To our esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, and to the ministers and delegates to the 52nd District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Churh of the West Virginia District,

Greetings in the name of our wonderful Lord .-

One more Conference year has closed and in the Providence of our Lord we are gathered together to do business for the King. How good God has been to us! While many around us have been called on to Eternity we still have opportunity to work for the Master. Who knows how long we shall have this opportunity? In many lands it seems the opportunities for the Church to work are being curtailed. The threats of war seem to be all about us. We are living in a threatening and dangerous age with sin and crime on the increase; yet our challenge is that in the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ we have the answer to the fears, frustrations and problems of the world about us. What will we do with this message? Will we keep it to ourselves? Will we enjoy it and then just share it with our friends, or will we spend and be spent in trying to get the message of Full Salvation out to a sinner world that so badly needs it? I'm afraid that in all too many of our churches, the church has become a "rest home for tired saints" rather than a "spiritual hospital for tormented sinners." May God awaken us to our opportunity and to our God-given responsibility; May God stir us to new activity for him lest we should come down to the final accounting day with nothing but leaves and wasted oppor tunities for our Master.

This year has been another busy year, but I would not want it otherwise. I only have one life to give to my Master and the Church, and I would that the life that I have shall be packed full of Jesus Sake. I have tried to faithfully fulfill my responsibilities to you as a District, to my church and to my Lord. I have visited all of the churches at least three times and a few of them four times, besides holding several revivals and other duties as Superintendent. With all the activity and expended energy I have come to the end of the year and as I look back I have asked myself the question, "Just what have I accomplished for God and Eternity? Brethern, I confess to you that one of the biggest trials of my life is look back and by what I see be made to feel that I am not accomplishing anything for Christ or the Church. I am made to realize, however, that someone must take care of the menial tasks of administration while others gather the sheaves. My consolation is that eternity may reveal that more has been accomplished for God and souls than mere observations and statistics may show.

This year has been a year of both victories and defeats. It was my happy privilege in April to organize our home missionary work at Dunbar into a church. We organized with nine charter members and the work seems to be making good progress under the leadership of their pastor Rev. Bob Keenan. We have hopes of this work developing into a substantial self-supporting work. We praise God for these good Pilgrims. The home missionary church at Bluefield seems to be making good progress. They made about a 70% gain in S. S. and over a 100% gain in membership.

They did, however have a little setback this year financially. We appreciate the good work that Bro. Alan Ledford has been doing here. On the other side of the ledger we have the Mission at Morgantown. As yet we have been unable to get a pastor for this work. Our big holdback has been finances. While Bro. Sebree has continued to take care of this work, he is unable to give it the time it should have; as a consequence we have made no progress here. It has just been a "holding on" action. It has truly been a great burden on my heart and I have been fearful lest we lose our opportunity there. If each of you really knew how important the "Penny a Day" calenders are to this District H. Miss. work, I am sure you would not let it just slide by. We are only working this about one third of our potential. Let us vow to do better in this. It is a life line for our District home missionary work.

Another defeat that we had this year was in the work at Princeton. Due to some circumstances beyond our control, such as the economic situation, several of the members moving out of the state, and the serious accident of the Pastor's husband last year during camp which seemed to necessitate their moving to Michigan, it seemed the church just disintegrated and we could do nothing but close the work.

Our District Youth work seems to be gradually going forward. Several fine Zone Rallies have been reported by the various Zones. Another good Youth Camp was conducted this summer with a slight increase in attendance over last year. Bro. Bob Kincaid has the Youth work on his heart and has been doing a good job as youth leader for the District.

According to the annual reports that I have received from the churches it seems that statistically we have just about stood still this year. In church membership we seem to have about held our own and in Sunday School attendance we may show a slight loss. Most of our larger churches showed good gains, but some of our smaller ones showed losses. I must confess to you that I feel ashamed that we have not made the gains that we should. I still believe that God expects us to grow. In fact, I believe that we would have made some gains if God could have had His way with each of us.

We have made some material gains by way of improved facilities. Clarksburg did a good remodeling job and installed fine new pews and pulpit furniture. Parkersburg 1st church completely bricked their church, built a nice stone bulletin board and installed new carpets. They also have plans to start a Sunday School annex shortly after Camp Meeting. Huntington 1st have sold their church location and building, have purchased several new lots and are starting to build a new church, and before next conference time I expect they will be well situated in their new church. Barboursville have installed a nice new illuminated bulletin board in front of their church. Mullens remodeled their church, purchased some good pews, installed some folding doors and carpets that gives them a nice looking interior to their church. Nellis built a new porch on the parsonage. Blue Jay built a new vestibul on their church. Also, several churches have done redecorating in either church or parsonage. Dunbar, tho they

rent their building, purchased some fine pews at a bargain price. These give their building a good church appearance. For all of these improvements, we thank the Lord and commend the pastors and people.

Our Camp grounds and buildings have been in need of attention for some time. Last fall a group of preachers and laymen from the district came to the grounds and worked for three days cutting and clearing out brush on the far side of the hill. This spring we did the same, but we are not done yet. I trust that we will get this job completed this fall. Two weeks ago a small crew of us worked here for four days painting on the buildings. We did not get quite through with the first coat on all of our buildings due to the weather, but we should get this done before another Camp. In fact, it had been so long since they had been painted, that one coat is not enough. We should plan on painting a second coat before next Camp if at all possible. We went in debt for the materials, but I trust that you good people appreciate the improved looks so much that you will quickly rally with the money for the paint. There are several other improvements that should be made in the near future for the good of our Camp.

We still have not acquired a District Parsonage. We are trying to build up our Parsonage fund so as to have a substantial down payment. This is a slow process in as much as over half of the churches have not paid anything into this fund.

OUR NEEDS-for the future ahead-

With the economic situation in West Virginia you might think that our greatest need is for more money .-- Certainly we could use more and it would take some of the pressure off from the District Superintendents mind, but this is not our greatest need. One of our great needs is a new and increased sense of loyalty to our church, especially in a District and a General Church sense. A sense of loyalty that makes us feel that each department of both District and General Church is our personal responsibility. A sense of loyalty that makes us feel that each Pilgrim Bible College is our College. A sense of loyalty that makes us feel that the Denominational Liberal Arts College at Owosso is our College. May God help us to have a sense of loyalty towards these various departments of our church until we will feel that if any of them fail, we must share the responsibility for their failure. No, you may not agree with everything that they do or say-but Pastor, does each of your board or members agree 100% with what your church does, or with what you, as Pastor, say or do? Yet you expect their loyalty and expect them to help push the work of your local Church. If they are members it seems that you have a right to expect that. However, the District and General church likewise has a right to expect of us the same loyalty for we are members of the District and General body. We need an increased sense of loyalty towards each other as brethren and fellow members of the Household of Faith.

Closely akin to the matter of loyalty, is this matter of Co-operation. It is not merely a matter of how much you can do. It is more important that each of us really co-operate so that we do as much as we can. I am

firmly convinced that if each of us could but feel that the whole work of the District, or of the church for that matter, would rise or fall according to our individual and personal co-operation, by the end of this new Conference year much more would be accomplished for the Kingdom than has been during the past year.

Our greatest need, yes our basic need, is for a real revival. We need a real spirit of old fashioned revival, a real Holy Ghost spirit revival. If God would be pleased to send us this kind of much needed revival we would be more interested in personally measuring up to Christ's standard of discipleship than in measuring each other. We would be more concerned about gaining souls or recruits for the Kingdom than about maintaining our personal positions in the church. We would be more concerned that Christ has His way than that we have our way. This kind of revival would strengthen our love for each other despite our differences of opinions. It would increase our charity towards each other. It would help us to forbear with each other in love. This kind of revival would take care of the problems of loyalty and co-operation. You may say, "but is it possible for us to have that kind of a revival? Yes, fellow-member of the West Virginia District, I have good news for us. God still lives and He is still on the giving hand. His word is still true. I believe that His word to Solomon applies to us even today. He said, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways: then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land."

Let us pray earnestly and work towards this kind of revival as we enter into the activities of this new Conference Year. Let us lose ourselves in Him. May we have a Spirit revitalized vision and outreach for the lost. This year, by God's Grace let us "spend and be spent" for souls and the Church. It may be our last opportunity.

Another year has past and with its passing comes the time of inventory.

This year found our Sunday School with their aims and efforts pointing forward. We have better Sunday Schools now namely, because we have consolidated our efforts. Report cards have come in in greater consistancy, accuracy, and with less pushing on our part. This we proudly say is a marked improvement over previous years. Thank you for your cooperation.

Also this year our schools have had a program, a church wide program, which makes us feel we are a part of the entire church. This program known as the "Sunday School Standard of Excellence," has given us a program with the small and the large school working together as one.

Participation in the Standard of Excellence has been wide spread with a number of our schools working parts of it at this time. However only six of our shools actually entered scoring sheets this year, mainly we feel, because of working knowledge of the program and the lateness with which they got started. We encourage and do believe its use will be improved this year.

Now to the statistical report for this year.

Our average for the conference year of 1959-1960 was 2632, for the year of 1960-1961 our average was 2616. This is a loss of 16 for the year.

We did have a noteable increase in churches that had a ten per-cent gain or more this year over last year. To the following we give recognition.

- No. 1. We recommend that the General Baptist Budget be placed at \$6,784.00 which is based on \$800 per member for 848 members.
- No. 2. We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25 cents per copy.
- No. 3. We recommend that each church, upon the visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts; churches who have under forty members, \$5.00; with forty or over raise \$7.50 per visit.
- No. 4. We recommend that No. 4 be reconsidered. That the District Budget be set at \$4,138.00 and that it be divided as follows:

- No. 5. We recommend that the District and the General Budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all Foreign Missionary Offering, Y. P. S. offering, and Evangelist pay.
- No. 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent salary be set at \$4,160.00 per year plus traveling expense at the rate of .05 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner:
- \$1,800.00 as provided for in the budget, offerings taken when he visits the churches, the half-tithe off all district pastors and evangelists except evangelists who are members of the pension plan; \$12.00 a year for all other district and local preachers, except those of the age of 65 years or over.
- No. 7. We recommend that the Superintendent's three-quarter tithe be placed in the "Incidental and Gen. Conf. Expense Fund." The three quarter tithe to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

- No. 8. We recommend that each voting member in the district be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent in by the local church treasurer, to the district treasurer. The money is to be used for the purpose of obtaining a new District Parsonage.
- No. 9. We recommend that the Supt.'s Parsonage rent be raised by taking \$80.00 per month out of the overall budget received. This to be paid as rent or on Parsonage payment if and when purchased.
- No. 10. We recommended the continuation of the District Home Mission calendar system.
- No. 11. We recommend that a charge of \$6.00 be made for all rooms for the entire Camp. We further recommend that the nightly rate be \$1.00 per room. We further recommend that a charge of 3.00 per person in Dormitories for the entire camp. And 35c for one night.
- No. 12. We recommend that a charge for meals for the entire camp be made as follows:

Inasmuch as many ministers of the District have long distances to travel to ministerial conventions thus finding it expedient to leave after the last afternoon service, be it resolved that the time in the week for ministerial conventions be as follows, the first service beginning on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 and the last service concluded at noon Thursday, and be it further resolved, that we amend Res. No. Four, Page Twenty Eight as follows, be it resolved that the date of our District Ministerial Convention be changed to the last week in March. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Since several of our Local and District Preachers pastoring churches, and should have an available address for both General and District officials, be it therefore resolved that the District minutes carry a listing of the names and addresses of all Licensed Ministers and Licensed and Ordained Deaonesses and be it further resolved that the telephone numbers of all our ministers be listed in the minutes. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Due to the excess dampness and the need for lumber for camp improvements, be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to let out contract for removal of excess trees and proper processing of lumber, to the best advantage of all concerned. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that the District Supt. on each official visit to the church sit down with the pastor and the church board to see that the budget is paid in full and that the half tithes of the pastor is paid to the District Treasurer. Carried.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

- 1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treas. monthly. Adopted.

- 1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.
 - BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.
- 1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolution Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for

- their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.
- 1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.
- 1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone anywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.

- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 16. RESOLVED, That we have an all day meeting on the 4th of July, with preaching, special singing and music, and a basket dinner, at this camp ground annually. Adopted.
- .0950—Res. 3. RESOLVED, We the Educational and Examining Board recommend that no minister upon having completed the prescribed course of study consider himself eligible for ordination nor shall he be ordained, unless he is actively engaged in the ministry. However, exceptions may be granted by the District Council according to the circumstances of the applicant.
- 1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.
- 1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

- No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.
