REPORTS SECTION

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT
OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH:

Dear Co-Laborers with me in Christ: Greetings:

Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. Grace and peace be multiplied unto you, according as his devine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him that hath called us to glory and virtue.

As we take a retrospect of the past twelve months, there is several things that stand out in my memory, but most of all is the car accident that we had just at the close of last conference, on August 31. Wife and myself and Miss Erie Wiley was on our way to Ravenswood for a week-end meeting and a Dedictory service, and just west of St. Albans we were struck by a man driving a car under the influence of whiskey, the results was my wife received a broken arm and a very serious blow on the head, Miss Wiley suffered a broken collar bone, and my car was demolished. I want to thank God for His sustaining grace, and the church folk for their prayers and love offering, and also the floral offering sent to the hospital.

This has been a very strenious year, but can we expect it otherwise as we approach the closing out of this Dispensation? We are told in the Holy word that there would be distress of nations, with perplexity, and Men's hearts failing them for fear, and when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption (deliverence) draweth nigh.

We have felt the strain of post-war conditions throughout the district, there has been about three coal strikes which has held our churches back financially, but despite world conditions we feel that God has led us through, and we have some victories to report. The church at Nellis have built a parsonage and it will be ready for the pastor to move in after this conference. The folk at Cinco have been worshiping in their new church for some time, however the interior is not complete, but they do not have any indebtedness. Barboursville has built a nice cinder block garage. Cherokee has received their deed from the Pocahontas Land Corporation, and they plan to start working on their church soon. Brother Baynum felt led to open a new work in West Huntington, and has purchased a very nice lot on Adams Avenue and his plans are to have it ready to worship in soon.

There has also been minor repairs made in a number of our churches. We organized a church at Baileysville and they have been worshiping in the school house, but when I was there for my last quarterly meeting they reported the purchase of a nice lot large enough for a church and parsonage.

CAMP GROUND—There has been considerable improvements made on

the camp ground, we have finished the cinder block dormitory which has forty rooms, the total cost of this building is about \$5,000.00. A concrete floor has been laid in the tabernacle at the cost of \$850.00. The District parsonage (or caretaker's cottage) has been painted, and three new cottages built. Mrs. J. H. Cottrill collected enough money to have a concrete road laid from the camp entrance up to "C" Street. Our good District Secretary, E. W. Miller donated the price of a new stove and silver ware, we also purchased some new cooking utensils

HOME MISSIONS—I am sorry to report we don't have a better report in this needy field. The committee you elected last year has served faithfully, but have been held back because of housing shortage, but to eliminate this condition we are building a portable tabernacle, and it should be ready to put on the field by the first of September, we have also engaged Rev. C. W. Keys as our Home Missionary Evangelist.

PROPERTY STATEMENT—We have a gain in property assets of \$21,321.62 and the total valuation of all district properties is \$205,921.85.

FINANCIAL—Our district set-up of 10 per cent to raise our budget for General and District work has just about paid us up in full. Our Churches and Sunday Schools show a gain over last year. Pastor's salary over last year \$4,838.85.

STATISTICAL—Calls made by pastors 5508. Our pastors made 1770 less than last year. Preached 185 more sermons; 102 less prayer meeting; 4 less revivals; 132 less regenerations and 75 less sanctifications. Our present membership is 1029, a loss of 9. Our Sunday Schools show a gain of 112, and we now have 10 Y. P. Societies.

PERSONAL—I have made quarterly visits; held annual meetings in each church; 1 ministerial meeting; 1 Bible school meeting; 1 Dedicator service; preached 125 times; baptized 19; traveled 17,064 miles. I have received my salary in full, and traveling expenses to date.

BE IT RESOLVED: That we reduce his visits to the churches from quarterly to Bi-annual, except in cases of emergency where he can be of assistance; and that each pastor shall be furnished adequate report blanks immediately after the district conference, to last the entire year, thus saving the time and postage to mail these out quarterly; and that the pastor of each church be required to hold the other quarterly meetings and forward the reports of these meetings promptly to the district superintendent. On motion, this resolution was approved by the Council. Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 2.—Due to the fact that the task of taking care of our annual camp in the way of preparing the grounds, dormitories, etc., before camp, and then cleaning up after the camp, is entirely too much for one man:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Council be empowered to appoint eight men from the pastors and unstationed ministers each year, alternating alphabetically from year to year, as a committee to do this work, four first to go to the camp grounds at least two days before the camp begins and properly prepare everything necessary for the camp, and four to remain after the camp to clean up everything and put things in order, this committee of eight to be under the supervision of the district superintendent. The names of this committee shall be printed in the district minutes. In the event of a member of this committee fails to act, he shall pay into the camp fund at the rate of \$5.00 per day covering the time he fails to perform his duties—This penalty, however, not to exceed \$10.00.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the district superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitory, and a monitor (man) for each of the other dormitories, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he appoint a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp and conference. Upon motion, this resolution was approved by the Council. Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 3.—WHEREAS: Commodities are at their highest peak in prices, thus causing a heavier financial burden on our camp.

BE IT RESOLVED: That we charge 25c for breakfast, 35c for dinner, and 35c for supper.—Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 4.—WHEREAS: Some of the churches are paying their Pastor's Ministerial Benefit,

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's Ministerial Benefit.—Adopted.

Resolution No. 5.—WHEREAS: There is no holiness church close to the camp grounds,

BE IT RESOLVED: That this district provide a place of worship on our camp ground, and that a district preacher be placed on camp ground as caretaker and pastor of the work established. Not recommend by Committee—Rejected.

RESOLUTION No. 6.—RESOLVED: That seats and tables be provided and placed on camp grounds for use by the people between services during Camp and Conference.—Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 7.—RESOLVED: That a prayer room be provided for the benefit of those who desire to be alone in holy meditation and earnest prayer during the camp, where they won't be disturbed.—Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 8.—Deleted (See minutes).

RESOLUTION No. 9.—Relative to helping cooks, was ignored.

RESOLUTION No. 10.—Since Huntington is the largest city in the state, and has only one P. H. Church; and since a lot in a good location has been purchased and a building started thereon, in which a mission is to be conducted until a church can be organized; and since the property is deeded to the district trustees; and since the basement, 36 x 56 ft. can be completed ready for use for around \$2,000.00; and since there is money in the Home Missionary Fund, which has been idle for quite sometime, and more will come in this year;

BE IT RESOLVED: That this conference give \$1,000.00 from this fund toward the completion of this project. Recommended by the Committee, but Rejected by the Conference.

RESOLUTION No. 11.—BE IT RESOLVED: That all the preachers and deaconesses taking the study course meet the Examining Board during the camp, rather than during the conference, so the Examining Board will be able to be present at each session of the conference and have their report ready.—Adopted.

RESOLUTION No. 12.—BE IT RESOLVED: That all the preachers and deaconesses taking the study course be charged 25c per book rental, so the secretary of the Examining Board will have sufficient funds to purchase new books as needed.—Rejected. The Chair urged that everyone who could purchase their own books.

RESOLUTION No.3.—We recommend that the District and General budget be raised in this method, that each church more than two years old shall send to the District Treasurer the first of each month, the amount equal to 12 per cent of the gross income of the Church and Sunday School, except that raised for Building Fund purposes, whether it be local, district or general, or for church or parsonage.

RESOLUTION No. 4.—Inasmuch as the following items are included in our General and District Budget, such as General Home Missions, Foreign Missions and District Home Missions, we recommend that all money raised in these special offerings for the above items, be credited to the budget.

RESOLUTION No. 5.—We recommend that each church treasurer be instructed to send their money to our District Treasurer marked as District Budget or General Budget and the proper distribution be made by the District Treasurer.

RESOLUTION No. 6.—We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$2,200.00 per year and traveling expenses at the rate of five cents per mile. That part of salary not provided for in the budget shall be raised by offerings taken when he visits the churches; the half tithe of all preachers in this district actively engaged, and ten dollars per year from those not actively engaged in the ministry.

RESOLUTION No. 7.—Inasmuch as there is a balance of \$205.13 in the District Superintendent's account, we recommend that we give him \$100.00 as a love offering. (Entire Report Accepted.)
