memorial No. 1 to read "for the past quadrenium" instead of the coming quadrenium, seconded and carried.

Motion to refer the Memorial back to the committee for redrafting, seconded and carried.

The Secretary read Memorial No. 2, calling for a reversion to one General Superintendent.

Motion to amend the Memorial to read "two General Superintendent" instead of one. Amendment carried.

Memorial No. 2 as amended carried.

Memorial No. 3 was read by the Secretary. Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

The secretary read Memorial No. 4, and a motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Memorial No. 5 was read by the secretary, and a motion to adopt was properly supported and carried.

The Conference recessed for ten minutes.

Dr. Thomas called the Conference back to order, and led the congregation in singing "Showers of Blessings".

Rev. Mark Storey asked for the privilege of introducing a new pastor and presented Rev. and Mrs. Cleon Ramsey, transferring from the Illinois District. They each gave their testimony and a motion to receive them into the Conference was seconded and carried.

Rev. Noel Taylor, our Insurance Administrator, spoke to the Conference briefly about a proposal to increase certain benefits for all 64 years of age and under who are participating in the Southern Indiana Group Insurance Plan for Ministers and their families. He also gave information about additional coverage that could be now had at an additional premium.

A motion to approve the increase in rate that will provide a higher room rate benefit in the hospital for members under 65 years of age, seconded and carried.

A final report was read by Rev. John Church from the Examining Board. A motion to accept the report was supported and carried.

The election of officers being the order of the day, Dr. Thomas called the Conference to prayer.

The secretary was asked to appoint eight tellers.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent.

Reports of tellers showed no election.

Ballots were again cast for District Superintendent. Report of the tellers showed Rev. Mark Storey elected.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Motion to extend the time for 15 minutes was seconded and carried.

Report of the tellers showed no election, and ballots were again cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed no election, and after a call to prayer by our Chairman Dr. Thomas led in prayer, and ballots were again cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed no election.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. E. W. Wright pronounced the benediction.

### FIFTH SITTING

The fifth sitting of Conference opened at 1:30 p.m. June 16, 1965 in Decker Memorial Tabernacle.

In lieu of the devotion service, Rev. Clyde Dupin, Sunday School Promotional Secretary was in charge. Rev. Ralph Oden, a member of the Sunday School Committee led the congregation in singing "Heavenly Sunlight".

Rev. Fay Locke, also a Committee member led in prayer.

Rev. Dupin then introduced the members of the Sunday School Board, after which he presented the awards to the different Sunday Schools.

Rev. Noland Stroud, pastor of the Valeene Pilgrim Holiness Church received the plaque for having the highest numerical gain for the year in Sunday School, who incidentally, also had the highest percentage gain of 100%.

The Decade of Progress Ship award was presented to the Evansville, Trinity Church with the Sunday School Superintendent, O. C. Clement being called forward to receive the award.

Certificates and ribbons were then presented to the other Sunday Schools of the Conference.

The minutes of the fourth sitting were read by Rev. E. A. Poe, and stood approved as read.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

The Chairman called for any evangelists who would be in the field this year, to come forward to be introduced to the Conference. The following ministers were introduced: Rev. A. L. Luttrull, Rev. Charles Riggs, Rev. Hobart Whittinghill and Rev. W. E. McGinnis. Each gave their testimony.

Conference recessed for ten minutes.

Rev. Donald Howe, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene of West Baden, Indiana, was brought forward by the Reception Committee and introduced to the Conference by our Chairman. He gave a word of testimony.

Since the report of the tellers showed no election, Dr. Thomas asked for the Conference to cease voting temporarily on the office of Assistant District Superintendent.

It was moved and seconded to extend the time to 4:55 p.m. Motion carried.

The secretary was asked to read the Council nominations for Conference Secretary.

Ballots were cast for District Secretary.

The secretary read the names of the Council nominations for District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer.

Report of the tellers showed E. A. Poe elected Conference Secretary.

Ballots were cast for two members of the Examining Board.

Report of the tellers showed Kendall Hayhurst elected as District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for two members of the Educational Board.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Ray Williams.

### SIXTH SITTING

The sixth sitting of Conference opened at 6:45 p.m. with Chairman, Dr. P. W. Thomas leading the congregation in singing "I Need Thee Every Hour".

Rev. Marvin Hughes led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes of the fifth sitting were read by the District Secretary, and were approved as read.

Rev. William Oden was asked by the Chairman to read the results of the balloting for Council members at large. The report showed Chester Swayzee, Ray Williams, Marvin Jewell, Clarence Hamilton, O. W. Willis elected.

The report of the tellers for the Examining Board showed Ray Williams and C. D. Hamilton elected.

Report from the tellers showed Chester Swayzee elected as one member of the Educational Board and ballots were cast for the remaining member.

Report of the tellers showed Sister Ruth Storey elected as the District Missionary Society President.

Ballots were cast for Camp Meeting Treasurer from nominations by the Council.

Ballots were cast for Camp Meeting Secretary.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Marvin Hughes elected as the remaining member of the Educational Board.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Marvin Hughes elected as Camp Meeting Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for Conference Trustee to serve three years.

Report of tellers showed Rev. John Church elected as Camp Secretary.

Ballots were cast for Boys Camp Director.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Leonard Fletcher elected as Conference Trustee.

Ballots were cast for Girls Camp Director.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Chester Swayzee elected director of Girls Camp.

Report of tellers for director of Boys Camp showed no election.



Motion to vote on the two highest was seconded and carried.

Report of tellers showed Mr. Kendall Hayhurst elected as a Director of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Rev. Mark Storey made a motion that we invest the authority in the General Superintendent to nominate two members of this Conference for Assistant District Superintendent. Motion was seconded and carried.

Dr. Thomas nominated Rev. Chester Swayzee and Rev. E. A. Poe.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Chester Swayzee elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Ballots were cast to elect one member to the Advisory Council to fill the vacancy created by Rev. Swayzee's election to the office of Assistant District Superintendent.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Philo Jones elected as director of Boys Camp.

Report of tellers showed no election for the member at large of the District Council.

Motion to vote on the two highest was seconded and carried.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Leonard Fletcher elected to the District Council.

A final report from the Ways and Means Committee was ready by Rev. Don Rohner.

He gave us the cost of a telephone answering service and made a motion to have same installed in the District Parsonage. Motion seconded and carried.

A recommendation that the District Superintendent secure professional secretarial help when he has need of same. A motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

An amendment to Section 138 of the Manual as redrafted by the Ways and Means Committee to read as follows: "The United Stewardship Fund to finance the program adopted by the International Conference shall be assessed to each district on a gross income basis rather than a membership basis. This is to be worked out by the General Board".

Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

The last item presented by the Ways and Means Committee was presented, recommending the District vote \$1,000.00 out of the District Church Extension Fund to aid Rev. Nelson McCullough in re-settling his family. Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Rev. Edith Smith read the Report of the Committee on Memoirs. Motion to adopt was seconded and carried.

Rev. Mark Storey read the Placement of Pastors Report and the Appointed Committees. Motion to receive the report was seconded and carried.

The chairman called for invitations for the Ministerial Convention.

Rev. James Storey invited the Convention to the Hulman Street Church at Terre Haute, and Rev. Leonard Fletcher invited the Convention to the Evansville Forest Hills Church. A standing vote was taken and the Conference voted to accept the invitation to Terre Haute.

Dr. Thomas made the proposal to the Conference that the Conference authorize the District Council to select the ten lay delegates and ten alternates to go to the 1966 International Conference. A motion was forthcoming with a second to accept the proposal of Dr. Thomas. Motion carried.

The Chairman recommended that the Conference accept the ten ministers receiving the highest number of votes be declared the ministerial delegates to the International Conference, and the ten next highest be the alternates.

Motion to accept Dr. Thomas' recommendation was seconded and carried.

The report of the tellers for Ministerial Delegates to the 1966 International Conference showed the following elected: Revs. Marvin Jewell, Ray Williams, John Church, Fay Locke, Leonard Fletcher, O. W. Willis, Noel Taylor, E. A. Poe, James Buckles, R. K. Storey.

The alternates elected: Revs. Marvin Hughes, Ralph Oden, Alfred Case, Clyde Dupin, James Storey, Angus Jeffers, Philo Jones, Wayne Isaacs, William Oden, Velma Manuel.

Motion that all unfinished business be left to the Council to take care of, and ratify the minutes of the last sitting, was seconded and carried.

The Conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. W. A. Frye.

### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY

To the Fifteenth Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Greetings in the interest of Pilgrim Sunday Schools.

We submit the following report not only as a review, but as a challenge for improvement. This report covers an eleven month period and 79 cooperating churches. Last year's average attendance was used where churches failed to report.

The average weekly attendance for the year was 7,079 as compared with 7,191 for last year.

Twenty-nine Sunday Schools reported a gain over last year, and thirteen of these showed a gain of over 10%.

Our Rally Day attendance this year was 6,969 as compared with 7,240 last year. These figures cover only the 79 reporting churches.

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.  
We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on May 31st of each year.

2.  
We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, utilities, heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroom floor coverings.

3.  
We recommend that the addresses of churches and parsonages appear in our minutes. We further recommend that the name and phone number of the pastor and church be listed in the phone book.

4.  
We recommend that no church board endorse for Conference license any candidate who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's work.

5.  
When a District Superintendent is to be elected, we recommend that he be elected from the ordained ministers of our Conference.

6.  
We recommend that each Zone be responsible for the promotion of their home missionary work, under the direction of the District Superintendent.

7.  
We recommend that the District Council be the District parsonage committee.

8.  
Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees, which has resulted in poorly constructed buildings, therefore:

Be it resolved that before construction of church buildings, and parsonages or camp buildings, that plans and specifications be approved by a three man building committee to be appointed by the District Council. The same to be listed in the Minutes under Boards and Committees.

9.  
We recommend that the time of voting of each local church on the pastor be April 15th to May 1st, or as the District Superintendent deems essential for an earlier meeting.

10.  
Inasmuch as many churches outside of our denomination are substituting movies for religious services, be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to the use of film strips, slides and movies in the church.

11.  
Whereas the need for Ministerial training is great in our District, we recommend that we have ministerial institutes.

12.  
Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements; therefore:

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the District, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

13.  
We recommend that our District Superintendent take a three weeks vacation with pay.

14.  
We recommend that our District have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the Fourth Monday of February each year, for a two day convention.

We further recommend that the pastors expense be paid by the local church.

15.

Inasmuch as many of our evangelists are either leaving the field because of insufficient finance, or are forced to injure their health by taking too many meetings without the proper rest in order to make ends meet, therefore be it resolved that our churches take more care in determining the evangelists' offering and not have any more revival meetings than they can adequately finance, nor call a larger evangelistic party than they can properly pay.

16.

Inasmuch as our current method of electing three members annually to one year terms for the Frankfort Pilgrim College Board creates the possibility of instability in the operation of the school,

Therefore be it resolved that we elect directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College in the following manner:

The three directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Conference, from nominations from the District Council.

The one receiving the highest vote on first ballot shall be elected for three years, the second highest vote to two years, and the third highest vote to one year terms. In subsequent years, only one board member will be elected annually, as the term expires.

17.

Whereas all major committee's are either appointed by the District Council or elected by this Conference, and

Whereas this policy should be followed for the unifying of our District Youth programs,

Therefore be it resolved that there be a committee consisting of: the District Youth President, who is elected by the Senior Youth Conference from nominees made by the District Council; the District Promotional Sunday School Secretary, who is appointed by the District Council; and two Directors of the Junior Youth Camps, who shall be elected by the Conference from nominees presented by the District Council.

Said committee is to administer the Junior Youth Camps.

## PASTORAL

1.

We recommend that each pastor take a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors or church secretaries of deceased members of our District Conference bring to the Committee of Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the district superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each secretary keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.

5.

Be it resolved that the conference secretary notify all pastors of conference ministers whose name has been dropped from the roll.

6.

Whereas it seems inconsistent from the commercial viewpoint, and for the sake of our influence, we recommend that when possible pastors be paid on the week day rather than Sunday.

7.

Whereas ministers are now eligible for Social Security and many of our pastors are already participating at their own expense, we recommend that

churches that are financially able to give special attention to this added expense of their pastors.

## EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

1.

We recommend that those ministers who desire to pursue the ministerial study course with the thought of receiving credit from Frankfort Pilgrim College, take their studies through the extension service of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Those desiring to take the ministers study course leading to ordination see Section 210 in the Manual.

2.

Whereas the conference has set the ordination service for Tuesday evening of Conference, therefore be it resolved that all candidates who are to appear before the Educational and Examining Boards shall meet on Monday preceeding Conference at which time the Boards shall complete their work and receive no more candidates.

3.

We recommend that all licensed ministers that fail to meet their educational requirements and fail to meet the Educational and Examining Boards, as required in our Minutes, be referred to their local church board for local license.

## CAMP MEETING

1.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a camp meeting board which shall supervise the operational procedure of the camp.

This Camp meeting Board shall have the authority to disburse funds, the selection of Camp Meeting workers, and any other business that would duly be termed Camp Meeting business.

This board shall be composed of : District Superintendent, Chairman; Work Coordinator; Conference elected Camp Treasurer; Conference elected Camp Secretary, and all heads of various departments.

The District Council shall nominate persons to be elected as Camp Treasurer and Camp Secretary.

2.

We recommend that our District Camp convene on the fourth Friday of July.

3.

Inasmuch as our superintendent is very busy with the spiritual interests of the camp and administrative duties of the district at camp meeting time;

Be it resolved that the assistant district superintendent advise all department heads of their duties, and responsibilities of their departments.

Be it further resolved that he be the assistant chairman of the camp meeting board.

4.

Camp Regulators: No smoking. No profane language. No shorts, slacks, or other forms of immodest dress. All parking shall be in the parking lots. Campers may unload their cars at their tents or cottages, after which their car is to be removed to the parking lot provided for them. No promenading on the camp grounds during the three main services of the day. All attending camp meeting must attend these services or stay in their tent or cottage. (Workers performing their duties of the work of the camp are excluded.)

All campers are to keep the area clean around their tents or cottages and to see to it that they are left tidy when checking out.

Be it resolved that \$1.00 deposit be made, the same to be refunded if their respective area is left tidy when checking out.

5.  
Inasmuch as God has seen fit to give us this beautiful camp grounds, and we have fully dedicated it unto God;

Therefore be it resolved that for safety and health reasons we allow no pets on the ground during all religious services during the year.

6.  
Be it resolved, in behalf of the spiritual interest of our camp meeting, that no cottage construction be permitted on the camp ground during the three main services of the camp meeting.

7.  
Be it resolved that the following resolution be read at our Conference:

Be it resolved that all able bodied ministers, both stationed and unstationed, remain long enough after camp meeting to help clean up the premises.

Be it further resolved that if they are unable to do so, they shall either obtain permission from the chairman or secretary of the Camp Meeting Board to be excused, or get a lay member to serve in their place.

8.  
We recommend that we maintain a caretaker.

We further recommend that the District Council shall have full charge of hiring, designation of duties, and setting the salary of said caretaker.

9.  
Be it resolved that a prophet's hour be included in the camp meeting schedule of services.

10.  
Be it resolved that the adult camp monies be handled by the camp meeting treasurer and that the monies of the three youth camps be handled by the regular district youth treasurer and boys and girls camp treasurer.

Furthermore that the utilities be prorated to each camp.

11.  
Be it resolved that the camp meeting board be empowered to set the policies for the administration, the work detail, dining room, etc.

Be it further resolved that the Conference Council approve all action of this board.

12.  
Inasmuch as our children are the church of tomorrow and need the best of training and supervision and should be encouraged to attend camp meeting, therefore be it resolved that we give more emphasis to the children's services during camp by obtaining a children's worker in advance and publicizing same on the camp posters.

Be it further resolved that there be a talent display service the last Saturday of camp just prior to the evening service for children.

Be it further resolved that we also provide a well supervised recreational period or periods between the three main services.

13.  
We recommend that camp advertisement be made available to the churches one month prior to camp, and such advertisement shall be displayed in other Holiness camps which are held prior to our camp.

We further recommend that the calendar sign board, display the date and workers names for the District Camp Meeting, and dates of other events. This sign to be prepared not later than the first week of June.

15.  
Be it resolved that each pastor, if called upon, be required to give forty (40) hours on the camp ground or forty (40) dollars.



14.

Be it resolved the camp meeting treasurer's books be closed on September 30th.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The Sunday School Committee shall present an annual report to the Conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the Conference.

2.

The Council shall instruct the conference treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

3.

Note. For all other duties of the Sunday School Board, see Manual, section 69.

4.

We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer vacation Bible School.

5.

Inasmuch as the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary has been sent to the National Sunday School Convention in the past, and inasmuch as we feel that it is a most valuable and informative resource that is well worth the cost, therefore be it resolved that this be done each year.

## ZONE WORK

1.

Inasmuch as the zone meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, educational, and doctrinal interests of the Conference, we recommend they be continued.

2.

Be it resolved the District be divided into eight zones for Senior zone work, and not less than three meetings per year, the first of said meetings to be held in October.

Be it further resolved that each of these zones have a chairman, secretary and treasurer. The same to be elected from the pastors of the zone. All zone officers are to be elected at the last zone meeting of the conference year.

3.

Be it resolved the New Albany church be placed in Zone 5.

## CONFERENCE

1.

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during Conference. All entitled to their entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during camp meeting.

2.

We recommend that the Conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3 where it speaks of the wearing of gold to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

3.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee, therefore:

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the Conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the Conference to be read and the same to be recorded in the Conference Minutes.

We further recommend that the Conference Secretary gather the needed information of each of our Ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each Conference.

4.

We recommend that upon the death of a Conference minister or his wife, that the Conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all Conference pastors and evangelists within reasonable distance, by telephone or telegraph.

We further recommend that the Conference Treasurer order flowers for the same.

5.

We recommend that each candidate for ordination shall be given a Bible by the District Conference. This Bible shall have the names of the Ordination Committee in it and shall be used during the ceremony.

6.

We recommend that all reports be sent to the statistician by June 10th.

7.

We recommend that all material to be audited shall be brought to the Auditing Committee on Monday prior to Conference.

8.

We recommend that the Conference buy 800 copies of the District Minutes this year.

9.

We recommend that the Ordination Service be on Tuesday night of Conference at 7:00 p.m.

10.

We recommend that all Conference ministers and their wives who have reached the age of 65, be given a guest meal ticket at camp and not be required to work.

11.

Inasmuch as the Manual states that pastors receive first consideration, we recommend that our District Superintendent also receive first consideration and that his salary be paid weekly and his travel expense monthly.

12.

Inasmuch as the Conference has adopted a group insurance program, be it therefore resolved that our churches continue assuming responsibility for the premium of their pastors.

13.

Be it resolved that the District Insurance Committee include a chairman, secretary, treasurer, and two advisory committee members at large.

We further recommend that this committee be appointed by the District Council.

14.

Inasmuch as other departments have the power to visit our local churches for special offerings, be it resolved that our District Superintendent be given the same privilege for emergencies of the district.

15.

Be it resolved the Conference take a project of establishing \$1,500.00 Pastors' Salary Supplement Fund.

The purpose of said fund is to supplement a pastors salary to the point of \$85.00 per week so that he can give full time to the work of his ministry in the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

The fund shall operate through a three way agreement between the said pastor, his local church board and the district council and under the direction of the district superintendent.

The fund will begin with the churches who pay less than \$85.00 per week for pastor's salary.

The pastor must agree to give his full time to his pastoral duties in the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and report monthly to the district superintendent.

The district will agree to pay one-half of the amount needed and the local church will agree to pay one-half or more, the amount needed to make the pastor's salary \$85.00 per week. The local church will also furnish parsonage and utilities.

Within one year or less according to the churches financial strength the district fund will be withdrawn and will move on to the next eligible church. Churches must pay a minimum of \$50.00 per week to qualify.

16.

Since Southern Indiana Conference is nearly the last of all Conferences, thereby creating a hardship relative to obtaining pastors from our school, therefore be it resolved, that we recommend to the District Council that our Conference next year be held on the Tuesday and Wednesday of the third week in June. Furthermore, we recommend that the Educational and Examining Boards meet on the Monday preceeding Conference and that all candidates who are required to meet those Boards, shall do so at that time.

We further recommend that when a pastor is changing, he be responsible for his new charge the second Sunday after Conference.

17.

Be it resolved that three Conference Trustees be elected by this Conference. Also that the District Council provide not less than six, not more than nine nominees.

The nominee receiving the highest number of votes be elected to a three year term, next highest two years, and the next highest to a one year term. Each year thereafter the Conference shall elect one trustee.

## MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the Conference, the Secretary mail an itemized notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year, in duplicate to each pastor. The pastor shall give one copy to the Church treasurer, the other copy to be posted on the bulletin board.

2.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept, and

Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference call attention to page 3, section 65 of our Manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts."

Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit, and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore be it resolved, that we as a District go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television.

Furthermore not only opposed to television, but also opposed to preachers appearing on television programs.

3.

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana District provide two Ministerial Scholarships at Frankfort Pilgrim College, per semester.

Said scholarships shall be made available only to students preparing for the ministry, or missionary work.

Students must attend our zone school, Frankfort Pilgrim College.

The scholarship shall be in the amount of \$100.00 per semester, payable directly to the school on student's account.

No one student shall receive this scholarship for more than five years.

4.

Be it resolved the District Treasurer supply a monthly tabulated, accumulative report of financial receipts to each pastor, and said report to be posted on the church bulletin board.

5.

Be it resolved that this Conference employ an administrator for Southern Indiana Group Insurance.

The duties of this administrator shall be: the sending of monthly premium notices, the handling of all claims, and the care of all matters pertaining to the operation of the Group Insurance Plan.

Said administrator should be paid \$25.00 monthly, plus 5c per mile. These expenses are to be paid from refund credit of the Group Insurance Premium.

This administrator shall be appointed by the District Council.

6.

Be it resolved the Building Committee formulate plans for a 20 room dormitory.

When said plans are prepared, there is to be a joint meeting of the Camp Board and Building Committee and District Council for ratification and implementation of these plans.

Construction shall begin only after one third of estimated cost is pledged.

## REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

### Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that the Conference budget consist of 10% of all money raised by the local church and Sunday School and 5% from the Young People's Society except that raised for missions, general budget, building funds, and all funds raised for special conference interests. Building fund purposes shall be interpreted to include rent on parsonages and church and money paid on contracts of the same. Said amounts are to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past years report and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming Conference Years District Budget and that each church make every effort to pay on this amount monthly.

2.

As a means of determining each church's share of responsibility to Frankfort Pilgrim College, we recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 2% of their annual gross income, except monies borrowed which shall be excluded from this assessment. Said amount to be paid monthly through the Conference Treasury. This amount is to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's report and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming conference year.

3.

We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the Conference Journal for the coming conference year. Said amount to be paid on monthly.

## District Financial

1.

We recommend that the conference budget be pro-rated as follows: Conference Funds 67%, Frankfort Pilgrim College 16%, Home Missions (District) 6%, Pastor's Salary Supplement Fund 3%, General Conference Fund 7%, Old People's Home  $\frac{1}{2}\%$ , and Ministerial and Missionary Scholarship Fund  $\frac{1}{2}\%$ .

2.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate for those working or traveling in the interest of the District be fixed at five cents per mile.

3.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$125.00 per week, plus 7c per mile traveling expense.

4.

We recommend that the insurance on the car of the District Superintendent be purchased and paid by the Conference.

5.

We recommend that our assistant district superintendent be paid at the rate of \$10.00 per day plus mileage for each days service.

6.

We recommend that our conference secretary be paid \$100.00 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that our conference district treasurer be paid \$62.50 per month for services for the year.

8.

We recommend that our regular conference statistician be paid \$50.00 for his services for the year.

9.

We recommend that our regular conference stenographer be paid \$20.00.

10.

We recommend that our district Sunday School promotional secretary be paid \$75.00 for his services during the year.

11.

We recommend that the district provide an electronic telephone answering service for the district superintendent's telephone.

12.

We recommend that the district superintendent secure professional secretarial help whenever he has the need of the same.

Greetings to the 14th Annual Youth Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

With thankful hearts we look back over the past year and praise God for His wonderful help in this great work of youth. While there is still much to be accomplished, we give praise for what has been done.

I want to express my appreciation to the fine Youth Council with whom I have been privileged to work. They have been very helpful and always most cooperative. Our District Superintendent has been a real friend to the youth work and I want to thank Bro. Storey for his deep interest in our youth.

All the effort, work, and planning is so gladly given when we see God moving in these young lives. We should never underestimate the work of our youth camp. It is doing a good work.

It has been a privilege to work with our fine youth this past year. I have tried to fill the office to the best of my abilities. I attended a Regional Youth Leaders Meeting at Winona Lake and the General Youth Convention at Anderson. I pray we shall leave this conference with a new purpose and determination to do all we can to save our youth. May God help us.

## REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the Executive Youth Committee be given authority to establish the date for the Annual Youth Camp subject to the approval of the District Council.

2.

Be it resolved that Zone Youth Leaders plan the program for Youth Zone Rallies, that they be held not less than once each quarter. Be it further resolved that each local pastor assume his responsibility in urging the youth in his church to take an active part in the Zone Youth Rallies.

3.  
We recommend that each Zone Young People's Chairman give opportunity to the District Youth President to present the program of the district at a convenient date.

4.  
We recommend that our summer youth camp program be set up to correspond to the new Christian Youth Crusaders program of our denomination.

1. A camp for boys and girls aged nine through eleven. This camp shall be called the Cadet's Camp.
2. A camp for boys and girls aged twelve through fourteen. This camp shall be called the Crusader's Camp.
3. A camp for boys and girls aged fifteen years and up to be called the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp.
4. Camps would run Monday through Friday, except for the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp, which would have the Annual District Youth Conference on the Saturday following the camp.
5. The Christian Youth Crusaders camps would be co-ordinated with the Christian Youth Crusaders program, and the Pilgrim Youth Society Camp would consist of classes and supervised recreation. All camps would maintain a strong evangelistic program.
6. A committee composed of the District Sunday School Committee and the District Executive Youth Council shall work out complete details and promote these camps. This committee is to elect a Youth Camp Chairman from their own group.

5.  
We recommend that all normal expenses of the District Youth President be paid when attending Youth Leaders Conferences.

6.  
We recommend that the Youth Project for the coming year be the continuance of the development of camp meeting housing. The goal for the year is \$1,100.00. We further recommend that the \$1,420.35 already contributed be placed in the fund and when the executive committee feel the fund is adequate to begin construction they will proceed. The specification for the building and final cost will be subject to district council recommendation and directives.

7.  
We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Such day shall be set aside for the various zone youth to bring their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the school.

8.  
All zone presidents elected will be expected to come at the request of the District Youth President to help prepare for the District Youth Camp. If one is nominated and does not think he can fulfill this obligation, let him state such before the election.

9.  
We recommend that the district youth council formulate and execute plans for an annual District Junior-Senior Banquet.

10.  
Be it resolved that the District Youth Executive Committee cooperate with the F. P. C. Action Day.

11.  
Be it resolved that a Youth Spiritual Retreat be planned by the Executive Youth Committee to be held in the fall. Plans and details to be effected by the Executive Youth Committee.

12.  
We recommend that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed May 31.

13.  
We recommend that the Zone Youth Officers be listed in the Youth Directory of the Conference Minutes and further that the secretary and treasurer of each zone be elected at the last regular youth zone meeting of each zone for the coming Conference year.

14.  
We recommend that the District Youth Executive Council be requested to plan, develop and supervise activities for the youth that attend adult camp.

15.  
Be it resolved that each zone youth leader work with his local pastors and youth leaders in an effort to organize chartered youth societies in churches which do not have them.

16.  
Whereas the District Youth President expends much energy and time in behalf of district youth without compensation, we recommend that a gratuity of \$100.00 be given annually as an appreciation for his services.
