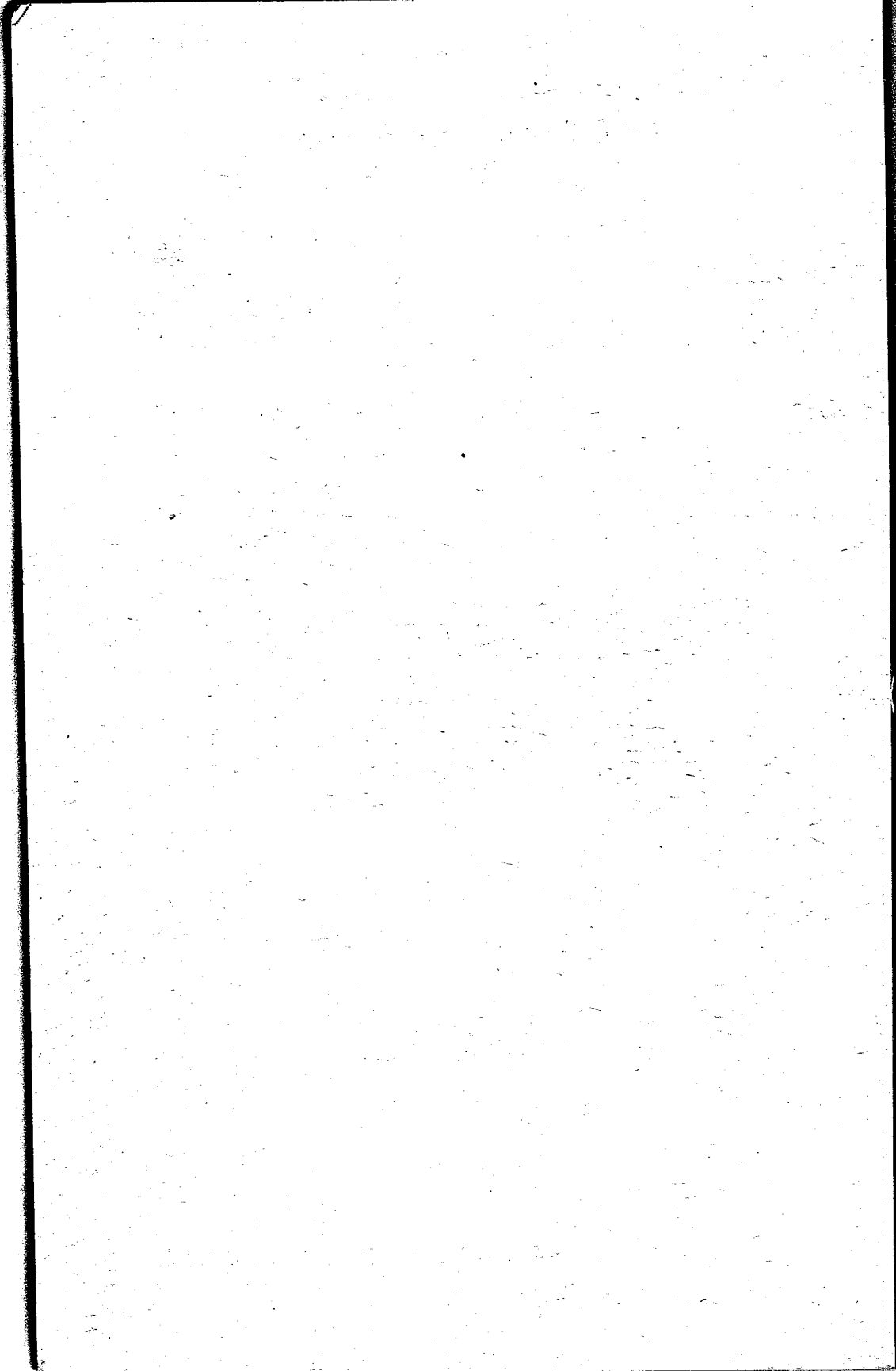

Resolution No. 1 relative to reports heard, and it was moved and seconded to accept this—After discussion it was lost.

REPORT of DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT heard and accepted, being as follows:

To the Annual Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District in session at Clarksburg, W. Va., Aug. 18th through 23rd 1936.

Greeting:

"We are labourers together with God:" 1 Cor. 3:9. This has been the busiest year of my life, but I have enjoyed my labours. This work being new to me, and feeling my insufficiency, I entered the year with much fear and trembling, but through the kind treatment and confidence of the District Council, together with the cooperation of the pastors, laity, and former Superintendent, I found I was among my friends, and therefore lost some of my fears. I assure you that I appreciate your fellowship and support, also your charity in overlooking my blunders.

I have traveled approximately 10,500 miles making a total expense including postage, etc. of \$371.76. My salary is paid in full. I have preached 151 times, held 84 quarterly meetings, and 21 annual business meetings. Have held four revivals in the district, namely, at Huntington, Vienna, West Union and Mullens. 37 professed regeneration and 3 professed sanctification. There were also 135 seekers at the District Camp Meeting. I conducted 5 funerals and married 4 couples. I helped to pitch the district tent at Welch. Rev. J. E. Guill was the evangelist and Rev. L. T. Copley Miss. Anna Sherman and Miss. Irene Tanner, workers. Bro. Guill my assistant, organized a mission of eight members. Rev. Copley was left in charge. Then the tent was placed at Danville with Rev. Cecil Phillips, Rev. Marie Green, Miss. Anna Sherman, and Miss. Irene Tanner as workers. The results of this meeting are not known at this writing.

The reports show that there has been paid for home missions \$595.37, for general budget \$1,957.76, and that the pastors have received for support \$12,114.89. Total finance, not including Sunday schools \$21,591.94.

Our membership has decreased this year. We have taken in the church by profession of faith and by letter only 33 members. We have removed from our records 50 making a loss of 12 members, leaving now on roll 684 including the 8 mission members at Welch. It seems our churches have come to a standstill, and it keeps us busy working over the old material, and losing some of them. I know these are sifting days, and I believe in a clean church. But I hope we can find a way to stop this leakage, and add to the church daily such as will be saved. I feel our hope for enlargement is in home missionary work, getting into new territory and establishing new churches.

I wish to call to the attention of the Ways and Means Committee that there is a budget placed on this district by the general board of the equivalent of \$2.00 per member for foreign missions and \$1.00 per member for general church budget, making a total of \$3.00 per member. Our membership as shown by this year's report is 684 making our missionary budget \$1,368.00. This does not include the district budget. I wish also to call your attention to the fact that the general board has ruled that the foreign missionary budget is to be separated from the general church budget. The general church budget according to our membership now is \$684.00, making a total of \$2,052.00.

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent be requested to give four quarterly meetings and preaching services to each church during the year.

Recommended by committee and adopted.

Resolution No. 10—1935

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent be requested to make out quarterly reports to be sent each church after each quarterly round, showing spiritual, numerical and financial condition of each church.

Recommended by committee and adopted.

Resolution No. 14—1935

BE IT RESOLVED: That a standing Resolution Committee be appointed by the District Superintendent at the closing of each Annual Assembly to serve at the next Assembly. Adopted.

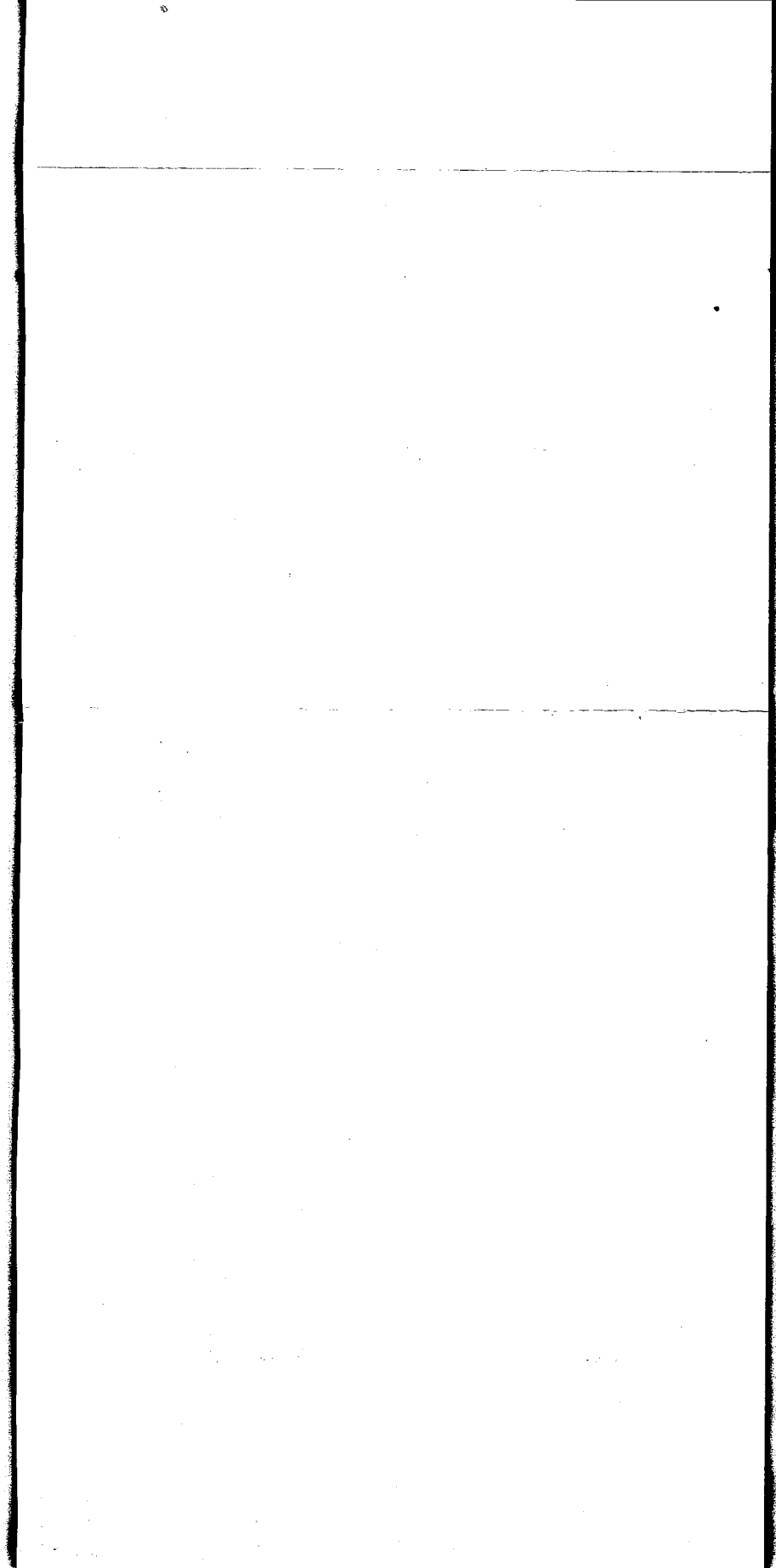
