**AUGUST 5, 1959 — 6:30 P. M.**

The (50th) Golden Jubilee Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the District Camp Grounds near Culloden, W. Va. with Rev. E. C. Swanson, District Superintendent, in charge. The opening songs, "Joy Unspeakable" and "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms," were led by Rev. R. R. Hughes, Pastor of Charleston Church. Rev. William Whitmore led in the opening prayer, after which Bro. Swanson introduced our General Supt. and presiding officer—Rev. Melvin Snyder. Rev. Snyder read from Revelations 3:7-13. He stated that Christs coming could be during this service tonight. Seven churches of Revelation represent various conditions of churches of every age. Religion's a snare when found to be without love. Christ has a message for each specific church. We are here to hear what the Spirit has to say to us. He elaborated on: I know thy works, the Lord expects us to do something. The final exhortation of the message: God usually leads through others; God told the churches what to do through Paul. The word must be preached. The chorus, "Let the Beauty of Jesus be Seen in Me" was sung after which the roll call of pastors and delegates were made. Bar set same as in former years. Report of District Superintendent read and accepted. Conference thanked God for the gains by saying Amen. The Auditing Committee's Report was read and accepted. District Treasurer's Report was read and accepted. Talk by Rev. Snyder on Stewardship Fund. Motion made and accepted to extend the time to 9:30 P. M. Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. H. H. Hughes report was read and accepted. Rev. Snyder commended the conference for their good average of attendance. Youth President's Report was read by Rev. W. C. Killen, in the absence of District Youth President—Bobby Kincaid, due to illness. The report was accepted. The Youth Treasurer Report was read by Arlie Cook, Youth Treasurer and accepted. The Statistical reports were read by Rev. L. K. Davis, District Secretary, and accepted. Meeting was adjourned. Dismissed in prayer by Rev. L. K. Davis.

Swanson for his earnest work in the previous year. Motion made council take care of all unfinished business and accepted. The Conference was closed.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the 50th District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of The West Virginia District and to our esteemed General Superintendent, Melvin H. Snyder:

Greetings:

These past almost ten months have been months of adjustments and of trying to get our feet down in this task of being your Superintendent. As I have told many of you, I came here after considerable prayer, feeling that the Lord wanted me to come and at least for a time, be one of you and that thus we might together, work for the advancement of the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, the salvation of souls and the building up of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

I do feel that the Lord has helped us these past months on the District and that He wants to help us even more this next year if we will co-operate with each other and with Him. We made some gain in membership, nothing outstanding, but about 40 gain for which we thank the Lord. Our gain in the Sunday School has been much brighter. According to the figures that I have, we gained over 190 in average S. S. attendance or a little over 9%. This is a good gain. I believe that this is a fertile field—that we should work very diligently, as the Sunday School is the feeder for the church. We should strive to get our scholars converted, and then tie them into the church.

While our numerical gains have not been large we do feel that we have made good gains spiritually, at least in some places. The Lord moved upon our hearts in a gracious way during our Ministerial Convention. I think that we all felt the nearness and heart warming of His presence that last afternoon service of the Convention. Praise His Name!

The youth department of our District has had a good year. They have had some very good Zone Rallies. I have attended all of these that I could and have preached in three youth meetings. Under the direction of District Youth President Bob Kincaid, the District Y. P. S. conducted it's first Youth Camp. I feel this was a step forward. There were about 60 teen agers enrolled and a very profitable week was spent here on the District Camp grounds. Several were saved during this time. The Youth camp ended with a fine 4th of July rally here at the camp. Gen. Supt. Flexon was our guest speaker.

There has been some property improvements, some redecorating and so forth, this year, but I shall not name out the churches at this time, but I think that several of the churches have plans afoot for enlargements, increasing facilities, etc. for this coming year. This is a good sign to me, as it indicates vision and faith as well as some growth.

We closed one church this year and sold the property. It seemed almost impossible to get a foothold in Mason City again after it had been closed for some time; so after due consideration it seemed the wise

thing to close and sell the property, which we did. From the proceeds received from this property, we were able to help Pt. Pleasant get a nice lot in a fine residential part of town, and give them a little start towards a new basement church.

We have been unable to do anything this year in the field of Home Missions. We have had no money to do anything with. This is indeed to our shame. We did however make an appeal to all of the churches for an offering so that we could install heat in the new home missionary church in Bluefield. We have been unable to get a pastor for this church yet as we had no funds but this is a "must" for this year.

### A LOOK AT THE FUTURE

As I look toward the future of the West Virginia District I see a great task ahead for each of us. This task we can accomplish only by the help of the Lord and the full co-operation of both ministry and laity. God has called us first to win souls to Him, to lift up Jesus Christ to a lost world, and then to build the church. To accomplish this we may have to change some of our methods, rethink and evaluate some of our positions. We will have to redouble our efforts. We must practice "Co-operative Loyalty". We must be charitable with each other when there is a difference of opinions, and in all of this show the true spirit of Christ towards a lost world and towards each other. Let us be diligent in our work, faithful in our calling as Christians, remembering that the words of the song writer are for us.—"A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, a never dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky. To serve the present age,—my calling to fullfil, Oh may it all my powers engage,—to do my Master's will."

With this I should like to make a few recommendations:—The spiritual life of our churches and District must be of paramount importance. I urge that every church pray earnestly for a real District wide spiritual awakening, a real spirit of revival. I would urge that a Fasting and Prayer League be organized in each church. I would like to recommend that each Friday be Prayer and Fast day for the whole District, and on that day one meal be set aside and a time of united fasting and prayer be practiced. In as much as we have been unable to do anything this year for Home Missions because of finances, I recommend that this conference enact legislation to help us raise finances to underwrite a stronger District Home Missionary program. There are several cities that we should be starting works in during the next few years if Jesus tarries and it will take money to do this. One of the goals for our District in the immediate future should be to either buy or build a District parsonage. It is not good business to rent for a long period. At the end all you will have is a handful of rent receipts. To either buy or build will take some money to even get a start. We will either need money for a down payment on a house or to purchase a lot on which to build. We now have a little laid aside towards this but this is only a start. I know that most of our churches are in hard position financially but unless we take steps

to do something we will get nowhere in the next five years. Therefore, I recommend that this Conference should levy an assessment on itself of at least one dollar per member for this year towards a District Parsonage fund.

This year is our 50th year as a District. It is our Golden Jubilee year. Let us do our best to make this the best year in the history of the West Virginia District. Let us go out of our way to co-operate with the whole Church program both District and General. Some have co-operated fine this year, some only in a half hearted way, and some have shown very little co-operation. I say this to their shame. Brethren, if we are to have the District that the Lord wants us to have and that would be a credit to the Pilgrim Holiness Church,—then we must co-operate with each other. Let us as Pastors vow to God that this year we will do our best to serve our age. It will take prayer, sweat, and tears; it will take calls and more calls; it will take more and better preparation for our preaching; in short it will take Work! but this is what the Lord called you for, this is what the Church credentialed you for, and this is what I as your superintendent am expecting of you. If you are not willing to do this then you should not be in the Ministry. If you are not willing to do this, then, frankly, I feel that you should ask God and the Church to forgive you for taking credentials, and you should turn them in and try to be a good layman. In short, let us put the goals or aims of this the Golden anniversary year in a few words, Spiritual revival, Souls and District-Co-operation. To this end I pledge each of you and the Lord my best. To this I ask each of you that you honestly pledge to God and the Church your best. The Lord help and bless each of you.

This District had a numerical gain of 190 for the past year and a percentage gain of 9.1%. (The average attendance for 1957-58 was 2304 and the average for 1958-59 was 2494.) Sixteen schools made a gain. Eleven schools made more than a ten per cent gain. The following schools receive special recognition for the highest percentage gains:

## REPORT OF YOUTH WORK

To The 50th Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

In the name of Christ our Saviour:

Greetings:

The Youth Dept. of our district in the fore part of our church year progressed very slowly, which we will not take up in detail in this report. Four of our six Zones were visited by the youth Pres. to conduct Zone Business Meetings. Due to the Devil and difficulty some Zone Leaders were not installed until after New Year (Jan. 1959).

In the first part of Sept., Wife and I (she for short vacation) went to Church Headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana for Youth Leaders Meet-

ing. After hearing reports from Youth Leaders from other Districts it seems that we are doing very little for our Youth in this District. During the course of the Convention in Ind. many worth while subjects were discussed in regards to Youth Work.

The first part of our Calendar Year a meeting of our Youth Leaders was held, during this meeting plans for the remainder of the Church year was worked out. So much was mapped out in the meeting in Indiana that we of our district would do well if we could get a foundation laid and some projects started, namely, Missionary Project for all Youth Societies to participate in. One dollar, at the least to be sent to Youth Treasurer, who would send it thru proper church channels. This money to be equally divided between Home and Foreign Mission Depts. Second project, Bible Quiz with winners from each district going to National Youth Convention in 1960. Third, a Youth Camp, several things of lesser importance was discussed. The first two projects seemingly did not do so well, but our Youth Camp, Praise GOD, we feel was a great success taking all into consideration.

In our first Youth Camp, which started on Monday, the 29th of June and continued thru July 4, we had Youth from different sections of our district, registering for our youth camp. Sixty-one registered for the first camp. Forty-four girls and seventeen boys. Mornings were used for teaching of Bible classes and Handicraft. Afternoons were used for recreational purposes and touring of a Local Glass Factory. Evenings were used for Youth Services and Evangelistic services. God met with us in these services. Most all of our campers who came to camp unsaved, left with a testimony to the Saving grace and Sanctifying power in the Precious Blood of Christ.

We of the Youth Dept. feel that the Youth Camp was a great blessing, and the year ended much better than the start indicated, PRAISE GOD.

No. 4.—We recommend that the district budget be set at \$4,088.00 and that it be divided as follows:

No. 5.—We recommend that the District and the General Budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all Foreign Missionary Offering and Y. P. S. offering.

No. 6.—We recommend that the District Superintendent salary be set at \$4,160.00 per year plus traveling expense at the rate of .05 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner: \$1,800.000 as provided for in the budget, offerings taken when he visits the churches, the half-tithe off all district pastors and evangelists except evangelists who are members of the pension plan; \$12.00 a year for all other district and local preachers, except those of the age of 65 years or over.

No. 7.—We recommend that the Superintendent's half-tithe be placed in the "Incidental and General Conference Expense Fund." This half-tithe to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

No. 8.—We recommend that each voting member in the district be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent in by the local church treasurer, to the district treasurer. The money is to be used for the purpose of obtaining a new District Parsonage.

## DISTRICT LEGISLATION

1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treasurer monthly. Adopted.

1927—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Superintendent. Adopted.

1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.

1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.

1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.

1936—Res. 8. RESOLVED, That each church pastor send one copy of all church reports to the District Statistician IMMEDIATELY after the close of our church (fiscal) year. Adopted. "Be not slothful in business," Rom. 12:11.

1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.

1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.

1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.

1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.

1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for

their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.

1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.

1946—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.

1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.

1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone anywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.

1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.

1947—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.

1948—Res. 5. RESOLVED, That all local preachers' names be inserted in the district minutes. Adopted .

1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.

1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.

1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.

1950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.

1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.

1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951—

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 8—We recommend that all former legislation pertaining to the registration of people attending our camp be rescinded, and the following be adopted:

1st. That we charge \$2.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 2 years except Ordained or Licensed ministers from other Districts.

2nd. That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

3rd. That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

1952—

No. 2—Where: The Pilgrim Pension Plan has been operating successfully for a number of years, and

Whereas: The church should make provision for the aged ministers, Therefore, be it resolved that each church pastor and actively engaged minister and Christian worker of the West Virginia District participate in the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.

No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 4% into the pension fund.

No. 8—Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America, Be it resolved that we as a District by a majority vote of this Conference go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television by our people and urge by resolution to the next general conference that it be incorporated in the church covenant. The same to be printed in the minutes.

1953—

No. 12—Whereas, such an urgent need exists for more direct supervision on our camp ground, therefore be it resolved that this conference appoint or elect a camp meeting committee, and that this committee be empowered to draw up and have printed a set of rules conspicuously displayed over our grounds, and furthermore that all young people attending and registering for

the youth convention and camp meeting be required to carry a card with their name and address, countersigned by his or her pastor.

1954—

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955—

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.

1956—

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2—Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3—Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4—Be it resolved that the lunch stand and registration office remain closed until the altar invitation is over. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6—Be it resolved that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:00 p.m. through Thursday 5:00 p.m. preceeding the camp meeting. ADOPTED.
