

Resolution No. 8: Referred back.

Resolution No. 9: Relative to change in serving meals. Lost.

Resolution No. 10: That each one registering be assigned a number, etc. Ruled out of order, after time had been extended until dinner bell.

Reception Committee presented Rev. A. M. Hicks and father. Rev. Hicks was given honorary seat in conference bar.

Dinner bell rang and the sitting was dismissed.

#### SECOND BUSINESS SESSION

AUGUST 23, 1948-1:30 P. M.

Opened with song and prayer.

Minutes of last sitting read and accepted.

Roll call being complete was dispensed with.

EDUCATIONAL & EXAMINING BOARD'S report accepted as a whole.

Reception Committee presented Rev.'s Burge and Davis (L. K.)

Moved and carried Sr. Chas. Weaver be excused for reasons of sickness. Prof. Yoh and wife of Kernersville Bible School presented and given seat in conference bar.

RESOLUTION No. 8, which was previously referred back, was presented and referred back the second time.

Resolution No. 11, providing for quarterly visits instead of twice a year was adopted.

Resolution No. 12, relative to Young People having services at Camp was accepted after deleting the last clause providing for free entertainment.

Resolution No. 13, Relative to Young Peoples Zone meetings died for want of motion.

Reception Committee presented Rev. E. B. Bailey, Rev. Grandstaff and wife and Ruth Kamper.

Rev. F. G. Strickler from S. C. was accepted into our Conference on duly carried motion.

Resolution No. 14: Relative to incorporating in the minutes names of Young Peoples Executive and Zone Leaders. Accepted.

WAYS & MEANS resolutions were accepted, each one separately, which included No.'s 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 (See Reports Sec.)

RESOLUTION No. 8, as amended and completed was adopted.

Moved and seconded we have election of officers immediately. Lost.

Moved and carried election of officers be first order of business at the evening sitting.

Moved and carried we elect the District Trustees by acclamation. Present trustees nominated and elected.

Educational and Examining Board raised from the floor \$50.00 to defray expense of books, etc.

Moved and carried we rescind former motion relative to election of officers and proceed immediatly with the election.

The Chair appointed Abla, Harrison, Cox and Schofield tellers. Ballots spread and tabulated with the following elections:

Moved and carried to adjourn.

#### THIRD BUSINESS SESSION

AUGUST 23, 1948-6:30 P. M.

Opened with song and prayer.

Election continued—Ballot for Treasurer.

The Council had nominated Sr. Mattie Esley and Vard VanBriggle.

Sister Ensley was elected on first ballot.

The Council had also nominated for member of Educational and Examining Board, A. L. Davis and J. C. Brillhart.

Brother Davis was elected on first ballot.

# REPORTS SECTION

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE THIRTY-NINTH DISTRICT CONFERENCE OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF THE STATE OF WEST VIRGINIA: GREETINGS.

"Unto Him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood, and hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father; to Him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen."

We have come to another pause to check on the activities of another year that has passed into history. I have been very busy these past twelve months visiting the churches. Last fall, two of the pastors resigned their churches; namely, Springfork and Fayetteville and we had to find pastors. I have visited the churches two or more times and have preached most every Sunday of the year.

We organized a church at Leon, West Virginia of eleven members with Rev. Killengsworth the pastor.

The Lord gave us a most blessed Ministerial Convention with the presence of the Lord being felt in every service.

We visited the young people's rally in each zone.

#### PROPERTY STATEMENT

Springfork has purchased a nice parsonage which they needed very much. Rev. Brillhart has remodeled the Huntington Church increasing the valuation of the property \$8,000.00. Williamson has finished their basement which is an asset to their church. Under the leadership of the Prater Brothers, Baileysville has built their church and are worshiping in it; they called Rev. John Horn. Jr., as their pastor. O'Toole is finishing their basement under the leadership of Rev. Killen. Fayetteville, under the leadership of Rev. Saunders as pastor, are remodeling their church making six Sunday School rooms which they will be using in three weeks and at a cost of \$5,000. With Rev. Rossow as pastor, Nine Mile is building a new cinder block church and will dedicate it Thanksgiving Day. The Second Church of Huntington will have the basement finished and ready for services by September 15. Rev. A. L. Davis has painted their church building. Rev. Hensley has installed a new furnace and put a new roof on the parsonage. Rev. Van Briggle has enlarged their basement and now has five rooms for Sunday School. Rev. Abla has finished the parsonage, drilled a well, and has installed a water system in the parsonage. Rev. Cox, at Mount Hope, has built four basement rooms for Sunday School. Rev. Brown has painted their parsonage.

#### HOME MISSIONS

The Home Missionary Board employed a missionary last fall, believing that he was coming in a couple weeks, but he was unable to come because of sickness and other hinderances. Rev. Hughes went to Welch and stayed a month, but was uable to secure a place to live and had to

give the work up. By the help of the Lord, we were able to get the tabernacle up and it is ready for services and Rev. Walters has been conducting services for a month. Rev. Cox is booked for a meeting there in September. The report has been very favorable with the interest increasing in their services.

#### STATISTICAL

There has only been an increase in membership of eleven over last year's report. It seems that the only way to get an increase in membership will have to be through the new churches. There was a loss of 40 in Sunday School attendance.

#### FINANCIAL

We have gone over the top in our church property with an increase of \$17,087.02. There is an increase of all money of \$4,310.06 this year. I have traveled 17,520 miles. My expense and phone are paid in full and my salary up to August 1

#### RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 1.—Whereas the finances of our Camp has been a continual problem to the district and whereas this plan has been proven as successful in other districts:

BE IT RESOLVED: That a registration fee of \$1.00 be charged to all registering above the age of six years. (Covered by Res. No. 8.)

Resolution No. 2.—Inasmuch as living costs have gradually and greatly increased, and Whereas our Superintendent has done his best to get the pastor's salaries raised throughout the District:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the District Superintendent's salary be raised from \$2200 to \$2600. The traveling expense to be the same. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3.—Inasmuch as the present budget assessment of twelve per cent is an unfair and unjust burden for some of our churches, and Whereas, several of our churches is pressed beyond reason to pay this assessment:

BE IT RESOLVED: That our budget be set up by a finance committee according to the local church income, responsibility and ability to pay. Lost.

Resolution No. 4.—RESOLVED: That the District Sunday School Banner be awarded to the Sunday School having the largest gain over the previous quarter, and not percentage of gain. Adopted.

Resolution No. 5.—Resolved: That all local preacher's names be inserted in the District Minutes. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6.—RESOLVED: That the District Council appoint someone to visit every church in the district in the interest of Sunday Schools this coming year. Died for lack of motion.

Resolution No. 7.—RESOLVED: That the Young People's Executive Secretary visit each church in the district annually. Died for lack of motion.

Resolution No. 8.—BE IT RESOLVED: That Res. No. 16 of the 1946 minutes, and Res. No. 3 of the 1947 minutes be rescinded, and that our Camp charge a \$1.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 10 years, and that each person registering be given a registration card which they shall show upon entering the dining room and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals. Adopted.

Resolution No. 9—RESOLVED: That this camp eliminate the standing line for meals, by seating persons around the tables and have table waiters to keep dishes refilled with foods. Lost.

Resolution No. 10.—RESOLVED: That as each one registers be issued a number, and as the head cook needs kitchen help he shall call on numbers in rotation as often as he is needed, also that there be no more drafting kitchen help. Chair ruled out of order.

Resolution No. 11—Inasmuch as this Conference has ruled that the District Superintendent make two calls to the churches:

BE IT RESOLVED: That this be rescinded and that either the District Superintendent or his Assistant visit the churches each quarter. Adopted.

BE IT RESOLVED: that we give the young people the first Thursday night and all day Friday and Friday night for a District Young People's Convention, using the regular camp meeting evangelists as workers and asking them to direct their messages especially to young people. Adopted.

Resolution No. 13—Since there is a need for a greater young People's organization in our district:

BE IT RESOLVED that this conference go on record as favoring at least four or more zone meetings this year for our young people.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a Ministerial Zone chairman be elected in each zone under the direction of the District council, and that the ministers of each zone have meetings in co-operation and in connection with the young people's zone meetings, the details of these meetings to be worked out by the Young People's and Ministerial zone chairman. Died for lack of motion.

Shall see that annual reports are sent promptly to Dist. Statistician—Res. 8, 1936.

Shall see that "No Smoking" signs are placed conspicuously throughout camp grounds—Res. 3, 1944.

Shall see that Lunch Stand remain closed one-half hour after altar call—Res. 3, 1944.

Shall see that adequate report blanks are mailed to each pastor—Res. 1. 1947.
