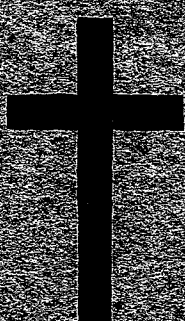

REPORT OF CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE—(accepted).

To the West Virginia District Assembly of the Pilgrim Holiness Church held at Culloden, W. Va., August 25, 1941.

We, your Committee, hereby make the following report: At our District Assembly held at Huntington W. Va., August 26-27, 1940. The Campmeeting Committee appointed by the District Council to formulate plans for a Camp Meeting grounds reported an estimated cost for equipping the ground for this years Camp. (See Dist. Minutes, pages 5 and 6.) The General Superintendent, knowing that estimates on buildings without a thorough investigation of cost are usually about one-third less than the actual cost, instructed the Resolution Committee to bring in a resolution empowering the District Council to have the Camp Meeting grounds and buildings ready for the Camp Meeting of 1941. The following resolution was adopted: "BE IT RESOLVED, that the District Council be empowered to transact all business connected with the purchasing and operation of the Camp Ground, in order to have it in readiness for the Campmeeting next year." (See page 9, of 1940 Dist. Minutes.)

At a meeting of the District Council following the District Assembly the following Committee was appointed with power to act according to the above resolution: Rev. J. F. Woods, Rev. Denver Musser, and Mr. E. W. Miller. At the organization of the Committee, Rev. J. F. Woods was elected as chairman and E. W. Miller as Secretary; they assumed their duties at once by first having the property surveyed and an abstract made of the same. They had a deed made according to the survey and paid cash for 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ acres of ground more or less, and had the deed recorded. We then cleared the ground of under brush, laid off the streets and lots, the location of the buildings and had a blue print made of the same.

We know that it is impossible for you to realize what it has cost us in labor, sacrifice, and loss of sleep in trying to perform the duties involved upon us. We have done our best with very little encouragement or help from over the District although we appealed to the preachers and churches a number of times telling of the distress we were in both for help and finances. We do appreciate the help we received from those who donated their services on two different occasions; we wish to mention here especially Harry Ensley and the men he secured to help us on July 4th, although it rained most of the day they worked in the rain as did also a number of men from the immediate vicinity, also a number from Barboursville.

We were very fortunate in securing the service of Bro. Cottrill to superintend the erection of the buildings, using only laborers to do the work and furnishing most of the tools to work with. He was also made a member of the Committee. Were it not for the untiring zeal of Bro. Musser and Bro. Miller we would not have been able to have had the buildings ready for Campmeeting. While it was the privilege of the writer to be on the job for a number of weeks he was deprived of being much help in the last three months on account of a broken hip. We feel that the only reason we did not have more cooperation from over the District was that they had never caught the vision, it has been very gratifying to us as a committee for the compliments we have received during the campmeeting, also for the little criticism we have heard; we are convinced that from this time forward we will have the cooperation of the entire District.

We now present to this Assembly a Tabernacle 68 x 92 ft. complete with the exception of a top floor on the platform; a dining room 32 x 80 ft. with a dormitory on the second floor; a two story building 24 x 80 for Men's Dormitory; a building 20 x 30 ft. for lunch room, book room, and registration office; a drilled well 125 ft. deep which supplies sufficient good water for the Camp, and two rest rooms 6 x 12 ft. Concrete piers are already in for a two story building 24 x 80 ft. for a women's dormitory. We recommend that provision be made to complete this building before next Campmeeting.

We have a six-room log house built up to the square ready for the roof. (We are indebted to Bro. Lefew for the building of this log house as far as it has gone). Provision has been made for a bath room and pantry. We recommend that this building be finished at

once and that it be used as a District parsonage for the home of the District Superintendent, with the understanding that each year during the campmeeting the three upstairs rooms be used for entertaining the Evangelists and Singer. We also recommend that an electric pump be installed and the parsonage be equipped with running water. We estimate that it will cost \$2,000.00 to complete these buildings, in addition to the present indebtedness which is \$3,281.35 making a total of \$5,281.35 to be provided for by this Assembly. \$2,000.00 must be provided by November 1st., either by raising it or borrowing it, as our word is out to pay for some of the material used. We also recommend that the buildings be insured.

We give you below an itemized statement of the indebtedness and the amount paid by the churches over the District, as follows:

The District Treasurer report will show that \$4,133.06 has been dispersed from the camp fund to July 15th, 1941 of this amount \$94.72 was the expenses of the District Assembly of 1940 leaving a balance of \$4,038.34 that has been used for Camp grounds to 15th of July, 1941. Since July 15th, \$994.67 has been dispersed making a total of \$5,033.01 that has been paid. This leaves the District Treasurer overdrawn on the Camp Fund \$725.24; beside this we owe \$2,456.11 which makes a total cost of the Camp Ground and buildings as they now stand \$7,489.12. Our indebtedness is as follows:

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONARY REPORT

To the District Assembly convening at Culloden, West Virginia:
At the council meeting following our last Assembly plans were discussed for the home missionary work for the coming year. As no provision had been made I offered my services free of charge, with the privilege of raising my own support. We felt definitely led to go to Ravenswood, although we had received word from there that it was no use to come.

So on September 17th, we drove in there and parked our trailer just outside the city limits. We lived in the trailer until October 9, getting acquainted with the people, and attending a little weekly cottage meeting they were holding. Soon we found a home where they would let us have Sunday night services, the interest seemed good and the people had been praying for several years for God to send them a holiness preacher. So we rented a house and moved in using the living room for services, we fitted it with folding chairs, pulpit and piano. We soon had a small Sunday School started and regular services.

The Lord put it on a man's heart to let us have a hall free of charge, we moved the services in there and on January 1, 1941 we started a revival. God gave us 17 seekers, 11 saved and 6 sanctified. There was some good work done and many were helped and deepened in their experience. Our attendance has reached 50 in the hall.

We have just closed a tent meeting, people came from miles around, the tent was well filled. We expect to organize soon with about 15 good, solid members and others looking this way.

We have also been holding meetings weekly in Ripley, the county seat of Jackson County, and are expecting to start a tent meeting there after the assembly. The devil has fought every inch of ground, but we are pressing on.

We have held 128 services in the hall, 35 prayer meetings, 62 cottage prayer meetings, and 61 other services.

Sermons preached 93 and pastoral calls 305. Have held one revival and one tent meeting. Seekers at the altar were 49. Professed regeneration were 31, seekers who professed sanctification were 9. There were 30 prayed with for healing and 2 funerals conducted.

Total cash support was \$437.13; Rent \$100.00. Total amount for the work \$903.17. Total expended was \$870.29 and the balance is \$32.88.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT—(accepted).

TO THE THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL DISTRICT ASSEMBLY OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH, WEST VIRGINIA

GREETINGS:

"Grace be to you and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ who gave Himself for our sins that He might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father: to whom be glory ever and ever, Amen." Gal.1:3-5.

Time has hastened us through another year. Another camp meeting is history and we are in the midst of another District Assembly to take a retrospect of the past year and audit and close our books. This has been the busiest year of my life. I have not had time to take a vacation, still it seems that I have accomplished so little.

I have preached 164 times and had 85 seekers, conducted a week's meeting at Owosso Bible Holiness Seminary, conducted 70 quarterly meetings and a revival at the Three Mile Church. I presented the Camp to the churches 25 times, held 17 annual meetings, 25 board meetings and three funerals. The Mullens Mission was organized into a church with eleven members. The Kenova church was organized with twelve members. I have traveled 13,398 miles. My salary, phone and rent is paid in full.

PROPERTY STATEMENT:

Rev. Niswander and his helpers finished their church this year. They have a nice little cinder-block church worth \$2,500.00. A number of the preachers have painted and re-decorated their church. The valuation of property is \$97,450.00 and the debt is \$3,624.21, the equity is \$93,825.79.

STATISTICAL:

The membership last year was 868. The present membership is 858.

HOME MISSIONS:

Rev. J. S. Hankins reports that he has at least fifteen members that could be organized into a church now. The Zufall family is running a mission at Terra Alta and writes that they want to organize with about 15 members soon. I have set the tent twice this summer, but have not been able to organize. There may be something come out of these meetings later.

FINANCIAL:

We have raised \$1,287.05; General Budget \$686.23; District Budget \$917.05; the Grand Total \$2,890.33. A deficit of \$627.72 for all departments.

I wish to call the attention of the Ways and Means Committee that the deficit, whatever it may be, be raised for the General Assembly Expense.

There should be provisions made to raise the remaining deficit on the overdraft, a part of which Rev. J. F. Woods raised to be paid on October the first, which is approximately \$230.24, yet to be raised.

For six years I have laboured among you as the Superintendent. Duties, Etc.

SHALL PRESIDE over annual church meetings: Resolutions No. 11, 1924:

“WE RECOMMEND: That the District Superintendent on his last quarterly visit to the churches, preside over the annual church meeting.

SHALL PAY EXPENSES OF ASSISTANT DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT—1930 minutes, page 10:

"Moved and carried that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent shall pay his expenses and charge it up to his expense account."

SHALL VISIT ALL CHURCHES QUARTERLY AND HOLD PREACHING SERVICES—Res. No. 8, 1935:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent be requested to make out quarterly reports to be sent to each church after each quarterly round, report to show the Spiritual, Numerical and Financial condition of each church." Adopted.

SHALL BE PERMANENT CHAIRMAN OF THE MINISTERIAL MEETING—Page 8, 1936 Minutes:

"Moved and carried that the District Superintendent be made permanent chairman of the Ministerial Convention."

DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

TIME—To follow Ministerial Convention—RESOLUTION No. 3, 1941. **BE IT RESOLVED:** That the District Assembly convene at 8:30 A. M., August 27, 1942.

FINANCING—Provided for in Resolution No. 2, 1938, as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED: That pledges be taken at the camp each year for the expense of the camp and district assembly for the following year, and that the Ways and Means Committee estimate the approximate cost, add 15 percent thereto and this amount be apportioned to each church and mission according to their financial and numerical strength, each church and mission to get credit with pledges made by individual members of their church while at the camp meeting, and the pastor shall raise the balance of their apportionment (or cause it to be raised) from the members of his or her church and see that it is paid into the local church treasury and then sent by the church treasurer to the district treasurer by the time of the camp meeting. That standing assessment for the assembly expense be rescinded. Adopted.

Considering the importance of a district camp meeting and the need of home talent to work in same,

BE IT RESOLVED: That no preacher in the district shall engage in revivals on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason shall prevent the same or that they have permission to be absent from the district camp from the District Superintendent. (Not recommended by the Committee). Adopted without dissent.

RESOLUTION No. 4 in 1940 minutes reads: WHEREAS: All other campmeeting committees over the country provide free entertainment for all licensed and ordained ministers.

BE IT RESOLVED: That this assembly recommend that the District Council provide such entertainment for all licensed and ordained ministers and their immediate families.

MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

WHEN BEGUN—Resolution No. 3, 1935:

Since the Spirit encourages likemindedness in the Scripture, and since there is diversity of opinions in the ministry,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent appoint a committee of three to draft plans for a MINISTERIAL CONVENTION for the coming year. Adopted.

CHAIRMAN—Page 8, 1936 Minutes:

Moved and carried that the District Superintendent be made permanent chairman of the Ministerial Convention.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR—Resolution No. 4, 1936:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Chairman of the Ministerial Convention appoint three members of the ministerial delegation to serve on the committee with him in preparing for and superintending the Ministerial Convention. Adopted.

EXPENSES OF—

That **ALL PREACHERS AND CHURCHES** over the District bring an offering either in cash or provisions, and that an offering be taken during the Convention to cover any deficit. Ways and Means Resolution No. 13, 1936.

PASTORS AND PREACHERS

RESOLUTION No. 2, 1927:

BE IT RESOLVED: That no pastor shall proceed to build, repair or buy a meeting house or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved without the consent of the District Superintendent. Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 2, 1930—
