The Forty Ninth Annual Conference of the West Virginia District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the District Camp Grounds near Culloden with Rev. J. C. Baynum, District Superintendent, in charge . . . Rev. R. R. Hughes led in singing "Leaning On the Everlasting Arms". We were led in our opening prayer by Rev. J. S. Hankins, Pastor of our Vienna church. Bro. Baynum stated his appreciation to God for His goodness to the district for the past Conference year and for the privilege of living in America where we have religious liberty . . . He declared his appreciation for our General Superintendents and their good leadership after which he introduced Rev. Melvin Snyder, General Superintendent for this zone who was in charge of the Conference . . . Rev. Snyder in his address to the Conference tells us one of the reasons for three General Superintendents is so that they can be with us more . . . In fact, he declared, he intended to sit up with us . . . Increase in United Stewardship Fund to cost each member only 50 to 60 cents per year . . . Scripture lesson was read from Psalm 20 . . . In his address on the subject of our goal "Toward Tomorrow" Our Look Ahead . . . He defined it as the greatest legislation of the church . . . Not only did we declare to be against some things, but we were for some things. He clearly defined our objectives as a church and placed emphasis on the value of having a goal ... Receiving postponed until after Auditor's Report ... Report of Home Missionary Board read by Rev. H. O. Ours read and received . . . Sunday School Promotional Secretary's Report read and received. Report of the Young People's Executive Secretary read and accepted . . . The Report of the Ways and Means Committee read and motion made to take this report item by item seconded and carried . . . Item 1 adopted, 2 Adopted, No change in No. 3, 4 Amended to cover cost on private phone, amendment carried, motion carried ... Adjourned by expiration of time ... Dismissed in prayer by Rev. J. R. Mitchell.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the 49th District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District, fellow Pilgrims and our Beloved General Superintendent, Reverend Melvin Snyder.

Greetings:

HOME MISSIONS

The Council appointed a committee after Conference on Home Missions and they took for a product Bluefield. We were able to organize a small class and the Committee placed Reverend Paul Steele as pastor. Having no place to worship, they rented a place which did not prove desirable, but under the circumstance this was the best that could be done. During the past year they have been in the process of building a basement which is a very nice one since they have constructed a gable roof and it takes away much of the appearance of a basement. This was done with the thought of raising the roof to finish the upper story. The folk at Bramwell have assisted very greatly in the finishing touches. The Committee will have to place a strong man in this church otherwise the district will be left with the bag to hold, although I think the property is worth what the District has invested in it.

I have organized two other churches beside the Bluefield church. Scarbro which was a branch Sunday School and Mission last year, is a newly organized church. My last visit I took in a fine young man and his wife, and the church gave them a call to pastor the church. A delegate is present to this Conference from this newly organized church.

Through the help of the Lord and Brother Patrick, I was able to organize a church at Point Pleasant with 12 members. They have rented a building and their Sunday School attendance is around 70. They too, have a delegate to this Conference. Three churches organized this year brings us to a total of 39 churches and one mission, which is at Dunbar. It could be called a branch Sunday School, and it is under the Missionary Committee. In the past 11 years we have gained 12 churches, an average of a little over one a year. I have organized all together in the District 23 churches that are still functioning.

If we could have retained all the churches we have organized besides the 23, our District would have been much larger; however, like the churches a lot of the time we were not able to hold them. I think this can be said of any District and a lot of churches. It is difficult to build up the membership of the District when a number of churches loses more than they take in, and loose more than is gained in newly organized churches. This always reflects back to the Superintendent, and the question is asked why doesn't the District grow? Let us all be sure that we have taken in more members than you have dropped before you criticize the Superintendent. Statistical: Sunday School gain 55. Gain of membership counting new churches 20.

CAMP GROUND

I was elected as Superintendent the first time in 1935 and served until 1941. The camp ground was built in 1935 and we had our first camp meeting in '41 on these grounds among the pines. That year the Tabernacle was built, dining room and open dorm over the dining room, men's dorm, lunch room, and book room, and the district parsonage. Brother Cottrill was the head carpenter in the erection of these buildings. Reverend Musser then came in to serve six years as the Superintendent. During this time the old block dorm was built and the parsonage completed. Then in 1947, I was re-elected as Superintendent; this makes the 11th year with the completion of this last term. During this time the new dining room 35 x 100' was built, the kitchen equipped with a large semi-steam cooker and a three section oven, the new 48 room dormitory on the hill, modern rest rooms, and a large reservoir to supply the rest rooms. The estimated value of the camp ground is \$75,000. We have five feet of water in the reservoir to begin this camp, and we hope that we do not run out of water this year. This work has been accomplished by all of us; I could not have done it alone. I will not mention the names of those that helped so faithfully, for fear that I might forget some that helped. To God be all the glory, for this camp ground was erected for Him and the salvation of souls. May thousands of souls find their Lord in years to come, here in this sacred place among the pines.

CHURCH REPAIRS AND PARSONAGE REPAIRS

Fayetteville has covered the inside of their church with wall board which has increased the value of the church as well as beautifying it. Logan has erected three nice rooms in the upstairs of their parsonage, giving them a four bed-room parsonage. Reverend John Nester is the pastor. Mullens has painted the church on the inside with Reverend Arlie Cook as pastor. Princeton is now worshipping in their newly completed sanctuary constructed over the basement where they have been worshipping in. Sister Truman O'Nan is the pastor of this church. Summerlee has finished the new vestibule which improves the church. Reverend Paxton is pastor here. Terra Alta has bought a parsonage in a very nice location. This has been needed for a long time, and Reverend Miller is the pastor. Williamson has their parsonage finished which gives them four bedrooms. This is a nice parsonage. Reverend Davis and his good folk have worked hard to bring this to pass. Nitro has painted their church on the outside and inside. Reverend Wiseman is the Pastor. Gallagher has put a covering on the outside of their church with imitation stone. Reverend Hex Shelton is pastor. St. Marys has removed the old wooden steps in front of their church and replaced them with concrete. Reverend Roy Markle is pastor. **Lenscreek** with Reverend Frank Wolfe as pastor has modernized their little country church with hardwood floors, redecorated on the inside, put in a floor furnace and beautiful new pews, and a new roof. **Springfork** has built a nice new parsonage, having sold the old one which was not in very good condition. They now have a four bedroom parsonage and Reverend Leonard Wolfe is the pastor. Some of the churches report good revivals; this is what we need more than any other thing, "Wilt thou not revive us again."

Now after my long term of 17 years, I feel somewhat like Amos felt when he said to Amaziah, "I was no prophet, neither was I a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a gatherer of sycamore fruit (railroad man)." I felt very small and insufficient, but the Pilgrims put up with me very gracefully. Then in 1941, I was re-elected again and this makes my 11th year. I do not claim that I have acted wisely in all of my deliberations. I have made a lot of mistakes no doubt, and it may have taken a lot of grace for some of you to put up with me; I implore your mercy. Gen. 31:49 "And Mizpath: for he said the Lord watch between me and thee." This has been called the Mizpath Benediction; this word has been used as a motto on rings and Christmas cards, and as a title of an organization. It is a promise to each other that they would not harm each other: 1. The Lord watch between thee and me for our mutual protection. 2. The Lord watch between me and thee for our mutual preservation. 3. The Lord watch between men and three for our mutual usefulness. 4. The Lord watch between me and thee for our mutual spiritual advancement. 5. The Lord watch between thee and me for our mutual fellowship in the Spirit.

The Lord watch between you and me for our mutual gathering in the home of the soul, where we will not have to say goodbye, or preach a farewell sermon. Let us press forward to that glad day. I am withdrawing my name as one to be voted on for District Superintendent. Do not vote for me for any office in the district. I hope you will follow me with your prayers. You may say, "How do you feel in this time of stepping aside from public service, I can only say, let us wait and see."

DISTRICT SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION REPORT

To The 49th Annual Conference of the West Virginia District of The Pilgrim Holiness Church:

Greetings in the "Precious Name of Jesus":

Another year has come and gone and we have enjoyed the blessing of the Lord in His great work.

We as a district had a reported average of 2,302 for the 1957-1958 church year over 2,300 reported average for 1956-1957. This a numerical gain of 2 over the previous year. There were 16 schools with a gain; also 8 schools with a gain of 10% or more. Award ribbons will be presented to the following schools with their respective gains as follows. Cinco 42% and Scarbro 38% will receive the Award Ribbon for 25% or more. Fayetteville 16%, Mullens 21%, Cuzzart 15%, Williamson 12.5%, Coal Branch Heights 12.5%, and Rawl 12.5% will receive the Award Ribbon for 10% gain.

Two new Sunday Schools were started, Dunbar with an average of 38 for the year and Bluefield with an average of 11 for the year. The closed school at Mason City was reopened. We thank God for what has been accomplished and appreciate all who worked and cooperated in the Sunday School Program.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1—We recommend that the general budget be placed at \$7,752.00, which is based on \$8.00 per member (969 members). ADOPTED.

No. 2—We recommend that the district minutes be sold at 25 cents per copy. ADOPTED.

No. 3—We recommend that each church, upon the visit of the District Superintendent, raise a minimum of \$5.00 to help defray his traveling expense.

No. 4*—We recommend that the district budget be set at \$3,611.20 and that it be divided as follows:

District Secretary	75.00
District Treasurer	150.00
District Home Missions	500.00
District Parsonage phone	31.20
Incidentals and General Conference Exp.	300.00

No. 5—We recommend that the District and the general budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send to the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for building fund, Easter offering, November self-denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all foreign missionary offerings, Y. P. S. offerings and Bus Funds.

No. 6—We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at 4,160.00 per year plus travelling expense at the rate of .05 cents per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner: 1,460.00 as provided for in the budget. Offerings taken when he visits the churches. The $\frac{1}{2}$ tithe of all district pastors, evangelists; 12.00 a year for all other district and local preachers, except those of the age 65 years or over. ADOPTED.

No. 7—We recommend that the Superintendent's $\frac{1}{2}$ tithe be placed in the "Incidental and General Conference Expense Fund." This $\frac{1}{2}$ tithe to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

No. 8—We recommend that the district paper, "Pilgrim Tidings" be financed by the following plan: Each church paying at least .06 per copy subscribed for, which monies shall be sent, each month, to the District Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY BOARD

The report of the Home Missionary Board to the Forty-Ninth Annual Conference of the West Virginia District:

Greetings in the wonderful Name of the Lord.

We, the Home Missionary Board, are grateful to God for His blessings the past year.

The Board approved a lot in Bluefield, West Virginia, on which a basement church is being built by a construction company.

A new work has been started in Dunbar with very good results. The average Sunday School attendance from July, 1957 to June, 1958 was 38. The attendance in July, 1958 showed an increase of 109% over July, 1957. The Board approved a lot for a church building in Dunbar. The legal details for the purchase of this lot are being worked out.

Many of the Churches in the state have been visited by the members of the Board, in the interest of home missions, with good response. West Virginia Pilgrims, in general, are interested in this work and are willing to cooperate to expedite the progress of home missions.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

- 1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treasurer monthly. Adopted.
- 1927-Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Superintendent. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That pastor's salary be paid while he attends the district assembly. Adopted.
- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1936—Res. 8. RESOLVED, That each church pastor send one copy of all church reports to the District Statistician IMMEDIATELY after the close of our church (fiscal) year. Adopted. "Be not slothful in business," Rom. 12:11.
- 1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

- 1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for

their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.

- 1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.
- 1946-Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone anywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947-Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.
- 1948—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district Sunday school banner be awarded to the Sunday school having the largest gain over the previous quarter, and not percentage of gain. Adopted.

- 1948-Res. 5. RESOLVED, That all local preachers' names be inserted in the district minutes. Adopted .
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.
- 1950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.
- 1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.
- 1950-Res. 5. RESOLVED, Whereas there has been a laxness in the past relative to the licensing and renewal of license of local preachers, and WHEREAS, this same condition exists in the licensing and renewal of license of our regular ministers from year to year, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED, That henceforth this District adhere strictly to the rules and regulations set forth in our Church Manual, according to Sec. 95, P6, 102, P2&3; 104, P2; 144, P1; 148, P1, and 158, P2; which specifically requires said applicant to conform with certain requirements, as well as to have a recommendation from his or her local church board, endorsed by the District Superintendent. Said recommendation certifying to his or her holy character and conversation, as well as spiritual gifts and calling, and recommended to the Annual Conference by the District Council through the Educational and Examining Board and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is and shall be made mandatory that our District Superintendent see that this ruling is carried out from year to year by each church of the District.
- 1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951---

No. 2-Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 8—We recommend that all former legislation pertaining to the registration of people attending our camp be rescinded, and the following be adopted:

1st. That we charge \$2.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 2 years except Ordained or Licensed ministers from other Districts.

2nd. That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

3rd. That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

1952---

No. 2—Where: The Pilgrim Pension Plan has been operating successfully for a number of years, and

Whereas: The church should make provision for the aged ministers, Therefore, be it resolved that each church pastor and actively engaged minister and Christian worker of the West Virginia District participate in the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.

No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 4% into the pension fund.

No. 8—Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America, Be it resolved that we as a District by a majority vote of this Conference go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television by our people and urge by resolution to the next general conference that it be incorporated in the church covenant. The same to be printed in the minutes.

1953 -

No. 12—Whereas, such an urgent need exists for more direct supervision on our camp ground, therefore be it resolved that this conference appoint or elect a camp meeting committee, and that this committee be empowered to draw up and have printed a set of rules conspicuously displayed over our grounds, and furthermore that all young people attending and registering for the youth convention and camp meeting be required to carry a card with their name and address, countersigned by his or her pastor.

1954----

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955—

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and ½ of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.

1956-

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2—Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3—Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4—Be it resolved that the lunch stand and registration office remain closed until the altar invitation is over. Adopted.
