CONFERENCE MINUTES

The 54th Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the district camp grounds at Culloden, W. Va., Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 P. M. with Rev. Parker Husselton, District Superintendent, in charge. Rev. Paul Sebree led in singing the opening song, What a Friend we have in Jesus. Rev. L. S. Steele led the conference in prayer. Devotions consisted of the quoting of scriptures. Dr. William Neff, presiding officer, was introduced to the conference by the District Superintendent. Dr. Neff told us that God has taken many on to Glory and a great host is waiting over there. He enjoys coming to W. Va. to renew friendships and to fellowship with us. He explained that he is here because Rev. P. W. Thomas is in England. Dr. Neff told us of five things that we need.

- No. 1. We need the Lord to come down in showers of blessings.
- No. 2. We need a clean mind.
- No. 3. We need to keep our hearts warm.
- No. 4: We need a good spirit in our midst.
- No. 5. We need the Holy Spirit to guide us.

Dr. Neff stated that he appreciated the laymen who loved God and the church enough to be here and that we must not forget to be diligent in business. He further stated that all of life must be under the reign of Christ and that the same spirit that brooded over the first conference will brood over us.

Roll call of ministerial and lay delegates.

The following ministers were received into the conference subject to the receiving of their respective transferes: Rev. John Abernathy, Rev. Mary Chapman, Rev. Noel Davis, Rev. Dwight Horn and Rev. Edward Miller.

Conference bar was set for the first ten seats of the east section of the tabernacle.

Report of District Superintendent, Rev. Parker Husselton, read and received with gratitude.

Oral report of Assistant Superintendent, Rev. H. H. Harrison, received.

Report of Sunday School Promotional Secretary, Rev. R. E. Grindstaff, read and received.

Treasurer's report read by Rev. Leonard Wolfe. Motion made and carried we receive this report

Rev. Bob Kincaid, District Youth President's report read and accepted.

Rev. Paul Sebree, District Statistician's report read and received.

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE - 1963

RESOLUTION NO. 1

Inasmuch as the Sunday School Promotional Secretary is a part of the general Sunday School program, be it resolved that his term of office run currently with the district fiscal year and his appointment be made at least 30 days prior to July first, thus making it possible for him to attend the General Sunday School and Youth meeting held each year. Adopted.

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved, that in the event of the death of any of our district ministers or their wives the district secretary notify all pastory by telephone. Carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Resolution No. 3, relative to district minutes tabled.

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be it resolved that the division of the District into zones for the purpose of Youth Zone Rallies be as follows: Carried.

CAPITOL ZONE - Charleston, Nellis, Cinco, Spring Fork, Coal Branch Heights, Gallagher, Lens Creek, Three Mile and Dunbar.

WESTERN ZONE - Huntington, Nine Mile, Wayne, Point Pleasant, and Barboursville.

SOUTH WESTERN ZONE - Williamson, Logan, and Baileysville.

CENTRAL ZONE - Fayetteville, Summerlee, Blue Jay, Mullens, and Mt. Hope.

SOUTHERN ZONE - Bluefield, Bramwell, O'Toole, and Lortons Lick.

EASTERN ZONE - Cuzzart, Clarksburg, Terra Alta, and Morgantown.

NORTHERN ZONE - Parkersburg (Broad St), Parkersburg (South), Ravenswood, Vienna, and St. Mary's.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1. We recomment that the United Stewardship Fund be placed at \$7,072 which is based on \$8.00 per member for 884 members.

No. 2. We recommend that the District Minutes be sold at 25¢ per copy.

No. 3. We recommend that each church, upon the visit of the District Superintendent, raise the following amounts: Churches who have under forty members, \$5.00; with forty or over, \$7.50 per visit.

No. 4. We recomment that the District Budget be set at \$3,900.00 and be

be divided as follows:

District Home Missions	500.00
Incidental & Gen. Conference	. 200.00
District Camp and Conference	. 400.00
District Sunday School	. 100.00

No. 5. We recomment that the District and the General Budget be raised in the following manner: Each church shall send the District Treasurer, the first of each month, 10% of the income of the church and Sunday School except money raised for Building Fund, Easter Offering, November Self-Denial, Sunday School Ra ly Day, all World Missionary Offering, Y.P.S. offering and Evangelist pay.

No. 6. We recommend that the District Superintendent's salary be set at \$4,160.00 per year plus traveling expenses at the rate of .05 per mile. This money to be raised in the following manner: \$2,100.00 as provided for in the budget, offerings taken when he visits the churches, half-tithes of all District pastors, and evangelists except evangelists who are members of the Pilgrim Pension Plan, \$12.00 a year from tithes of other district and local preachers except those of the age of 65 or over

No. 7. We recommend that the Superintendent's full ministerial tithes be placed in the Incidental and General Conference Expense Fund. These ministerial tithes be in addition to the already stipulated amount for this fund.

No. 8. We recommend that each voting member be assessed \$1.00 per year. This money is to be sent by the local church treasurer. This money is to be divided equally between the district parsonage and district camp and conference accounts.

No. 9. We recommend that the District Parsonage payment be raised by taking \$80.00 a month out of the over-all budget and be paid on same.

No. 10. We recommend the continuation of the District Home Missions calendar system.

No. 11. We recommend that a charge of 6.00 for all rooms except the rooms with 4 beds — these are to be 10.00. We further recommend the nightly rate to be 1.00 per room. We further recommend that a charge of 3.00 per person in dormitories for the entire camp and .35 for one night.

No. 12. We recommend that a charge for meals for the entire camp be as follows:

18 Yrs. and Over\$4.	00
Under 18	00
Under 2 No char	ge
Single Meals	30

No charge shall be made for ordained and licensed ministers from other Districts.

No. 13. We recommend that each church send to District Treasurer for District Conference Expense \$2.00 for pastor and \$2.00 for each delegate and licensed and ordained ministers and Ordained Deaconesses. Under 12 years of age meals free. Over 12 years, meals .25 or work under direction of committee to be appointed by council.

A recommendation of the examining and educational board to ordain Rev. Eugene White was accepted by the conference.

RESOLUTION NO. 4. Carried over from last year.

Whereas, The camp ground has been laid out in streets and lots, and

Whereas leases to these lots have been offered for sale over a number of years, and

Whereas, many of the leases have been sold, and

Whereas some leases have been built upon, and other cottages are in the planning stage, therefore

Be it resolved that permission in writing be granted by the district Council for lease holders to live on the camp grounds.

Be it further resolved that the lease holder be required to pay for utilities and,

Be it further resolved that the District Council set the rate of payment and that the council be guided in rate setting by the size of the cottage and the number of persons occupying it.

And be it further resolved that if at the demise of the lease holder, the heirs or assigns be judged by the District Council to be persons not in harmony with the spirit, intents, and purposes of the camp, the property shall be sold as follows:

A notice shall be caused to be posted on the building by the District Council for a period of six months of intentions to sell. The property to be sold at the best available price and the proceeds of the sale to be turned over to the heirs or assigns. The council shall be required to notify the heirs or assigns at the time of posting the building, of intent to sell, by registered mail. Not more than \$50 shall be retained by the District Council for the expenses of the sale.

The resolution was ammended that paragraph five read as follows:

Be it resolved that permission in writing be granted by the District Council for retired and disabled ministers to live on the camp grounds. Ammendment to the resolution carried, resolution as ammended carried. Moved that we have the election of officers in the evening session following the report of the examining and educational boards.

Adjourned by expiration of time.

Report of the District Auditing Committee received.

Rev. L. B. Reese, camp evangelist introduced to conference.

Motion made and supported that all unfinished business be referred to council.

Dr. William Neff given rising vote of appreciation for the splendid manner in which he conducted our conference.

After a very impressive ordination service, there being no further business, the conference was dismissed in prayer by Rev. Eugene White.

Immediately following the conference the new district parsonage, recently erected on the camp grounds was dedicated by Dr. William Neff. Rev. L. B. Reese prayed the dedicatorial prayer.

DISTRICT LEGISLATION

- 1920-Res. 10. BE IT RESOLVED, That all district assessments be sent to the District Treas. monthly. Adopted.
- 1927-Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That no pastor shall build, repair or buy a church or parsonage where more than \$1,000.00 is involved, without the consent of the District Bldg. Committee. Adopted.
- 1930-Res. 2. BE IT RESOLVED, That each local church pay expenses of their pastor and delegates to the district conference. Adopted.
- 1930-Res. 3. RESOLVED, That the District defray the expenses of the district secretary and district treasurer, if other than a pastor, to the district assembly.
- 1930-Page 10. Moved and seconded that when it becomes necessary to have the Assistant District Superintendent visit churches, in case he does not receive expenses, the District Superintendent pay his expense and charge it up to his expense account. Carried.
- 1939-Res. 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That no preacher of the district shall engage a revival on the same date of District Camp without permission from the District Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That all preachers in the district will be present at the district camp to offer their aid and help in any way they can, unless sickness or death, or some other essential reason, shall prevent; or that they have permission to be absent, from the District Superintendent. Adopted without dissent.

- 1939-Res. 8. BE IT RESOLVED, That all resolutions possible be handed to the Resolutions Committee as early before the assembly convenes as can be arranged. Adopted.
- 1943-Res. 4. RESOLVED, That the District Council appoint a children's worker to conduct children's meetings each day during camp. Adopted.
- 1943-Res. 6. RESOLVED, That the District Ccuncil elect a Sunday school board of four, including the Sunday School Director. Adopted.
- 1943-Res. 7. RESOLVED, That the Conference recommend that the local church pay the Ministerial Benefit fee and assessment for their pastor and his wife. Adopted.
- 1944-Res. 1. RESOLVED, That this Conference recommend and urge each church financially able, to build a cottage on the camp grounds for their pastor, to be used and known as their "Camp Meeting Parsonage." Adopted.
- 1944-Res. 2. RESOLVED, That "No Smoking" signs be placed conspicuously throughout the camp grounds. Adopted.

- 1946-Res. 6. RESOLVED, That we call two evangelists and special singers for for our camp. Adopted.
- 1946-Res. 10. Seeing there is great need of an agressive Home Missionary Program in this District,

RESOLVED, That we divide the district into three zones, as follows: A Southern Zone comprised of all territory south of a line running due east and west and crossing the state at Mt. Hope; a Central Zone including all territory north of above mentioned line to U. S. Route 33 (Mount Hope to be in this zone); and a Northern Zone including all territory north of U. S. Route 33.

This Board shall function separately from the District Council and shall be amendable to the District Council between conferences, and shall make a complete report of its activities to the Conference.

Further, each board member shall have the privilege of visiting each church in his respective zone once a year in the interest of home missions, and shall have the privilege of taking an offering upon his visit, which offering shall be forwarded by the local church treasurer to the district treasurer and applied solely on District Home Missions. All monies received by the district treasurer for home missions shall be at the disposal of the home missionary board. All money raised by this Board of Home Missions shall be exempt from the 10% budget plan. Adopted.

- 1946-Res. 13. RESOLVED, That we change the date of our Camp to the first Thursday after the first Sunday in August, and that we change our fiscal year from July 15 to June 30, to become effective in 1949. Adopted.
- 1946-Res. 15. RESOLVED, That the bell be tapped at 6 o'clock during our camp, calling the people to prayer, and that everyone everywhere on the camp grounds kneel in prayer just where they are. Adopted.
- 1947-Res. 2. RESOLVED, That the District Superintendent appoint a matron for the women's dormitories, and a monitor (man) for the men's dormitories and sleeping quarters, to keep order and sanitation. Also that he employ a janitor to keep the tabernacle and grounds clean during the camp. Adopted.
- 1947-Res. 4: RESOLVED, That the district make provisions to pay the District Superintendent's ministerial benefit. Adopted.
- 1949—Res. 4. RESOLVED, That all having rooms or beds in the dormitories, who desire to do any cooking, be required to use electric hot plates only (no open flames or stoves allowed). Adopted.
- 1950-Res. 4. BE IT RESLOVED, That the District Superintendent be allowed two weeks vacation with pay each year, at such times as he may desire, providing it does not interfere with his slate for quarterly meetings; BE IT FUR-THER RESOLVED, That since so many churches of our district allow their pastors to hold two revivals a year away from their own churches, that we allow our District Superintendent the privilege of holding two meetings a year and the offerings from these meetings not to be applied to his present salary.

1950-Res. 11. We urge our churches when calling workers for revival and camp meetings, to call preachers of the P. H. C.

1951-

No. 2-Whereas: we are failing to get our District Church Extension needs before the people, be it resolved, that the district church extension and the general church extension be jointly represented in our camp meetings and any offerings raised be equally divided between our District and our General Church Departments.

No. 3-Be it resolved that each pastor secure a subscription list to the Advocate equal to his church membership.

No. 4-Be it resolved that report blanks be provided for our missionary societies, and that quarterly and yearly reports be made by said societies.

No. 5—That each person registering be given a meal ticket which they shall show upon entering the dining room, and that said card shall entitle the bearer to free meals.

No. 6-That all Ordained and Licensed ministers from other Districts be entertained free of charge, however, the regular charge shall be made for private rooms.

No. 10-Whereas: all of our organized districts make it a practice of furnishing the camp Evangelists and workers with a worker's table in the dining room, Therefore, be it resolved that our camp dining room be furnished with a table for this purpose.

No. 4-Whereas: There has always been a shortage of rooms, and several names on the waiting list, and, whereas the rooms belong to the district and not to the party who has rented it, therefore be it resolved that from now on anyone leaving the district or for any other reason has no further need for a room, shall turn their key into the office so the room can be rented to someone on the waiting list, with preference being given to a family with children.

No. 7-We recommend that all evangelists and actively engaged workers who tithe into their local church, said church shall pay the 5% into pension fund.

1954 -

No. 2-Whereas the District Superintendent needs more time to superivse weak churches and carry on other work of the District, therefore be it resolved that he visit the churches twice each year instead of four times.

1955—

No. 1—Whereas the tithe of each Young People's Society of the district has not been sufficient to pay the Executive Secretary's expenses, and other necessary costs involved; BE IT RESOLVED: that the Young People of the District run the refreshment stand, under the supervision of a paid capable manager appointed by the council, and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the profits go into the District Youth treasury.

Resolution No. 4—Whereas our district has received and is receiving money from the estate of the late A. V. Conklin, be it resolved: that all money received from this estate be placed in a fund known as the "C. L. Fund." This fund to be used only and absolutely for the sole purpose of constructing new churches in our district, as recommended by the Home Mission Board and approved by District Council. Any church or group securing a loan from this fund shall repay said loan from this fund in quarterly installments bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year. 1956-

Resolution No. 1—Be it resolved that our district use the report blanks that are provided by the general church. Adopted.

Resolution No. 2-Be it resolved that the pastor's half tithe be paid through the local church treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 3-Be it resolved that the local church treasurer send copies of the financial report to the district treasurer. Adopted.

Resolution No. 4-Be it resolved that lunch the stand and registration office remain closed until altar invitation is over. Adopted.

Resolution No. 6-Be it resolved that our district conference convene on Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. through Thursday 5:00 p.m. preceeding the camp meeting. Adopted.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To our highly esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, delegates, fellow ministers and friends, to the fifty fourth annual Conference of the West Virginia District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church,

Greetings in the Name of our Wonderful Lord. -

This has been a rear of travel, of getting acquainted, of making adjustments, a year of meeting our pastors and the people, as well as facing our problems, and by God's gracious assistance, making some progress.

It has been a wonderful year as wife and I have traveled over our beautiful state meeting the Godly Pilgrims and faithful pastors, and have had the presence and protection of the Lord with us; we have felt and have seen the workings of the Holy Spirit.

We appreciate very highly the love and kindness shown us as we visited the churches and the pastors in their homes. We have felt a spirit of love and unity and cooperation among the pastors and the people.

It would be misleading to report that we have accomplished all that we desired, but we feel that we should like to acknowledge God's help, assistance and blessings, on the people and the churches. Without the faithful labors of the dedicated pastors and laity of the West Virginia District, our hands would have been tied. It has been through your work of faith, and labor of love, and patience of hope, that we have been able to make some progress.

TEMPORAL PROGRESS

The District Council followed out the instructions given them by the Conference last year, and many of you have already seen and visited the lovely new district parsonage, which has been constructed on the camp grounds under their direction.

Also almost completed is the much needed and very adequate Prayer Chapel and Children's Chapel, that God has seen fit to permit us to have. This fine building is located just above the District parsonage. Surely God must want us to fill this building this year with eager children and praying adults.

While reporting on Camp Ground improvements we should now make mention of the new roof installed on the lunch room, on the kitchen, and dining room; this work was done free of charge, the labor and material both being furnished by Elmer Browning of Logan. The Capitol Zone raised funds in their meetings this year for the improvements made on the rest rooms. More such improvements are to follow. The boys' dorm (so called) upper floor has been divided into rooms, and has been furnished with many new springs and mattresses, which has been much needed for Youth Camp. Some painting and repair has been done on the grounds and much more needs to be done.

If you would care to look over the hill you will see a fine garden of vegetables and corn growing instead of weeds and sprouts. This hard work has been done by a local friend of the camp, without any cost to the district. The state road department has donated and installed a fine directional sign located on route sixty. Huntington First Church has donated a nice sign located in the front of the Camp Ground. The lunch stand received some much needed equipment — a large electric fry pan, and a large electric refrigerator. This was donated by the Barboursville church. A new and adequate water system is being installed, and plans are developing that will supply this camp with pure, fresh water.

DISTRICT BUILDINGS

A new, lovely, well constructed church has been completed and dedicated at Vienna this year. Much credit, under God, goes to Rev. L. C. Haynes for his leadership in this progress.

A basement church has been completed and dedicated at Morgantown. The new pastor, Rev. Noel Davis, is on the field full time. Prospects are good for an early organization of this new work. Rev. Paul Sebree will be rewarded for his faithful labors and leadership that makes this possible.

The Logan congregation has decided to relocate and build a new church in the near future and efforts are being made to secure sufficient lots for this purpose. Rev. John Nester is the pastor here who is furnishing leadership for this development.

Rev. Ralph Burch, pastor at Barboursville, with his fine people, have just lately completed the remodeling of their church building. This speaks of faith for the future.

Wayne church, with Rev. Cecil Niswander as pastor, are giving their church building a real face lifting. This also speaks of life, interest, and plans for the future.

The Charleston congregation, with their good pastor, Rev. R. D. Brown, have made some real fine improvements on their church building this year which would have to be seen to be fully appreciated.

Several other churches, namely, Bluefield, Nine Mile, Cuzzart, Mt. Hope, Lorton's Lick, and others, have made necessary and minor improvements which indicate progress

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS

Our District Youth President, Rev. Bob Kincaid, will give a full report of Youth Work of the District, which is a very important arm of the church. The District Youth Camp which closed just last month, was reported to have been the best attended ever. Over fifty young people came and camped and studied and prayed, who were first timers at this camp. The teachers and councellors were from among the best pastors in our district. The spiritual tide rose high, with seekers at the night services finding forgiveness and help. Some estimated the total seekers about seventy in four night services. To God be all the Glory.

The Sunday School Department has been under the leadership of Rev. Richard Grindstaff, who has certainly done a splendid piece of work in getting together and publishing each month the state and attendance of our Sunday Schools. In this Conference you will learn further of our gains or losses in S. S. attendance. This year several of the pastors have reported seekers in their Sunday School sessions. This is a wonderful goal to keep before us.

REVIVALS

Several churches reported good revivals this year. We all know that this is the answer to most of our problems. God can and will give us this week in this camp a real spiritual awakening, if we will fast, if we will pray, if we will believe and act. Greetings:

Senator Charles W. Tobey of New Hampshire, a member of the famous Senate Crime Investigation Committee shocked the nation with these words, "Since the earliest days of our nation, the Sunday school has stood as a mighty bulwark against evil. It stands today as a rebuke to those who worship the God of the flesh and material things." Oh, how we need to give more attention to the work of our Sunday school!

This having been my first year as your promotional secretary I have had lots of things to learn. My predecessor left the District and didn's leave me with a "do it easy plan". I have had lots of advice, but little example.

It has been a very hard year due to one of the worst winters in the history of West Virginia. Floods closed down some of the schools for some time. However, the Lord has been among the "candle sticks". We have seen Him behind the lattice showing Himself now and then, for which we are very thankful.

Fourteen of our churches were able to come forth with a gain for the year. Our total average for the conference year was 2,263 or an average of 65 per church. Reports have come in very good, in fact, we have about 96 percent of the churches reporting for the year.

Now I would like to make a few recommendations for this year.

1. I recommend that the appointment of your Promotional Secretary be made early enough for him to be able to plan to go to the General Sunday School and Youth meeting.

3. I recommend that this year we set as our goal 3,000 average attendance in the West Virginia District.

4. I further recommend that each pastor sit down with his Sunday school staff and set some goals for their church this year. When this is done, send your goals to your Promotional Secretary who in return will make note of your progress from time to time during this year.
