

Challenged by new horizons not yet seen, and attainable victories not yet realized, we square our shoulders, lift our heads, and with stout hearts obey the clarion call of The Master as He says, "Go". Spirituality is being viewed as a practical reality, workable in daily routine, rather than mere staid dogmas. The battle is The Lord's, but we are His loyal and faithful soldiers.

It is with praise and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father that we bring you this report. We extol Him for every victory and admit our humanity and weakness in every defeat. This has been a blessed year of fellowship, cooperation and planning, as well as progress.

IMPROVEMENTS

AFTON - has a complete new plaster job, floors sanded and varnished and many other improvements.

ALGER - moved from the basement and had their first service on June 1 in their lovely new sanctuary. This is fully equipped with good pews purchased at a very reasonable cost. The church is completely free from debt and the pastor and people are certainly to be commended for their excellent achievement.

BERRYVILLE - moved into their new church in the early spring. The old church has been removed and this lovely new church stands as a real monument to the faith and labors of that plucky band of Pilgrims, and a real asset to the community.

BEVIS - recently installed a new ceiling and did a complete redecorating job.

MADISONVILLE - took another major step toward the completion of their new church by erecting a new front porch, complete with steps and rails, that will fit into the overall plan of this beautiful structure.

NORTH FAIRMOUNT - has constructed Sunday School rooms in the basement and redecorated their building.

DAYTON FIRST - dedicated their newly purchased parsonage last fall, after it had been beautifully painted.

DAYTON GREENWICH VILLAGE - has ordered new pews.

DAYTON SMITHVILLE RD. - Has redecorated.

DELPHOS - has redecorated and done other repair.

ELMWOOD - dedicated their beautiful new sanctuary on May 18. This church, one of the nicest in our District, is a real asset and compliment to the work of our Denomination. It is fully equipped with new pews, pulpit furnishings, carpets, etc. Well placed Sunday School rooms also double for a larger auditorium. Rev. Stanley Dean and the fine Elmwood Pilgrims are to be highly commended for this splendid achievement.

GRAND RAPIDS - has plans well under way for an excellent new Sunday School addition to their church.

LIBERTY CENTER - Dedicated their beautiful new church last summer shortly after camp. Rev. Goldsmith with the fine group of Pilgrims there are using their new facilities to excellent advantage as they show growth and development.

LIMA MARKET ST. - has plans nearly completed for a fine educational unit to be added to their present structure.

MAUD - recently moved their pastor into the new parsonage. This is one of the nicest parsonages in the District, yet because of the industry and labor of Rev. Clyde Waites and his good people the cost and debt was extremely low.

MIAMISBURG - now has plans under way for a new Sunday School addition to their present structure.

MULBERRY - has installed new aluminum siding on the parsonage and new carpet for the church.

NEW MADISON - has installed new siding on the parsonage.

PIQUA - has redecorated the church.

SPRINGFIELD FIRST - has redecorated their church.

SPRINGFIELD MEADOW GROVE - moved into their new building last fall. This excellent cement block church with full basement is the first unit of their plan and will be later used as the educational unit. The oil fired hot water heating system is adequate for the completed building when it is constructed. With faith, courage and a zeal to labor this building has been constructed at a minimum of cost. Rev. Darrell Rotz and his fine people are to be highly commended for this excellent achievement.

MT. ORAB - is now reviewing plans looking forward to a new church building. Lots have already been purchased and considerable finance has already been given and pledged toward its completion.

TROY - has installed beautiful new pews and redecorated.

WEST CARROLLTON - has installed partitions in the parsonage basement in such a manner as to provide excellent additional Sunday School and Youth facilities.

We are also grateful for numerical progress. Four of our churches were cited for the honor roll at General Conference for their excellent gains over the past quadranium. Those ranking among the 19 with highest numerical gain throughout the denomination were West Carrollton with 73 gain, Pleasant Valley with 63 gain, Liberty Center with 59 gain and Washington C. H. with 56 gain. Our compliments are extended to pastors and churches for this fine growth.

Sister Monroe, who has labored faithfully by my side, together with Gloria and Johnny, join me now in heartfelt appreciation to Ministry and Layety alike. In deepest gratitude we recall the many acts of personal kindness ministered to us as we have endeavored to carry on the work of the District entrusted to us. You have helped to lift many a load and carry many a burden. May God bless you for it is our earnest prayer.

Without hesitation, we report to you that the Council has worked together in perfect harmony. They have given me the finest of cooperation, and much credit of the work is due them as together we have labored for the interest of God's Kingdom.

MISSIONS

Last fall, God laid it on the heart of Rev. William Balser, who was in charge of an independent work at Auburn community west of Hamilton, to turn the work over to the Pilgrims. With a lovely concrete block building of 40 by 70 feet, built tabernacle style, which we are given rent free for one year, there also came to us a Sunday School of more than forty members. Under the excellent direction of Rev. M. H. Robbins we proceeded through the winter months to make contacts and win influence in the community. Rev. Melroy Ward held a revival with the Robbins as singers. Rev. V. C. Sharp was placed over the work this spring and under his full time leadership the work is growing. We expect to be able to organize this work in the near future, and purchase the property, on which we now have an option.

This spring, Rev. Clayton Coulter wrote us that God had laid it upon his heart to re-open the old Richwood Church. The Committee heartily approved this move, and Bro. Coulter, with the help of Bro. Glenn Wickard, has been working faithfully in this community. God has blessed their labors and an excellent Sunday School and Worship Services are being held each Sunday afternoon with more than 30 attending. A recent revival was held with increasing interest. We trust to have an organized church here in the near future.

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Tuesday a.m., July 15, 1958

The fourth annual conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at Springfield at 9:00 a.m. with Rev. G. F. Sheridan leading the congregation in singing "Victory Ahead," followed by the chorus, "Victory in Jesus," and "My Faith Looks up to Thee." The congregation responded heartily.

Dr. Otho Jennings, president of Owosso College, led in prayer.

Rev. Harold Monroe, Dist, Superintendent, presented the chairman for this conference, Gen. Superintendent Rev. R. G. Flexon, with words of encouragement concerning the forward step taken by the General Conference in electing three General Superintendents, and with words of special appreciation for the choice of Rev. Flexon as General Superintendent in our particular area.

Rev. Flexon read from the Gospel according to St. John, Chapter 16, verses 1 through 14. He chose for his text words from the eighth verse, "When He is come," which refer to the Holy Ghost. He stated that the real need of our church is not just a Forward Movement, but a backward movement to Pentecost. With the power of the Holy Ghost in our midst, a forward movement will become a reality. "Many people", he said, "confuse separation with isolation." He went on to say that any pastor who is unfriendly is headed for failure. We can rub shoulders with the world without letting any of the sin of the world rub off on us. He further stated that a church without the Holy Ghost spends more time protecting its doctrine that it does proclaiming its doctrine. We should be more interested in what men are than in what they do. The coming of the Holy Ghost will bring a display of the unusual. Oue church is comparatively young and does not have an attractive ritual as many of the older churches; therefore if we lose the glory and the fire, we have no substitute with which to attract people. We need not fear our smallness, because Jesus himself did not do his greatest works through multitudes, but through individuals. We need not be afraid of our emotions, nor try to control them, because everything that has changed the course of history has come from a powerful emotion. The Holy Ghost will give us some religious unrest, and will bring progress and productiveness.

Rev. Flexon closed his remarks with a plea for the church to endeavor to reach the Sunday School. He stated the goal set by the General Conference for 5000 new members in the next quadrennium. This would amount to 85 new members for our district per year and a gain of two churches. He urged the organization of prayer and fasting leagues. District Superintendent Monroe responded to Rev. Flexon's challenge with courage and confidence. He then returned the chair to Rev. Flexon.

Conference bar was announced, as previously established in permanent rules, three sections at the right of the platform to the back center aisle and platform. Members of conference were instructed to move within the bar.

The standing rule governing time schedule as follows: 8.30 to 12:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m. 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. -10:00 p.m.

A motion from the floor to seat Mrs. R. G. Flexon within the conference bar with full privileges was adopted.

Rev. Flexon introduced Rev. Otho Jennings and the same courtesy was extended to him. Moved and seconded that the ministers transferring from other districts, and the one newly licensed minister be received and seated within the conference bar. Motion carried. The ministers were: Rev. Raymond Simpson, Mrs. Raymond Simpson, Rev. G. E. Stace, Rev. Charles Felsberg, Rev. James L. Estes and Rev. Russell Howard.

Ways and Means and Resolutions Committees were instructed by the Chairman to present copies of all resolutions to be submitted to the chairman and secretary before presentation to the conference.

The Chairman called for the District Superintendent's report, which was read and accepted with a rsising vote of thanks.

Report of Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. O. E. Rutledge was read, and was also accepted by the conference with a rising vote of thanks.

The Auditing Committee, members, in the absence of their chairman, were instructed to prepare a report so that the Treasurer's report could be given.

The Statistician's report was read and was accepted by the conference.

Rev. Eldon T. Rotz, Sunday School Promotional Secretary read the Sunday School report and presented awards to Sunday Schools of the Year.

Report of Auditing Committee was read and accepted.

The Treasurer's report was read by Rev. G. F. Sheridan, and was accepted with a rising vote of thanks for the clear and concise manner of presentation. Motion to incorporate the report in form presented in the minutes was adopted.

Announcements concerning committee and council meetings were made.

Rev. Flexon requested special prayer for Dr. Neff who has just suffered the loss of his companion.

The conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. H. C. Walker.

Second Sitting, Tuesday p.m.

Afternoon sitting of the conference was called to order by Bro. Flexon. Mrs. Howard Williams led the congregation in singing "He Hideth My Soul," with Mrs. M. H. Robbins at the piano.

Rev. Flexon again requested prayer for Gen. Supt. W. H. Neff in his recent sorrow, as well as for our national leaders in these times of crises. Rev. Raymond Simpson led in prayer.

Rev. Otho Jennings read from Paul's Colossian letter, Chapter 3, verses 1 thru 17, giving a few rich thoughts on the word of authority as against the opinions of Gnosties of that time. He then directed our thoughts toward the Liberal Arts College at Owosso, Michigan.

He stated that the purpose of all education is that men might be like God and live with him forever.

We could educate our children in other church schools, but the educational institutions in which we get our training tend to leave their mark upon us. If we send our children to other schools, we may expect them to come out with the particular church and doctrinal interest of those schools.

No other schools can do for our Pilgrim students what our own colleges can do. Our Sunday Schools are on the increase and more and more of them will be going to college for professional training. The challenge of the hour is that we educate every young person possible in our own Pilgrim schools, and there prepare them for the profession of their choice.

Under the new set-up, Owosso College, after 1961, will award only AB and BS degrees.

The Bible Colleges will award ThB and BRe degrees. This new set-up, making Owosso a Liberal Arts college, was agreed to upon one condition, for which we should be very grateful - that it always maintain a Major in Bible.

Rev. Flexon made a few remarks concerning the college, after which the Reception Committee presented Rev. and Mrs. C. P. Pridgeon to the conference. They each gave a glowing testimony and were given seats within the conference bar.

A new delegate was seated for the Delphos church.

Motion was made to dispense with the roll call for the balance of the sittings, by allowing delegates arriving late to contact the secretary and thus be counted present. Motion carried.

Minutes of morning sitting were read and accepted.

Rev. Flexon made a suggestion concerning the meeting of Ways and Means and Resolutions prior to conference, so that delegates and pastors will have opportunity to study such resolutions and know how they wish to vote. The motion was made as follows: That Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least 30 days prior to conference and pre-

pare their recommendations in the form of a brochure. These to be in the hands of delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration. Motion carried.

CONFERENCE RECESSED FOR THIRTY MINUTES

Conference reconvened after recess with congregation singing a portion of "There is a fountain filled with Blood." While waiting for committee reports, the tabernacle resounded with the testimonies of the saints, and gospel songs.

A new delegate was seated for the Cincinnati First Church.

Rev. Monroe appointed tellers for election of officers: Rev. Stanley Dean, Rev. Donald Wilson, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, Rev. Gary Lieberick, Rev. Boyd Schell.

District Supt. was elected last year for 2-year term. First election was for Asst. Dist. Supt. Rev. O. E. Rutledge was elected on 2nd ballot.

Second election was for Dist. Secretary. Rev. M. H. Robbins was reelected on first ballot. Ballots were cast for Dist. Treasurer. Because of expiration of time, motion was made to recess until after the supper hour, when first order of business will be ordination service. Tellers were instructed to count ballots for treasurer and report at next business session. Adjourned with prayer by Rev. Monroe.

Third Sitting, Tuesday Evening

The third sitting of the conference opened with an ordination service: Rev. Howard Williams leading the congregation in singing Rock of Ages. Rev. M. H. Robbins prayed.

Names of the following candidates who had been recommended by the Educational Board and approved by council for ordination were read and approved by the Conference: For the ministry - Darrel Rotz, Rudolph Moore, Vernon C. Sharp, Glenn Reiff, Thomas Brand; For deaconness - Victoria Vincke.

The ordination committee was composed of Rev. R. G. Flexon, Rev. M. H. Robbins, Pev. Harold Monroe, Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. O. E. Rutledge, and Rev. Eldon T. Rotz. Scriptures from I Timothy, chapter 3, II Timothy, Chapter 4 and Titus, chapter 3, were read by Rev. Rutledge, Rev. Ward and Rev. Monroe.

The congregation sang, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

The ordination chairman, Rev. R. G. Flexon, addressed the candidates and administered to them a charge with a real challenge. He spoke from the text, "There was a man sent from God whose name was John." He stated that man, most times, must work with an organization if he is to do his best work, but he does do his work through men. If he can get the right man, it has never been told what God can do. If the church should be taken out of the world, it would uproot all the good there is in the world. But the church, nevertheless, is proving inadequate for these times because of inadequate leadership. Without qualified leaders, the church becomes a negligible force in the world. The local leaders of the church, he stated, have been and still are the greatest problem in the Pilgrim Holiness denomination. To have competent leaders we must have God-called men. What constitutes a call? First, the existence of a need. Second, the ability to perform. When God calls us to preach he will put within us a native power to do the work. Another thing is an impression that becomes a conviction. A called man will feel that if he preaches not the gospel he will lose his soul. Rev. Flexon charged the candidates to cultivate the God-given talent, to be perpetual students, to feed the sheep all year, to keep the blessing and the song in their own hearts that they might be able to impart it to others; to think things through rather than jumping to conclusions; to live during the week like they preach on Sunday. Spirituality is determined by the desires of the heart which motivate the actions. Spirituality founded on anything else is false. A preacher should pray more than he expects his people to pray. The ministry should be first in his life, and should always be held sacred and above reproach. Indolence, indifference and carelessness are inexcusable. He may never be perfect, but should never be less than good. If he prays his serm on down, it will be good for it will be from God. He should be clean - a clean life, clean thoughts, clean conversation, neat about his home and person. God has not called us to failure but to success.

The candidates were ordained by prayer and laying on of hands, after which the congregation sang "We're Marching to Zion" while ordained ministers greeted the newly ordained.

The tellers reported on Ballot for Treasurer, Rev. G. F. Sheridan elected.

The Reception Committee presented Mrs. R. G. Flexon and Rev. and Mrs. G. E. Stace to the conference. They were received with hearty greeting and given opportunity to testify.

The conference proceeded with election of officers by casting ballots for the five advisory members of the council. Three of the tellers were excused to count the ballot swhile the conference cast ballots for one member of the Education-Examining Board. Rev. E. G. Marsh was elected for a three year term.

Revs. Clyde Waites, Ralph Shope and Howard Williams were appointed to be additional tellers.

Rev. Harold Monroe was re-elected for a five-year term as District Trustee.

Report of Ways and Means Committee was read and the following action was taken.

Motion was made to revise Resolution concerning Budget, Page 27 of Dist. minutes, No. 1(A) to conform with new ruling of the General Conference concerning Stewardship Fund. Carried.

Motion to delete Resolution No. 16, page 29 of Dist Minutes was carried.

Motion to revise No. 2 (E) to specify the fund involved for modernization of rest rooms and building of showers. Carried.

Motion to delete No. 2(F), page 27, was referred until after report of Resolutions Committee in morning sitting.

Tellers reported on the ballot for advisory members of council. Rev. Flexon announced a "miracle," inasmuch as all members were elected on first ballot. They were: Rev. Melroy Ward, Rev. W. L. Kilwy, Rev. L. R. Roberts, Rev. Eldon T. Rotz, Rev. E. C. McKinney.

Rev. Flexon read from the Manual, page 89, sec. 178, and page 82, par. 8. These provisions of the manual are to be enforced next year.

The conference was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Harold Monroe.

Fourth Sitting, Wednesday a.m.

The morning sitting was opened by Rev. Flexon. Rev. M. H. Robbins led the congregation in singing "My Jesus, I Love Thee." Rev. H. C. Walker led in prayer.

Rev Flexon read from Luke, Chapter 14. He gave a devotional message on Descipleship from this scripture. He brought out that Jesus definitely stated requirements for descipleship. He asks us to subscribe to a way of life and not just an intellectual creed. He is not so hard pressed for desciples that He will take them on their terms. He has laid down the terms for this descipleship. We sometimes lift up a standard so high that no man can attain, or on the other extreme, so low that it does not mean much. But between two extremes there is always A follower after Jesus will be a follower after truth, and will therefore never be an extremist. He makes the price of descipleship very high, but leaves room for development and advancement. First we must come to Him, then we must follow AFTER Him. Each of these two steps has its price. The coming is voluntary - Jesus places strong emphasis on the will. Old time religion is not just an emotional spring, but it is placing our wills on the side of God's will and following his commands because we want to. We are not Christians because we have to be, but "on purpose." Following after him will cost us surrender, and sacrifice. The surrender in verse 26 does not mean that we must hate our relatives, but that we must love them less than we do God. His will will be the only will of our lives. in sacrifice is found in verse 27 is in following after Him. Between coming to Him and following after Him, something happens - the taking up of the cross. This is more than bearing everyday burdens. To embrace the cross is to find the power to enable us to live. To have constant victory, we must be able to be a victim, and this does not mean a long-faced religion. The cross is rigorous and exacting, but it is also glorious and dynamic. To really love the Old Rugged Cross may mean lonely hours, hatred by other people, maybe untold suffering, but

above all, death to self. Then we find in the cross the sufficiency to do the thing God wants us to do. We do not want to be like the man who started the house and couldn't finish it and thus bring reproach on the name of our descipleship; but before becoming a cross-bearer, count the cost and then when you take it, don't let it down. There will be sufficiency to complete the task we undertake. It will give power in conflict. It will keep us from succumbing to the pressures of the world. Let us not be cross rejectors, but cross bearers. To shrink from cross bearing is to compromise, and Luke says that a compromiser has lost his soul and is good for nothing. Compromising is crossing not a notion, but a principle. You can give up every pet notion you have and not compromise, but to cross a principle is to compromise; principles are based on the word of God. Changing a method is not compromising. We need to change the methods that have not given results in the past, so that we may grow not only in our individual experiences, but as a church.

Minutes of second and third sitting were read. They were approved after proper corrections were made.

Ballots were cast for Dist. Statistician. Rev. Rudolph Moore was re-elected.

Resolutions committee reported and the following action taken.

- 1. Motion to move the resolution on appreciation to the last rather then the first resolution in the minutes, and change the name of the reporter. Carried.
 - 2. Motion to add the word "Youth" to page 21, No. 2A. Carried.
- 3. Motion to add the phrase "two of whom will not be members of the council" to No. 3, introduction, carried.
- 4. Motion to add A to No. 5, changing time of conference to Monday and Tuesday following camp, carried.
- 5. No. 6A That all reports be in to Dist. Statistician by July 5th instead of July 10th. Carried.
- 6. No. 8 Add "B" that minister's phone numbers be carried in Ministerial Directory of the minutes. Carried.
 - 7. Add "C" to No. 9, making the camp committee consist of the entire council. Carried.
- 8. Motion to leave the date of ministerial convention to be set by council before printing of minutes, carried.
- 9. Motion to delete No. 18 concerning Owosso Bible College, since it no longer applies, carried.
 - 10. Resolutions No. 21 and 24 were deleted.
 - 11.
- 12. District program, conforming to new plan by general conference was presented. In connection with this, a resolution from the Ways and Means committee was also presented, and the overall plan, including reports of both committees was adopted. This seemed to be a great step forward in planning for the success of our church, and the conference stood and sang the Doxology with fervor and inspiration.
- 13. The Resolutions committee presented a resolution concerning the grading of churches. Motion to approve this and incorporate it in the previously approved District Program carried.

Ways and Means Committee Resolution No. 2F which was referred last night was recommended deleted. Carried.

A resolution, from the floor, directing the Dist. Secretary, upon any change of pastors, during the year, to inform all pastors in the district of such change, as well as any general officers that should be informed.

It was suggested that all pastors should notify pastors in other cities when any of their members or friends are moving to that area.

The District Superintendent read the appointments of committees.

Rev. Flexon spoke to the conference concerning the new General Church Educational Committee and explained the system for the benefit of ministers and Dist. Educational Board.

The Superintendent read the list of changes in pastors. Rev. Flexon dismissed the sitting with prayer.

Fifth Sitting, Wednesday p.m.

Rev. R. G. Flexon called the afternoon sitting to order and Rev. George Poole led the congregation in singing "Draw Me Nearer". Bro. Hannan led in prayer. The conference sang "There is a Fountain" and "Blessed Assurance." A number of the saints testified.

Ways and Means committee report was read.

Motion to change No. 2C under District Budget, Page 27, to read 50 cts. per member instead of \$1.00. Carried.

Motion was made to delete "in addition to all birthday offerings" from Dist. Budget, No. 2D and was carried by a standing vote of 49 to 29.

A complete report of the Examining Board was read and approved by the Conference. The Secretary was authorized to secure the report of the Memorials Committee and incorporate same in the minutes.

Resolution committee presented motion that Items 29, 30 and 31, page 26 of minutes be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the minutes under "Youth". Carried.

Motion to refer the part of the District Program relating to grading of churches to the council for some modification was carried.

Motion was made to extend vote of thanks to General Supt. Flexon and all others who had a part in making the conference a success. Carried with a standing vote.

Motion to approve the list of evangelists after some modifications was carried.

Motion to adjourn carried, and the conference was dismissed with prayer by Rev. C. P. Pridgeon.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local church for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to the standard required by the State, therefore be it resolved that:

A committee of three, two of whom shall not be members of the District Council, be appointed to act as a Building Committee whose duty shall be as follows:

- A. To study the State Building Code and learn all requirements.
- B. To study methods of financing and have knowledge of best and cheapest ways.
- C. Check with church boards as to the deed and type of mortgage.
- D. No church can buy or build without the approval of this committee and a written consent from the District Council.

No. 3 CAMP

- A. Be it resolved that any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp it shall be turned over to the Camp Registrar, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.
- B. Further, that all who rent a room or cot at camp, furnish their own linen.

- C. Be it resolved that any person who is transferred from our district to another district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp registrar.
- D. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our perople be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep the peace, and that be he paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the camp.

No. 4 CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that Conference be on Monday and Tuesday following Camp.
- B. Be it further resolved that we provide for services for children during Conference.

No. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 5th.
- B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE.

- A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a minister or minister's wife of the District, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairman and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred.
- B. Be it further resolved that all minister's phone numbers be carried in the Ministers' Directory.

No. 8 DISTRICT COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members; these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer, and five elective members, with six members making a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire District Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be it further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved: that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAM

In the light of God's blessing on the recent General Conference, where faith and vision took precedent over problems and circumstances, and whereas Divine Leadership was evident: Be it resolved that the General Church program as adopted by the General Conference, entitled "Toward Tomorrow", be unanimously approved and adopted in its entirety by this Conference.

Be it further resolved that we set District Goals to conform to this program as outlined on page 26 of this Journal and entitled "District Program - Toward Tomorrow."

No. 11 HOME MISSIONARY SERVICE

Inasmuch as our District Home Missions program has been defined as the 'weak link' of our church:

Be it resolved that the resolution conditionally adopted by the Eastern Ohio Conference be adopted by this Conference;

That our camp schedule be arranged to provide one afternoon service for Foreign Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions.

No. 12 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.
- D. Be it resolved that our unstationed licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 14 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be as nearly central as possible.

No. 15 MISSIONS

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council appoint two persons to serve with the District Superintendent as a Home Missionary Committee.
- B. This committee shall direct the efforts of a corps of ministers cooperating in Home Missionary Projects.
- C. Each Minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- D. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.
- E. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- F. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.
- G. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer and forwarded to the Treasurer of this committee.
- H. We also recommend that this committee investigate the advisability of building one or more folding Church Trailers.

No. 16 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 17 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. Be it resolved that all third year licentiates meet the Examining Board the first Saturday of camp in order that approved candidates for ordination may be determined before Conference, and that all others meet the Examining Board the Friday and Saturday preceding Conference.
- B. Be it further resolved that the District Council meet on Monday following the first Saturday of camp to take official action on the Examining Board's recommendations for Ordination.
- C. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- D. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night of Conference.

No. 18 PASTORS

- A. Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- B. To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- C. Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pasters, when he meets with the local church boards.
- D. Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year withour consent of the District Council.
- E. Be it resolved that the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.
- heating equipment for the parsonage due to varied facilities:

 Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church-owned parsonages.

Inasmuch as moving Pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new

No. 19 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Page 37, Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 20 SALARIES

F.

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers, inasmuch as it is embarrassing to discuss said matters after the election. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own peckets.

No. 21 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, Section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television; Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 22 SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends the state conference provide for a District Sunday School Committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee.
- B. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the District to work under the supervision of the superintendent.
- C. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our District Churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- D. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

No. 23 SUPERINTENDENT

- A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district.
- B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 24 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 25 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 26 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 27 APPRECIATION

A. Be it resolved:

That we extend to our General Superintendent a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, the Educational Committee, the cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.
- C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splendid cooperation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference, and that a letter of appreciation be mailed to them by our District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. J. W. Smack for his labors as a reporter.
- D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken in each church annually on the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions. The money received will be sent immediately to the District Treasurer, and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the District Budget Fund but each church will receive credit for it in their annual report.

No. 2 MINISTERS' DUTIES

- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 3 MINUTES

- A. Be it resolved that the price of the Minutes shall be 50 cts per copy.
- B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the Secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$25.00 for these services.

No. 4 SALARIES

- A. District Superintendent.
 - (1) be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$3,900.00, 6 cts. per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
 - (2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6 cts. per mile traveling expense.
- B. District Council.

Resolved that 6 cts. per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work,

- C. District Treasurer and Secretary.
 - Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's salary be \$500.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$200.00.
- D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

E. Educational-Examining Board.

Be it resolved that the Educational-Examining Board members be given \$65.00 per member per year, plus 6 cts. per mile for travel authorized by this Conference or the District Council.

No. 5 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provision as follows:

Foreign Missions 20% or \$1.60
Administration 36% or 2.88
General Church Extension 14% or 1.12
Senior College 21.4% or 1.71
Church Extension Loan Fund 3% or .24
Sunday School Extension and Youth 2.6% or .21
Contingent
Total, per Member per Year 100% or \$8.00

B. District Budget.

- (1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interests of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offerings received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.
- (2) Be it resolved that we raise 25 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference Expense.
- (3) Be it resolved that each church raise at least 50 cts. per member per year for our zone school.
- (4) Be it resolved that one dollar and a quarter (\$1.25) per member per year be raised annually to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- (5) Inasmuch as the provision to date is inadequate to care for the financial obligations of the camp grounds, be it resolved that we ask the local churches to raise the equivalent of one dollar (\$1.00) per member this year, to be forwarded to the District Treasurer, the same to be applied on the building of showers and the modernization of rest rooms at the camp grounds.
- (6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.
- (7) Be it resolved that, with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three fourths the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

No. 6 CAMP AND CONFERENCE.

- A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to alleviate the financial obligation of the Camp Meeting.
- B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly renumerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.
- C. Be it resolved that all minister's wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.
- D. That our active minister's children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.
- E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives. Each church and youth society should take a good liberal offering to provide the expense of the delegate when attending the conference.

No. 7 SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE.

Be it resolved that each church raise \$5.00 per year for the financing of our Sunday School Institute. We urge each church to take care of this before the time set for the Institute.

No. 8 TREASURER.

- A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer. The audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.
- B. Insuring of the Treasurer We recommend that the Council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 9 WESTERN BUILDER.

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 10 YOUTH.

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expense of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in budget statement as "camp and conference."
- C. That young people who receive free entertainment at our District Convention be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fee to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Furthermore, said monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

TOWARD TOMORROW

District Program

(As presented by Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees, and approved by Conference)
In the light of God's blessing on the recent General Conference, where faith and vision took precedent over problems and circumstances, and whereas Divine leadership was evident.

Be it resolved that the General Church program as adopted by the General Conference and entitled "Toward Tomorrow," be unanimously approved and adopted in its entirety by this Conference.

Be it further resolved that we set District Goals to conform to this program, as follows:

A net gain of two churches this year.

A net gain of 112 members each year (2 per church).

Annual pastors' conference.

Accentuated Holiness Evangelism.

Establishment of Prayer and Fasting Leagues (Pledge people to fast and pray at least one meal each week - suggested Friday morning).

To promote this program we propose in addition to existing District and General procedure that:

- (1) Our General Superintendent in cooperation with the District Superintendent and Council, be asked to meet with our people in special premotional meetings on Zone and local, as well as District level.
- (2) That the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following Conference for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work Local, District and General.
- (3) That local churches be encouraged to expand and improve facilities as much as possible. This shall be encouraged by the District Building Committee and District Council. The District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting Church Extension with the District.
- (1) Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound business basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.
- (2) No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- (3) Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of 5%.
- (4) There shall be a combined offering for the District Promotion, with a goal of the equivalent of 1 ct. per meal per member. Said offering shall be dispersed as follows: the minimum payment on principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp gound fund and the District Church Extension Fund. Said offering shall be taken monthly at a time at the discretion of the pastor and local board. The District

Superintendent shall help to promote this offering and shall give it special consideration upon the visit to the local church as soon after Conference as possible.

(5) Realizing the cost in interest, we purpose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

WHAT THE LOAN FUND CAN DO.

- (1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities by furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.
- (2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.
- (3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.
- (4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.
- (5) This fund is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund that amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls. Where could money be spent better?

Church and District Loyalty and cooperation are urged and pledged to the limit of our ability for the sake of the salvation of souls through the channels of the church organization.

YOUTH CONFERENCE

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THIS YOUTH CONFERENCE, GREETINGS:

Usually, when we think of reports, we think of statistics. This is true, in part, because statistics are vital to our progress. But not all progress can be so classified. We feel that in our district in our day there are evolving attitudes and meaningful undertones, not identified on typewriter keys, that promise a greater tomorrow for our youth.

One of the signs of this evolving of attitudes is the growing recognition of the place of Youth Camps. We have just completed our second one, and are thrilled with the results. We believe that this is the greatest, most decisive stride that we have taken in many years. Do not accept this as an inflated report of an over-enthusiastic youth leader — just ask anyone who was here. We do not boast of a perfect program - there are yet many wrinkles to iron out. But God's signal blessings on our awkward efforts give the clear signal: "This is the way-walk ye therein."

Another milestone in the progress of our youth work is the new organizational plan projected by our recent General Conference. This may seem too revolutionary to some, but to those who have been close to youth work, and have been often stymied by some of the organizational problems, this is the key to unlock new doors of opportunity. Not only is the letter of this new legislation important, but greater still is the spirit thus expressed by our church leaders that promises new life to our overall program.

For a more tangible report let us look at the beautiful evergreen and shrubbery that now adorn the front approach to the tabernacle. This is what has been done this year with your project funds - a project that will enhance our sense of beauty for many years to come. This program was sparked by our District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe. The labor was provided by Bro. Monroe, the District Youth Committee, area and district pastors, and a layman or two. Our sincere expression of appreciation is extended to all of them.

Personally, I have had the joyful privilege of speaking in one zone rally in six of our seven zones during the year. The seventh appointment was cancelled because of a new outbreak of Asian flue. I wish to express my regrets to the Hamilton Zone - the loss is largely mine. I have conducted three District Youth Committee meetings, but had to miss for the first time the annual youth leaders conference, due to illness. Meeting these several times with our Director, Dr. Elliot, and his staff, along with the youth leaders far and wide has afforded me untold pleasure and experience. These are rich paintings in the hall of my memory.

This conference marks an anniversary for me. Ten years ago I received two of the greatest surprises of my mediocre career. The first was to learn that the District Council had nominated me for District Youth Leader. The second surprise was that of being elected to this office. To this has been added a series of such honors, lo, these ten years.

This year I am stepping aside that another may have this honor. This is not to be construed as a waning interest in our youth. I shall be standing by to render any aid possible. I want all of you to know that I shall always be grateful for your repeated vote of confidence. I am indebted to all of you who have worked together to achieve what success may be attributed to us in our youth program. May the future of Western Ohio be accelerated by a zealous youth program, and may we never give our superiors occasion to "despise thy youth."

The Western Ohio District Youth Conference convened at 9:00 a.m., July 19, 1958. George Weber led the group in singing, "Love Lifted Me," and "I Know Whom I Have Believed," with Beverly Bogard at the piano.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Rudolph Moore.

After singing a group of choruses, the group sang "He Lives."

Rev. Wachenschwanz introduced Rev. Joseph Brown as representative of the Youth Department of the General Church to be presiding officer of the conference.

Rev. Brown spoke on I John 5:4, and brought out particularly that God wants us to be agressive spiritually, individually, and with humility. He stated that true humility is not paraded by the person possessing it, but like that of Christ, it is self-effacing.

He emphasized the need of memorizing the scripture and learning to use it. We must not be spiritually lazy. The greatest safety is in service. He closed his message by dramatically calling for "Hats off to the past - but coats off to the future."

Rev. Monroe welcomed the youth group and expressed appreciation to Rev. Brown for the fine message, then turned the chairmanship over to him.

Motion was made and seconded that the new Youth Program passed by the General Conference be presented. Carried. This program was presented by the chairman.

Motion to proceed with election of officers carried. Tellers were appointed.

Ballots were cast for Vice President. Rev. Lowell T. Brand was elected on first ballot. Ballots were cast for District Youth Secretary.

Since there was no election for District Youth Secretary after the second ballot, a motion was made and seconded that ballots be cast for the two having received highest number of votes. Carried. Rev. Rudolph Moore was elected on the following ballot.

Nominees for Youth Treasurer were Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, Rev. H. D. Wright and Rev. Stanley Dean. Rev. Dean was elected.

Motion was made to give an offering to the retiring Executive Secretary. Carried and a march offering was taken.

Zones were divided to elect Zone Chairmen. Ballots were cast, and were to be counted by the District Council who would report to the conference.

Treasurer's report was read and approved.

Motion to recess until 1:00 p.m. carried.

Second Sitting

Conference reconvened with Rev. Wachenschwanz leading in singing "Glory to His Name." Prayer was offered by Bro. R. T. Powell.

Rev. Brown asked zone chairmen to come to platform and be prepared to give zone reports. Zone Chairmen were then announced as follows:

Greenville - Mrs. George Poole; Defiance - Rev. L. T. Brand;

Dayton - Rev. Robert Ferguson.

Zone reports were received with a rising vote of thanks. Ways and Means and Resolutions committees reports were given. Dismissed with prayer by Rev. Wachenschwanz.

Report Of Young People's Resolution Committee

No. 1 YOUTH SOCIETIES

Inasmuch as the General Conference has outlined new organizational procedures for Youth Societies, be it resolved that this Youth Conference adopt these provisions.

No. 2 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference authorize an annual Youth Camp Program - plans, date and administration to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

No. 3 YOU'TH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone once annually.

No. 4 ZONE PROGRAM

In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible to plan the program for his zone for the year.

No. 5 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee and zone chairmen be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 6 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible.

No. 7 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church;

Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 8 BIBLE MEMORIZATION

Be it resolved that the Youth Conference adopt the plan of Bible Memorization as outlined by our General Youth Department.

Report Of Young People's Ways and Means Committee

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

- A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.
- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$3.00 a year to maintain the fund.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed .06 cts. per mile for traveling expenses.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that a special project fund be maintained to finance the special projects approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.00 to be paid by each church.
- B. Whereas the present facilities are inadequate for efficient service in the kitchen: Be it resolved that this Youth Conference adopt as its project for the coming year the purchasing of a large American Food Mixer, and to provide adequate wiring for use of the same.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

Be it resolved that each zone raise the equivalent of \$5.00 per church for the District Youth Council fund and District Youth project.

Scope of Examination

Our examination consisted of a review of cancelled checks representing cash disbursements of the General Fund and Summer Camp operation for the period under review. Cash on deposit was confirmed by correspondence with The Hicksville Bank, Hicksville, Ohio, and by reconciliation of the balance reported directly to us with the balance shown by the records. Tests of cancelled checks were made with the disbursement record, excepting for those checks outstanding at July 5, 1958, and no discrepancies were disclosed. The distribution of the bank balance at July 5, 1958, amounting to \$15,827.20, is reflected in Exhibit A.

Operation of the summer camp for period July 18, 1957 to October 8, 1957, resulted in a net income of \$369.04. This amount was equally distributed between the Eastern and Western Ohio Districts. The amount of \$184.52 received by the Western Ohio District was deposited in the general fund bank account on October 15, 1957. A summary of the camp operation is shown in Exhibit B.

These statements have been prepared from the records of the church. We did not make a complete audit or an independent verification of the recorded cash receipts by direct correspondence with the member churches, and accordingly no accountant's opinion is supplied or intended.


