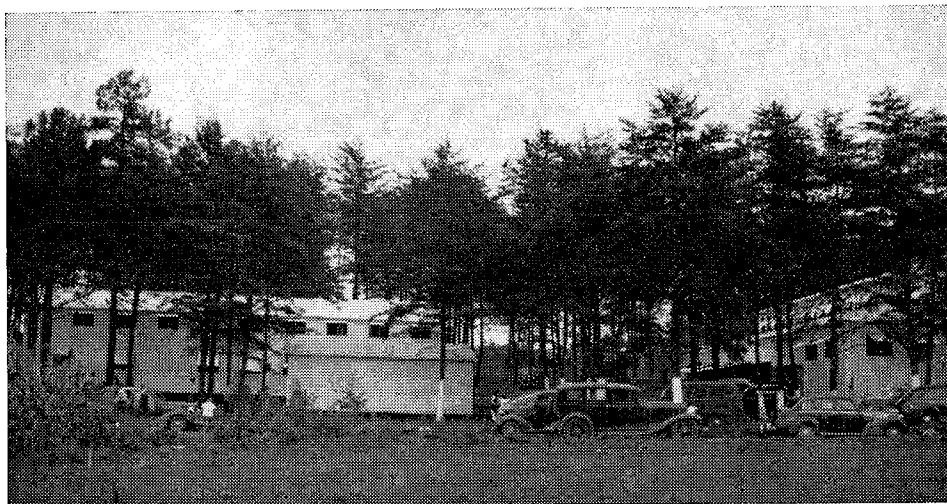

REPORTS SECTION

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 45th District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, West Virginia District

Greetings:

This is our sapphire anniversary. The sapphire is a brilliant blue stone. This stone was the second stone in the second row of the breast plate of the high priest. It was also the second foundation stone in the wall of the Holy City. It is a heavenly color and should remind us of the manifold goodness of our Heavenly Father through the past forty-five years. The success of the church has not been phenomenal. By this time we should have a hundred churches in this district instead of thirty-nine. This slowness cannot be laid at the door of any one person. It takes the hard work of all pastors and laity to make a district grow. We should not grieve over the slowness of the past but it should serve as an incentive to spur us on to a swifter pace.

Home Missions: This reminds us that there should be something done for Home Missions. We have been able to organize only one new church this year. Rev. Paul Sebree came to Cuzzart and had a good revival meeting and as a result we were able to organize a church with 21 members. A nice new church at this location will soon be under roof. The Conklin estate has been settled and Rev. Arnold Peck wants to liquidate this property as soon as possible without too much sacrifice in price. We hope to erect at least two churches in her memory to be known as the Conklin Memorial Churches. The present program to raise Home Missionary funds in this District does not seem to function to well, and I recommend that the Ways and Means Committee study this problem well and bring to our Conference a more efficient way to raise Home Missionary money for our District.

Church and Parsonage Improvements: The Barboursville Church with Rev. Surret as pastor has redecorated the parsonage inside and out and has also put Celatex on the inside of the church. Rev. Cox and his folks at Bramwell have raised the church and have five Sunday School rooms at the cost of approximately \$7,000.00. The Charleston Church with Rev. Fuller as pastor was compelled to move to another location due to the City building a new street. They have purchased another church building and are redecorating it on the inside. The old frame church at Cinco has been replaced with a cinder block building under the leadership of Rev. Van Bibber. Huntington First with Bro. Harrison has put on a new roof on the church at the cost of \$3,000.00. They have also painted the trim on the outside of the church. Rev. Wooten at Logan has redecorated the church and Sunday School rooms and also refinished the inside of the parsonage. Mason City has put a half basement under the church, making two nice Sunday School rooms. The Nellis Church with Bro. L. K. Davis has made nice Sunday School rooms after having drained the basement, put in new wall board on ceiling and walls, refinished the floor and painted. The parsonage has also undergone some repairs.

Princeton with Rev. Ours is going ahead on their new basement church.

Summerlee with Rev. Paxton has remodeled their church, putting a belfry on front and enlarging the auditorium and ceiling it. This has really changed the appearance of the Church. Terra Alta with Rev. Zufall has excavated a parking lot in front of their church. Also lifting floor of church. Nine Mile has done quite a lot of work on parsonage by drilling a well, putting in a bathroom and painting. Vienna with Rev. Hankins has built a fine parsonage, the finest in the District. Wayne with Rev. Blankenship has done a lot of work of church and parsonage. Nitro with Rev. Mrs. Nona Teeney have a church lot paid for and are now planning to build on it. St. Marys has bought a nice church building for \$2,000.00 and Rev. Lyons is getting along fine. Lens Creek with Rev. Weaver has bought a lot and plan a new church this year.

There has been the largest attendance at our night services we have ever had. There was an increase of 612 in people fed in the dining room. Counting them as they came there were around 150 seekers at altar, which inspired our whole district to give approximately \$3,000.00 in view of building more rooms to accommodate the increasing crowds. More than sixty people are crying for rooms.

Membership: There seems to be an error somewhere as to the membership of the District. The best we can ascertain, there has been a slight gain this year of about 29. Comparing the year '53 with '54, there has been a gain in finance of \$4,677.81. The increase in attendance in Sunday School over last year was 233.

This has been a very busy year. I have traveled approximately 16,000 miles and visited all the churches at least three times and some more than that. Fed 1,805 more meals, increase of 25%.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Forty-fifth Annual District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District

Christian greetings in the name of our Lord, who freely gave His life on the Cross to save a lost world. To Him be praise, glory and honor, everlastingly.

The Conference year of nineteen fifty-three and fifty-four is now history, which brings us nearer to the return of Jesus, to lift out His people, and to my thinking this is the next great event to take place, and I feel sure that every Christian is looking forward to this time with great anticipation, and I believe the local church at Nine Mile has made some progress; we have taken in some new members, and the Sunday School has made a very good gain over the previous year. The church has purchased another Sunday School bus, which I think is a forward step, and is bringing very good results. We have blocks purchased and paid for to put in a bathroom. For all the accomplishments we give Him praise. I have conducted two revivals—one at Mt. Hope and one at Portsmouth, Ohio.

As to the work of the District, we are happy to say that our District Superintendent has been able to preside at all the quarterly meetings with the exception of three, and because of other interest of the District, which claimed his time, he called on me to visit Baileysville, Anawalt, and Cherokee. We enjoyed the visits to these churches very much.

And now that we are entering into a new Conference year, and since we believe that the coming of the Lord is so near that He may come before another year, may we as a church do our best to rescue as many souls as we possibly can for Him.

Following Adopted

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

No. 5—Whereas the manual provides for both an Examining and Educational Board, therefore be it resolved that this Conference elect both an Examining and Educational Board.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1—We recommend that the general budget be placed at \$7,020.00, which is based on \$6.00 per member, 1170 members.

No. 2—We recommend that the district minutes be furnished free.

No. 3—We recommend that each church upon the visit of the District Superintendent try to raise a minimum of \$5.00 to help defray his traveling expenses.

No. 4—We recommend that the District budget be placed at \$2,606.40 and that it be as follows:

No. 5—We recommend that the District and the general budget be raised in the following manner: Each church more than four years old shall send to the District Treasurer the first of each month 10% of the gross income to the church and Sunday School except that raised for the building fund account, whether it be local, District or general.

No. 6—We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$3,380.00 per year and traveling at the rate of five cents per mile and that it be raised in the following manner: Exclusive of the \$1,000.00 provided for, by offerings taken when he visits the churches; the half tithe of all district ministers and evangelists actively engaged in the work; \$1.00 per month, paid monthly, of all district preachers not actively engaged in the ministry.

No. 7—Be it resolved that each pastor urge each unstationed minister of their church to give to their church treasurer their budgeted amount of \$1.00 per month and the church treasurer forward same to the District Treasurer.

1927—Res. 3. BE IT RESOLVED, That Res. 2, page 21, and Res. No. 11, page 22, of the minutes of the district assembly of the year 1924, also all other resolutions that have been or shall be passed by the

- District Assembly of W. Va., shall remain valid until such time as they may be revoked by the District Assembly. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That pastor's salary be paid while he attends the district assembly. Adopted.
- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1934—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That all our churches set aside one Sunday service in each month for missions, at which time an offering be taken for same. Adopted.

- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.

- 1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this conference elect by secret ballot one ordained pastor who is not a member of the District Council, from each of these zones to form a District Home Missionary Board, with the District Superintendent as chairman.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amenable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 12% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1948—Res. 11. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent or his assistant, visit the churches each quarter and that all former legislation relative to this be rescinded. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all employes having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.
- 1950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.
- 1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of hold two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.
- 1950—Res. 5. RESOLVED, Whereas there has been a laxness in the past relative to the licensing and renewal of license of local preachers, and WHEREAS, this same condition exists in the licensing and renewal of license of our regular ministers from year to year, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, That henceforth this District adhere strictly to the rules and regulations set forth in our Church Manual, according to Sec. 95, P6, 102, P2&3; 104, P2; 144, P1; 148, P1, and 158, P2; which specifically requires said applicant to conform with certain requirements, as well as to have a recommendation from his or her local church board, endorsed by the District Superintendent. Said recommendation certifying to his or her holy character and conversation, as well as spiritual gifts and calling, and recommended to the Annual Conference by the District Council through the Educational and Examining Board

and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is and shall be made mandatory that our District Superintendent see that this ruling is carried out from year to year by each church of the District.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.
