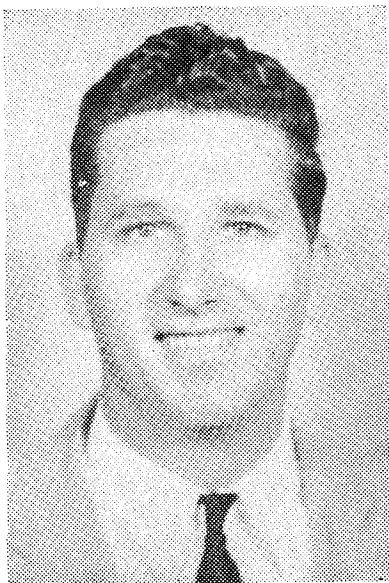

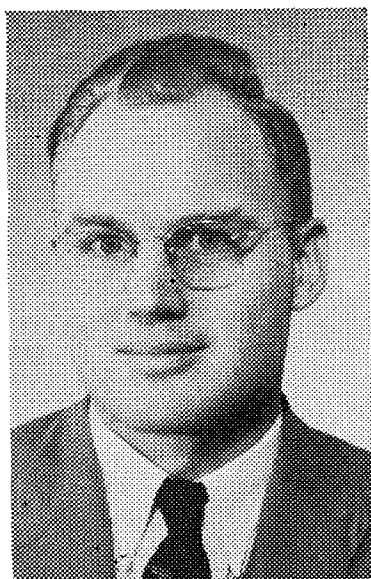

Alan Ledford, pastor of Bluefield Church. Rev. E. C. Swanson, District Supt., in charge. Led in prayer by Rev. J. F. Lint. Dr. William Neff, presiding General Supt., introduced by Brother Swanson. Bro. Neff informs us he is happy to be with us. Tells us we cannot see the groans and tears behind these reports. Life and trust in the Church is the work of the Holy Spirit. These extraordinary days in which we live we need to be in the glow and the fire of the Holy Ghost. Peril of no real life in the Spirit, failure of making inroads into the devils territory should stir us. We're in this world for two things: to save souls and build up the body of Christ. REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT

To the 51st District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District and to our beloved and esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff.

Greetings:

It is in the Providence of God that we are meeting together at the close of another year. It hardly seems possible that a whole year has slipped by since our last Conference; but it is a fact. How rapidly time carries us on towards Eternity. Each of us are one year older, one year nearer Eternity and have one year less to work for our Lord, one year less to work for our beloved Church and one year less in which to try to win souls to Jesus. In view of this truth we must do our best we must give our best in the remaining time allotted us by our Lord.

This past year has been a busy year. As I have endeavored to carry out my duties as your Superintendent, and with that, also supply the pulpit of one of your churches for ten months of the year. I feel that the Lord has helped us on the District. Some churches have had good revivals for which we thank God. Our heart desire is that our whole District shall feel the spirit of genuine, spiritual revival and for this, we must all keep on working and praying. God saw fit to give us a very excellent Ministerial Convention at Parkersburg this spring. Truly you who missed this convention missed a great blessing as God moved upon our hearts and our hearts were stirred by the messages of General Superintendent Flexon. Many of us shall long remember that blessed time.

In spite of these big losses for these winter months, our gains earlier in the year were sufficient to more than compensate for the losses and we did come out with some gain in the Sunday School for the year, for which we praise God.

We have had quite a lot of dead wood on our membership rolls for the past few years. I have urged our pastors to bring their membership rolls up to date. Some have, and in view of this, we will suffer a loss in membership for this past year. I think that there are still some more revisions that need to be made, especially where there are those who have moved to other states for work and are now permanently gone from the home church. This means that we must work harder this coming year so that we can more than offset the losses and thus make some gains for the kingdom. We must give our best, anything less than this will not be pleasing to God.

This past winter was one of the hardest winters that West Virginia has seen for several years. For two months our Sunday Schools took big losses. Some of our churches did not even have Sunday School for three or four Sundays out of those two months.

The Youth Department of our District has had another good year under the leadership of Bro. Bob Kincaid. There were some very good Zone Rallies and the second District Youth Camp was held this year. The number

attending the youth camp this year was about the same as last, but it seemed that this year's camp was better than last year. Quite a number of the teenagers were saved during the camp. There were between forty and fifty from the West Virginia Conference who attended the National Youth Convention at Winona Lake this June. We were happy for the good representation.

There has been a considerable amount of property improvements this past year in our Conference. Baileysville purchased and remodeled another house and now have a nice parsonage and are using the old parsonage for Sunday School rooms. Charleston purchased a beautiful electric organ. Circo finished a good two room Sunday School addition. Coal Branch Heights built a new auditorium, while it is not all complete yet, inside, they are using it and it is a big improvement for them. Fayetteville beautified the outside of their church with a covering of perma-stone. Mt. Hope added to their facilities by adding two fine class rooms in their basement. Nine Mile just completed a redecorating and purchased beautiful new pews and pulpit furniture. Parkersburg So. installed new pews and pulpit furniture and also a new piano. This certainly was a fine improvement. They also built a new garage. Pt. Pleasant, with the help of the District, purchased a fine lot on a paved residential street and have built a very lovely basement church with four nice Sunday School rooms alongside of the auditorium. Terra Alta is in the process now, of putting the top on their basement church. They have it all inclosed and hope to finish the inside soon. This will really add to both the looks and the facilities of the Terra Alta church. The Williamson Church has completed a remodeling of it's entrances and put on new siding that gives it a stone effect. This certainly improves it's looks.

Besides these major improvements several churches have done redecorating jobs on either church or parsonage. These many improvements and enlargements of buildings on the District are very good signs to me, and needless to say are sources of encouragement to a superintendent. They tell of vision and desire to improve the material part of God's work and in these rather rough times, economically, in West Virginia, they tell of sacrifice on the part of many people. For these things we praise God.

One of the weakest parts of our District organization, for the past few years has been our Home Missionary Dept. The Lord has been helping us in this Dept. this year. Last Camp meeting we had a special Dist. Home Missionary service on the first Sunday afternoon. Gen. Supt. Flexon was here and spoke to us and raised a fine offering of over \$3,000. While all of this did not come in, most of it did. Then last Conference you adopted our proposal and put the penny-a-day calender into effect. The Calenders were gotten out between Oct. and Dec. By this means you gave over a \$1,000 before the end of the Conf. year. We have three home missionary projects, two of which we are helping to support with this money. We put a full time pastor in the Bluefield work. Bro. Alan Leadford has been there since last Sept. The work is going good and the Sunday School is running in the 60's now. We trust that by the end of another year they will be pretty much self-supporting. We had a little Sunday School a few miles outside of Morgantown last

year. Last fall we felt we should have a church in Morgantown. We found a building we could rent and Bro. Paul Sebree, who pastored at Cuzzart, has been going over to Morgantown for Sunday afternoon and Thursday evening services these many months. For this, we have only paid him his expenses. The work seems very encouraging there and we hope to be able to organize it before many months and get a full time pastor.

It looked for a time last winter as tho we would have to close the work at Dunbar. But somehow God stepped in and revived it and now it seems to be doing better than it had for some time. Bro. Bob Keenan is pastoring this work with no pay. The local group are doing well in paying their own way, for their rent, and operating expenses. The District is paying nothing to Dunbar and as far as I know never have. We are hoping to be able to organize this work before too long.

The Home Missionary Department is one of the most important of our District. It is the hope of our District. We must increase our efforts in this direction. It is a fact that many of the churches in the southern part of our state are losing in numbers, because of the exodus of people, looking elsewhere for work. Unless there is a decided change in the economic situation in this part of the state, many of these churches will eventually have to close. We must increase our efforts in these larger cities and areas that are not supported by one or two small mines. To this effort let us spend, and be spent.

As there always is in every District, there has been some shifting of personnel this year. Two of our fine pastors left our District to work in the Church Extension Dept. The Lord saw fit to call one home to be with Him. In turn however we have received four men from other Districts that I am sure will be a big blessing to us.

A LOOK INTO THE FUTURE

As I do this I would like to repeat a paragraph from my report of last year. As I look towards the future of the West Virginia District I see a great task ahead for each of us. This task we can accomplish only by the help of the Lord and the full co-operation of both ministry and laity. God has called us first to win souls to Him, to lift up Jesus Christ to a lost world, and to build the church. To accomplish this we may have to change some of our methods, rethink and reevaluate some of our positions. We will have to redouble our efforts. We must practice "Co-operative Loyalty." We must be charitable with each other when there is a difference of opinions, and in all this, show the true spirit of Christ towards a lost world and towards each other. Let us be diligent in our work, Faithful in our calling as Christians, remembering that the words of the song writer are for us, — "A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, a never dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky. To serve the present age, — my calling to fulfill, Oh may it all my powers engage, — to do my Master's will."

Last year we started the push on the Home Missionary front. We must keep this up. We should increase our giving to Dist. Home Missions. The

Calender idea is working, let's keep it working, let's push it harder. We got a start towards a District Parsonage fund with the dollar per member assesment, but several did not seem to push it, let's all push it this year. May this new year be characterized as a year of true "spiritual life" emphasis. There can be no substitute for the spiritual life of either our ministry or laity. Let us give ourselves to prayer and fasting if need be, to maintain our own spiritual life and then to have the true outreach, that Christ our Lord wants us to have, for the lost. We must work the program of lay evangelism. Where this is put into action it seems to give new life to the church. It is the Master's plan. Let us do our best to work it in some fashion at least.

Pastors, you are the main key to the success of this District. If you are satisfied with the "Status Quo," If you are satisfied with an occasional call, if you are satisfied with the same little crowd, of you are satisfied to preach the same old dried up sermon, each Sunday only from a different text, if you are satisfied to never see a sinner in your congregation, and thus you become a part of a mutual admiration society of satisfied saints, while the world all about you goes on to destruction, then don't be surprised if next year your congregation will be smaller than it is now. If this be the case then you will fail, and the District will fail. Pastors you have a great task, to shepherd the flock and seek the lost. May God help each of you by His grace, and by your doing your best, to be adequate for the challenge of this OUR DAY.

Though there have been many battles, problems and some lonely hours. Though there have been burdens tears and an occasional heart ache, — yet it has been a pleasure to serve you and work with you for I have felt that I have been in the Masters will for I felt that I was not only appointed here by my Church, — for these two years but by my Lord. From the deep of my heart I say God bless each of you and help you to win Souls for the Master.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1. — We recommend that the general Budget be placed at \$7,224.00 which is based on \$8.00 per member at 903 members.

No. 2. — We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25 cents per copy.

No. 3. — We recommend that each church, upon the visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts; churches who have under forty members, \$5.00; with forty or over raise \$7.50 per visit.

No. 4. — We recommend that the district budget be set at \$4,088.00 and that it be divided as follows:

District Treasurer	200.00
District Home Missions	500.00
District Parsonage phone	68.00
Incidentals & General Conference Exp.	325.00

No. 5. — We recommend that the District and the General Budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all Foreign Missionary Offering, Y. P. S. offering, and Evangelist pay.

No. 6. — We recommend that the District Superintendent salary be set at \$4,160.00 per year plus traveling expense at the rate of .05 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner:

\$1,800.00 as provided for in the budget, offerings taken when he visits the churches, the half-tithe off all district pastors and evangelists except evangelists who are members of the pension plan; \$12.00 a year for all other district and local preachers, except those of the age of 65 years or over.

No. 7. — We recommend that the Superintendent's half-tithe be placed in the "Incidental and General Conference Expense Fund." This half-tithe to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

No. 8. — We recommend that each voting member in the district be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent in by the local church treasurer, to the district treasurer. The money is to be used for the purpose of obtaining a new District Parsonage.

No. 9. — We recommend that the Supt.'s Parsonage rent be raised by taking \$80.00 per month out of the overall budget received. This to be paid as rent or on Parsonage payment if and when purchased.

No. 10. — We recommended the continuation of the District Home Mission calendar system.

To the 51st Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church:

During the year that has just closed, we of the Youth Department feel that we have had a profitable year. In the early part of the year, a meeting of the Youth Council was held. During this meeting plans were laid for the year. A discussion was held in regard to the possibility of setting up a Scholarship Fund, as a District Youth Project; but as yet there has been no followup on this matter.

Our Youth Camp which began on the 4th of July and concluded on the 9th was far superior to last year; although the attendance was the same as last year. We had thirty-seven girls and twenty-four boys in Camp. A total of sixty-one Campers. In our Camp this year, three classes were taught, as compared to two last year. During the evening Evangelistic services, God met with us from the very beginning. The first night seven of our campers yielded to the invitation to accept Christ as Lord and Saviour. Each of our services found young people at the altar to be saved and sanctified.

During our Church Year it was a great privilege for me, as Youth President to visit each of the six zones in the District. The Rallies were all enjoyed, although in many of the zones some of the churches in the zone did not have a single representative at the Rally. You of these churches who have not supported the Youth Work, should STIR yourselves.

It was our privilege to have a Quiz Team enter the National Quiz Contest at the National Youth Convention; also we had an entry in the Talent Hour Contest.

May the dear Lord help all of us to WORK and PRAY together for the advancement of this great part of the Church.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treas. monthly. Adopted.

1927—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Bldg. Committee. Adopted.

1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.

1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.

1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.

1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.

1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.

1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.

1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.

1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for

their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.

1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.

1946—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.

1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.

1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone anywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.

1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.

1947—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.

1948—Res. 5. RESOLVED, That all local preachers' names be inserted in the district minutes. Adopted .

1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.

1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.

1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.

1950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.

1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.

1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951—

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 8—We recommend that all former legislation pertaining to the registration of people attending our camp be rescinded, and the following be adopted:

1st. That we charge \$2.00 registration fee for everyone above the age of 2 years except Ordained or Licensed ministers from other Districts.

2nd. That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

3rd. That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

1952—

No. 2—Where: The Pilgrim Pension Plan has been operating successfully for a number of years, and

Whereas: The church should make provision for the aged ministers, Therefore, be it resolved that each church pastor and actively engaged minister and Christian worker of the West Virginia District participate in the Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Be it further resolved that the District Superintendent, upon his visits to the churches, assist the pastors and churches in putting this plan into operation.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.

No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 4% into the pension fund.

No. 8—Inasmuch as television is fast becoming a daily habit and an open door for the infiltration of all kinds of vice and crime into the sanctity of the home in an ever increasing number of homes in America, Be it resolved that we as a District by a majority vote of this Conference go on record as being strongly opposed to the use of television by our people and urge by resolution to the next general conference that it be incorporated in the church covenant. The same to be printed in the minutes.

1954—

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955—

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.

1956—

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2—Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3—Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4—Be it resolved that the lunch stand and registration office remain closed until the altar invitation is over. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6—Be it resolved that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:00 p.m. through Thursday 5:00 p.m. preceeding the camp meeting. ADOPTED.
