REPORTS SECTION

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the 46th District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District

Greetings:

This has been a very laborious year, especially manual labor. Wife and I worked hard to get the new dorm, reservoir, and rest rooms finished for this camp. This has approximately covered five months of work. I would net want to forget to thank every one who helped make this possible. There were a few who put almost as many hours in work as my wife and I, but we are not sorry for all the labor that we have spent, but glad that we have these fine buildings to enlarge our growing camp. With the completion of 48 new rooms, we were more crowded than last year. We fed nearly a thousand meals more than last year. There was an increase of 160 in the total registration, which was 612. In pledges and cash for camp, the Sunday morning offering amounted to \$4,566.45. There was also \$1,878.87 in cash and pledges for Foreign Missions, but greatest of all there were nearly two hundred souls knelt at the altar and there were many shouts of victory. Our camp is growing amazingly. Thanks to the Lord.

Budgets:

There was a decrease in budget this year. There were 18 churches who failed to pay any budget this year. This is a reflection on church and pastor. I realize that the mines were stopped and the extra money raised for new buildings may have had something to do with this. In all, we raised as much for budget as our quota. Only this money was not equally distributed. The general budget is also behind.

In Sunday School there was a gain of 33 this year. The largest gain in Sunday School was 22 and the district banner goes to the Mason Church, whose pastor is Ervin Patrick. Nine Mile Church had a gain of 20, Terra Alta 16, Three Mile 15, and Mullens 14. There has only been a gain of 7 in membership. Improvements on our churches and parsonages over the district amounted to \$8,848.79. Indebtedness paid on churches \$33,768.74, and on the parsonages \$12,008.32. The total came to \$52,890.97. The value of church property is \$277,750.00. The parsonage value is \$128,800.00. Pastor's support amounted to \$53,356.15.

Home Missions:

There were no churches organized this year, but we have a considerable sum of money available for Home Missions this year. We should go forward. Thanking you for your good cooperation this past year, I remain

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1—We recommend that the general budget be placed at \$6,390.00, which is based on \$6.00 per member—1,065 members.

No. 2-We recommend that the district minutes be furnished free.

No. 3--We recommend that each church upon the visit of the District Superintendent try to raise a minimum of \$5.00 to help defray his traveling expenses.

No. 4—We recommend that the District budget be placed at \$3,138.90 and that it be as follows:

No. 5—We recommend that the District and the general budget be raised in the following manner: Each church more than four years old shall send to the District Treasurer the first of each month 10% of the gross income to the church and Sunday School except that raised for the building fund account, whether it be local, District or general.

No. 6—We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$3,380.00 per year and traveling at the rate of five cents per mile and that it be raised in the following manner: Exclusive of the \$1,000.00 provided for, by offerings taken when he visits the churches; the half tithe of all district ministers and evangelists actively engaged in the work; \$1.00 per month, paid monthly, of all district preachers not actively engaged in the ministry.

2—We recommend that the District and the general budgets be raised in the following manner: Each church more than four years old shall send to the District Treasurer the first of each month 10% of the gross income of the church and Sunday School, except that part of the building fund used to pay regular monthly obligations of church indebtedness. 3—We recommend that report No. 7, page 16, be deleted and the following resolution substituted: Be it resolved that the District Superintendent on his rounds, meet with each pastor and church board to ascertain whether unstationed ministers have paid their budgeted amount of \$1.00 per month and whether the church has paid its budget. Be it further resolved that the District Treasurer send a list of those ministers who have not paid their budget to the Examining Board and ordained referred to the Council.

4-We recommend that resolution No. 6, page 21, be made to correspond with worker's salaries listed on page 13.

5—Inasmuch as the manual states on page 81, Sec. 149, p. 3, that a local church can not specify an offering until the budget is paid, and inasmuch as some churches specify an offering for foreign missions and assume that this amount is being applied to the budget: Be it resolved that the district financial report blanks for the local church be changed to separately designate monies sent for foreign missions and district budget.

6—Be it resolved that each local church treasurer send a copy of the local church financial report, each quarter, to the District Treasurer.

7—Be it resolved that the open dormitory over the old dining hall be made into large rooms and rented on a nightly basis, 25c a night per person

8—Be it resolved that the old dormitory on the hill southeast of the tabernacle be divided into rooms and rented at the rate of 25c per person each night.

9—Be it resolved that support for Owosso Bible College be included in our budget the amount of \$.50 (fifty cents) per member.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

- 1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treasurer monthly. Adopted.
- 1927—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Superintendent. Adopted.
- 1927-Res. 3. BE IT RESOLVED, That Res. 2, page 21, and Res. No. 11, page 22, of the mintues of the district assembly of the year 1924, also other resolutions that have been or shall be passed by the District Assembly of W. Va., shall remain valid until such time as they may be revoked by the District Assembly. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That pastor's salary be paid while he attends the district assembly. Adopted.

- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1934—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That all our churches set aside one Sunday service in each month for missions, at which time an offering be taken for same. Adopted.
- 1936—Res. RESOLVED, That local preachers shall receive free books from, and answer to, the Educational and Examining Board, the same as licensed preachers, and the District supply the books. Adopted.
- 1936—Res. 8. RESOLVED, That each church pastor send one copy of all church reports to the District Statistician IMMEDIATELY after the close of our church (fiscal) year. Adopted. "Be not slothful in business," Rom. 12:11.
- 1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

- 1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1942—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That henceforth we open our conference by observing the Lord's Supper. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.
- 1944-Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the Lunch Stand remain closed for onehalf hour after the altar call. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.

- 1946—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That our district conference of held on Monday until finished following our camp meeting. (Res. 1 of 1943 minutes provides for this also.)
- 1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this conference elect by secret ballot one ordained pastor who is not a member of the District Council, from each of these zones to form a District Home Missionary Board, with the District Superintendent as chairman.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amenable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 12% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1946—Res. 12. RESOLVED, That every minister and minister's wife be subject to 3 calls to help in the kitchen during camp meeting. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone anywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 17. RESOLVED, That our District Council appoint a man to be duly sworn in as a policeman to keep order on our camp grounds during our camp meetings. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.

- 1947—Res. 11. RESOLVED, That all the preachers and deaconesses taking the study course meet the Educational and Examining Board during the camp, in order that their report may be ready for conference at the first sitting. Adopted.
- 1948—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district Sunday school banner be awarded to the Sunday school having the largest gain over the previous quarter, and not percentage of gain. Adopted.
- 1948-Res. 5. RESOLVED, That all local preachers' names be inserted in the district mintues. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all employes having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.
- 1950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.
- 1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.
- 1950-Res. 5. RESOLVED, Whereas there has been a laxness in the past relative to the licensing and renewal of license of local preachers, and WHEREAS, this same condition exists in the licensing and renewal of license of our regular ministers from year to year, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, That henceforth this District adhere strictly to the rules and regulations set forth in our Church Manual, according to Sec. 95, P6, 102, P2&3; 104, P2; 144, P1; 148, P1, and 158, P2; which specifically requires said applicant to conform with certain requirements, as well as to have a recommendation from his or her local church board, endorsed by the District Superintendent. Said recommendation certifying to his or her holy character and conversation, as well as spiritual gifts and calling, and recommended to the Annual Conference by the District Council through the Educational and Examining Board and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is and shall be made mandatory that our District Superintendent see that this ruling is carried out from year to year by each church of the District.

1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951 -

No. 1—Whereas: many people are now attending our camp meetings and many urgent calls are coming in and going out, and whereas: it may mean the difference between life and death in securing undelayed medical attention, Be it resolved, that a telephone be installed on the District Camp grounds. The place of installation to be decided by the District Council.

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 7—Whereas: a new church is overburdened financially, because of small membership and with building program and pastor's support and whereas it would be an encouragement to District preachers to organized new churches, be it resolved that all churches under four (4) years old be exempt from budget assessments.

No. 8—We recommend that all former legislation pertaining to the registration of people attending our camp be rescinded, and the following be adopted:

1st. That we charge \$2.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 2 years except Ordained or Licensed ministers from other Districts.

2nd. That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

3rd. That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

1952 -

No. 2-Where: The Pilgrim Pension Plan has been operating successfully for a number of years, and

Whereas: The church should make provision for the aged ministers, Therefore, be it resolved that each church pastor and actively engaged minister and Christian worker of the West Virginia District participate in the Pilgrim Pension Plan. Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.

No. 5—Whereas: Our District has grown to the extent that we have competent men available to fill office, Be it resolved that no person be placed in more than one office with the exception of District Superintendent.

No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 4% into the pension fund.

No. 8—Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America, Be it resolved that we as a District by a majority vote of this Conference go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television by our people and urge by resolution to the next general conference that it be incorporated in the church covenant. The same to be printed in the minutes.

1953 -

No. 5—Be it resolved that the date of our annual youth convention be changed to the first Thursday, Friday and Saturday of our camp meeting. Be it further resolved that the camp meeting workers be used for the convention with the youth executive and the district superintendent in charge.

No. 8—Whereas the sanitation of the camp ground is not what the district would like for it to be, therefore be it resolved that the \$500.00 appropriated for this purpose be used in the coming year for construction of necessary equipment.

No. 12—Whereas, such an urgent need exists for more direct supervision on our camp ground, therefore be it resolved that this conference appoint or elect a camp meeting committee, and that this committee be empowered to draw up and have printed a set of rules conspicuously displayed over our grounds, and furthermore that all young people attending and registering for the youth convention and camp meeting be required to carry a card with their name and address, countersigned by his or her pastor.

No. 13—Be it resolved that each organized church send in \$1.00 to the examining board to buy study course books. 1954—

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

No. 5—Whereas the manual provides for both an Examining and Educational Board, therefore be it resolved that this Conference elect both an Examining and Educational Board. 1955—

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and all profits go into the District Youth treasury. Resolution No. 1 recommended.

No. 2—Whereas we are allowed one trustee to our Bible college for each six hundred members or major fraction thereof; BE IT RESOLVED, that this conference elect two trustees this year, one for one year and one for two years, so that hereafter one trustee will be elected each year. Resolution No. 2 recommended.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.
