DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To General Superintendent, Dr. William H. Neff, delegates and friends of the Ninth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, Greetings.

As we again pause to review the work and accomplishments of the past year, it is with deep gratitude to God, our Heavenly Father, for all His bountiful blessings upon us. It is our conviction that the work, dedication, burden and vision for advancing the work is becoming more intensive, and that labors now being expended will reap a harvest for the church and the cause of God.

Intensive effort has again characterized the year. Some very excellent programs and personalities have been presented to our people for the advancement of the work.

God gave us a blessed camp last summer with the largest attendance since the Conference division. We were blessed by some of the finest workers in the persons of Rev. B. Ivan Williams, Rev. W. F. Page and Rev. and Mrs. Roy Ankrim. The camp finances were lifted without undue stress and the buildings and ground are in an improved state of repair. Much remains yet to be done, however, at this point.

The programs and personalities presented to the district during the year have been outstanding:

The District Sunday School Conventions were held November 8 and 9 at the Dayton Riverdale and Lima Market St. Churches with D. Clate Risley as the principal speaker. Rev. Peisker from Indianapolis and several district ministers also were used in the convention under the direction of Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, District Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

The Pastors' Seminars, for pastors and their wives, were held December 3-6 at Piqua, Washington C. H., Liberty Center and Cincinnati First. Rev Adrian Grout, well known and very successful pastor of the High Point, North Carolina, church, was the speaker. He shared with our pastors from his rich experiences of a long and fruitful pastoral ministry.

The Ministerial Convention was held at the newly purchased Miamsburg church, with Rev. J. R. Mitchell as speaker. Rev. Don Fisher, President of the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, also addressed the convention.

The Youth Institutes were held at Elmwood and Defiance on April first and second under the direction of Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President. Rev. and Mrs. Joe Brown were featured as youth leaders specialists, and they presented a wealth of excellent materials.

The Senior Banquets at Lima and Hamilton, honoring 22 graduating seniors present, were well attended and most enjoyable and profitable. The ministry of Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Youth, on the subject "Life's Greatest Discovery," was challenging to our youth.

The youth camp, one of our finest ministries, was attended by 157 youth and by some 25 enrolled workers, under the direction of Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President.

Action Day at Frankfort Pilgrim College was well attended by Western Ohio Youth and quite a number of adults.

In all of these varied promotional programs, we have greatly appreciated the cooperation of the District Council and the various committees responsible for the work. For the most part, the attendance was commendable. We feel, however, that more complete cooperation in attendance at each of these programs would be profitable to all.

Material Progress

Considerable effort and progress have been made during the year to improve the physical facilities of our churches.

AFTON — Fire severely damaged the church last fall, and the congregation has worshipped in the home of one of the members most of the winter. In spite of this, however, the attendance has held up well and the church building is now in use and nearing the completion of the repair that will place it in even better condition than before the fire.

BEVIS — For some time the church has been considering their need for a new church building and parsonage. This spring the opportunity came for them to buy the property adjacent to their present church, which includes a parsonage with rental apartments upstairs, and adequate land for a proposed new church.

DAYTON FIRST — This congregation is now worshipping in their beautiful new sanctuary, which is one of the very nicest of the District. It has facilities for near three hundred people, with full basement for Sunday School and plenty of space for off-street parking. The pastor, Rev. Robert Ferguson, recently moved to the new parsonage by the side of the church. The church being located on Troy Pike in North Dayton, the field is unlimited, and the challenge is now accepted to work to fill their new facilities.

MAUD — The Maud Pilgrims are eager to move into their nearly completed beautiful new church on Tylersville road about two blocks from their former location. The faith of these people together with their dedicated pastor, Rev. Waites, is most gratifying, and is soon to be richly rewarded.

MIAMISBURG — The negotiations already begun last conference were completed, and the lovely church located on Kercher Street is indeed a beautiful and inspiring place of worship. We share the joy of the Miamisburg congregation over this advance. Plans and negotiations are now under way for the sale of their old parsonage and the purchase of another and more adequate home for their pastor, Rev. Enlow.

MULBERRY — The present parsonage is now being moved to another location, and a new church is to be erected in the near future on the old parsonage site, adjacent to the present church. This is to be a very fine edifice, meeting the challenge of one of the fastest growing areas of our district. God is blessing the leadership of Rev. L. T. Brand, pastor.

Home Missions

Since special report will be given from the District Home Missionary Committee, I will omit it from my report.

Our Position

Realizing the trends and issues being faced by the entire Christian church today, I believe it proper to make a statement of my vision of our course.

Brave, strong and good men, filled with the Holy Ghost, gave us the foundations of a noble and glorious church. Others walking in their footsteps have handed to us their heritage. What shall be our disposition of it? I urge that we follow them as they followed Christ. We dare not drift into the pharisaical and legalistic spirit of some who would divide and rent the Church of Christ, neither dare we position ourselves with the compromising Laodicean emphasis ever present and striving to deviate us from our course of service to God. Rather, may we in the Western Ohio District dedicate our time and talents to the basic issues and message of the Gospel, with the deep conviction that outward manifestations of its power will inevitably be manifest. To follow these principles is not the popular course of our day, but to us, the determining factor is not the will of men, even the trend of the masses, but rather the fact that these people are in harmony with the spirit and tenor, as well as the writing, of the Word of God.

An ever more vigorous, agressive warfare must be waged against the enemy and the banner of Holiness advanced. More must be done to win souls. To this end, we plead for a greater cooperative effort by ministry and laity alike. Let us go forward. Others may be doing little or no more than we, but there is no comfort here when souls are lost. Let us win them while we have opportunity. Our Ministerial Convention theme, "Set us Aflame," should be the prayer of laity as well as the ministry. Complacency destroys. May God give us Nehemiahs, Gideons, and Elijahs who will dare to lead in building the work of God in our era and area.

Appreciation

Speaking on behalf of Sister Monroe and our children as well as myself, words fail to express our appreciation to the District for the many acts of personal kindness, the cooperation in programs presented, and the general spirit of loyalty and purpose that characterizes our people.

The unity, cooperation and spirit of the members of the District Council have been most gratifying. It has been a real pleasure to work with them throughout the year. Rev. Melroy Ward, Assistant Superintendent, has been true to his position, ever ready to give counsel and help lift the load as the need arose and he was called upon to do so. Most of all, we give thanks to God for His traveling mercies, personal blessings, and the privilege of working in His great whitened harvest field of Western Ohio.

REPORT OF DISTRICT HOME MISSIONARY COMMITTEE

Western Ohio District Conference 1963

The following fields have been under the supervision of the Home Missionary Committee:

1. ST. PARIS. This field, largely supported by local funds, was not considered a safe venture for expanding district funds and has been discontinued.

2. NEW WESTVILLE. This project is being supported entirely by local funds; at present it is not too promising. We do not anticipate spending district funds here unless there is a very marked sign of progress.

3. PIQUA. This work has had considerable interest the past year. The Sunday School was signally honored for its progress at this Conference. We are supporting the work on practically the same basis as last year. This work will be reviewed the first of the calendar year as to possibility of organization, etc.

4. LEIPSIC. Approximately \$500 is being spent on the church and parsonage from Home Missionary funds. Sister Irene Tanier is going there to pastor this year with the backing of the Committee. We have hope that this work, which is well located, can be revived.

5. SPECIAL REPORT. A field recently surveyed by the Committee seemed a promising one; and the Committee, with the approval of the District Council, was prepared to commit most all available funds that remained for the coming year's operation to the proposed project. A growing new section of the city of New Carlisle was the proposed site; but since this would involve the selling of the Liberty Church and parsonage, and since the Liberty church is not fully committed to the program, there are no further plans to proceed, and the funds will be held until further surveys show fields of promise.

WESTERN OHIO CONFERENCE JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting, Monday, July 22, 1963, Convened at 2 P.M.

The Ninth Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Sugar Grove Camp Ground, Springfield, Ohio, at 2:00 P. M., July 22, 1963, with the District Superintendent, Rev. Harold Monroe, calling the conference to order. Mr. Elwood Stuart, song evangelist for the camp meeting in progress, led the conference in singing the great old song "Amazing Grace", following which Rev. Melroy Ward led in earnest prayer for God's blessing and guidance to rest upon the conference.

Rev. Monroe then introduced the presiding officer, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, General Superintendent of the area, who, before proceeding further, requested a special number in song from the Stuarts which was a blessing to the conference. In greeting, Dr. Neff mentioned briefly the present travels of General Superintendents Paul W. Thomas and Melvin H. Snyder in certain foreign areas of our church. He then gave the conference for a few brief moments some most appropriate and godly exhortations, which were received with much appreciation and good response.

The roll call of ministerial and lay delegates was taken, and instruction was given for delegates arriving later to report to the secretary upon their arrival. In the absence of a delegate from the Piqua church, Mrs. Eva Yaney from said church was seated in the conference.

The standing rules establishing the conference bar and time of sittings were read.

The names of Pilgrim ministers transferring to Western Ohio from other districts were read, and these were accepted into the conference. The ministers were Stanley Booher from Northern Indiana, Miss Grace Kelloway from Pennsylvania, Mrs. Lily Penny from Texas, Charles Roark from Eastern Ohio, Earl Wachenschwanz from Illinois, V. C. Sharp from Southern Indiana, and George Carr from the Central District.

The report of the District Superintendent was read by Rev. Monroe and was received by a hearty "Amen" from the conference body.

The Assistant Superintendent, Rev. Melroy Ward, gave his report, which the conference received.

The Statistical report was called for, but delayed due to serious accident which prevented completion of the report.

The report of the Auditing Committee was heard and received.

The Treasurer's report was given and received, with commendation for its unusual thoroughness.

The District Missionary Society President gave her report, which the conference accepted.

The report of the Examining Board recommended for ordination Boyd Schell, minister, and Mrs. Eula Thompson, deaconess; and it recommended either for advancement or re-instating in the various years of District License as follows: Third year, Stanley Booher and Verl Light, Second Year, Eden L. Johnson and Job Stagner, First Year, Eugene Huff, Jon Thomas, and Donald C. Wichard; and it recommended for Licensed Deaconess, First Year, Mrs. Carrie Johnson. The Board's report was accepted by the conference.

Rev. Robert Ferguson gave the report of the Resolutions Committee, with the following results:

No. 2, Building Committee was completely revised, by a motion which carried, to read as follows:

"Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to standards required by the state, therefore be it resolved that;

A. The District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of qualified men who shall meet with him for the purpose of counsel and advice at each church or new location where church property is to be erected.

B. A committee shall be chosen for each zone or section as necessary so that the men may be familiar with the territory.

C. This committee shall report to the Council as to its findings.

The adoption of part "C" to No. 10, District Programs, was moved and seconded. An amendment was offered to insert the word "net" between the words "basis of" and "members" and to change the word "received" to "gained." The amendment carried, and the main motion was then adopted, which reads as follows: C. Be it resolved that we establish an honor roll system and that each church qualifying receive an honor roll certificate. This certificate shall be presented on the basis of net members gained during the conference yar. The groups and qualifications shall be as follows:

The committee's motion to adopt part "D" under No. 13, Ministerial Convention, was passed, which is an acceptance of the invitation of the Eastern Ohio District to join them in the 1964 Ministerial Convention.

Motion carried to add section "I" to No. 14, Missions, which calls for a combined Missionary Convention including General Church Extension, District Home Missions and World Missions, and specifies that the offerings received during the convention be divided equally, except that which is given for a specific place or department.

Under No. 17, Pastors, the committee's resolution to add item "4" on section "B" was amended, and the amended motion passed restricting a pastor to no more than two revivals per year away from his church, of not more than 10 or 12 days each, in addition to his two weeks of vacation.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

Second Sitting, Tuesday, July 23, 8:30 A.M.

The second sitting of the conference was opened at 8:30 A. M. Tuesday, July 23, with Elwood Stuart leading the conference in singing number 13, "Hiding In Thee." Rev. M. L. Bogard led in prayer, following which the Stuarts sang "Jesus, Lover of My Soul" with such a sense of divine presence that a spirit of blessed quietness rested upon the conference. Dr. Neff made extemporaneous comments of spiritual insight which increased the holy joy among us.

Minutes of the previous sitting were read and accepted.

The Resolution Committee resumed its report. No. 23, Sunday School and Youth, was moved for adoption. After discussion, a motion to amend was carried, and then the main motion as amended was passed and reads as follows: "Be it resolved that we have a combined institute of Sunday School and Youth, to be held in whatever section or sections of the district as the authorities think desirable."

The report of the Ways and Means Committee, read by Rev. M. L. Bogard, proceeded as follows:

The committee moved the adoption of a resolution entitled District Missionary Society, which requests each local society or church to pay \$1 per month for the promotion of the district society. A motion carried amending the amount to read 50 cents, and the main motion as amended was passed.

A motion to change from \$5 to \$7 the amount to be raised per church for Sunday School Institutes (No. 13, Sunday School Institute) was referred back to committee for further consideration, including proration of costs of said institutes to the churches of the district.

A motion to adopt No. 3, Zone School, was carried.

Robert Keith, whose name was overlooked in the earlier list of ministerial transfers presented to the conference, was accepted as a member of the conference, having been recommended to us from the Central District.

After a fifteen minute recess, the conference resumed business, and the Reception Committee presented Rev. Rollie Schell and Rev. Isaac of Indiana as visitors at the conference who were then given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The Sunday School report was given by Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, who then presented awards to the churches having the highest numerical and percentage gains, and a motion carried to receive the report.

The conference secretary, by previous appointment, presented the joint report of the Resolutions and the Ways and Means Commiteees on the relocating of our camp grounds. Rev. Charles Felsburg, another member of the investigating committee on relocating, was then given the floor, and he gave a detailed report on the features and facilities offered by the Memorial Holiness Camp grounds under consideration and gave figures of comparison between rental of these grounds and the maintenance and operation of our present grounds. The adoption of the joint report was moved and seconded.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

Third Sitting, 2:00 P.M., July 23, 1963

The conference reconvened at 2:00 P. M., with Elwood Stuart leading in the singing of "A Shelter in the Time of Storm." Rev. J. Howard Berridge led in prayer.

The Reception Committee introduced Rev. and Mrs. Dale Jones and Rev. James Hertel, who were then given honorary seats within the conference bar.

The conference resumed discussion of the motion to adopt the report on relocating of the camp ground. Upon a call for the vote, a motion prevailed to vote by secret ballot. The motion carried by a vote of 78 in favor to 33 against.

The report of the Examining Board recommending Mrs. Carl Beard for ordination as deaconess was heard and accepted.

The Ways and Means Committee brought back to the floor their revision of No. 13 on Sunday School Institute which then recommended the raising of 25 cents per member per year for financing the Sunday School and Youth Industries. A standing vote was taken and the motion was lost by a count of 49 for and 51 against.

The original Ways and Means resolution No. 13 on Sunday School and Youth was called for from the floor and readily passed by a standing vote.

The election of officers for the ensuing year was the next order of business, and the following tellers were appointed by the District Superintendent: Rev. B. Ivan Williams, chairman, and the Reverends M. L. Bogard, Ted Wilson, Wm. Salley, Joseph Martin, Hugh Mosher, Virgil Miller, Wm. Hannan, V. C. Sharp, and Armond Calvert.

After several unsuccessful ballots for the office of District Superintendent were taken, sensing an indicative trend in the balloting, Rev. Harold Monroe, the incumbent Superintendent, addressed the conference in a beautiful spirit, expressing to the people deep appreciation for their kindness and support through the years in his office, closing with remarks indicating the withdrawal of his name from the balloting. Rev. Charles Felsburg was then elected as District Superintendent on the twelfth ballot.

Rev. Melroy Ward was reelected Assistant Superintendent on the first ballot.

The sitting was adjourned by expiration of time.

Fourth Sitting, 7:00 P.M., July 23, 1963

The fourth sitting of the 1963 conference was an ordination service which began at 7:00 p. m., with Dr. Neff as the presiding officer and Bro. Elwood Stuart leading in the singing "A Charge To Keep I Have."

The scripture readings from 2 Timothy 4:1-8 and Titus 3:1-11 were given by Rev. L. R. Enlow and Rev. B. Ivan Williams. Rev. Melroy Ward led in an earnest prayer, seeking God's special blessings upon the service and particularly upon the candidates to be ordained.

The District Superintendent presented the candidates for ordination, namely, Boyd Schell for minister and Mrs. Carl Beard for deaconess, who were then seated before the speaker. Dr. Neff delivered a message challenging the candidates with the high honor and grave responsibility of the office to which they were to be ordained.

Following the message, the candidates responded affirmatively to the questions the presiding officer read from the Manual, after which they were duly ordained by the laying on of hands by the General Superintendent and the Ordination Council consisting of the reverends Charles Felsburg, Melroy Ward, Harold Monroe, B. Ivan Williams and L. R. Enlow.

The service closed with the singing of "Blest Be The Tie That Binds", and the congregation entered immediately into the evening camp srvice.

Fifth Sitting, Wednesday, July 24, 8:30 A.M.

The fifth sitting opened with the camp song evangelist leading the people in singing "My Jesus, I Love Thee." The Superintendent brought a brief report of good news concerning the greatly improved condition of the Waites family following their serious accident. Rev. Hugh Mosher led in prayer for God's continued presence to rest upon the conference, and the Stuarts blessed the opening moments of the sitting by singing "How Firm a Foundation." A brief period of rejoicing, testimony, and praise followed.

The minutes of the previous sittings of Tuesday were read and accepted.

The District Superintendent mentioned the action of the Council granting the Superintendent the privilege of taking a love offering for the Waites family. A motion was carried to have the District Secretary send greetings to Bro. and Sis. Waites and also to Bro. Simpson whohas been quite ill and hospitalized.

The Secretary will give the minutes of the ordination service in the minutes of the conference.

Next in the order of business was the election of District Secretary. The Council presented nominations for District Secretary, and Rev. L. R. Enlow was elected on the first ballot.

Rev. G. F. Sheridan was elected District Treasurer on the first ballot.

Ballots were cast for five Advisory members of the Council. Revs. M. H. Robbins, B. Ivan Williams, Lowell Thomas Brand, Harold Monroe, and W. L. Kilwy were all elected on the first ballot.

Bro. Monroe was reelected to the District Board of Trustees for a term of five years. The next election was for District Missionary President. Mrs. L. R. Enlow was elected to this office on the first ballot.

Two men were elected to the Examining Board—Rev. B. Ivan Williams for a period of three years and Rev. Armond Calvert for one year to complete the unexpired term of Rev. Felsburg.

Ballots were cast for a member of the Educational Board.

While the ballots were being counted, Rev. Monroe moved that the trustees for Frankfort Pilgrim College be left to the Council's decision. The motion was carried.

The Secretary reported on the results of the voting for a member of the Educational Board. Rev. L. R. Enlow was elected.

Motion to reelect by acclamation Rev. Clyde O. Waites as the District Statistician was carried.

The first ballot to elect the two non-Council members of the District Home Mission Board failed to produce any election. A motion carried to vote for two names out of the four highest on the previous ballot. D. R. Close and L. R. Roberts were elected.

The Conference recessed for fifteen minutes.

The report of the Memorial Committee, given by Mrs. E. M. Maddox, was accepted by the conference.

Rev. Neff asked the conference body to stand and sing "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder," in keeping with the reading of the Memorial report.

Rev. Charles Felsburg, the newly-elected District Superintendent, spoke of his appreciation for the faithful labors of Bro. Monroe as District Superintendent. Upon the previous consent of the District Council, he called for a march love offering for the retiring Superintendent, who stood in line to receive the kind expressions of the people of the district he had served so faithfully. With Mrs. D. R. Close at the piano, Rev. Williams led in singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." As the march continued, "What Friend We Have in Jesus" and "My Jesus, I Love Thee" were also sung.

Returning to the platform, Rev. Monroe, with deep feeling and a most gracious spirit, expressed gratitude for both the offering and the expressions of appreciation given by the people. He earnestly intended to make heaven his home. But most of all, he desired this for his wife and family. He gave the assurance that the one great purpose to which he would hold would be that he with us, in the interests of the Kingdom, would continue to work together in oneness of the Spirit of Christ, whether it be within the district or duty called elsewhere.

A list of evangelistic workers was read by the District Superintendent and approved by the conference. Dr. Neff encouraged the churches to use our evangelists.

The District Church Extension Committee's report, given by Rev. Robbins, was received by the conference upon motion which carried.

The list of pastoral changes was read by the District Superintendent.

The chairman asked that the Conference stand and sing the chorus, "We'll Work 'Till Jesus Comes," which was led by Rev. Williams.

The Conference approved a resolution expressing appreciation to Dr. Neff for his efficiency and gracious manner in conducting the Conference, and to the district officers, camp ground officials, and others who are responsible for the efficient operation of the Conference and camp, and to the Springfield News and Sun for its coverage of the newsworthy conference events.

Rev. Monroe made announcements and urged the pastors and delegates to stay for the remaining camp services.

Dr. Neff adjourned the conference with prayer led by Rev. B. Ivan Williams and which included special petition that the year ahead be filled with God's blessings upon the work of the district.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

A. Be it resolved that the conference treasured have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.

B. That all money raised in the local churches for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.

C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our Pastors and Churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to standards required by the state, therefore be it resolved that:

A. The District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of qualified men who shall meet with him for the purpose of counsel and advice at each church or new location where church property is to be erected.

E. A committee shall be chosen for each zone or section as necessary so that the men may be familiar with the terriory.

C. This committee shall report to the Council as to its findings.

No. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Whereas many of our pastors and laymen who attend the annual conference do not get to attend the camp services due to various demands at home, and due to the added expense of having our conference either ahead of or after the camp; and since we have only a few campers who attend the day services of camp;

A. Therefore, be it resolved that we request our council to set the camp and conference as follows:

(1) That our camp begin on Friday evening before the last full week of July, with regular services until Monday noon.

(2) That our district conference begin on the first Monday of camp at 2:00 p. m. with the following schedule: Monday, 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.; Tuesday, 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon and 2:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m.; Wednesday, 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and afternoon sessions as needed.

(3) That the evening evangelistic camp services continue on schedule with the camp evangelist preaching in these services during conference.

(4) That the District Youth Convention convene as per schedule on Thursday, with its conference being held on Saturday.

(5) That the regular camp service schedule resume its normal schedule after the close of the District Conference.

B. Any person who has furnished, and regularly rents a room, shall have authority of that room. If he does not intend to occupy the room during the camp, it shall be turned over to the Camp Registrar, unless he has authorized a family or a married person to occupy the room.

C. All who rent a room or a cot at camp shall furnish their own linen.

D. Our camp schedule shall be arranged to provide one service of World Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions at times to be sent by the District Council.

E. Any person who is transferred from our district, or otherwise becomes disqualified, shall be automatically dispossessed of his room. These persons whose claims have been relinquished shall be immediately notified by the camp registrar.

F. Inasmuch as there is so much disturbance on the camp ground during the camp be it resolved that someone who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.

G. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference, with fair remuneration; also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the Camp.

No. 4 CONFERENCE BAR

A. The conference bar is to consist of three sections of seats at the right of the platform, to the back center aisle, and the platform.

E Services shall be provided for the children during the Conference.

No. 5 CONFERENCE YEAR

A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician needs more time to prepare his report for Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close June 30th and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than July 5th.

B. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes June 30th, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's book close July 5th.

No. 6 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 7 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a voucher.

B. Be it further resolved that all minister's phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 8 DISTRICT COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum. B. Be it resolved that our entire Disrict Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.

C. Be is further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 9 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 10 DISTRICT PROGRAMS

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following conference, for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work, Local, District and General. B. Be it further resolved that we set a goal for membership of 116 members per year for the Quadrennium.

C. Be it also resolved that we establish an honor roll system and that each church qualifying receive an honor roll certificate. This certificate shall be presented on the basis of net members gained during the conference year. The groups and qualifications shall be as follows:

No. 11 MINISTERS

A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.

B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.

C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 12 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

A. Be it so resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.

B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 13 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.

B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.

C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council. D. Be it resolved that we accept the invitation of the Eastern Ohio District to attend a joint Ministerial Convention with them in 1964.

No. 14 MISSIONS

Whereas, we do not have a report in our District Minutes from the District Home Missionary Committee, that would serve to set District Home Missions before our people in clear perspective,

A. Be it resolved that we reorganize our District Home Missionary Committee, and that it be composed of five members, consisting of the District Superintendent, two members of the District Council (to be appointed by the council), and two members to be elected by the Conference from outside the council.

B. Further, it shall be the responsibility of the committee to present to this conference a District Home Missionary Program to be approved by the Council. This committee committee shall also report annually to the District Conference and shall be responsible for the execution of the Home Missionary program.

C. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.

D. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.

E. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.

F. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.

G. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in the new works.

H. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.

I. Be it further resolved that we have a combined Missionary Convention for General Church Extension, District Home Missions, and World Missions, and that the offerings received during the convention shall be divided equally except that which is given for a specific place or department.

No. 15 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 16 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination of service.

B. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night after the first day of Conference.

No. 17 PASTORS

A. Calling of:

(1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.

(2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.

(3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.

(4) Be it resolved the the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the second Sunday after Camp.

(5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a consider-

able length of time, making it difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor is not recalled:

(a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the results of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.

(b) That the District Superintendent make available to the changing churches a list of all the ministers who are changing, and who will be available to accept pastorates. B. Support of:

(1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.

(2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.

(3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and pastor.

(4) Be it resolved that no pastor take more than two revivals, of not more than 10 or 12 days each, per year away from his church in addition to his two weeks of vacation.

No. 18 PASTORS CALLS

Be it resolved that each visit to a home, and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 19 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 20 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 21 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 22 STANDARDS

A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.

C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with

the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Conference.

D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 23 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH PROMOTIONS

A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends that the state conferences provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee, and,

B. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate.

C. Inasmuch as our District annually has some type of Sunday School convention, and since it is generally held some time in the fall, therefore, be it resolved that we designate the first week of November as District Sunday School Promotion Week; further, be it resolved that the District Sunday School Convention be held during that week.

D. Since it is difficult to have a convention which draws a crowd sufficient to merit obtaining an outstanding speaker, therefore be it resolved that all churches be asked to plan their revivals in the future so as not to conflict with the Sunday School week; further, that the District Superintendent remind the church boards of this resolution when he meets with them relative to their local plans.

E. Be it resolved that an Annual Sunday School Rally be held in each zone, the same to be under the supervision of the superintendent. Furthermore, that the Promotional Secretary of District Sunday School work shall appoint committees in the various zones of the district to work under the supervision of the superintendent.

F. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our district churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.

G. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.

H. Be it resolved that we have a combined institute of Sunday School and Youth, to be held in such section or sections of the district as the authorities think desirable.

No. 24 SUPERINTENDENT

A. Be it resolved that when the district superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, that he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the district. B. Be it resolved that the district shall enroll the superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.

C. Resolved that the District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.

No. 25 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership; therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 26 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 27 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 28 APPRECIATION

A. Be it resolved: That we extend to our General Superintendent, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.

B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, members of the District Council, the Camp Grounds Committee, Educational and Examining Committees, cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been. C. That we express our appreciation to the Springfield News and Sun for the splended co-operation that they have given us in their paper for this Conference in the form of a letter from the District Secretary, and that we express our appreciation to Rev. Ted Wilson for his labors as a reporter.

D. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

A. Be it resolved that each local church be asked to bring provisions to relieve the financial obligations of the Camp Meeting.

B. We recommend that the District Council be requested to properly remunerate every person who has by labor or service helped to prepare our camp grounds and to carry on the camp, so far as reason and consistency will permit.

C. Be it resolved that all ministers' wives shall be subject to call to give one day's work in the kitchen or dining room.

D. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free. Those over 14 to be subject to call for work in any department.

E. That all visitors attending the Annual Conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers or their wives.

F. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimbuse their delegate for traveling.

G. That the charge for rooms for camp and conference be as follows:

(1) Rooms at the rate of 8.00 for the entire time or 2.00 for the first and 1.50 for each additional night.

(2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time or \$1.00 per day.

(3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give three days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$20.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.

B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending, forgiven interest or principal.

C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.

D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent per annum.

E. Each church shall pay a promotional budget to the District in the amount of \$4.00 per member per year to be dispersed as follows: the minimum payment of principal and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.

F. Realizing the cost of interest, we propose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

What The Loan Fund Can Do

(1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.

(2) Eventully improve some older but promising churches.

(3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.

(4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus givin them funds with which to operate.

(5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

Be it resolved that each local society or church be requested to pay 50 cents per month for the promotion of the District Missionary Society. Said funds are to be sent to the District Treasurer from whom they shall be transferred to the Disrict Missionary Society treasurer.

No. 8 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 9 MINISTERS DUTIES

A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.

B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 10 MINISTERS' INSURANCE PLAN

Inasmuch as there is a need among the ministers of the district for an effective plan of health and life insurance, be it resolved that the District Council make the necessary investigation into various plans of group insurance, and at the earliest practicable time, call the ministers of the district together to present to them their recommendations concerning such a plan, at which time a representative of the insurance company will be present to give explanation and answer questions.

No. 11 MINUTES

A. Be it resolved that the price of the minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.

B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.

No. 12. SALARIES

A. District Superintendent.

(1) Be is resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$90.00 per week, 6c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.

(2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.

B. District Council

Resolved that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurers' Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 13. STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund (Formerly General Budget)

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provisions as follows:

B. District Budget

(1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offering received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

(2) Be it resolved that we raise 50 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.

(3) Inasmuch as zoning arrangements concerning Frankfort Pilgrim College have been reached to the satisfaction of the General Board and the District Council, therefore be it resolved that we raise \$1 per member per year for the Frankfort Pilgrim College.

(4) Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.25 per member per year to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.

(5) Be it resolved that we ask each church to raise 1.00 per member per year for Camp Ground maintenance.

(6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.

(7) Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

(8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obligations without good reasons shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

(9) Be it resolved that the following chart be used as a guide for local church treasurers in paying the district budget:

No. 14 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH INSTITUTES

Inasmuch as the Council has recommended it, be it resolved that we raise \$7 per church for the Sunday School and Youth Institute.

No. 15 TREASURER

A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books—Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer, the audit to be made after the books have been closed on July 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

B. Insuring of the Treasurer—We recommend that the council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 16 YOUTH

A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.

B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expenses of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in the budget statement as "Youth Convention and Conference."

C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00, said fund to be used to provide monitors and adult supervision. Delegates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

YOUTH CONFERENCE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To Dr. P. F. Elliott, conference chairman, and members of this 1963 Western Ohio District Youth Conference:

It is with much praise to God that I submit this report to the Youth Conference. We have been made more fully aware, during this past year, of the fact that without His help and blessing we can do nothing. With the knowledge that we must give an account to Him with whom we all have to do, I have desired to have a spiritual youth program in harmony with His will. If this has been realized, then all credit and honor belong to the Lord.

It was a special privilege to accompany Rev. Harold Monroe, our former District Superintendent to the seven zone organizational meetings. I visited each zone in the district and preached in a zone rally in each one.

There were two Youth Leaders' Institutes held, one at the Cincinnati Elmwood Church with 48 in attendance; and the other one at the Defiance Church with an attendance of 70. Rev. and Mrs. Joe Brown of Frankfort, Indiana, were the Institutes workers.

Another interesting youth activity of the year was "Action Day" at Frankfort Pilgrim College. On May 11 some 200 young people and older people of our District attended this special activity to help swell the total number present to at least 1000.

There were two Pilgrim Senior Banquets held, one at Lima with some 90 in attendance, which included 11 seniors. The other one was held at Hamilton with an attendance of 127, which included 11 seniors. Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of S. S. and Youth, was the banquet speaker, and the Kings Men Trio from Owosso College, Owosso, Michigan, were the special singers.

The District Youth Camp, with the theme "Adventure With Christ" was the scene of many and varied activities, with 157 young people in attendance. Of greatest importance were the evening evangelistic services where many young people found definite, spiritual help. We greatly appreciated the messages brought by Rev. Stanley Booher, Rev. Robert Hiler, Rev. Clyde Waites, and Rev. Paul Berridge. We also appreciated the co-operation and work of the teachers, troop-leaders and other workers of the youth camp. The Holy Spirit did bless in a wonderful way, and we are still getting reports of victories won at the youth camp.

Rev. William Gilkerson and Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Stuart have been a great blessing as God has used them in this youth convention for the spiritual benefit of us all.

I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to Brother Monroe, the Youth Council and all who have been such a help and blessing throughout this year. If Jesus tarries, I trust that all that has been done this year will be added to, and built upon, for a greater and more effective youth work in the Western Ohio District.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

8:30 A.M., July 27, 1963

The ninth annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened with Rev. Ivan Williams leading the congregation in singing "Sunshine in the Soul."

District Superintendent, Rev. Charles Felsburg, led in prayer.

Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President, introduced Dr. P. F. Elliott, President of Owosso College, who presided over this Conference.

Dr. Elliott talked about youth work in the church and brought greetings from Rev. O. D. Emery, General Secretary of Pilgrim Youth.

The Conference was called to order by Dr. Elliott and the secretary read the roll call. The following officers were present: Rev. Charles Felsburg, District Superintendent, Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President, Rev. Robert Ferguson, District Vice President, and Mr. James Booher, District Youth Secretary. The following Zone Chairmen were present: Rev. M. H. Robbins, Rev. L. T. Brand, Rev. W. L. Kilwy, Rev. Robert Ferguson and Mr. James Booher. Also 20 pastors, 6 youth presidents, and 40 delegates answered the roll call of churches. A motion setting the conference bar was carried. Motion carried to recess at 12:00 noon.

The report of the District Youth President, Rev. Ted Wilson, was read and accepted.

The report of the District Youth Treasurer was read by the conference secretary. A motion carried to receive the treasurer's report.

The Zone Chairmen gave their reports. Rev. Cedric Wilson's report was read by Rev. Ted Wilson. Motion carried to receive these reports.

Rev. Ted Wilson then read the Tug-O-War Contest results stating that the Hamilton Zone had won the contest.

Reports of the Local Youth Society Presidents were given. These fine reports were received on motion. Dr. Elliott, chairman, suggested that next year these reports be limited to one minute.

Motion carried to recess for ten minutes.

Winners of the District Youth Camp snapshop contest were announced by the District Youth President.

Report of the Ways and Means Committee was read by Mr. James Booher. A resolution concerning No. 1, Executive Fund, section B, was carried.

Motion carried to delete No. 2-B under Project Fund.

Resolution No. 3 Method of Raising Executive and Project Funds was tabled until the report of the Young People's Resolutions Committee was read.

A resolution to delete No. 4 under Youth Camp was adopted.

Rev. Rudolph Moore, pastor of the Argo, Illinois Pilgrim Holiness Church was introduced and given an honorary seat within the Conference Bar.

The Report of the Resolutions Committee was read by Rev. Verl Light.

A motion carried to add to No. 2 under Committees the following: "The Reports of these committees are to be sent to each church thirty days prior to Youth Conference."

An amended resolution No. 4 under Reporter, concerning Youth News for the Western Builder, carried.

A resolution to delete No. 7 (c) Youth Camp was adopted.

Motion concerning re-evaluation of the Youth Camp and Convention program to be shown in the minutes as No. 8-D, Youth Council, carried.

A Resolution concerning the Youth Project No. 10 was adpoted.

A motion carried to delete "A" and "B" from No. 11 Youth Societies.

Resolution No. 13-C, Zone Program, concerning District participation in Action Day at Frankfort Pilgrim College, was amended to include Owosso College and was adopted as amended.

Tabled Ways and Means resolution No. 3, concerning Method of raising Executive and Project Fund, was re-read and after discussion was amended and adopted.

Tellers for the election of officers were appointed by the Youth President. They were Rev. Hugh Mosher, Rev. William Salley, Rev. Paul Berridge, Rev. Robert Hiler, Rev. Verl Light and Mr. Hoagland.

Rev. Ted Wilson was re-elected for two years as District Youth President on the first ballot.

Motion carried to recess until 1:30 p.m.

The conference reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with Rev. Ivan Williams leading in prayer.

Rev. Paul Berridge was elected vice president on the second ballot, and Rev. Verl Light was elected youth treasurer on the first ballot. Mr. Jones Booher was elected District Youth Secretary on the first ballot.

The conference was divided into zones for the election of zone chairmen. The results were as follows: Cincinnati Zone, Rev. Otis Dinkins; Dayton Zone, Rev. Earl Wackenswanz; Greenville Zone, Rev. Armond Calvert; Hamilton Zone, Rev. Robert Hiler; Ambassador Zone, Rev. Cedric Wilson; Northern Zone, Rev. D. R. Close; Washington C. H. Zone, Rev. Paul Berridge.

A motion to authorize the Youth Council to read, correct, and approve the minutes was carried.

A love offering for Rev. Ted Wilson was taken.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolution Committee thanking Dr. Elliott for his fine leadership in this conference.

Dr. Elliott adjourned conference at 2:35 p.m. with prayer.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairman, be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolution Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible. The Reports of these committees are to be sent to each church thirty days prior to Youth Conference.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather and co-ordinate Youth News for the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, Part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report to the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council; and this report will not conflict with the present District report.

No. 7 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program, the plans, dates, and administration of which are to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp will begin the last Monday of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.

B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.

No. 8 YOUTH COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times each year, and the officers of the district be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.

B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council promote an annual tour of one or more of our colleges.

C. Be it resolved that a Northern and a Southern Regional Senior Banquet be planned by the Youth Council. The Council shall set the time, place and price per person. Seniors shall be entertained free.

D. Be it resolved that the entire youth camp and convention program be re-evaluated by the District Executive Youth Council; said Council having authority to make any necessary changes.

No. 9 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone twice annually.

No. 10 YOUTH PROJECT

Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids and recreational equipment for the Youth Camp.

No. 11 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed July 5th, and the Youth Council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 12 ZONE PROGRAM

A. In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President, and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

B. Be it resolved that the district hold a Tug-O-War contest between the zones, with rules to be set up by the Youth Executive Council and distributed to the zone chairman and pastors as soon as possible.

C. Be it resolved that our District Youth Program include Action Day at Frankfort Pilgrim College to be held each year on the second Saturday of May, and Youth in Action Day at Owosso College.

No. 13 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give a vote of thanks to Dr. P. F. Elliott for his fine leadership in this conference.

Report of Young People's Ways and Means Committee

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.

B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$7.50 a year to maintain the fund.

C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed six cents (6 cts.) per mile for traveling expenses.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.00 to be paid by each church.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

A. Be it resolved that each zone be responsible for the raising of \$9.50 per church for the executive and project funds. Said money includes an executive fund of \$7.50 and a project fund of \$2.00, stated under No. 1 (B) and No. 2 (A)

Sheridan, District Treasurer of the Pilgrim Holiness Church—Western Ohio District, for the period beginning July 6, 1962 and ending July 5, 1963, including the summer camp operation. 
