

We thank God that we are privileged to meet again in the capacity of this District conference to do business for God and for the churches of the Western Ohio District. We invite the blessed Holy Spirit to be in our midst today, and may He be our helper and instructor in all that we may do or say. May all be done for the glory of God!

I deeply enjoyed the beautiful spirit of fellowship among God's people, on my visits to the different churches. I had completed my first appointment to all of the churches, and was well started on the second round of visits, when, as you all know, I became ill. The members of the District council so graciously came to my rescue, and helped me bear the greater part of the load. May God richly bless and reward them for all they have done to help me.

With deep sincerity, I wish to thank all pastors, lay members, and friends for the prayers, cards, gifts and everything you have done to help me back to health again. God has heard and answered prayer, for which we are grateful, and we think of the writings of the apostle Paul, when he said, "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory; while we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal." 2 Corinthians 4:17, 18.

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS:

Many of our churches have reported good revivals and times of refreshing from the skies. There have been gains in same places in Sunday School and church membership, while others suffered some loss. Our young people's executive secretary; editor of our youth paper and Sunday School promotinal secretary, have each done good work in their respective field of labor. BUDGETS:

May we continue the good work.

HOME MISSIONS:

Our great forward movement of the Pilgrim Holiness church has been launched, and we are supporting it one hundred percent. We need workers of great spiritual vision who will open up new Sunday schools and preaching points.

The churches that many of our men are pastoring today, are the results of some former pastors prayers, sacrifice and hard work.

IMPROVEMENTS:

Arcanum, Rev. J. W. Smack, pastor, has remodeled their church, with complete change in contour of the building; nursery and youth auditorium; new heating unit; church office and pastors study. Total cost, \$13,000.

Dayton Greenwich village, Rev. R. W. Shope, pastor, has completed their addition of S. S. rooms to the rear of the church, added a vestibule entrance purchased lot next to church and bought a church bus.

Dayton Westwood, Kev. Harold Monroe, pastor, has purchased a completely modern 1½ story frame and stone parsonage, with attached garage, black top side drive, and full basement. Cost \$15,625.

Hicksville, I he people here, with Brother Payton, have purchased a church building, moved it to a well located lot; concreted the basement; made many repairs on the building, and drilled a new well.

Leipsic, Rev. Clarence Hamm, pastor, completely redecorated the inside of their seven room parsonage, and built new steps to from porch.

Liberty Center, Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, pastor, the Pilgrims here are in the process of building an extremely nice church building; basement is finished, and bricks are purchased for super structure. The young people have purchased a school bus for Sunday school.

Lima First, Rev. J. B. Zeits, pastor, the people here are now completing the project of enlarging the church, with full basement, new gas heating plant, and secured a Sunday school bus.

Maud, Rev. Eugene Sohn, pastor, has redecorated the church building, inside and out; built new inside stair way to basement; lowered pulpit platform and bought new carpeting for church.

New Madison, Rev. F. H. Baker, pastor, completing basement with four Sunday school rooms, and new gas furnace.

North Bend, Rev. V. C. Sharp, pastor, Has redecorated inside of church, purchased new rug, lights and stove, and secured S. S. bus.

Piqua, Rev. Garvin Sheridan, pastor, is in the process of building a lovely new parsonage. The building is framed up to the ceiling joists. The project thus far, is debt free.

Sidney, Rev. Otto Bennett, pastor, these Pilgrims purchased a well located lot, and are now completing a nice cement block church building, complete with new pews and pulpit furnishings.

St. Marys, Rev. Rudolph Moore, pastor, has converted the church coal furnace to gas. Purchased a lovely 3 bedroom parsonage, completely redecorated the house, placed cabinets in kitchen and installed gas furnace. Cost \$9,000.

Troy, Rev. Floyd Beldon, pastor, has redecorated inside of church, installed new lights, built new steps and side walk.

West Carrollton, Rev. R. T. Powell, pastor, Has remodeled basement of church, installed new gas furnace, finished four S. S. rooms, and covered floor with asphalt tiling. Also, completed a beautiful new brick seven room parsonage with attached garage.

First Sitting, Wednesday Morning, July 18, 1956

The Second Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 A. M. with an excellent delegation present.

Sixth Sitting Thursday Evening

The Conference was brought to order by Rev. Melvin Snyder leading the Conference in the singing of the hymn, "What A Friend We Have In Jesus." The Lord was graciously present as Rev. R. T. Powell led in prayer.

Motion made and carried that the reading of the minutes of the previous sitting

be omitted.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

Rev. Harold Monroe read to the Western Conference the proposal of the Eastern Conference as to the settlement of the property on Sugar Grove Camp Grounds. Rev. Monroe then read the Western Council's counter proposal.

Motion made and carried that we accept the Western Council's recommendation. Motion made and carried that the Council of the Western Ohio District be authorized to investigate fully and thoroughly the matter of Camp Ground Settlement and report to the Western Ohio Conference of 1957 as to their findings.

Motion made and carried that an expression of sentiment be made as to how the Conference feels toward selling or staying on the present Camp Ground site by either

a display of hands or a standing expression.

Very few cared to express themselves in either way.

Committee appointments read.

The recommendation of the Examining Board was read and accepted by the Conference.

The Resolutions Committee reported.

Motion made and carried that all unfinished business be referred to the Western District Council.

Motion made and carried that the Conference express their appreciation to Rev. Melvin Snyder by a standing vote of Thanks and a liberal love offering.

Motion made and carried that the Conference Secretary send greetings and our prayers for complete restoration to our General Superintendent, Rev. Wm. Neff.

Motion made and carried to adjourn. Rev. Melvin Snyder dismissed the Conference in prayer.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 Appreciation

A. Be it resolved:

That we extend to our Assistant General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this Conference.

- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun and Rev. E. R. Overman for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our District Secretary.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 2 Budgets

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District and General Interests, and said cards be forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- That all money raised in the local church for District or General Budget be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 3 Euilding Committee

Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages aren't up to the standard required by the State, therefore be it resolved that: A committee of three be appointed to act as a Building Committee whose duty shall be as follows:

- To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.
- To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- No church can buy or build without the approval of this committee and a written consent from the District Council.

No. 4 Camp

- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Secretary, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp, furnish their own linen.
- C. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp secretary.
- D. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 5 Combined Camp

Be it resolved that we ask the Eastern District to remain in a combined camp for a period of at least three to five years.

No. 6 Conference.

Be it resolved that we provide services for children during Conference.

No. 7 Conference Year

- Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 10th. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District
- Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 8 Daily Vacation Bible School

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School in their churches.

No. 9 Decease of Minister or Wife

Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or ministers wife of the District, that the District Secretary be given the information immediately; and that he notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmon and that they immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred.

No. 10 District Council

Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members; these being the District Superintendent, the assistant District Superintendent, secretary, treasurer, and five elective members, with seven members making a quorum.

No. 11 District Paper

Inasmuch as mid-year action taken by the District Council changing the Pilgrim Youth Paper to the "Western Builder" making it a district project, including Sunday School and Youth interests has met with general approval:

Be it resolved that this project be ratified by this Conference; authorizing the District Council to provide a Managing Editor to supervise the paper who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Youth Editor, as well as promoting District interests.

No. 12 Home Missionary Service

Inasmuch as our District Home Missions program has been defined as the 'weak link' of our Church:

Be it resolved that the resolution conditionally adopted by the Eastern Ohio Conference be adopted by this Conference;

That our camp schedule be arranged to provide one afternoon service for Foreign Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions.

No. 13 Incorporation

Whereas we have been advised by the Exective Council of the Pilgrim Holiness Church that the Articles of Incorporation of the Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church which were filed October 1, 1928 under Corporation Number 133145 do not meet the requirements of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church and are inadequate since the division of the Ohio District into two districts in 1955.

Be it therefore resolved that this Conference empower the District Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Secretary and the District Trustees to incorporate the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. They are hereby empowered to secure legal counsel, sign all necessary documents and approve the articles of Incoporation and Constitution for the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, as submitted to this Conference and approved hereby, subject to the regulations as set forth in Section 95, Page 54 of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and notice of any meeting required by law to adopt said Constitution is hereby waived by the members of this Conference.

Be it further resolved that they take these steps immediately so that the unfinished business concerning the division of the Ohio District into the Western Ohio District and the Eastern Ohio District can be completed.

No. 14 Ministers

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study; therefore be it resolved that the local prachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 15 Ministerial Benefit Association

A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.

B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 16 Ministerial Convention

A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.

B. The date of said institute shall begin on the Monday following the first Sunday

of March and continue through Wednesday of that week.

C. The location of this should be as nearly central as possible.

No. 17 Missions

A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.

B. This committee shall direct the efforts of a corps of ministers cooperating in Home Missionary Projects.

2. Each Minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.

D. This cimmittee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.

E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.

7. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.

G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Treasurer of this committee.

H. We also recommend that this committee investigate the advisability of building one or more folding Church Trailers.

No. 18 Name of Church

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 19 Ordination

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

A. Be it resolved that the examining board meet at least ten days prior to the conven-

ing of the District Conference.

B. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.

. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night of

Conference.

No. 20 Owosso Bible College

Inasmuch as the Board of Trustees of Owosso Bible College has adopted a re organizational plan whereby the official control of the College is vested in a Board of Trustees equally representing the entire school zone, Be it Resolved that the Western Ohio Conference approve said reorganizational plan by electing one Trustee of Owosso Bible College for each six hundred members as specified by the revised By-Laws of the College. Be it further Resolved that the terms of office of said Trustees need be fixed in such a manner that hereafter only one Trustee need be elected each year except when membership increase calls for the election of additional Trustees.

No. 21 Pastors

- A. Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extended a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- B. To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost if living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- D. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and incuding the second Sunday after Camp.
- F. Inasmuch as moving Pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage due to varied facilities:

Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church-owned parsonages.

No. 22 Salaries

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 23 Standards

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resloved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television; Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 24 Summer Harvest Gathering

Since the cost of food is such an enormous item in this camp and conference; therefore be it resolved that on the first Friday of the Camp at the 10:30 meeting, we have a Summer Harvest Gathering for the Camp asking each church to cooperate by bringing in produce, canned goods and meats.

No. 25 Sunday School Promotion

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School Committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School Committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to co-operate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee or board be appointed by the council, and that the superintendents be members of said board.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Convention be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.

- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee present a plan of financing the Sunday School Institute to this Conference.

No. 26 Superintendent

- Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 27 Tithe

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 28 Voting

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 29 Youth Camp

Inasmuch as unforeseen circumstances prohibited the execution of action taken by the 1955 Annual Conference authorizing the institution of a one-week youth camp; Be it resolved that a Youth camp be conducted on the camp ground in 1957, details of which shall be worked out by the District Youth Committee, subject to the approval of the District Council.

No. 30 Youth Conference

Inasmuch as the District Conference precedes the Youth Conference; Be it resolved that the District Council be authorized to act upon any action taken by the Youth Conference.

No. 31 Youth Council

Be it resolved that the District Youth Committee consist of the District Superintendent, the Executive Youth Secretary, the Youth Editor, and the District Youth Treasurer.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

As Adopted by the Conference

BUDGET

No. 1 General Budget

A. We recommend that the Manual provision for the General Budget be adopted by our conference as follows:

Total—\$6.00 Per member per year 35% or \$2.10 for Foreign Missions

25% or \$1.50 for General Administration

20% or \$1.20 for General Church Extension

10% or .60 for Senior College Fund

6% or .36 for Church Extension Loan Fund

.24 for General Sunday School Extension and Youth Work

If the local church does not properly divide the money, the District treasurer is authorized to do so. No church is permitted to specify funds until its monthly quota for general interests is paid.

B. We recommend that the general budget be raised monthly in the Sunday School

or church, taking any Sunday thought best for the offering.

C. Be it resolved that we request the General Board to send a deputational worker to visit our local churches and assist the pastor in raising the Conference Home Missionary and General Budget Funds.

No. 2 District Budget

A. Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that all gross receipts of the local church, excepting General Church Budget, Conference, Home Missionary funds, evangelistic support, and building funds, be tithed, the same to be forwarded to the conference treasurer.

3. Be it resolved that we raise 15c per member per year to take care of the General

Conference expense.

C. Be it resolved that each church raise at least \$1.00 per member per year for our

zone school.

- D. Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member per year, in addition to all birthday offerings, be raised annually to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- E. Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member per year, to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, the same to be applied on the upkeep of the camp grounds.

. Be it resolved that each church raise the equivalent of 50c per member per year to

liquidate the district parsonage indebtedness.

G. Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

No. 3 Newly Organized Churches

A. Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

B. Be it further resolved that the district budget be paid monthly.

No. 4 Camp and Conference

A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the

financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.

B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

C, Be it resolved that all minister's wives shall be subject to call to give one day's

work in the kitchen or dining room.

- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. We recommend that all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

No. 5 District Home Missions

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer, and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the annual budget but each church will receive credit for it in their annual report.

MINISTER'S DUTIES

No. 6 Minister's Duties

A. Resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local churches.

MINUTES

No. 7 Cost of Minutes

Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be 50c per copy.

No. 8 Preparing Minutes for Publication

Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at th close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for his services.

SALARIES

No. 9 District Superintendent

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$3,900.00, 6c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.

B. The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

No. 10 District Council

We recommend that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized district work.

No. 11 District Treasurer and Secretary

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's salary be \$500.00, and the District Secretary's salary be \$200.00.

No. 12 Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 13 Educational and Examining Committee

Be it resolved that the Educational and Examining Committee be given \$65.00 per member per year, plus 6c per mile for travel authorized by this conference or the District Council.

No. 14 Sinking Fund

In order that funds may be available when it becomes necessary to either add facilities on the present grounds or establish new grounds located in the Eastern Ohio District; Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church of the conference for this fund.

The time of said offering shall be set by the Council.

No. 15 Sunday School Institute

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute;

Furthermore we urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

TREASURER

No. 16 Auditing of Treasurer's Books

Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the Annual Conference.

No. 17 Insuring the Treasurer

We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

YOUTH

No. 18 Young People

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe in their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the State Youth Convention.
- C. That our State Pilgrim Youth News Bulletin be placed on a subscription basis, Single copies at 50c per year, 10 or more copies sent to one address 35c per copy per year. All subscriptions are to expire at the end of the conference year.

No. 19 Monitors and Police

We recommend that young people who receive free entertainment at our State Convention be requird to pay a rgistration fee of 50c, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

No. 20 Executive Secretary

Inasmuch as the Executive Youth Secretary received only a mileage fund, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 21 Youth Conference

The resolutions passed by the 1955 Western Ohio Youth Conference were presented in a slightly modified form and ratified. (See Youth Business Meeting)

IN MEMORIAM

The members of the Ohio Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church give honorable mention, in remembrance of those deceased during the past year.

RFV. JOEL HARMON, son of Benjamin and Elizabeth Harmon was born May 3, 1878 near Greenville, Ohio and departed this life Aug. 2, 1955 at his late home in New Carlisle, Ohio at the age of 77 years.

On Dec. 18, 1901 he was united in marriage to Edna Walter. At an early age he gave his heart to the Lord and remained a faithful and devoted Christian to the end. He had been in ill health for six years but was always concerned about the work of the Lord.

He faithfully served several churches in the Ohio district as pastor, retiring on account of his health.

He also served a number of years on the district council and was chairman of the Camp Meeting Board for a number of years.

One would have to be a dwarfed soul indeed to reflect on or discredit this rebirth of Pentecostal passion born in the hearts of our denominational leaders. It is entirely up to us as to how large a tree this mustard seed will produce.

There is no segment of our church that is so pin-pointed by the spirit of the "For Ward Movement" as is the youth of our church such as this group we have here today. We are the ones that must see the gravity of the hour, the potency of the challenge, then make the necssary adjustments and go forward at any cost. It is imperative that we have a soul searching. We must reappraise the accumulations of things in our gear. We must "lay aside every weight" that does not have a direct bearing upon the Plan of God, His righteousness, and souls. We must cast aside Saul's armour; the rusty helmet of prejudice, the rigid breastplate of lovelessness, and the tight-laced girdle of legalism, and move forward armed with the Spirit of God. I believe we have convincing evidence that the Spirit of God is moving—we must, at all costs, get in line and move with Him.

It has been my privilege and pleasure to speak in each of our seven zones, and have attended 12 zone rallies. I have attended one district council meeting in the interest of our District Youth Work; have attended three District Youth Council Mee ings; two joint-District Youth Council meetings; have attended two youth leader's meetings at our international headquarters in Indianapolis; have attended one joint-meeting with the executive secretary of the Eastern Ohio District; and have traveled approximately 3,000 miles in the interest of District Youth work. In addition I have personally sent out several hundred pieces of mail, and have written approximately 20 articles for youth publications.

It is with the deepest gratitude that I give my personal report. God has been faithful in providing for my soul health, and has wonderfully and graciously restored my physical health. My associations with the Man of Galilee have been the most blessed of all my mediocre career. My association with our District Leaders, Zone Leaders, Pastors and local leaders has been a gratifying experience. I can only pray for God's choicest blessings to be upon every one of them.

If I could have one wish above all others, I believe that it would be that cur Western Ohio Pilgrim Youth will catch on and carry on the spirit of the "Forward Movement" that has been instituted to make the phrase increasingly true: THIS IS OUR DAY.
