# GENERAL PROCEEDINGS FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

August 17, 1953, 8 A. M.

Opened with devotional.

The district superintendent, Rev. J. C. Baynum, introduced General Superintendent Rev. L. W. Sturk, who presided over the Conference. He brought a very timely message, using as his subject "Our Church." The main thought was that the Pilgrim Holiness Church came into existence over the issue of Scriptural Holiness and that this should still be the issue. It was emphasized that there is no substitute for the presence and power of God in our midst. A note of warning was sounded that our church is not to follow the present popular trend of evangelism, but to follow the scriptural methods used by our founders.

The Conference sang "Rock of Ages," after which they entered into the Communion service.

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### GREETINGS TO THE FORTY-FOURTH DISTRICT CONFERENCE OF THE PILGRIM HOLINESS CHURCH OF THE WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT.

#### Personal:

I have been very busy this year, traveling 10,221 miles, visited all the churches at least four times and some more than that. Also preached 180 sermons, conducted one revival outside of the District with seekers.

I have enjoyed working with the pastors and laity and have had very fine cooperation.

The Lord has blessed me with good health for which I praise Him. I am more determined to hold the old lines and keep the fire of God than ever before!

We are living in dangerous days—Laodicean days—the days when we may lose a lot of necessary things, and substitute a lot of things not so important. First lose the knowledge of real values—they know not they were poor. Second, lose our ferverancy—Lukewarm—loss of fervent spirit in prayer and love. Third, lose the true riches—gold of purity, tried faith. Fourth, lose our spiritual clothes of righteousness. Fifth, lose our vision they were blind, blind and cannot see afar off, cannot see the needs of others, cannot see our own dangers, and cannot see the near coming of the Lord. We need to put in a large order for eye salve, may we have a new vision and see things as they really are.

### Church Repairs:

Bro. Surrett has re-decorated his church and parsonage inside and out. The Huntington church has done quite a lot of repair work. Mason City is making a basement for Sunday School rooms. Terra Alta is about to close a deal for a parsonage at a very reasonable price. They have also done some remodeling and excavating, making a parking lot which was much needed. Nine Mile has done a lot of remodeling of the church and parsonage, also put a basement under parsonage and are getting ready to put in running water and bath. Other churches have also done repairs, etc.

#### Parsonages:

The Parkersburg Broad Street Church has a nice new eight-room parsonage, soon to be completed, which will be valued at \$15,000. This work has been under the direction of the pastor, Rev. L. K. Davis.

The Vienna Church has bought a nice lot in a good location for a parsonage at the cost of \$2,000.00. Rev. Rossow and his folk got this on foot.

#### Young People:

The Young People by the leadership of Rev. Peck and zone chairmen have been quite active this year. At the close of the District gathering at the camp grounds were found seventeen young people at the altar and the most of them received help.

#### Camp Meeting and Camp Grounds:

For lack of funds, we have been unable to do much toward the goal we had hoped to accomplish. Painting and sanitary conveniences have not been accomplished, however some painting has been done and a new well has been drilled which has supplied us with plenty of water during this camp. Drinking fountains have not had to be shut off because of lack of water, thanks to the Lord.

#### Home Missions:

We, by the help of the Lord and our good preachers, have been able to organize four churches and one mission this year. Lensecreek, which Rev. Weaver is the pastor, has purchased a quonset hut and are now worshiping in it. Coal Branch Heights, with Rev. Nona Tenney, who pastored a mission at this place, was then later organized into a church. They now have 19 members. Rev. Tenney and her people purchased a dwelling house and have taken out the partitions and are now holding services there. They also have two Sunday School rooms. Grantsville: Rev. Rossow, the zone secretary, is starter of this work. Their membership is now ten. They are starting to build a church and the last report was that the walls were up to the windows. Blue Jav—Rev. Midkiff started this work and their membership is now 24. Thev have built a nice church and I was privileged to preach the first sermon on July 28th with the church well filled with 108 in Sunday School. This building is to be sealed overhead as yet. The total membership of these four new churches is now 63.

The mission is at Morgantown, a new field. I organized this mission just a short time ago with five members. They have deeded the church building to the Pilgrims in which we hope to organize a church in the near future. At a very conservative estimation, all this property just as it stands is worth \$9,000.00, and has only cost the District \$1,010.00. For the investment of the above amount we have \$9,000.00 worth of property all deeded to the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

In the past six years by the Lord's help we have gained 12 churches, averaging two churches a year. We now have 38 churches, a twenty-one and two-thirds per cent gain. Besides this we were able to amalgamate another work with the Baileysville Church, doubling the membership. They were scarcely able to pay a pastor before this, but we are now able to pay forty dollars a week plus house and utilities.

We were much elated when we read Rev. Sturk's report to the General Board at their last session, that we were one of the two districts that has reached the goal set by the General Conference three years ago. Counting four years we were to have 8 churches, we have ten to report and also have a lot deeded to the Pilgrim Holiness Chlurch at Grafton. Rev. Greenley purchased this lot for us and we hope to get a church in this nice city.

### RESOLUTIONS BY COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS (Following Adopted)

No. 5—Be it resolved that the date of our annual youth convention be changed to the first Thursday, Friday and Saturday of our camp meeting. Be it further resolved that the camp meeting workers be used for the convention with the youth executive and the district superintendent in charge.

No. 8—Whereas the sanitation of the camp ground is not what the district would like for it to be, therefore be it resolved that the \$500.00 appropriated for this purpose be used in the coming year for construction of necessary equipment.

No. 13—Be it resolved that each organized church send in \$1.00 to the examining board to buy study course books.

#### MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

No. 3—Be it resolved that the church members who habitually absent themselves from the church for a period of 90 days and violate the church manual and are out of victory shall not be allowed to cast a vote in any church election.

No. 4—Be it resolved that a committee from the General Board meet with the manager of the publishing house and remove any program material that conflicts with the manual.

No. 5—Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America, Be it resolved that we as a District by a majority vote of this Conference go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television by our people and urge by resolution to the next general conference that it be incorporated in the church covenant.

No. 6—Be it resolved that when our churches use signs or printed matter in which the name of our church appears, that it always be The Pilgrim Holiness Church and not The Pilgrim Church.

#### REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1—We recommend that the general budget be placed at 6,644.00, which is based on 5.50 per member.

No. 2-We recommend that the district minutes be sold at cost of printing.

No. 3—We recommend that each church upon the visit of the District Superintendent try to raise a minimum of \$5.00 to help defray his traveling expenses.

No. 4—We recommend that the district budget be placed at \$2,616.40 and that it be as follows:

No. 5—We recommend that the district and the general budget be raised in the following manner: Each church more than 4 years old shall send to the district treasurer the first of each month 12% of the gross income to the church and Sunday School except that raised for the building fund account, whether it be local, district or general.

No. 6—We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$3,260.00 per year and traveling at the rate of 5c per mile and that it be raised in the following manner, exclusive of the \$1,260.00 provided for, by offerings taken when he visits the churches: the half tithe of all district ministers and evangelists actively engaged in the work; \$10.00 per year of all district preachers not actively engaged in the ministry.

We recommend that this Conference adopt the following plan, known as the "Call System," as a means of helping finance the Home Missionary work of the district:

1. That a form card be printed to use in securing pledges for home missionary work.

2. That the Home Missionary Chairman visit each church in his zone as soon as he can conveniently arrange to do so after the Conference, and that he secure pledges for the home missionary work.

3. That not more than two calls be sent out during one Conference year.

4. When calls are made the pastors shall assist by urging their people to remit immediately.

No. 7—Be it resolved that each pastor urge each local and unstationed minister of their church to give to their church treasurer their budgeted amount of \$10.00 per year and the church treasurer forward same to the District Treasurer.

No. 8—Whereas the tabernacle is in need of painting and roof repairs, therefore, be it resolved that before another camp meeting that necessary painting and repairs be done and payment for same be made from the district camp and conference fund.

#### DISTRICT LEGISLATION

- 1920-Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treasurer monthly. Adopted
- 1927—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Superintendent. Adopted.

- 1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That pastor's salary be paid while he attends the district assembly. Adopted.
- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1934—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That all our churches set aside one Sunday service in each month for missions, at which time an offering be taken for same. Adopted.
- 1936—Res. RESOLVED, That local preachers shall receive free books from, and answer to, the Educational and Examining Board, the same as licensed preachers, and the District supply the books. Adopted.
- 1936—Res. 8. RESOLVED, That each church pastor send one copy of all church reports to the District Statistician IMMEDIATELY after the close of our church (fiscal) year. Adopted. "Be not slothful in business," Rom. 12:11.
- 1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

- 1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1942—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That henceforth we open our conference by observing the Lord's Supper. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amenable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

- 1946—Res. 17. RESOLVED, That our District Council appoint a man to be duly sworn in as a policeman to keep order on our camp grounds during our camp meetings. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947-Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Shperintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 11. RESOLVED, That all the preaches and deaconesses taking the study course meet the Educational and Examining Board during the camp, in order that their report may be ready for conference at the first sitting. Adopted.
- 1948—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district Sunday school banner be awarded to the Sunday school having the largest gain over the previous quarter, and not percentage of gain. Adopted.

- 1948—Res. 11. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent or his assistant, visit the churches each quarter and that all former legislation relative to this be rescinded. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all campers having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1949-Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room Provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.
- 1949-Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.

Said recommendation certifying to his or her holy character and conversation, as well as spiritual gifts and calling, and recommended to the Annual Conference by the District Council through the Educational and Examining Board and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is and shall be made mandatroy that our District Superintendent see that this ruling is carried out from year to year by each church of the District.
- 1950-Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

#### 1951 - -

No. 1—Whereas: many people are now attending our camp meetings and many urgent calls are coming in and going out, and whereas: it may mean the difference between life and death in securing undelayed medical attention, Be it resolved, that a telephone be installed on the District Camp grounds. The place of installation to be decided by the District Council.

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 7—Whereas: a new church is overburdened financially, because of small membership and with building program and pastor's support and whereas it would be an encouragement to District preachers to organize new churches, be it resolved that all churches under four (4) years old be exempt from budget assessments.

No. 8—We recommend that all former legislation pertaining to the registration of people attending our camp be rescinded, and the following be adopted:

1st. That we charge \$2.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 2 years except Ordained or Licensed ministers from other Districts.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas, the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preference being given to a family with children.

No. 5—Whereas: Our District has grown to the extent that we have competent men available to fill office, Be it resolved that no person be placed in more than one office with the exception of District Superintendent.

No. 8—Whereas the sanitation of the camp ground is not what the district would like for it to be, therefore be it resolved that the \$500.00 appropriated for this purpose be used in the coming year for construction of necessary equipment.

No. 12—Whereas, such an urgent need exists for more direct supervision on our camp ground, therefore be it resolved that this conference appoint or elect a camp meeting committee, and that this committee be empowered to draw up and have printed a set of rules conspicuously displayed over our grounds, and furthermore that all young people attending and registering for the youth convention and camp meeting be required to carry a card with their name and address, countersigned by his or her pastor.
