#### STANDING RULES

One copy of the quarterly report from each church in the conference shall be sent each quarter to the District Superintendent, Rev. Mark Storey, Box 167, Bedford, Ind.

#### Annual Report

One copy of the annual report shall be sent each year from each church in the conference to the Conference Statistician. Said report shall be in the hands of the statistician by June 10 of each Conference Year.

All report blanks shall be received from the statistician.

#### MINUTES OF CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

#### First Sitting

The Seventeenth Annual Conference of the Southern Indiana District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle at Orleans, Indiana, June 20, 1967 at 9:00 a.m.

Rev. Mark Storey called the conference to order and introduced Rev. Philo Jones, Chairman of the Devotional Committee, who in turn, asked Rev. Ralph Oden to lead the conference in a song.

After singing, "Tis' So Sweet to Trust in Jesus", and a chorus of, "I Need Thee Every Hour", we were led in prayer by Rev. E. W. Wright.

Rev. Philo Jones quoted some poems from memory. They were: "The Company You Keep," "When He Grows Up Just Like You," and "The Touch of the Master's Hand." Brother Jones then quoted verses 28 through 31 of the 40th Chapter of Isaiah.

Rev. Mark Storey, District Superintendent then presented Dr. Melvin Snyder, our Senior General Superintendent as Chairman of our District Conference.

After warm words of greetings, Dr. Snyder gave his personal testimony and then requested five or six others to give their testimony.

Rev. Mark Storey requested Brother Melvin Smith to lead the conference in a special prayer for Rev. and Mrs. Fay Locke, who had been involved in a serious auto accident.

Rev. Snyder then called the Conference to turn to the 143 rd Psalm and requested all to pray this Psalm.

The secretary read the ministerial and lay delegate roll. There were 78 ordained ministers, 2 ordained deaconesses, 16 Licensed Ministers and 69 lay delegates who answered the roll.

The chairman asked the Examining Board if they had any new ministers to be received into the conference. Rev. John E. Floyd, coming to us from the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and Rev. Gilbert Hall, coming from the Tabernacle Association were introduced and received by a motion properly supported into the conference.

Rev. John Blann, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College was introduced to the conference by Dr. Snyder and was asked to give a word of greeting.

Rev. H. B. Carter then was recognized as an ordained minister transferring from the Illinois District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church; and Rev. William Breidenbaugh, also from the Illinois District was recognized.

Our District Superintendent's report was called for and Rev. Mark Storey read his report.

A motion to receive our District Superintendent's fine, comprehensive report was seconded and carried by a hearty, "Amen" by the conference.

Rev. C. M. Swayzee, Assistant District Superintendent read his report and it was moved and supported to receive this report -- was also carried by a unanimous, "Amen."

Two new churches were presented to the conference by our District Superintendent.

They were: Columbus, Central, with their pastor and his wife, Rev. and Mrs. Armond Calvert, being introduced; our new church at Greencastle, Indiana with their pastor, Rev. Walter Gonsor, and his delegate, LaVonne Strange.

These two churches were received by a properly supported motion and standing vote of the conference and the words, "Praise the Lord."

The Auditing Committee's report was read by Rev. Lester Strahley and a motion to receive same was seconded and carried.

The secretary called attention to another ordained minister coming to us from the Wesleyan Methodist Church who had not been received into our conference. He was Rev. Roy Thomas. A motion to receive him into our conference was seconded and carried.

Mr. Kendall Hayhurst read the District Treasurer's Report. A motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

Rev. Clyde Dupin, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary read his report which was accepted by the conference.

Rev. Noel Taylor, Chairman of the Insurance Committee, and Insurance Administrator, read the District Group Insurance Report.

A motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

After announcements the first setting of conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Angus Jeffers.

#### Second Sitting

The second sitting of the conference convened in Decker Memorial Tabernacle at 1:30~p.m. with Rev. Clyde Dupin in charge of devotions.

Rev. James Storey led the conference in singing, "Draw Me Nearer" and ending with choruses, "The Haven of Rest" and "Peace, Sweet Peace."

We were favored with a song by Rev. C. D. Jester singing for us, "Be Still and Know."

Rev. Robert Murphy read from the 46th Psalm and led in prayer.

Dr. Melvin Snyder then took the chair and spoke to the conference on the theme, "The Time Is Now" and for a text, John 4:35 and 11 Corinthians 6:2.

Dr. Snyder proceeded to give a resume of the history of the downfall, scattering, and the most recent return of the Jews to their home and the city of Jerusalem, and of how all this is the fulfillment of prophecy which could only mean the time of the Gentiles is ending and "the time is now." Dr. Snyder continued to challenge us with this serious business of witnessing to men everywhere we find them long, loud and clear. The time for us to begin bearing fruit is, "now." He concluded by stating that if our district would have another real baptism of the Holy Spirit, something would happen in Southern Indiana that would eclipse even what is happening in the Middle East.

He then led the congregation in singing the chorus, "I Love Him."

Minutes of the first sitting were read by E. A. Poe, Secretary. It was moved and supported that the minutes be received as corrected.

A motion was made to hear a resolution from the Resolutions Committee regarding having the Ordination Service on a Sunday of our camp. Motion was seconded and carried.

Rev. Paul Wright read the resolution dealing with the subject which read, We recommend that the Ordination Service be held the first Sunday of camp at 2:30 p.m.

It was moved and supported to adopt the resolution. Motion carried. Rev. Philo Jones, Chairman of the Junior Boys' Camp, read his report. It was moved and supported to receive this report. Motion carried.

Rev. Chester Swayzee, Chairman of the Junior Girls' Camp, read his report. A motion to receive, was properly supported and carried.

Rev. William Oden, District Youth President, read his report that he gave at the District Youth Conference. A motion to receive this report with our appreciation. Motion seconded and carried.

The Junior Youth Camp Treasurer's Report was called for and read by Rev. William Oden. A motion to receive same was seconded and carried. Conference recessed for 20 minutes.

Conference reconvened at the call of the chair.

Rev. Marvin Hughes read the District Camp Treasurer's Report. Motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Mark Storey, President of the District Missionary Society read her report. It was moved and seconded to receive Sister Storey's report with deep appreciation. Motion carried.

Our Chairman, Dr. Snyder, presented Rev. John Blann, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College to the conference to speak to us about whatever might be on his heart.

President Blann gave us a brief report on the progress of Frankfort Pilgrim College and of spiritual victories. Rev. Blann also expressed his appreciation for the consecrated and dedicated staff and also made an appeal for more qualified workers. He dealt with the merger and its effect upon our school, urging all to continue to back Frankfort Pilgrim College with our enthusiasm and prayer thus insuring it will continue as a school for training our youth for God's work, and to fail to do this would mean the loss of the school. Rev. Blann also made an appeal for 400 more members in the "600 Club", that would provide the necessary buildings and equipment to do the job that needs to be done so badly. President Blann concluded by reading the 8th chapter of Romans.

Rev. Storey asked the conference how many were members of the "600 Club" to stand and then how many would like to join the plan to stand -- 51 responded.

The Secretary read a card of appreciation from the family of Eva Grace Frye.

Rev. Blannasked for the floor to express his thanks for the fine response to the call for new members of the "600 Club."

A motion was made and seconded for the conference to send flowers, along with a note to Rev. and Mrs. Fay Locke, pledging our prayers for their speedy recovery. Mo-

tion was carried.

Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Clarence May.

#### Third Sitting

The third sitting of the conference opened at 7 p.m. in Decker Memorial Tabernacle with Rev. Wayne Maze in charge of devotions.

Rev. Ralph Oden led the conference in singing, "Hallelujah, I Have Found Him."

Rev. Gilbert Hall led the conference in prayer.

Rev. Montey Mahoney read the Scripture lesson from Ezekiel 37: 1-14.

Dr. Snyder took the chair and called for the reading of the minutes of the second sitting. The Secretary read these minutes which were approved as read.

Dr. Snyder then told us Rev. Beltz could not meet with the conference this year and had asked him to represent him in speaking about the Pilgrim Pension Plan. Dr. Snyder read from a report by Rev. R. A. Beltz, published in a recent issue in the Advocate. Brother Snyder also spoke briefly regarding The Pilgrim Pension Plan and the Merger, stating that it will take from five to seven years to work out a new plan and that no member of the Pilgrim Pension Plan could lose since our plan is a vested plan. The chairman then informed us that only 25% of the churches in our district were participating in the plan and proceeded to attempt to "jar" those non-participants into joining the plan and introduced some printed material explaining all he had read to us.

Rev. Mark Storey asked how many of our ministers were members and then how many would be interested in joining the plan. The literature pertaining to same was distributed to interested ministers.

The District Youth Treasurer's report was read by Rev. James Buckles, Youth Treasurer. A motion to receive same was seconded and carried.

Rev. Edith Smith, Chairwoman of the Committee on Memoirs read their report. A motion to receive the report was properly supported and carried. The conference stood for a moment of silent prayer and then the Chair led in prayer, afterward singing, "In The Sweet By and By". Rev. Storey then called the conference to stand and say, "God bless you Brother Snyder", after which Dr. Snyder spoke a few words in memory of the late Rev. W. A. Frye.

Rev. William Oden also spoke a few words about some of Brother Frye's attributes and was followed by a few words from Rev. Virgil Halt.

Brother Melvin Smith read the Statistical Report. Because of the incompleteness of the report it was decided to wait until it could be made more complete. Rev. Leonard Fletcher and Rev. Noel Taylor volunteered to work on this report and bring it back at a later sitting.

Inasmuch as the merger will take place before another district conference, and this will be the last Southern Indiana District "Pilgrim Holiness" Conference we would be having and the next conference we have here will be known as the "Wesleyan District Conference", Dr. Snyder urged all to be much in prayer between now and the election of officers and delegates to our "Merging Conference" to be held in June of 1968. Dr. Snyder also told us why the name "Wesleyan" had been chosen and that it stood for second blessing holiness.

We were adjourned with prayer by Mr. Fred Heugel.

#### Fourth Sitting

The fourth sitting of Conference opened at 8:30 a.m., June 21, 1967 in Decker Memorial Tabernacle with Rev. Philo Jones in charge of devotions.

Rev. C. D. Jester led the conference in singing, "What A Friend We Have In Jesus."

Rev. Wilbert Vandervort led in prayer.

Rev. R. K. Storey read the 5th chapter of 1 Thessalonians for devotions.

Dr. Melvin Snyder took the chair.

A motion to dispense with the reading of the roll call was seconded and carried.

The minutes of the third sitting were read and a motion to receive same as read was seconded and carried.

The secretary read the report of the Educational Board. A motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

Rev. Leonard Fletcher read the balance of the Statistical Report and some revision in the partial report that was read in the third sitting. Motion to receive the report as revised was properly supported and carried.

Rev. John Church read the names of the ministerial candidates passed by the Examining Board. A motion to receive this report was seconded and carried.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read by Rev. Paul Wright, Chairman of the Committee. Rev. Wright read a new resolution under "Pastoral" as follows:

"We recommend that all pastors get their reports to the proper authorities as designated or be subjected to a collect call of notification. A motion to adopt was seconded. An amendment was offered to add the words, "the district superintendent." The amendment was lost.

A second amendment was offered to add, "the name of any minister who refuses to accept such a call shall be turned over to the district superintendent for Council action and to the Examining Board." The amendment carried. The resolution as amended carried.

Rev. Wright read Resolution, No. 6 under Conference, changing the date from June 10 to June 13 as the deadline date for annual reports to be received by the statistician, and moved the adoption of same. Motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. Melvin Smith readthe report of the Ways and Means Committee, which included one substitute Resolution for item #1 under "Local Church Financial," which reads as follows:

"We recommend that each local church and Sunday School set as their goal for district budget giving a tithe in the amount of 10% of the local church regular offerings each month. Saidamount is to be paid monthly and forwarded to the district treasurer at the end of the month. Since tithing is the scriptural method of supporting God's work and our pastors encourage our people to practice tithing, let our churches practice tithing in supporting the total district program."

A motion to adopt was seconded and after lengthy discussion, motion carried.

Dr. Snyder then asked Mr. Kendall Hayhurst to read the names of the churches who paid at least 80% of their United Stewardship Fund, and as the names were called the pastor and delegates came forward. Dr. Snyder then gave out certificates of recognition to these churches. Those receiving three stars were ones who paid 100%, two stars for over 90% and one star for over 80%. Churches receiving one star certificates were as follows: North Vernon, Hartsville, East Enterprise, Oaktown, Evansville, Forest Hills.

The two star churches included: Terre Haute, Northside, Scott City, Poplar Grove, Bloomington, Aurora, and Morgantown. Three Star churches were: Medora, Lawrenceburg, English, Terre Haute, South Central, Terre Haute, Greenwood Street, Paoli, Boonville, Trafalgar, Versailles, French Lick, Terre Haute, Hulman Street, Seymour, Sandford, Columbus, Central, Cannelton and Bethel.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time. Rev. Grant Speer dismissed with prayer.

#### Fifth Sitting

The fifth sitting of Conference opened at 1:30 p.m. in the Decker Memorial Tabernacle.

In lieu of the devotional service. Rev. Clyde Dupin, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary, was in charge.

Rev. Ralph Oden, a member of the District Sunday School Committee led the conference in singing, "I Belong To The Pilgrim Sunday School."

Rev. Noel Taylor, another member of the Committee led in prayer.

Rev. Dupin announced the Sunday School of the year in numerical gain. This was Versailles where Rev. Cecil Brown is pastor. Rev. Brown came forward and received the award. Brother Dupin asked Brother Brown to tell us how he did it. Rev. Brown stated he felt that it was because of about 414 prayer meetings and planning.

Rev. Bence Miller and Rev. Kenneth Greves from Madison and Columbus, Flintwood respectively, received honorable mention.

Brother Dupin then presented the percentage gain ribbons to those Sunday Schools with at least a 5% gain.

Rev. Clyde Dupin next presented the Standard of Excellence Certificates to qualified  $Sunday\ Schools$ .

The Promotional Secretary presented the Decade of Progress Ship to the delegate of the Evansville, Trinity Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Dr. Melvin Snyder then took the chair and called for the reading of the minutes of the fourth sitting which were read by the secretary and a motion to accept same as read, was seconded and carried.

Dr. Snyder then declared the election of officers to be the order of the day, and asked Rev. Mark Storey to appoint tellers.

After tellers were appointed, Dr. Snyder instructed the Conference as to the responsibilities and sacred trust we exercise in voting. Also of how personalities and selfish motives, prejudice and outside influence should not be, in any way, deciding

factors in how we vote, but only to the glory of God.

The Chairman then called the Conference to prayer.

Ballots were cast for District Superintendent.

The Secretary was asked to read the names of the Council's nominations for the Examining Board.

Ballots were cast for two members for the Examining Board.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Mark Storey re-elected as District Superintendent.

Ballots were cast for Assistant District Superintendent.

The Secretary read the Council's nominees for two members of the Educational Board.

Ballots were cast for the two members of the Educational Board.

The Secretary read the nominees for District Trustee.

Report of tellers showed Rev. C. M. Swayzee elected as Assistant District Superintendent.

Rev. E. A. Poe read the nominations of the Council for District Secretary.

Ballots were cast for Conference Secretary.

The Secretary next read the Council's nominees for District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for District Treasurer.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Mark Storey elected as District Trustee.

Report of tellers showed Rev. John Church and Rev. Lester Smith elected as members of the Examining Board.

Report of tellers showed Rev. E. A. Poe elected as District Secretary.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Velma Manual and Rev. O. W. Willis as members of the Educational Board.

Report of tellers showed Mr. Kendall Hayhurst as District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for five members of the District Council.

Dr. Snyder asked all voting to cease for a few minutes while he explained the requirements for electing our ministerial and lay delegates to the next International Merger Conference, which might necessitate action by this conference. He stated that our district would have ten ministerial delegates and ten lay delegates to the last International Conference and to the Merger Conference there will be nine ministerial delegates and 14 lay delegates.

In the ministerial vote a record will be kept of the votes for each member elected and the nine highest will be the delegates to the Merger Conference. In the election of

the lay delegates, fourteen will have to be elected, ten will go to the last International Conference and fourteen to the Merger Conference.

A motion to elect the Ministerial Delegates by open ballot was seconded and carried.

A motion to have the District Council nominate twice the number of lay delegates required and lay delegates be elected by ballot from these nominees. Motion seconded and carried.

A motion was made and seconded to elect by a majority vote. Motion carried.

Dr. Snyder then told us that District Conference Memorials, as such, will not be considered at the Merging Conference; however, our conference can send in suggestions to the Merging Polity Committee.

The chair declared a ten minute recess that would last fifteen minutes, while the Council met to nominate lay delegates.

Conference reconvened at the call of the chair.

Rev. Noel Taylor, Insurance Administrator, read a proposed change in daily room rate and benefits, also medical and maternity benefits.

A motion to extend the time to 5 p.m. was seconded and carried.

A motion to increase such benefits was made by Rev. Taylor and properly supped. Motion carried.

Report of tellers showed no election for fifth member for District Council.

A motion to vote on two highest was seconded and carried.

Report of tellers showed Rev. Fay Locke elected as the fifth member of the District Council.

We were adjourned by expiration of time and all standing and turning to another, looking them in the two eyes and saying, "God bless you."

# REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the annual business of the church be closed on May 31 of each year.

2.

We recommend that each church provide a parsonage with telephone, utilities, heating facilities, window shades, kitchen and bathroon floor coverings.

3.

We recommend that the addresses of churches and parsonages appear in our minutes. We further recommend that the name and phone number of the pastor and church be listed in the phone book.

4.

We recommend that no church board endorse for conference license any candidate who is not willing to give full time to the ministry of God's work.

5.

When a District Superintendent is to be elected, we recommend that he be elected from the ordained ministers of our conference.

6.

We recommend that each zone be responsible for the promotion of their home missionary work, under the direction of the District Superintendent.

7.

We recommend that the District Council be the district parsonage committee.

8.

Whereas in many of our building projects there seems to be poorly formulated plans due to incompetent committees, which has resulted in poorly constructed buildings, therefore:

Be it resolved that before construction of church buildings, and parsonages or camp buildings that plan and specifications be approved by a three-man building committee to be appointed by the District Council. The same to be listed in the minutes under Boards and Committees.

We recommend that the time of voting of each local church on the pastor be April 15 to May 1, or as the District Superintendent deems essential for an earlier meeting.

10

Inasmuch as many churches outside of our denomination are substituting movies for religious services, be it resolved that we go on record as being opposed to the use of film strips, slides and movies in the church.

11

Whereas the need for ministerial training is great in our district, we recommend that we have ministerial institutes.

12.

Whereas some of our churches are failing to meet their financial requirements; therefore:

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, as he visits the district, shall give this matter careful consideration with each local church board.

13.

We recommend that our District Superintendent take a three weeks vacation with pay.

14.

We recommend that our district have a Ministerial Convention, the same to begin on the fourth Monday of February each year for a two-day convention.

We further recommend that the pastor's expense be paid by the local church.

15.

Inasmuchas many of our evangelists are either leaving the field because of insufficient finance or are forced to injure their health by taking too many meetings without the proper rest in order to make ends meet, therefore, be it resolved that our churches take more care in determining the evangelists' offering and not have any more revival meetings than they can adequately finance nor call a larger evangelistic party than they can properly pay.

16.

Inasmuch as our current method of electing three members annually to one year terms for the Frankfort Pilgrim College Board creates the possibility of instability in the operation of the school.

Therefore be it resolved that we elect directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College in the following manner:

The three directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the conference from nominations from the District Council.

The one receiving the highest vote on the first ballot shall be elected for three years, the second highest vote to two years, and the third highest vote to one year terms. In subsequent years, only one board member will be elected annually as the term expires.

45

Whereas all major committees are either appointed by the District Council or elected by this conference, and

Whereas this policy should be followed for the unifying of our district youth programs,

Therefore be it resolved that there be a committee consisting of: the District Youth President, who is elected by the Senior Youth Conference from nominees made by the District Council; the District Promotional Sunday School Secretary, who is appointed by the District Council; and two directors of the Junior Youth Camps who shall be elected by the conference from nominees presented by the District Council.

Said committee is to administer the Junior Youth Camps.

18.

We recommend that the district provide an electronic telephone answering service for the district superintendent's telephone.

19.

We recommend that the district superintendent secure professional secretarial help whenever he has the need of the same.

#### PASTORAL

1.

We recommend that each pastor take a two weeks vacation with pay.

2.

We recommend that pastors or church secretaries of deceased members of our district conference bring to the Committee on Memoirs a copy of the obituary of the deceased and any other information that is available.

3.

We recommend that no pastor call an evangelist outside of our church without the approval of the district superintendent.

4.

We recommend that each secretary keep a record of all names and addresses of the subscribers to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate.

5.

Be it resolved that the conference secretary notify all pastors of conference ministers whose name has been dropped from the roll.

6.

Whereas it seems inconsistent from the commercial viewpoint and for the sake of our influence, we recommend that when possible pastors be paid on the week day rather than Sunday.

7.

Whereas ministers are now eligible for Social Security and many of our pastors are already participating at their own expense, we recommend that churches that are financially able to give special attention to this added expense of their pastors.

8.

We recommend that all pastors get their reports to the proper authorities as designated or be subjected to a collect call of notification. The name of any minister who refuses shall be given to the District Superintendent and Examining Board for Council action.

#### EDUCATIONAL AND EXAMINING BOARD

1.

We recommend that those ministers who desire to pursue the ministerial study course with the thought of receiving credit from Frankfort Pilgrim College take their studies through the extension service of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

Those desiring to take the ministers study course leading to ordination see Section 210 in the Manual.

2.

Whereas the conference has set the ordination service for Tuesday evening of conference, therefore, be it resolved that all candidates who are to appear before the Educational and Examining Boards shall meet on Monday preceding conference at which time the boards shall complete their work and receive no more candidates.

3.

We recommend that all licensed ministers that fail to meet their educational requirements and fail to meet the Education and Examining Boards, as required in our minutes, be referred to their local church board for local license.

#### GAMP MEETING

1.

We recommend that the District Council appoint a camp meeting board which shall supervise the operational procedure of the camp.

This Camp Meeting Board shall have the authority to disburse funds, the selection of Camp Meeting workers, and any other business that would duly be termed Camp business.

This board shall be composed of: District Superintendent, Chairman; Work Coordinator; conference elected Camp Treasurer; conference elected Camp Secretary and all heads of various departments.

The District Council shall nominate persons to be elected as Camp Treasurer and Camp Secretary.

We recommend that our district camp convene on the fourth Friday of July.

Inasmuch as our superintendent is very busy with the spiritual interests of the camp and administrative duties of the district at camp meeting time;

Be it resolved that the assistant district superintendent advise all department heads of their duties and responsibilities of their departments.

Be it further resolved that he be the assistant chairman of the camp meeting board.

4.

Camp Regulations: No smoking. No profane language. No shorts, slacks, or othher forms of immodest dress. All parking shall be in the parking lots. Campers may unload their cars at their tents or cottages, after which their car is to be removed to the parking lot provided for them. No promenading on the camp grounds during the main services of the day. All attending camp meeting must attend these services or stay in their tent or cottage. (Workers performing their duties of the work of the camp are excluded).

All campers are to keep the area clean around their tents or cottages and to see to it that they are left tidy when checking out.

Beit resolved that a \$1 deposit be made, the same to be refunded if their respective area is left tidy when checking out.

5.

Inasmuch as God has seen fit to give us this beautiful camp grounds, and we have fully dedicated it unto God;

Therefore be it resolved that for safety and health reasons we allow no pets on the grounds during all religious services during the year.

6.

Be it resolved, in behalf of the spiritual interests of our camp meeting, that no cottage construction be permitted on the camp ground during the three main services of the camp meeting.

7.

Be it resolved that the following resolution be read at our conference;

Be it resolved that all able bodied ministers, both stationed and unstationed, remain long enough after camp meeting to help clean up the premises.

Be it further resolved that if they are unable to do so, they shall either obtain permission from the chairman or secretary of the Camp Meeting Board to be excused, or get a lay member to serve in their place.

8

We recommend that we maintain a caretaker.

We further recommend that the District Council shall have full charge of hiring, designation of duties and setting the salary of said caretaker.

9.

Be it resolved that a prophet's hour be included in the camp meeting schedule of services.

Be it resolved that the adult camp monies be handled by the camp meeting treasurer and that the monies of the three youth camps be handled by the regular district youth treasurer and boys and girls camp treasurer.

Furthermore that the utilities be prorated to each camp.

11.

Be it resolved that the camp meeting board be empowered to set the policies for the administration, the work detail, dining room, etc.

Be it further resolved that the conference council approve all action of this board.

12.

Inasmuch as our children are the church of tomorrow and need the best of training and supervision and should be encouraged to attend camp meeting, therefore be it resolved that we give more emphasis to the children's services during camp by obtaining a children's worker in advance and publicizing same on the camp posters.

Be it further resolved that there be a talent display service the last Saturday of camp just prior to the evening service for children.

Be it further resolved that we also provide a well supervised recreational period or periods between the three main services.

13.

We recommend that camp advertisements be made available to the churches one month prior to camp, and such advertisement shall be displayed in other holiness camps which are held prior to our camp.

We further recommend that the calendar sign board display the date and workers' names for the District Camp Meeting and dates of other events. This sign to be prepared not later than the first week of June.

We also recommend that the conference appoint Rev. Russell Manship to be in charge of advertising of our Camp Meeting on radio. The budget for the same shall not exceed \$250 annually.

14.

Beit resolved that each pastor, if called upon, be required to give forty (40) hours on the camp ground or forty (40) dollars.

Be it resolved that the camp meeting treasurer's books be closed on September 30.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

1.

The Sunday School Committee shall present an annual report to the conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work in the conference.

2

The council shall interest the conference treasurer to take care of all finance incurred by the Conference Sunday School Board.

3.

Note: For all other duties of the Sunday School Board, see Manual, section 69.

4.

We recommend that where possible each local church conduct a summer vacation Bible School.

5.

Inasmuch as the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary has been sent to the National Sunday School Comvention in the past, and inasmuch as we feel that it is a most valuable and informative resource that is well worth the cost, therefore, be it resolved that this be done each year.

#### ZONE WORK

1.

Inasmuch as the zone meetings have been beneficial in advancing the spiritual, education, and doctrinal interests of the conference, we recommend they be continued.

2.

Be it resolved that the district be divided into eight zones for senior zone work and have not less than three meetings per year, the first of said meetings to be held in October.

Be it further resolved that each of these zones have a chairman, secretary, and treasurer.

Be it further resolved that the zone chairman be elected from the pastors of the zone. All zone officers are to be elected at the last zone meeting of the conference year.

# CONFERENCE

1.

We recommend that only ministers, their wives and unmarried dependent children and lay delegates be given entertainment during conference. All entitled to their entertainment shall be duly registered and given cards of recognition. For all other entertainment the same rate shall prevail as during camp meeting.

2.

We recommend that the conference go on record as interpreting I Peter 3:3 where it speaks of the wearing of gold to mean all rings including wedding and class rings.

3.

Inasmuch as we have an active Memorial Committee, therefore:

Be it resolved that instead of a Memorial Service during the conference, we ask this committee to bring adequate memoirs of the deceased to the conference to be read and the same to be recorded in the conference minutes.

We further recommend that the conference secretary gather the needed information of each of our ministers by sending out a questionnaire. This information is to be kept up to date by making the needed additions at the close of each conference.

4.

We recommend that upon the death of a conference minister or his wife, that the conference secretary be notified at once, who shall notify all zone chairmen, who in turn shall notify all conference pastors and evangelists within reasonable distance, by telephone or telegraph.

We further recommend that the conference treasurer order flowers for the same.

5.

We recommend that each candidate for ordination shall be given a Bible by the district conference. This Bible shall have the names of the Ordination Committee in it and shall be used during the ceremony.

6.

We recommend that all reports be sent to the statistician by June 13.

7.

We recommend that all material to be audited shall be brought to the Auditing Committee on Monday prior to conference.

8.

We recommend that the conference buy 800 copies of the district minutes this year.

9.

We recommend that the Ordination Service be held on the first Sunday of Camp at  $2:30\ P.M.$ 

10.

We recommend that all conference ministers and their wives who have reached the age of 65, be given a guest meal ticket at camp and not be required to work.

11.

Inasmuchas the manual states that pastors receive first consideration, we recommend that our District Superintendent also receive first consideration and that his salary be paid weekly and his travel expense monthly.

12.

Inasmuch as the conference has adopted a group insurance program, be it resolved that our churches continue assuming responsibility for the premiums of the pastors.

The Insurance Administrator shall annually send a remindertothe local church secretary of resolution #12 of the conference journal.

Be it resolved that the District Insurance Committee include a chairman, secretary, treasurer, and two advisory committee members at large.

We further recommend that this committee be appointed by the District Council.

14.

Inasmuch as other departments have the power to visit our local churches for special offerings, be it resolved that our District Superintendent be given the same privilege for emergencies of the district,

15.

Inasmuch as we have an established Pastor's Supplement Fund, be it resolved that the District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Secretary and Treasurer administer the same.

16.

Since Southern Indiana Conference is nearly the last of all conferences, thereby creating a hardship relative to obtaining pastors from our school, therefore, be it resolved that we recommend to the District Council that our conference next year be held on the Tuesday and Wednesday of the third week of June. Furthermore, we recommend that the Educational and Examining Boards meet on the Monday preceding conference and that all candidates who are required to meet those boards shall do so at that time.

We further recommend that when a pastor is changing, he be responsible for his new charge the second Sunday after conference.

17.

Beit resolved that three Conference Trustees be elected by this conference. Also that the District Council provide not less than six, nor more than nine nominees.

The nominee receiving the highest number of votes be elected to a three year term, next highest two year, and the next highest to a one-year term. Each year thereafter the conference shall elect one trustee.

18.

Inasmuch as there is some confusion in sending the youth monies, be it resolved that all youth monies be channeled through the District Treasurer's office, who in turn shall make a monthly transfer to the youth treasurer.

19.

Be it resolved that each church of this conference prepare a list of their lay delegates and mail this list to the District Secretary annually, not later than June 10.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

1.

We recommend that immediately following the conference, the secretary mail an itemized notice of the financial requirements of the church for the year, in duplicate to each pastor. The pastor shall give one copy to the church treasurer, the other copy to be posted on the bulletin board.

Whereas example is more powerful than precept, and

Whereas our officials and ministers are looked upon as examples of standards of our church, therefore:

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana Conference call attention to page 3, section 65 of our manual which reads, "Whereas the present trend toward immodesty of dress is so evidently out of keeping with the Word of God, the girls and women who are members of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are not to appear in public wearing shorts, dresses of immodest length, slacks or similar garments, or without stockings. Men and boys of the church are not to appear in public in shorts or without shirts."

Inasmuchas television is fast becoming a daily habit, and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever-increasing number of homes in America;

Therefore, be it resolved that we as a district go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television.

Furthermore, not only opposed to television but also opposed to preachers appearing on television programs.

3.

Be it resolved that the Southern Indiana District provide two ministerial scholar-ships at Frankfort Pilgrim College per semester.

Said scholarships shall be made available only to students preparing for the ministry or missionary work.

Students must attend our zone school, Frankfort Pilgrim College.

The scholarship shall be in the amount of \$100 per semester, payable directly to the school on the student's account.

No one student shall receive this scholarship for more than five years.

4.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer supply a monthly tabulated, accumulative report of financial receipts to each pastor, and said report to be posted on the church bulletin board

5.

Be it resolved that this conference employ an administrator for Southern Indiana Group Insurance.

The duties of this administrator shall be: the sending of monthly premium notices, the handling of all claims, and the care of all matters pertaining to the operation of the Group Insurance Plan.

Said administrator should be paid \$25 monthly, plus five cents per mile. These expenses are to be paid from refund credit of the Group Insurance Premium.

This administrator shall be appointed by the District Council.

# REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Local Church Financial

1.

We recommend that each local church and Sunday School set as their goal for District Budget giving the tithe (10%) of the local church regular offerings each month. Saidamount is to be paid monthly and forwarded to the District Treasurer at the end of the month. Since tithing is the scriptural method of supporting God's work and our pastors encourage our people to practice tithing, let our churches practice tithing in supporting the total district program.

2.

As a means of determining each church's share of responsibility to Frankfort Pilgrim College, we recommend that each church pay the Frankfort Pilgrim College at the rate of 2% of their annual gross income, except monies borrowed which shall be excluded from this assessment. Said amount to be paid monthly through the conference treasury. This amount is to be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's report and printed in the conference journal for the coming conference year.

3.

We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be figured by the Ways and Means Committee for each church from the past year's reports and printed in the conference journal for the coming conference year. Said amount to be paid on monthly.

#### District Financial

1.

We recommend that the conference budget be pro-rated as follows: Conference funds 71.5 per cent, Frankfort Pilgrim College 16 per cent, District Home Missions 4 per cent, Pastor's Salary Supplement Fund 3 per cent, General Conference Funds 5 per cent, Old People's home 1/4 per cent, and Ministerial and Missionary Scholarship Fund 1/4 per cent.

2.

We recommend that the standard mileage rate for those working or traveling in the interest of the district be fixed at 10 cents per mile.

3.

We recommend that our District Superintendent be paid a salary of \$140 per week, plus the regular mileage established for district interest.

4.

We recommend that the insurance on the car of the District Superintendentbe purchased and paid by the conference.

5.

We recommend that our assistant district superintendent be paid at the rate of \$15 per diem plus mileage for each day's service.

We recommend that our conference secretary be paid \$100 for his services for the year.

7.

We recommend that our conference district treasurer be paid \$62.50 per month for services for the year.

8.

We recommend that our regular conference statistician be paid \$50 for his servicfor the year.

9.

We recommend that our regular conference stenographer be paid \$20.

10.

We recommend that our district Sunday School promotional secretary be paid \$75 for his services during the year.

For the first time, we conducted youth services at the adult camp while the morning service was going on. Our attendance was quite good at these services and we feel they were helpful. Along with our services, we are also providing other activities for those youth who attend this camp.

#### RETREAT

Our third annual retreat was by far the most widely attended. They came and came until about 225 had gathered on these grounds for a short week-end packed full of activity. Our facilities were taxed quite strenously but room was provided for all who came and we had a great time together.

### JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET

Our fourth annual Junior-Senior Banquet was again held on the campus of Indiana University in very beautiful surroundings. One hundred-sixty gathered for this lovely evening. Music was provided by our schools at Frankfort and Owosso. A tremendous challenge was given to us all by our speaker, Rev. David Breese. All seniors present were introduced and presented a gift from the district youth.

# YOUTH CAMP

We have just concluded another week of teen camp with an attendance of 138. We had a fine staff of workers who helped to make the week so meaningful. God's Spirit was present and a large percentage of the youth received spiritual help while here. Let us pray that these youth shall find their places in the local church and be a real blessing.

#### ZONE RALLIES

It seems apparent to your director that our zone rallies as we have them are not getting the job done. #### REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the Executive Youth Committee be given authority to establish the date for the Annual Senior Youth Camp subject to the approval of the District Council.

2.

Be it resolved that Zone Youth Leaders plan the program for Youth Zone Rallies, that they be held not less than once each quarter. Be it further resolved that each local pastor assume his responsibility in urging the youth in his church to take an active part in the Zone Youth Rallies.

3.

We recommend that each Zone Youth Chairman give opportunity to the District Youth President to present the program of the district at a convenient date.

4:

We recommend that Junior Youth Camps be held during the summer months on our Camp Grounds with the following set-up:

- Separate camps would be held for boys and girls age groups from nine through thirteen.
- 2. Camps would be run Monday through Friday, beginning at noon on Monday and closing at noon on Friday.
- 3. Camps would consist of classes and institutes, supervised recreation, and classes in handcraft during the day and a strong evangelistic program at night.
- 4. Whereas all major committees are either appointed by the District Council or elected by this Conference or the District Conference and whereas this policy should be followed for the unifying of our District programs,

Therefore be it resolved that there be a committee consisting of the District Youth President, who is elected by the Senior Youth Conference from nominees made by the District Council; the District Promotional Sunday School Secre-

tary, who is appointed by the District Council; and two Directors of the Junior Youth Camps, who shall be elected by the Conference from nominees presented by the District Council.

- 5. Said committee is to administer the Junior Youth Camps.
- 6. A committee composed of the District Sunday School Committee and the District Executive Youth Council shall work our complete details and promote these camps. This committee is to elect a Youth Camp Chairman from their own group.

5.

We recommend that all normal expenses of the District Youth President be paid when attending Youth Leaders Conferences.

6.

We recommend that the youth conference empower the executive youth committee to survey the needs of the youth work and to establish a youth project for the year subject to District Council approval.

7.,

We recommend that we have a Thanksgiving Harvest Day for Frankfort Pilgrim College. Such a day shall be set aside for the various zone youth to bring their canned goods and produce of all kinds for the school.

8.

All zone chairmen elected will be expected to come at the request of the District Youth President to help prepare for the District Youth Camp. If one is nominated and does not think he can fulfill this obligation, let him state such before the election.

9.

We recommend that the district youth council formulate and execute plans for an annual District Junior-Senior banquet.

10.

Be it resolved that the District Youth Executive Committee co-operate with the F. P. C. Action Day.

11.

Be it resolved that a Youth Spiritual Retreat be planned by the Executive Youth Committee to be held in the fall. Plans and details to be effected by the Executive Youth Committee.

12.

We recommend that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed May 31.

We recommend that the Zone Youth Officers be listed in the Youth Directory of the Conference Minutes.

14.

We recommend that the District Youth Executive Council be requested to plan, develop and supervise activities for the youth that attend adult camp.

15.

Be it resolved that each zone youth leader work with his local pastor and youth leaders in an effort to organize chartered youth societies in churches which do not have them.

16.

Whereas the District Youth President expends much energy and time in behalf of district youth with compensation, we recommend that a gratuity of \$100.00 be given annually as an appreciation for his services.

17.

Be it resolved that the Executive Committee be responsible for formulation of a daily menu for youth camp.

#### REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

1.

We recommend that the district youth financial obligation be raised as follows:

All churches with membership under 40, \$1.00 per month.

All churches with membership 41 through 60, \$2.00 per month.




