The 53rd Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the district camp grounds at Culloden, W. Va. August 9 at 1:30 P.M. District Superintendent, Rev. E. C. Swanson in charge. Led in the opening songs: Saviour Like a Shepherd Lead Me, We have an Anchor, and I Will Sing of My Redeemer. Rev. R. E. Grindstaff and Rev. R. D. Brown led the conference in prayer. Bro. Swanson introduced Dr. P. W. Thomas, presiding General Superintendent. 31 years ago attended first camp here. Thanked God for privilege to love and serve Him. Declares he is still a good Pilgrim. Never fought Holiness. Loves the world for which Jesus died. We can enjoy good salvation and have a bit of heaven to go to heaven in. Would please God for us to let Him have his way. The Holy Spirit knows when He is welcome. Let us make the Lord welcome.

Roll call of ministerial and lay delegates.

Conference time: Wednesday 1:30-4:30, 6:30-9:30 P.M. Thursday 8:30-11:30 A.M. 1:30 P.M. until finished.

Report of District Superintendent read and accepted with appreciation. Testimony of Rev. H. H. Harrison, Assistant Superintendent, received. Ministerial transfers of Rev. and Mrs. R. R. Hughes and Rev. R. D. Brown accepted by conference. Ordained deaconess, Mrs. R. D. Brown received into conference. Each testified to the grace of God.

The Welcoming Committee introduced Rev. Kermit Farlow, evangelist of North Carolina, Rev. R. A. Beltz, Executive Secretary Director of the Pilgrim Pension Fund and Rev. Edward Miller, pastor in Wisconsin. These were granted honorary seat in the conference bar.

Rev. R. A. Beltz given time to explain benefits of ministerial benefit association and Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Report of District Treasurer Rev. Leonard Wolfe accepted.

District Statistician report read and accepted.

Sunday School Promotional Secretary report accepted.

District Youth President's report read by the secretary in absence of the President and received.

Adjourned by expiration of time. Dismissed by Dr. Thomas.

Motion made and seconded to reconsider Resolution No. 1—Lost. Resolution No. 4 referred back to committee.

Reception committee introduced Sis. P. W. Thomas and Sis. R. A. Beltz who gave their testimonies. Given honorary seat in conference bar. Rev. and Mrs. O. F. Haynes and son of the Church of the Nazarene given seat.

Report of Ways and Means Committee. Motion made we proceed at once with the election of officers. Tellers appointed: Rev. Hughes, Ledford, Shelton, Stegel, Keenan, Eagle, Nester and Lint.

Ballots spread for election of District Superintendent. Adjourned by expiration of time.

THURSDAY MORNING 8:30 A.M.

Conference opened with singing, "When the Roll is called up Yonder." Prayer by Rev. A. L. Sybolt. Results of the balloting were as follows:

THURSDAY AFTERNOON 1:30 P. M.

Rev. R. R. Hughes led the congregation in singing, "Glory to His Name." Prayer by Rev. Ervin Patrick. Combined report of Education and Examining Boards approved.

Sis. R. R. Hughes elected District Missionary President. L. K. Davis elected to the District Building Committee for a term of two years.

Motion made and carried for council to take care of all unfinished business for the conference.

There being no further business, the 53rd conference adjourned. Dismissed by prayer by Rev. E. C. Swanson.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1. We recommend that the United Stewardship Fund be placed at \$7,120.00 which is based on \$8.00 per member for 890 members.

No. 2. We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25 cents per copy.

No. 3. We recommend that each church, upon the visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts; churches who have under forty members, \$5.00; with forty or over \$7.50 per visit.

No. 4. We recommend that the district budget be set at \$3,978.00 and be divided as follows:

No. 5. We recommend that the District and the General Budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Rally Day, all World Missionary Offering, Y.P.S. offering, and Evangelist pay.

No. 6. We recommend that District Superintendent's salary be set at \$4,160.00 per year plus traveling expense at rate of .05 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner: \$1,800 as provided for in the budget, offerings taken when he visits the churches, half-tithes of all District Pastors, and Evangelists except evangelists who are members of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, \$12.00 a year from tithes of all other district and local preachers except those of the age of 65 or over.

No. 7. We recommend that the Superintendent's full ministerial tithes be placed in the Incidental and General Conference Expense Fund. These ministerial tithes to be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

No. 8. We recommend that each voting member in the district be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent in by the local church treasurer, to the district treasurer. This money is to be used for the purpose of obtaining a new District Parsonage.

No. 9. We recommend that the Superintendent's Parsonage rent be raised

by taking \$80.00 per month out of the overall budget received. This to be paid as rent or on parsonage payment if and when purchased.

No. 10. We recommended the continuation of the District Home Mission calendar system.

No. 11. We recommend that a charge of \$6.00 be made for all rooms for the entire Camp. We further recommend that the nightly rate be \$1.00 per room. We further recommend that a charge of \$3.00 per person in dormitories for the entire camp. And 35 cents for one night.

No. 12. We recommend that a charge for meals for the entire camp be made as follows:

18 Yrs. and Over	\$4.00
Under 18	2.00
Under 2	0.00
Single Meals	.30

No charge shall be made for Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts.

No. 13. We recommend that each church send to District Treasurer for District Conference Expense \$2.00 for pastor and \$2.00 for each delegate and licensed and ordained ministers. Ordained Deaconesses and under 12 years of age meals free. Over 12 years meals 25 cents or work under direction of a committee to be appointed by council.

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE—1962

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved that the district parsonage be built on the District Camp grounds. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved that the last Saturday of camp meeting, if candidates are available, there be a baptismal service.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Be it resolved that resolution No. 16, 1949 page 21 of the 1961 Conference Minutes, henceforth, be carried out. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Whereas, The camp ground has been laid out in streets and lots, and

Whereas leases to these lots have been offered for sale over a number of years and,

Whereas many of the leases have been sold, and

Whereas some leases have been built upon, and other cottages are in the planning stage, therefore

Be it resolved that permission in writing be granted by the District Council for lease holders to live on the camp grounds,

Be it further resolved that the lease holder be required to pay for utilities and,

Be it further resolved that the District Council set the rate of payment and that the council be guided in rate setting by the size of the cottage and the number of persons occupying it.

And be it further resolved, if at the demise of the lease holder, the heirs or assigns be judged by the District Council to be persons not in harmony with the spirit, intents, and purposes of the camp, the property shall be sold as follows:

A notice shall be caused to be posed on the building by the District Council for a period of six months of intentions to sell. The property to be sold at the best available price and the proceeds of the sale to be turned over to the heirs or assigns. The council shall be required to notify the heirs or assigns at the time of posting the building, of intent to sell, by registered mail. Not more than \$50 shall be retained by the District Council for the expenses of the sale.

Tabled until next conference or until legal advice can be obtained. . . .

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that Page 21, resolution No. 4 be changed to read: that the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay and be limited to two revivals a year with financial remuneration. All other revivals be given to smaller and needy churches on the District. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 6

Be it resolved that the District Superintendent not be allowed to take any revival or camp meeting that closes within two weeks of our conference and camp date. Lost.

RESOLUTION NO. 7

Inasmuch as the churches of the Western and Capitol Youth Zones seem to be inadequately divided due to geographic location. Be it resolved that the zone divisions be adjusted by adding Huntington, Barboursville, and Nine Mile to the Capitol Zone. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 8

Resolved that this conference by a rising vote and a hearty Amen express its appreciation to our retiring District Superintendent, Rev. E. C. Swanson, for his untiring labours in our midst. Praying that God will bless him and make him a blessing as he continues to labor for the Lord. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 9

Resolved that we express our deep appreciation to our beloved General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, for his wise counsel, timely advice, spirited exhortations, and patient consideration, in conducting our Conference by a rising vote of thanks. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 10

Whereas the matter of liquor by the drink will be an open issue in the fall elections of our state, be it therefore resolved that this Conference unanimously

go on record as being firmly against so called "Liquor Control" or Liquor by the Drink. Be it also resolved that the newspapers of our state be informed of our stand. Carried.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

1961 RESOLUTION NO. 1

Be it resolved that all ministers in the District be considered for pastoral placement before any one out of the District is considered. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Inasmuch as many ministers of the District have long distances to travel to ministerial conventions thus finding it expedient to leave after the last afternoon service, be it resolved that the time in the week for ministerial conventions be as follows, the first service beginning on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 and the last service concluded at noon Thursday, and be it further resolved, that we amend Res. No. Four, Page Twenty Eight as follows, be it resolved that the date of our District Ministerial Convention be changed to the last week in March. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Since several of our Local and District Preachers pastoring churches, and should have an available address for both General and District officials, be it therefore resolved that the District minutes carry a listing of the names and addresses of all Licensed Ministers and Licensed and Ordained Deaconesses and be it further resolved that the telephone numbers of all our ministers be listed in the minutes. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Due to the excess dampness and the need for lumber for camp improvements, be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to let out contract for removal of excess trees and proper processing of lumber, to the best advantage of all concerned. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

Be it resolved that the District Supt. on each official visit to the church sit down with the pastor and the church board to see that the budget is paid in full and that the half tithes of the pastor is paid to the District Treasurer. Carried.

1920—Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treas. monthly. Adopted.

1927—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Bldg. Committee. Adopted.

1930—Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.

1930—Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.

1930—Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.

1939—Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage in a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

1939—Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolutions Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.

1943—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.

1943—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Council elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.

1943—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.

1944—Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.

1944—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.

1946—Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for our camp from now on. Adopted.

1946—Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an aggressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west and crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer

and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board for Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

1946—Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.

1946—Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone everywhere on the camp grounds, kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.

1947—Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.

1947—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.

1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.

1949—Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the women have a designated prayer room provided, open all day, if and when funds are provided. Adopted.

1950—Res. 4. BE IT RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That since so many of the churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not be applied to his present salary.

1950—Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meeting, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951—

No. 2—Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3—Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4—Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 5—That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall

show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

No. 6—That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10—Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room. Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

No. 4—Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preferences being given to a family with children.

No. 7—We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 4% into pension fund.
1954—

No. 2—Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to supervise weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955—

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year.

1956—

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2—Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3—Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4—Be it resolved that the lunch stand and registration office remain closed until the altar invitation is over. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6—Be it resolved that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. through Thursday 5:00 p.m. preceeding the camp meeting. Adopted.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our esteemed General Superintendent, Rev. Paul W. Thomas, and to the ministers and delegates to the 53rd District Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church of the West Virginia District,

Greetings in the name of Jesus, our Saviour and coming King.—

Once again, through the providence of God, we are permitted to meet in another annual Conference. A whole year has gone by since last we met like this and much has happened in this year. Things seem to move with even greater rapidity in this advancing space age than at previous times. We as a nation have put men in orbit, we have had a man travel over 4,000 miles an hour in a plane, we have detonated a hydrogen bomb in high altitude that could be seen for well over a thousand miles and we have put Telestar, that very complicated transmitting station with over fifteen thousand parts into space and have transmitted both words and pictures through it to other parts of the world and back. All of this and much more has our nation accomplished in the scientific field. However, with all this increase in knowledge, we as a nation, still do not see that our greatest need is Jesus Christ the Lord. We uncap new scandal after scandal in national government, in state government, in city governments; amongst both Democrats and Republicans. We hear of rulings by our courts that would have been unthought of two or three decades ago and we take them without much protest even from the Church. With all this we are made to wonder if this once great nation of ours, whose freedom of life and worship was paid for very dearly by the blood of many a mother's son, and whose righteous principles of life, liberty and equality were conceived under God by reverent God fearing men, has any conscience left

and if the Church has any militancy left. May God help us as a nation and may God help us as a Church. The great concern of my heart and soul is that in the midst of a fast moving age, that needs God more than ever, we who profess to have and who believe that we do have the Light and the Message that our world needs, yea, we believe that in Jesus Christ our Lord, and in His gospel we have the answer to the dark, hopelessness of the hearts of the world about us; that we should be so slow to really sense and rise to our responsibility; so slow to meet the challenge of this fast moving age with the light of the Gospel and with the living vital life-witness to the realities of true, scriptural second blessing holiness. May God forgive us for our careless slowness and may somehow God build a fire under us and in us that shall give us a true "inward-forward movement." I am praying that somehow by the help of God every true Pilgrim, on these mountains, in these valleys, in these towns and cities of West Virginia shall arise to his or her full stature and with new life and new meaning to themselves. God and the Pilgrim Holiness Church shall sing with the poet:

"A charge to keep I have, A God to glorify:
A never dying soul to save, And fit it for the sky.

To serve the present age, My calling to fulfill,—
O may it all my powers engage, To do my Master's will.

Arm me with jealous care, As in Thy sight to live:
And O, Thy servant, Lord prepare a strict account to give.

Help me to watch and pray, And on Thy-self rely,
Assured, if I my trust betray, I shall for-ever die."

Since my last report God gave us a very good camp meeting. Many expressed the feeling that it was the best camp in many years. One of the missionaries who visited several Camp Meetings last year told me later, that the days he spent at the West Virginia Camp were the best of the summer and how he appreciated the presence of God and of victory at our camp. For this we praise God and give Him the glory. You who were at the Ministerial this spring remember how the Spirit of the Lord visited us there. Some of us almost felt a bit like the disciples, like building three tabernacles and staying there, but we cannot do this, as God blesses us for a purpose, that we might go out and be a blessing to a poor sin sick world that needs our Saviour.

Improvements:

Many churches have made improvements this past year. Perhaps to top the list is the beautiful new church that the Huntington congregation have just completed. It is certainly a credit to the local group and to the pastor, Rev. Husselton who engineered the work. Williamson purchased a house alongside the church and have spent many days in remodeling it into a fine Sunday School Annex. Parkersburg So. built a fine basement Sunday School Annex last fall. Terra Alta, after much work and sacrifice, got their new auditorium nearly completed, at least to the point where they are using it. This makes a big improvement for the church there. Fayetteville put a beautiful new floor in their church. Blue Jay have laid

a fine new floor in their church. St. Marys built two nice class rooms off the side of their platform. As a result of the disastrous flood of last summer the Cinco church had to put in a whole new floor. Barboursville church is now in the process of remodeling. Vienna is just closing the transaction for a nice corner lot upon which they plan to build a new church. Len's Creek, Mt. Hope, Charleston, Coal Br. Heights, Nellis and Parkersburg Broad Street have done either some minor remodeling or redecorating. For all these improvements to these properties we thank God and express our appreciation to the Pilgrims and commend the pastors.

We have done considerable work again on the Camp grounds: but as you can see there is still much to do. According to your action last Conference we have had some of the trees cut down, but have a few more to cut close to the buildings.

The Youth work of the District has been doing well under the direction of Brother Bob Kincaid. We had a good Youth Camp with the largest enrollment yet. The Young people raised money this last year to put partitions in what has been called the girls dorm. This we feel is a big improvement and has been needed for some time. I believe with all my heart that we should do our best for the Youth work, for our young people are the hope of our Church. Let us do our best to tie them to the Church and help them to walk with the Lord.

In our home missionary work this year we suffered a bit of a reverse in that due to finances we had to withdraw any District support of the Morgantown mission. However, Bro. Sebree and the good people up there are still carrying on by the help of the Lord. Both Bluefield and Dunbar suffered some reverses this year, but I believe they will both come out of it to final victory. We must keep on with our home missionary work. Our only hope as a District is to get into some more of the needy fields. All of this takes money. We cannot cut off the support of the new churches too soon and yet we must go forward to still new areas. Let us pray, work and give to this end.

I do not have all the annual reports in, but what I do have it looks as if we may just about break even with last year in our Sunday School attendance. It also looks as if for the first time in several years we may have a small gain in church membership. For what gains we may have we thank God. However let us promise God that we will try to do better this coming year.

The Future:

I believe that we should set some goals for this coming year. We ought to strive for at least a 5% gain in church membership. That would be just a little over a one member gain per church. We should make a goal of 200 gain in Sunday School. This would only be a gain of one scholar per Sunday School class. Certainly these goals are not out of reach. I think that we should also re-emphasize the matter of fasting and praying. We had urged you as pastors and churches to have one meal a week set aside as a time for fasting and prayer. I think that we should take this seriously. Our greatest need of all is the spiritual need. The need of having God lead us and of having His blessing upon us. If we have this I am convinced we will make some progress; we will love each other, we will work together in a co-operative spirit and God will be glorified.

We are entering upon a new year. Let us fervently ask God to enlarge our vision, to lengthen our outreach for the lost and to increase our fervor and zeal for His Kingdom. This could be the last year that some, or all of us may have to work for the Master and the church. Let us spend and be spent for Souls and the Church. Let us give our very best to serve this present age.

We have come to the time once again to report to this conference on the work of our Sunday Schools.

This has been a year of encouragement and some discouragements. Some of our schools have continued in a consistent growth and some have not.

One bright spot in our Sunday School work in the district, was the receipt of a general church award at the General Conference, at Wiona Lake. This consisted of a ribbon for a 20% plus gain during the past quadranium. We came in fourth in the ratings in all organized districts. This we consider a major achievement.

Our average for 1959-1960 was 2,265, our average for 1961-1962 was 2,355. This gives us an overall gain of 90 for the present conference year. Part of our difficulty of this close margin was due to the closing of two schools.

Twelve of our schools made gains this year, of these twelve we had eight schools with a ten percent gain or better. We wish to give recognition to them now with proper awards to follow in our Sunday School Service.
