#### FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

AUGUST 26, 1946-8:30 A. M.

Opened with song service led by K. G. Lawrence.

Conference greeted by the District Superintendent, Rev. Musser, and called to prayer. Prayer led by Rev. Leonard W. Mann, after which Rev. Musser introduced our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. #### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

Dear Co-Laborers with me in Christ: Greetings:

Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. We give thanks to God always for you all making mention of you in our prayers; remembering without ceasing your work of faith, and labor of love and patience of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, and in the sight of God and our Father.

As we take a retrospect of the past year, we note many things in regard to the work of the district that we will not mention in this report. We feel that we have great occasion to praise God for His faithfulness to us during the year. There have been many new problems and trying problems, but we have found that God has been faithful to us in every circumstance. It has been a pleasure to visit our pastors and churches and view the splendid advances they have made this year. The church at Ravenswood purchased an apartment house on one of the best corners in town and have completely remodeled the building and today they have a nice six-room parsonage with bath, a beautiful church, two Sunday school rooms and rest room; their payments are just the same as when they paid rent. Charleston has had a prosperous year; they purchased a parsonage and painted the church inside and The Williamson church has been raised and a full size basement for Sunday School rooms is being built. Parkersburg, Logan, and Nellis have purchased new heating systems which will be a great asset to the churches. The O'Toole Church has been hindered in the completion of their church basement due to lack of workers, etc., but plans are made to finish the work by cold weather. Huntington has liquidated the entire indebtedness on their parsonage. Bramwell has put a new roof on their church. boursville has painted both the church and parsonage. The Cherokee Church has had a nice lot donated to them and they plan to build a church soon. The Cinco Church is in the midst of a building program now. The Three Mile Church has put on a new roof and concrete steps and sidewalk.

The Statistician's Report will show that we have had a gain of 7 per cent in membership, and a 7 per cent gain in Sunday School attendance; we have added two new young people's societies with a gain of 108 members and despite the coal strike this year, we have had a net gain of \$1,084.35 in finances. Our pastors received \$5,502.81 more than last year; made 2,038 more calls, held five more revivals with 352 more seekers; 239 more professed regeneration and 85 more sanctifications. I thank God for my loyal pastors that have a vision to go forward.

I have visited the churches three times; held annual meetings in each church; one home missionary meeting, dedicated two churches; preached 122 times, dedicated two children. I have traveled 12,391 miles. I have received my salary in full and traveling expenses to date.

#### REPORT OF CAMP MEETING GROUNDS COMMITTEE

TO THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

#### Greetings:

Inasmuch as the Conference of August 27, 1945, left all unfinished business in the hands of your District Council, they met on the following morning at 9:30 A. M. in Huntington and after much discussion relative to the growth of our Camp and the need of another dormitory it was moved and carried that all rules and regulations pertaining to the Camp Grounds and operation be left in the hands of the Camp Ground Committee, therefore we submit the following report:

This spring we contacted several lumber companies relative to building material and they all informed us that they could not promise us anything definite, so we contacted Mr. W. L. Bowman, a member of our Nine Mile Church and he gave us the estimate on a cinder block building, furnishing the blocks and all concrete for foundation and floor with a white coat on the outside for \$1,700.00. We felt that this was a very good offer and we gave him the contract of all the block and concrete work. We secured Mr. J. H. Cotrill as our carpenter foreman and God has helped us to have the building ready for our Camp this year.

We present to this Conference a two-story cinder block dormitory 24 by 80 feet with metal roof at the cost of around \$3,000.00, all finished with the exception of the partitions and white coat on the outside. We have painted all the buildings except the cartaker's cottage and we plan to paint it this Fall. The wife of our careaker, Mrs. J. H. Cottrill, collected money and had a nice concrete walk laid between the tabernacle and dining room which is a great asset to our Camp Ground. The treasurer's report will show an overdraft of \$762.36 in the Camp Found. However, at the present it exceeds that, but we have two christian business men that have promised \$500.00 each, which will cover the overdraft.

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#### RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

(Recommended and Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 2—Whereas there is a great need for prayer on this Camp ground and there is no adequate place, be it therefore resolved that a prayer room be built and equipped before the Camp meeting of 1947.

(Not Recommended; Lost)

RESOLUTION No. 3—Since the responsibility of our District Young People's Executive Secretary has increased with the growth of our District, but it resolved that he be elected by secret ballot at our District Conference.

(This conflicts with the Manual according to page 56, section 82, paragraph 5B.) Ignored.

RESOLUTION No. 4.—Be it resolved that the names of our Camp Meeting Committeemen be placed in our minutes and that the manner of their election or appointment be made clear to this Conference.

(Recommended and Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 5.—Be it resolved that our District Superintendent be required to make quarterly visits to each church.

(Recommended and Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 7.—(Resolution Committee Substitute for No. 6.) Whereas: It would not be best to change district officers in the midst of camp meeting responsibilities, yet seeing the tendency of some of our ministers and delegates to return home before the business of our conference has been completed.

Be It Resolved: That our district conference be held on Monday and Tuesday following our camp meeting, providing we need these two days for our district business, and that the evening sittings be devoted to constructive messages for the ministers and delegates by the Chairman of the conference.

(Adopted.)

RESOLUTION No. 8.—Be It Resolved: That the district superintendent live in the district parsonage, that he may be better able to supervise the building of our camp grounds.

(Not Recommended; Ignored)

RESOLUTION No. 9.—Resolved: That the Young People of the district have three afternoons, or two days for their rally.

Also: That we have a District Evangelist who will give a young people's meeting in each church which has no young people's society in order to dig out a young people's society; and,

TO THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL DISTRICT CONFERENCE:

At the close of this Conference year we take a retrospective view and discover that this has been one of the busiest years of our ministry and due to the fact that our duties as a pastor have demanded almost all of our time, we have certainly not given the young people's work any ways near the interest we think it should have.

It has visited some of our churches in the interest of cur Young People's work and conducted a rally in our Northern zone in the Clarksburg Church which was surely no small event. The interest and shouts of those present, both young and old, are long to be remembered. We predict great things ahead for the young people of our district and we are praying that this coming year the young people's worker will be able to devote more of his time to the great youth department of our district.

Substituted to read: "That we have a young people's service every evening during Camp, from 6:15 to 7:15."

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 10.—Seeing there is a great need of an aggressive Home Missionary program in the district and since the District Council has failed to carry out the desire of this conference to promote Home Missions, Be It Resolved: That we divide West Virginia into three zones as follows: A Southern Zone to be comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west and crossing the state at Mt. Hope, W. Va.; A Central Zone including all territory north of the above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33, (Mt. Hope shall be in the Central Zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

Be It Further Resolved: That this conference elect by secret ballot one Ordained Minister from each of these zones to form a District Home Missionary Board, with the District Superintendent as chairman. shall function separately from the District Council, and shall be authorized to engage a Home Missionary Evangelist, who shall be actively engaged to establish new churches. Said Missionary shall receive \$1,800.00 per annum, to be paid semi-monthly in advance in addition to his house rent and moving expenses; and that all money raised in the Home Missionary Campaign be turned over to the District Treasurer. This Home Missionary Board shall be amenable to the District Council between conferences and shall make a complete report of its activities to the conference. Further, each Board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit. Said offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the District Treasurer and shall be applied solely on District Home Missions. All money received by the District Treasurer for Home Missions shall be at the disposal of the Home Missionary Board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be above the 10 per cent budget.

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 11.—Be It Resolved: That each local church try to conduct at least one Home Missionary meeting this year.

(Recommended and Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 12.—Be It Resolved: That every minister and minister's wife be subject to three (3) calls to help in the kitchen during our camp meetings.

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 13.—Whereas: The date of our camp and conference runs so close to the opening of public schools, and since the weather is so cool at the present date; Be It Resolved: That we change the date of our camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our Fiscal Year from July 15 to July 1, to become effective in 1949.

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 14.—Be It Resolved: That evangelistic offerings taken in our local churches be exempted from the 10 per cent budget.

(Lost)

RESOLUTION No. 15.—Be It Resolved: That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock P. M. during our camp meeting calling the people to prayer, and that everyone kneel and pray.

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 16—Whereas: All ordained and licensed ministers are entertained at camp free.

Be It Resolved: That all local preachers actively engaged in the ministry, or attending Bible school, be entertained free. Substituted to read: That all local preachers pastoring churches in our district be entertained free.

(Substitute Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 17.—Be It Resolved: That our District Council appoint a man to be duly sworn in as a policeman to keep order on our camp ground during our camp meeting.

(Adopted)

RESOLUTION No. 18.—Be It Resolved: That our District Young People's Executive Secretary be under the age of 35.

(Lost)

RESOLUTION No. 19.—Be It Resolved: That all members of the District Council be ordained ministers who are actively engaged in the ministry. (Lost)

RESOLUTION No. 20.—Be It Resolved: That we have one ministerial convention this conference year, and that the time be set by this Conference. Also that invitations be considered at this time.

Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 21.—Be It Resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to our General Superintendent, Rev. L. W. Sturk, for his efficient services in the chair; to Rev. Denver Musser, our District Superintendent, for his splendid services to our district; also to Rev. M. L. Goodman for his spirit filled ministry while with us, and to the cooks and other workers for so graciously carrying out the duties of Camp and Kitchen. Also to our District Treasurer and Secretary.

RESOLUTION No. 22.—Inasmuch as the District Council is cumbered with the administrative duties of the District,

LODGING AND MEALS TO OTHERS: Dormitory rooms per night 50c, entire 10 days \$4.00. Hall beds per night 20c, entire 10 days \$1.50. MEALS:—Breakfast 20c, Dinner 25c, Supper 25c.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE shall follow Camp.

CHURCH REPORTS MUST be sent to the chairman of Statistical Committee IMMEDIATELY after their ANNUAL MEETING.

An All Day Meeting on the Camp Ground to be held July 4th.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT Must be consulted where an expenditure of \$1,000.00 or more is made for repairs; or purchase of church property.

LOCAL PREACHERS shall receive free books from, and answer to the Educational & Examining Board the same as licensed preachers.

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL BANNER to be presented to the Sunday School making the highest percentage of gain in attendance over the previous quarter. Complete tabulated reports to be sent to each pastor.

YOUNG PEOPLES SOCIETY: All churches having no Y. P. Organization shall have a special young peoples revival during the year. The District Superintendent shall see to this.

The District Council shall appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meeting each day during Camp.

MINISTERIAL BENEFIT FEE and Assessment for their pastor must be paid by the church.

CAMP MEETING PARSONAGE (Cottage) Must be built by each church of the district if financially able.

NO SMOKING SIGNS must be placed conspicuously throughout the Camp Grounds.

LUNCH STAND must remain closed for one-half hour after altar call.
