JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Sitting

The Eleventh Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at the Memorial Holiness Campground, West Milton, Ohio, at 2:00 p.m., July 19, 1965, with General Superintendent Dr. P. W. Thomas presiding.

District Superintendent Rev. Charles Felsburg greeted the Conference and called upon Rev. Norval Rickner to lead the congregation in song. The congregation sangthree verses of, "I'm Pressing On," and Rev. L. R. Roberts led in prayer.

The district superintendent introduced the general superintendent, Rev. P. W. Thomas, who addressed the Conference using a passage of Scripture taken from Hebrews 12, beginning with verse 25. Verse 27, referring to "those things which cannot be shaken" was cited for particular notice.

He referred to the changing patterns in the political, social, and religious world against a backdrop of unchanging things headed by the unchanging God, Himself. Spiritual values have not changed. Bible standards of integrity have not changed, which includes one's relationship to his home, his church, his employer, and his brethren. God's standards of morality and purity have not changed. God's standards concerning worldliness have not changed. This worldliness of one's spirit can only be changed by the new birth. The gospel which changes men's lives and the Great Commission to go with the gospel has not changed.

Following his short address, Dr. Thomas called the Conference to order.

Dr. Thomas outlined the Conference bar and the time of sessions.

The secretary called the roll of ministerial delegates. The roll of lay delegates was called.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham, Rev. and Mrs. George Poole, Rev. Kenneth Whitescarver, Rev. and Mrs. Jason Sherwood, and Rev. Norval Rickner were introduced to the Conference and accepted by the body, then seated within the Conference bar.

Rev. James Hertel, president of Frankfort Pilgrim College was introduced and granted a seat within the Conference bar and was welcomed to the platform by the presiding officer.

Report of the district superintendent was read, which included both a report of material progress and an ad libbed exhortation to higher things, and this was accepted by a standing vote and a hearty Amen!

Reverends M. H. Robbins, E. E. Leadingham, Cedric Wilson, Dale Rummel, and Melroy Ward were given special recognition for contributions made to the Conference in the way of material progress.

Report of the assistant superintendent, Rev. Melroy Ward, was read and accepted by a hearty Amen.

Rev. James Hertel, president of our zone college at Frankfort, Indiana, was given time to address the Conference.

Rev. Hertel, who is completing his sixth year as president of Frankfort Pilgrim, College, reported the financial year is closing in the "black." He also reported on the tri-semester program which would enable one (if he could carry a full study program) to complete college in two years and seven months. A brochure was circulated which projects building plans for the near and more distant future.

Conference recessed for five minutes, then continued with the reading of reports. Mrs. H. C. Walker read the report of the Auditing Committee, accepting the report of the Certified Public Accountant, Marion Fessler, of Piqua, Ohio. The report was accepted by the Conference, upon motion.

The report of the District Treasurer, Rev. G. F. Sheridan, was presented to the Conference with pertinent comments. The report was accepted upon motion.

Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, Sunday School Promotional Secretary, presented his report and awarded various colored ribbons honoring churches for progress in Sunday School work. Pink ribbons for a gain of 15% or more were won by the Leipsic, Sidney and Maud churches. Blue ribbons for gains of 10% or more were awarded to the White Oak and Bevis churches. The certificate for highest numerical gain was awarded the Mulberry Church and honorable mention was given to the Lima Market Street, Maud, Meadow Grove and Sidney churches.

Mrs. Charles Felsburg, District Missionary Society President, presented an encouraging report which was accepted by the Conference with an "Amen."

District Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. L. R. Enlow, presented her report, which was accepted upon motion.

The Conference session adjourned.

Second Sitting — Tuesday A. M., July 20

The Tuesday morning session of Conference began at its appointed time with Rev. Dale Rummel leading the conference in singing, "Deeper,"

The District Superintendent called on Rev. Jason Sherwood to lead the congregation in prayer.

Rev. P. W. Thomas, upon taking charge of the sitting, read a scripture lesson from Matthew 25, beginning with verse 14. He indicated, in speaking from the Word, our need of not only doing our best, but also of setting goals for our work. Dr. Thomas emphasized that our first goal should be to have a more spiritual church than ever before. A second goal he stressed was to get more people converted, and get them into the church. There must be replacements for those who have gone to glory.

Dr. Thomas emphasized the improving of our Sunday Schools, especially cur teaching staffs; also our financial condition and the condition of our physical facilities. He urged us to find ways to meet all our financial obligations to the church.

Dr. Thomas closed his timely message with prayer, then led us in singing, "This Is My Story."

The Chairman gave a few moments time for recognition of any delegates who were not present at the first session. Minutes of previous sittings were read and approved. The Report of the Examining Board was read by Rev. Ted Wilson and approved. Rev. Jerald Lavy, transerring to us from the East Michigan District, was introduced to the Conference and after words of personal testimony was given a seat within the Conference bar.

Rev. and Mrs. Frank Thompson were also introduced to the conference and gave words of testimony. Rev. Thompson was accepted by the conference and seated within the conference bar.

Rev. Rollie Schell was introduced to the conference and granted a seat within the conference bar.

Rev. Virgil Miller reported for the Resolutions Committee, and the following action was taken.

Motion to delete Resolution No. 17-A(5)b regarding the providing of a list of available ministers to the churches, was adopted.

Motion to add a new resolution concerning use of Conference Minutes during voting was lost.

Resolution No. 3, providing for changes in dates of conference and ending of conference year was presented. After some debate an amendment was offered to separate the two points discussed in the resolution. Then a motion prevailed to refer the entire resolution back to the committee for redrafting.

Resolution No. 4, concerning Sunday School, Youth and Leadership co-ordination

was read. The Chairman ruled that the section referring to the election of Sunday School Promotional Secretary by the conference was out of order as it conflicted with the Manual. After the omission of this section, the amended motion carried.

Resolution No. 5 regarding Pilgrim Men's Fellowship was adopted upon motion.

Rev. Wallace Marshall reported for the Committee on Ways and Means.

Recommendation No. 1 concerning charges for cottages and rooms was adopted. Recommendation No. 2 pertaining to charge for electricity was moved adopted and carried.

Recommendation No. 3 regarding camp clean-up was adopted.

Recommendation No. 4, Ministers Insurance Plan, was read. Motion and second to adopt were made. An amendment was offered to add the following: "Further that the Company chosen to insure the ministers be selected by the District Council." The amendment carried. The main motion as amended was adopted.

Recommendation No. 5, increasing mileage for the District Superintendent from 6 cents to 7 cents per mile was adopted.

Recommendation No. 6 deleting a phrase from No. 16-C was adopted.

Recommendation No. 7 pertaining to cottage rentals was seconded and carried. A supplemental report of the Examining Board was given by Rev. Ted Wilson and was accepted upon motion.

Rev. Gary Leiberick, transferring to us from the Wesleyan Methodist Church, gave a few words of testimony, and the sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Wilson.

Third Sitting

The conference reconvened with Rev. Dale Rummel leading the congregation in singing "Saved to the Uttermost." Rev. Felsburg called Rev. E. E. Leadingham to the microphone to lead in prayer. The sitting was then called to order by Rev. Thomas.

Rev. M. H. Robbins read the minutes of the previous sitting which were approved.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs was given by Mrs. E. M. Maddox, in memory of Mrs. Edna Walter Harmon. The conference accepted the report with a few moments of silent prayer, after which prayer was offered by Rev. Melroy Ward. Rev. Thomas led the congregation in singing "Shall we Gather at the River?"

Rev. Paul Graham of the National Evangelical Association was presented to the conference by Rev. Thomas, and upon motion of the conference, gave an inspiring exhortation on II Timothy 1:13-14. He stated that many things are happening in the church and it is a great thing to be a part of it. He emphasized Paul's admonition to "Hold Fast" to something that is good. Many things are changing in the world, the nation, the church, and there is something good that we need to hang on to. We can hold fast to these things only as His Spirit dwells in us.

Rev. Graham left literature to be distributed, concerning N.A.E., and announced a convention to be held at the Southern Hotel, Columbus, Ohio, October 28 thru 30, 1965.

The Resolutions Committee reported on the redrafted motion called for in an earlier sitting, concerning the changing of date of conference and the end of the conference year. The redrafted motion lost. An alternate resolution was then presented, which would end the conference on May 31st. A substitute to this motion, making the end of the conference year April 30th was lost. The main motion, to close the conference year on May 31st, then carried.

The Committe on Memorials to the International Conference reported.

Resolution No. 1, asking the Conference to make the District Superintendent, Assistant District Superintendent, District Secretary and District Treasurer of each fully organized district in the U.S.A. delegates to the International Conference by virtue of their office, was approved.

Resolution No. 2, to change from 7 to 15 the number of members required to organize a church, was approved.

Resolution No. 3, changing all instances requiring 2/3 majority vote to 3/5 was carried.

A motion to table Resolution No. 4 concerning changing from 3 to 1 General Superintendent was carried.

Resolution No. 5 concerning developing a new plan for raising United Stewardship Fund was presented. The first amendment offered was withdrawn, and a second amendment, revising the wording of the resolution was approved. The main motion then carried.

After a five minute recess, Rev. Ward presented Rev. Max Williams to Dr. Thomas and the conference. He was accepted by the conference as transferring from the Eastern Ohio District, and was given a seat within the conference bar.

The next order of business being the election of officers, Dr. Thomas offered prayer asking God's guidance in this important business. Rev. Felsburg named the following tellers: Revs. Rickner, Salley, Whitescarver, Rummel, Thompson, Marshall, Grandstaff, Leadingham, Sherwood, C. Wilson, Forrester and Mosher.

There was no election required for District Superintendent as the two year term has not expired. The first ballot was cast for Assistant District Superintendent, and resulted in no election. Rev. Melroy Ward was elected on the second ballot.

Ballots were then cast for District Treasurer, District Secretary, and District Missionary Society President, with the following results: Rev. G. F. Sheridan was re-elected Treasurer on the first ballot; Rev. M. H. Robbins, Secretary on the first ballot, and Mrs. Ann Marshall, Missionary Society President on the second ballot.

Ballots were then cast for five councilmen. Tellers retired to count and the nominees for three members to the Examining Board were presented. It was explained that the two receiving the highest number of votes would fill the vacant three year terms, and the third highest would fill the unexpired two-year term of Rev. Roberts who has withdrawn. Tellers also retired to count this vote.

Motion by Bro. Miller that an open ballot be held for ministerial delegates to the International Conference, and that council bring a list of nominees for lay delegates for the consideration of the conference, was seconded and approved.

The sitting adjourned by expiration of time.

Ordination Service - July 20, 1965, 7:30 P.M.

The service was opened with Bro. Longfellow leading in singing "Stepping in the Light," and "I am the Resurrection." Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, camp evangelist, led in prayer.

A beautiful duet, "Thirty Pieces of Silver," was sung by Eddie Fisher and Dave Shirley of the Mulberry church. Bishop Ullrey of the Brethren in Christ church was introduced by Rev. Felsburg and spoke briefly. Prayer was offered by Rev. Wallace Marshall, and the offeratory, "Since Jesus Came into my Heart," was played by the Greenville Cornet Trio. The Longfellows sang, "Teach Me, Lord, to Wait." Rev. Rummel led the congregation in singing "A Charge to Keep."

Scriptures from II Timothy 3, II Timothy 4 and Titus 3 were read by Revs. Melroy Ward, Earl Wachenschwanz and M. H. Robbins, respectively.

The congregation stood as the candidate, Rev. Jerald Lavy, with his wife, were presented to Dr. Thomas and the committee.

Dr. Thomas read from Psalm 126, and took as his text, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." There are two striking scenes in this picture. First, is the sower going forth, weeping, and bearing precious seed. There is no plan or program

that will take the place of the warm human hand reaching out to the people. We cannot wait for the people to come to us—we must go to the people. Consider the tears of the sower; tears of compassion, of intercession, of suffering and of sacrifice. And then there is the second picture—that of the sower returning, rejoicing, bearing sheaves. There are a lot of things that will not matter when we stand in eternity, but the two things that will count will be "Is my heart right?" and "What have I done for Jesus?" When we march before the King, will we be able to present to Him the "brands" we have rescued from the burning?

At the conclusion of the address, Rev. Lavy stood before the Ordination Committee, consisting of Revs. Charles Felsburg, Dale Rummel, Melroy Ward, M. H. Robbins, Earl Wachenschwanz. After satisfactory answers to the questions from Dr. Thomas, Rev. Lavy, with the committee, knelt for prayer by Bro. Felsburg. He was then ordained by Dr. Thomas by prayer and with the laying on of hands of the committee. The congregation sang, "I'll Live for Him."

The service was dismissed with prayer by Bishop Ullrey.

Fourth Sitting - Wednesday, July 21, 1965, 8:30 A.M.

The morning sitting of the conference was opened with Rev. Robert Ferguson leading the congregation in singing, "Amazing Grace," with Mrs. L. T. Brand and Mrs. Robert Ferguson at the organ and piano. Rev. Felsburg called Rev. Hugh Mosher to the platform to lead in prayer.

Dr. Thomas called the conference to order, and minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved. He then instructed the conference that provisions should be made for showing a complete roll call of the conference in the minutes.

The tellers announced the results of ballots cast in the previous sitting, the elections being as follows: Revs. L. T. Brand, Robert C. Ferguson, D. R. Close, Ted Wilson and Earl Wachenschwanz, advisory members of council; Revs. Ted Wilson and E. E. Leadingham. 3 year terms and Virgil Miller 2 year term to the Examining Board.

The nominations of the District Council for a member of the Educational Board were presented: Wallace Marshall, J. H. Sherwood and M. H. Robbins. Rev. Wallace Marshall was elected.

Nominees for District Statistician were James Booher and Rev. Stanley Booher, with Mr. James Booher being elected.

Due to the resignation of the previously elected District Missionary Society President, the previously named nominees, Mrs. Vera Close and Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, were resubmitted for election. Mrs. Wilson was elected on the first ballot.

The entire record of voting for the five advisory members to the council was read to the conference upon request, as well as the record of voting for the members of the Examining Board.

Nominees for the following offices were presented and voted on consecutively: CYC Director—Revs. Wallace Marshall and Ted Wilson; PELT Director, Revs. Earl Wachenschwanz and Dale Rummel; Member-at-Large to Christian Education Coordination Committee—Mr. James Booher and Mr. John Holstein. An open ballot was cast for one District Trustee. These ballots had the following results: CYC Director, Rev. Ted Wilson; PELT Director, Rev. Dale Rummel; CEC Committee, Mr. James Booher. There being no election of trustee on the first ballot, a motion prevailed to vote on the two receiving the highest number of votes. This resulted in the election of Rev. G. F. Sheridan.

Ballots were cast for ministerial and lay delegates to the International Conference, and the conference recessed until the count was completed. The balloting resulted in the election of Rev. L. T. Brand as one ministerial delegate. Motion carried to vote for four of the ten names receiving the highest number of votes, and a second

ballot was cast. Revs. Melroy Ward, G. F. Sheridan and M. H. Robbins were elected.

Motion prevailed to accept the next highest as the fifth delegate, and five following highest number of votes to be alternates. The result was as follows: Delegate, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz; Alternates—Revs. E. E. Leadingham, Ted Wilson, D. R. Close, Wallace Marshall, and Robert Ferguson.

The report of the ballots cast for lay delegates showed the election of three: Mr. James Booher, Mr. Lawrence Longfellow, and Mr. Clifford Ward. A motion to accept the two with the next highest number of votes as the two remaining delegates, and the five following as alternates, carried. The two delegates were: Mrs. Mary Smack and Mr. Robert McCoppin. Alternates chosen were: Mr. E. T. Rigel, Mr. Roger Fisher, Mr. Ernest Goldsmith, Mr. Floyd Kasler and Mr. Wilson Mahoney.

Ballots were cast for two members of the District Church Extension Board. A report of pastoral appointments was read by the District Superintendent and accepted by the conference.

A supplemental report was submitted by the Resolutions Committee, Rev. Virgil Miller reporting.

A resolution changing No. 17A(4) to state that the end of the pastor's term will be the last Sunday of June was adopted.

A resolution disqualifying any pastor serving under the District Church Extension Board from serving on that Board was approved.

An Appreciation Resolution extending thanks to all who had a part in making the conference successful, with particular mention of Dr. Thomas, was adopted.

Rev. Felsburg spoke a few minutes on the importance of the unity of the Holy Spirit in our lives when doing business for God.

The tellers announced no election of the two members of the District Church Extension Board. Motion to vote for two of the five highest carried. Motion carried to extend adjournment time of the sitting until completion of count of ballots, thus avoiding an afternoon session. The second ballot resulted in the election of Revs. Wallace Marshall and E. E. Leadingham.

Motion to refer all unfinished business of the conference to the District Council for completion was approved.

The motion to adjourn was approved by the congregation rising, and Rev. Melroy Ward dismissed with prayer.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, delegates to the Eleventh Annual Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, friends:

Greetings in the wonderful name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. In the providence of God we are gathered on these lovely grounds for our second camp meeting and Conference. This is an appropriate time for all of us to thank God for His visitation on our last camp. Especially do we give God praise for the wonderful altar service on the last Sunday night.

But we should thank God for the immediate blessings we enjoyed in the first day of this camp, yesterday, and the climactic altar service of last night.

All of you are interested in the progress made in selling Sugar Grove Campground, in Springfield. Your District Council has worked diligently through this past year. The grounds are presently in the hands of a realtor, who has a client expressing interest in purchasing. Let us pray together for the help of God in selling this property.

It was our privilege to work with the Eastern Ohio ministers, in another joint ministerial convention last February. The inspiration and fellowship we experienced will long live in our memories. General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, challenged our hearts with pertinent truth.

Three district missionary conventions were held this spring. Springfield First, was host to the first; Cincinnati First, to the second convention; and Lima Market Street, the third. My part in these conventions was to spearhead the work of district home missions. The challenge was put to Western Ohio Pilgrims to launch a new church in the greater Cincinnati area. Although we have not reached our necessary financial goal, we have taken some great strides in this direction. Since we have not received enough pledges to completely underwrite the project we will have to momentarily delay opening. Let us pray and give to establish another center of Christian holiness. I cannot over emphasize how important it is for us to expand our work in this great metropolitan area. Thousands of new homes have been built on all sides of Cincinnati. Many new developments are under way. If we are to keep pace with the expanding population we must establish churches in these areas. It takes faith and courage to forge ahead with a district home missionary program and I believe our Conference has been chosen to take this course. As your administrator, nothing would please me more than to spend my full time with this phase of our work. Will you join with the many Pilgrims across the Conference who have already pledged to support our new project? We are asking you to give one dollar per week for two years, so property can be purchased and a full-time pastor placed on the field. Let us rise to the challenge of this missionary enterprise.

A door was opened to us in the northern part of the state some months ago. For about 12 years we have had a small struggling congregation called New Zion. We did not own property and the building we were using was inadequate for growth. It was a one-room building with no Sunday school rooms. About six and a half miles to the northeast of New Zion, in a prosperous farming community, an E.U.B. church was vacated. Last fall I began negotiations to purchase the building, but it did not appear we would be able to arrive at a figure we felt could be reached on our part. After some months the Lord helped us to sign a contract for this lovely brick church, which is about 40 x 60, full basement, lovely furniture, automatic oil furnace, a few Sunday school tables and chairs for the unbelievable sum of \$4,000. The Lord has already provided over half this amount. We must pay the final balance by April 1st, but by that time I believe God will help us to completely clear the debt. Under the leadership of Rev. Floyd Thomas, the New Zion work was transferred to our new location, which is called Beech Grove. Beech Grove is situated about three miles southwest of Carey. We are very near several other smaller communities.

The community has responded well although we obtained the building too late in the present farming season to conduct an opening revival. Plans are in the making for two strong evangelistic efforts this fall. In the past few weeks they have broken their Sunday school record three times. Let this rural church be a challenge to you. Unless some of you begin to make some very positive progress, our growing Beech Grove congregation will pass you by in the next few months. This pastor believes he has one of the finest opportunities in the Conference and he is proving it. Some of the finest young people in Western Ohio are a vital part of Beech Grove. We give God all the glory for these strides of progress.

Sunday, August 1st, I am scheduled to meet with a small group that have expressed desire to join ranks with the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Further report' will be given on this new development through the pages of the Western Builder.

Time and space prevent me from giving detailed reports on all our district home missionary projects, but the above gives you our most recent developments. Your home missionary dollars are spent with great care and are giving us very fine returns. Some of the finest workers in Western Ohio District work in your Department of Church Extension.

OUR OUTLOOK

The key to our success or failure, lies largely in our outlook on life and the future. Our outlook is determined by our own spiritual relationships. Sanctified, Spirit-filled men and women of vision look on life as a panorama of opportunity and challenge. Yes, they are fully appraised of the odds, the powers of evil, the tremendous opposition that Satan raises; but their eyes are lifted beyond the immediate battlefields and all the opposition to the cross of Calvary and the Captain of our salvation. Some men speak as if the spiritual work of the church is frustrated, but they are only making public confession of their own spiritual frustrations.

If you are looking for an excuse for your failures, you will find many; but if this is your outlook, I tell you now, you will continue to FAIL. When I graduated from high school, our class chose for its motto, the slogan, "Ever Forward." This is a very appropriate motto for every one of us. Too many pastors and laymen are satisfied with the status quo, and to my dismay, retreat does not seem to alarm you. We dare not retreat. We live in one of history's finest hours for the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Western Ohio to forge ahead. History, our conscience, and our God will not excuse us if we do not take advantage of today's opportunities. No man who is determined to succeed need fail. We may face setbacks at times, but we must rise again to press ahead, with renewed vision, courage, and faith.

Western Ohio is, without a doubt, the best Conference in this denomination, and by God's grace we shall strive to be the largest. If you do not have such conviction and faith for your church, you are doomed to mediocrity or complete failure. Faith and courage are contagious. We are the leaders who must germinate this in the hearts of every Pilgrim in Western Ohio.

MATERIAL PROGRESS

AUBURN

Our Auburn property has no water or other modern facilities. A few days ago a well was drilled and preparations are being made to place a Mobile Home on our lots to serve as parsonage. Also a new roof is to be placed on the church building.

CINCINNATI FIRST

This conference year the mortgage on their church was paid in full. Shortly after, a lovely three bedroom parsonage was purchased in an addition on the northwest corner of the city. I was privileged to burn the mortgage on the church and to dedicate the parsonage in March.

GRAND RAPIDS

While this conference is in progress, the laminated arches are being erected for the new sanctuary and educational unit in Grand Rapids. The new structure is situated in a new addition on a strategic corner. Sufficient land has been purchased to build a parsonage later.

LIMA MARKET STREET

Very recently their parsonage has been relocated to very good residential area of Lima. Though the building is not new, it is a very adequate home. The old parsonage will be used for a much-needed Sunday school annex.

MAUD

This spring, the basement of their new church was completely finished. Each classroom has a plastered ceiling and the side walls are painted in pastel colors. The center auditorium has been finished into a beautiful youth and junior auditorium, complete with carpeted platform with new drapes as a background for the platform.

MOUNT ORAB

For many years, building a new church has been discussed. This past year their hopes were realized and now we have a brick church and educational unit. Also, new

pews and other church furniture, a new organ and piano. Pastor Cedric Wilson deserves much credit for his many hours of hard labor to make this program possible. The future is extremely bright for this growing congregation in a growing community.

NAPOLEON

After building the lovely Mount Orab church this past year, Rev. Cedric Wilson has accepted the challenge to build a new church in Napoleon. We rejoice to see this program under way. Lord willing, the building will be under way in August.

TROY

Since the beginning days of this church, we have rented a parsonage for the pastor. Last August, under the able leadership of Rev. E. E. Leadingham, a spacious three bedroom parsonage was purchased.

WHITE OAK

White Oak is one of our unusual rural churches. While most rural churches are realizing a decline, these Pilgrims are moving ahead. God in His providence sent these Pilgrims a pastor in the person of Rev. Wilbur Forrester, who is a professional contractor. Under his leadership they are building an annex which houses four Sunday school rooms and also will serve as an overflow for the sanctuary.

JOINT RESOLUTION OF RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES:

Be it resolved that we lease the Memorial Holiness Camp Ground of West Milton, Ohio, for a period of ten years, and that the District Council be empowerd by the conference to sell our camp property at Springfield, Ohio.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General Interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local churches for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, that the local church may receive due credit.
- C. The District Treasurer shall send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget, six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.
- No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our Pastors and Churches are not familiar with building programs and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to standards required by the state, therefore be it resolved that:

- A. The District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of qualified men who shall meet with him for the purpose of counsel and advice at each church or new location where church property is to be erected.
- B. A committee shall be chosen for each zone or section as necessary so that the men may be familiar with the territory.
- C. This committee shall report to the Council as to its findings.

No. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Whereas many of our pastors and laymen who attend the annual conference do not get to attend the camp services due to various demands at home, and due to the added expense of having our conference either ahead of or after the camp; and since we have only a few campers who attend the day services of camp;

- A. Therefore, be it resolved that we request our council to set the camp and conference as follows:
- (1) That our camp begin on Friday evening before the last full week of July, with regular services until Monday noon.
- (2) That our district conference begin on the first Monday of camp at 2:00 p. m. with the following schedule: Monday, 2:00 to 5:00 p. m.; Tuesday, 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 roon and 2:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m.; Wednesday, 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon, and afternoon sessions as needed.
- (3) That the evening evangelistic camp services continue on schedule with the camp evangelist preaching in these services during conference.
- (4) That the District Youth Convention convene as per schedule on Thursday, with its conference being held on Saturday.
- (5) That the regular camp service schedule resume its normal schedule after the close of the District Conference.
- B. All who rent a room or a cot at camp shall furnish their own linen.
- C. Our Camp schedule shall be arranged to provide one service for World Missions, one for Church Extension, and one for District Home Missions at times to be set by the District Council.
- D. In order to prevent disturbance on the camp ground during the camp be it resolved that someone who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep peace, and that he be paid for his services. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention, camp and conference, also, that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's Convention as well as the Camp.

No. 4 CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Whereas there is a growing need for a better method of coordination of the non-professional teaching interests of the church, including Sunday School, P.Y.S., C.Y.C., and P.E.L.T., and

Whereas our International Youth and Sunday School Department, under the Direction of the General Board, has initiated a working method of coordinating these vital interests, a method which was described to various district leaders at a Christian Education Convocation held at Winona Lake, Indiana, November, 1964;

A. Be it resolved that a Christian Education Committee be formed in our district to consist of: The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary (appointed by the Council), the District Youth President (elected by the Youth Conference), the District C.Y.C. Director (elected by the Conference), the District P.E.L.T. Director (elected by

the Conference), and one member-at-large (nominated by the District Council and elected by the conference). It is recommended, where possible, that the member-at-large be a professional educator.

- B. B it further resolved that this Christian Education Committee be authorized, under the direction of the District Council, to make long-range plans to coordinate (not supplant) the interests represented by these various district offices.
- C. It is recommended that the chairmanship of this committee be rotated to include all mmbers of the committee, with the understanding that the District Superintendent is always the ex-officio chairman.

No. 5 CONFERENCE BAR

- A. The conference bar shall consist of the two south sections of seats back to the center aisle, and the platform.
- B. Services shall be provided for the children during the Conference.

No. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician must have sufficient time to prepare his report for the Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close May 31st and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than June 10th.
- B. Dates of quarters of the fiscal year shall be June through August, September through November, December through February, and March through May.
- C. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes on May 31st, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close on June 5th.

No. 7 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School.

No. 8 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a voucher.

B. Be it further resolved that all minister's phone numbers be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 9 DISTRICT COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire Disrict Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be is further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 10 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as, the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests, be it resolved that the District Council provide a managing Editor, to supervise the paper, who will work with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary and the Youth Editor as well as promoting other district interests.

No. 11 DISTRICT PROGRAMS

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following conference, for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work, Local, District and General.

- B. Be it further resolved that we set a goal for membership of 116 members per year for the Quadrennium.
- C. Be it also resolved that we establish an honor roll system and that each church qualifying receive an honor roll certificate. This certificate shall be presented on the basis of net members gained during the conference year. The groups and qualifications shall be as follows:

No. 12 FRANKFORT PILGRIM COLLEGE

- A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be one of the two representatives from the Western Ohio District to the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.
- B. The second representative to said Board of Directors shall be appointed by the Council.

No.13 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that no person be given or hold license to preach, who is not a member of a local Pilgrim Holiness Church of Western Ohio.
- B. Whereas the 1950 General Conference made a new set up in the Course of Study, therefore be it resolved that the local preachers are to be under the supervision of the Examining Board in regard to their Course of Study and character, also that pastors encourage the local preachers in pursuing their Course of Study. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend this District Conference.
- C. We recommend that in order to save the Educational and Examining Board a great deal of time and labor, that our licensed ministers shall present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the examining board before or during the Annual Conference.

No. 14 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 15 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council.

No. 16 MISSIONS

A. Be it resolved that our District Home Missionary Committee be composed of five members, consisting of the District Superintendent, two members of the District Council (to be appointed by the Council), and two members to be elected by the Conference from outside the council.

- B. Further, it shall be the responsibility of the committee to present to this conference a District Home Missionary Program to be approved by the Council. This committee shall also report annually to the District Conference and shall be responsible for the execution of the Home Missionary Program.
- C. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.
- D. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- E. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Home Missionary Projects.
- F. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Home Missionary Project.
- G. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in new fields.
- H. All Home Missionary funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.
- I. Be it further resolved that combined District Home Missionary and District Missionary Society Conventions be held in two or three strategic areas in the District, and that monies received during these conventions shall be divided equally, except that which is given for a specific place or department.

No. 17 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 18 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- B. The time of ordination shall be the first order of business on the first night after the first full day of Conference.

No. 19 PASTORS

A. Calling of:

- (1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- (2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- (3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.
- (4) Be it resolved the the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the last Sunday of June.
- (5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a considerable length of time, making it difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor is not recalled:
- (a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the results of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.

B. Support of:

(1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.

- (2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.
- (3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastor a two week vacation with pay, and that time for pastor to take said vacation be decided by the Church Board and pastor.
- (4) Be it resolved that no pastor take more than two revivals, of not more than 10 or 12 days each, per year away from his church in addition to his two weeks of vacation.

No. 20 PASTOR CALLS

Be it resolved that each visit to a home, and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 21 PILGRIM MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Whereas the strength of the church is in her unity, fellowship and common purpose, and

Whereas our attitude toward material needs of the church is a fairly accurate measure of our devotion to God, and

Whereas increasing demands upon both time and ability compel men to reach well beyond their reasonable capacities, and

Whereas the demands of these days call for the best both in qualifications and in dedication, and

Whereas material pressures consistently and sorely limit our leadership in their outreach toward the spiritual needs of our people, which needs are of first and final importance,

Therefore, be it resolved that a Pilgrim Men's Fellowship be organized in the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in accord with the format of the Miami Valley Pilgrim Men's Fellowship.

Be it further resolved that a District Coordinator be appointed by the District Council, whose duties shall be to help organize the fellowship in churches and/or zones and to coordinate the total program of said organization within the District.

Format of Constitution of Miami Valley Men's Fellowship:

Name of Organization:

a. Pilgrim Men's Fellowship

Purpose of Organization:

- a. To give practical expression to Christian fellowship
- b. To enlarge the scope of service to Christ and the church
- c. To emphasize witnessing, especially to men and boys.

Form of government or administration:

- a. This fellowship shall be governed by a Board of Directors.
- b. This Board of Directors shall be comprised of two men from each affiliated church. Said two representatives shall be selected under the direction of the local church board.
- c. The mebers of the Board of Directors shall elect a President, vice-president, secretary and treasurer from their own ranks, who shall continue in office for one year or until their successor has been elected.
- d. The Board of Directors may delegate routine matters to the Executive Committee comprised of the officers of the Board of Directors.
- e. The local church representatives shall be elected or appointed for the period of one year. They may be elected to succeed themselves, depending on the policy of the local church board.
- f. By virtue of his office it must be recognized that the District Superintendent is ex-officio chairman of the Board of Directors.
- g. An affiliated pastor shall be elected each year to serve as an active member

- and advisor of the Board of Directors. Said affiliated pastor shall be a member of the executive committee.
- h. Consideration may be given to having a Member-at-large on the Board of Directors to be elected by the body of the fellowship.
- i. All members of the Board of Directors shall be members in good standing of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Meetings: Preferrably once a month—time and place to be set by the Board of Directors.

No. 22 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 23 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 24 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers. Further, that all officers receiving salary for said office when necessary to have assistance to care for their work, shall select help only from those already holding complimentary tickets, or pay for the needed help during camp and conference out of their own pockets.

No. 25 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. Inasmuch as there is a tendency in the religious realm to lean toward the social rather than the spiritual; Be it resolved that the Western Ohio Conference go on record as supporting the Manual stand on the matter mentioned on Page 33, section 60, Paragraph 3, namely: "The local church board shall not permit fairs, festivals, dramatic exercises, so called sociables, nor anything of like nature to be held in connection with the Church, or any department of its work." And be it further resolved that the District Council encourage and enforce strict adherence to this in the Western Ohio Conference.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that this resolution be placed in our Minutes urging our ministers and laity to recognize the fact that television is systematically and very subtly undermining some of the standards that our church has held for years.

No. 26 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH PROMOTIONS

- A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends that the state conferences provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee, and
- B. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate.

- C. Inasmuch as our District annually has some type of Sunday School convention, and since it is generally held some time in the fall, therefore, be it resolved that we designate the first week of November as District Sunday School Promotion Week; further, be it resolved that the District Sunday School Convention be held during that week.
- D. Since it is difficult to have a convention which draws a crowd sufficient to merit obtaining an outstanding speaker, therefore be it resolved that all churches be asked to plan their revivals in the future so as not to conflict with the Sunday School week; further, that the District Superintendent remind the church boards of this resolution when he meets with them relative to their local plans.
- E. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our district churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- F. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.
- G. Be it resolved that separate Sunday School Institutes and Youth Institutes be held at different times, in such areas of the District as may be covenient.

No. 27 SUPERINTENDENT

- A, Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the District.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, be a member of the District Board of Trustees.
- C. The District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.
- D. The District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be a member of the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

No. 28 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership: therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 29 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 30 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

No. 31 APPRECIATION

- A. Be it resolved that we extend to our General Superintendent, Dr. P. W. Thomas, a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, Members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, Educational and Examining Committees, cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been.
- C. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School.

No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that everyone attending Camp and Conference be given a work assignment by the Camp Registrar, except General Officials, Evangelistic Workers, special guests, delegates to conference, children 13 years of age and under, and any others deemed excusable by the Camp Registrar.
- B. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free.
- C. That all visitors attending the annual conference be charged a reasonable sum for meals, the price to be set by the committee in charge. This does not apply to ministers and their wives.
- D. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling.
- E. That the charge for rooms and cottages for camp and conference be as follows:
 - (1) \$8.00 and up for the entire time or \$2.00 and up per night.
 - (2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time, or \$1.00 per day.
 - (3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.
- (4) Renters of cottages for the entire camp shall pay an electricity fee of \$1.00 per cottage.
- F. Be it resolved that the registrar notify cottage renters by the first of May to inquire whether they desire to retain their cottage for the camp. If no reply is received by the registrar within 30 days, the cottage may be rented to others on the waiting list.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give one days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$5.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by the district council.

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Loan Fund shall be enlarged for promoting church extension within the district.
- B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending forgiven interest or principal.
- C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of five per cent per annum.
- E. Each church shall pay a promotional budget to the District in the amount of \$4.00 per member per year to be dispersed as follows: the minimum payment of principal

and interest to the Eastern Ohio District and Western District Parsonage shall be paid first and the remaining balance shall be divided equally between camp ground fund and District Church Extension Fund.

- F. Realizing the cost of interest, we propose to retire the Camp Ground debt as soon as possible, yet keep the buildings in reasonable repair.

 What The Loan Fund Can Do
- (1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.
 - (2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.
- (3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.
- (4) Save interest on Camp Ground Loans and enable us to meet our obligation to the Eastern Ohio District as soon as possible thus giving them funds with which to operate.
- (5) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

A. Be it resolved that each local society or church be requested to pay 50 cents per month for the promotion of the District Missionary Society.

No. 8 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 9 MINISTERS DUTIES

- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 10 MINISTERS' INSURANCE PLAN

Inasmuch as there is a need among the ministers of the district for an effective plan of health and life insurance,

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council shall be responsible for the choice of an insurance company for this plan and
- B. Be it resolved that a budget of 50 cents a year per member be raised to underwrite this Ministerial Health and Life Insurance Program.

No. 11 MINUTES

- A. Be it resolved that the price of the minutes shall be \$1.00 per copy.
- B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.

No. 12. SALARIES

A. District Superintendent.

- (1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$100.00 per week, 7c per mile traveling expense, parsonage, all utilities and three weeks vacation with pay.
- (2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus 6c per mile traveling expense.
- (3) Be it resolved that the District shall enroll the Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan, as per the plan for local churches and their pastors

B. District Council

Resolved that 6c per mile be given each member of the District Council when traveling in authorized District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary.

Be it resolved that the District Treasurers' Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$250.00.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary.

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 13. STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

A. United Stewardship Fund

We recommend that our Conference raise the United Stewardship Fund in accordance with Manual provisions as follows:

B. District Budget

- (1) Be it resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the Church by their tithes and offerings, and that all regular offerings received by the church treasurer, excepting special offerings (self-denial, Easter, Rally Days, Evangelist and Building Fund offerings) and funds channeled into District and General Budgets, be tithed, the same to be forwarded monthly to the Conference Treasurer.
- (2) Be it resolved that we raise 50 cts. per member per year to take care of the General Conference expense.
- (3) Inasmuch as zoning arrangements concerning Frankfort Pilgrim College have been reached to the satisfaction of the General Board and the District Council, therefore be it resolved that we raise \$1 per member per year for the Frankfort Pilgrim College.
- (4) Be it resolved that each church raise \$1.25 per member per year to constitute our District Home Missionary Fund.
- (5) Be it resolved that we ask each church to raise \$1.00 per member per year for Camp Ground maintenance.
- (6) Inasmuch as many churches do not pay tithe to the district, we therefore recommend that the District Superintendent check the record of the District Treasurer and then investigate and encourage all delinquent churches to pay tithe. We recommend that any church be omitted from the Gold Star Roll that fails to pay the tithe.
- (7) Be it resolved that with the exception of the tithe, our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the district budget quota for the first fiscal

year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

- (8) Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to raise their district obligations without good reasons shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.
- (9) Be it resolved that the following chart be used as a guide for local church treasurers in paying the district budget:

No. 14 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH INSTITUTES

Inasmuch as the Council has recommended it, be it resolved that we raise \$8 per church for the Sunday School and Youth Institute.

No. 15 TREASURER

- A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books—Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer, the audit to be made after the books have been closed on June 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.
- B. Insuring of the Treasurer—We recommend that the council be requested to have the District Treasurer insured.

No. 16 YOUTH

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That each church contribute \$10.00 annually, to be applied on the expenses of the District Youth Convention, this to be shown in the budget statement as "Youth Convention and Conference."
- C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00. Delegates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

REPORT OF WESTERN OHIO DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

Resolution Number 1:

BE IT RESOLVED: that the District Superintendent, the Assistant Superintendent, the Secretary and the Treasurer of each fully organized district in the U.S.A. be a delegate to the International Conference by virtue of his office.

Resolution Number 2:

BE IT RESOLVED: that we substitute the words "fifteen persons" for the words "seven persons" as the required number for organizing a Pilgrim Holiness Church, section 25 paragraph 1.

Resolution Number 3:

WHEREAS there has been an evident need of protecting certain areas of the Church from sudden and capricious changes by requiring more than a simple majority vote, however, inasmuch as the present requirement of a two thirds majority vote makes it possible for thirty four out of one hundred delegates to control the course of the church,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED: that our Manual be so revised that all actions now requiring a two thirds majority vote, whether on the International, District or Local church level, hereafter shall require only a three fifths majority for passage.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that this action become immediately effective upon passage by this International Conference.

Resolution Number 4:

INASMUCH AS our present system of raising United Stewardship Fund on the basis of church membership is not satisfactory

BE IT RESOLVED: that this international conference present a plan to raise the United Stewardship Fund in a manner not related to church membership.

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YOUTH CONFERENCE JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The eleventh annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened with Harold Longfellow leading in singing "Standing On The Promises" and the chorus "Everybody Ought To Know."

We were led in prayer by Rev. Paul Berridge.

A special song was sung by Mr. and Mrs. Longfellow "I've Found the Answer." Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President, introduced Dr. Paul F. Elliott who presided over the Youth Conference.

Dr. Elliott spoke of the necessity of team work, keeping pace with opportunity and being ready to make change when needed. The three points which Dr. Elliott, stressed were Vision, Leadership, and Organization. These three are needed for success in youth work.

Mr. Harold Longfellow then led the conference in the chorus "Oh How I Love Jseus."

The Conference was called to order by Dr. Elliott and the secretary proceeded with the calling of the roll. The following officers were present: Rev. Charles Felsburg, District Superintendent; Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President; Rev. Paul Berridge, District Vice-President; and Mr. James Booher, District Youth Secretary.

The following Zone Chairmen were present: Revs. Lilly Penny, Wallace Marshall, Earl Wachenschwanz, M. H. Robbins and Stanley Booher.

Also 24 pastors, 15 youth presidents, and 35 delegates answered the roll call of churches.

Motion carried that the conference bar consist of the platform and the center section of seats back to the aisle.

The time for adjournment was set at 12:00 and the time for re-assembly 1:30. Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth President, read his fine report for this past year and was given a standing vote of thanks.

The auditor's report was presented by Rev. Kenneth Whitescarver, chairman of the committee.

The Treasurer's report was read by secretary James Booher. These good reports were then accepted upon motion.

Reports of Zone chairmen were given. These interesting reports were received upon motion.

The reports of the local society presidents were given and accepted.

Report of the Resolutions Committee was given by the secretary of this committee, James Booher.

Under No. 9, Senior Banquet, section B, a resolution concerning payment of the fees for the speaker for the Senior Banquet carried.

Because of expiration of time, we were adjourned.

The Youth Conference re-convened at 1:30 p.m. with Mr. Longfellow leading in singing "My Burdens Rolled Away."

A special song was sung by Miriam Ward "It Took A Miracle."

Trophies were presented to Lou Sena Toliver and Shirley Close as district winners in their category in the Teen Talent Quest.

The Ways and Means committee report was read by chairman, Rev. Stanley Booher. A resolution carried to increase the Project Fund under No. 2, Project Fund, section A.

A resolution then carried concerning a 50c penalty for late Youth Camp registration, No. 4, Youth Camp, section B.

A further report from the Resolutions Committee concerning the date for the Senior Banquet carried under No. 9, Senior Banquet, section A.

Under No. 8, Youth Council, section C, a resolution concerning a self evaluation program on the District level carried.

Tellers for the election of officers were appointed by the Youth President.

Rev. Ted Wilson stated his reasons for not allowing his name to be voted upon for youth president. Rev. Charles Felsburg made kind remarks in regard to Rev. Wilson's labors of love, following which he suggested that we give him a love offering which was carried out.

Rev. L. T. Brand was elected District Youth President on the first ballot. Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz was elected Vice President on the first ballot. Rev. Stanley Booher was elected treasurer on the first ballot. Mr. Jams Booher was re-elected secretary on the first ballot.

The conference was divided into zone areas for the election of zone chairmen. The following were elected: Ambassador Zone, Mr. James Stevens; Cincinnati Zone, Rev. Wallace Marshall; Dayton Zone, Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz; Greenvile Zone, Rev. Stanley Booher; Lima Zone, Rev. Dale Rummel; Washington C.H. Zone, Rev. Paul Berridge. Election in the Defiance and Hamilton Zones will be carried out late.

A motion to authorize the Executive Youth Council to read, correct, and approve the minutes was carried.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolutions Committee thanking Dr. P. F. Elliott for his very fine leadership in this conference.

The conference was adjourned at 3:00 p.m.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

To Dr. Paul F. Elliott, chairman, and delegates to the 1965 Western Ohio District Youth Conference:

It is good to report that God has been our Helper during this past conference year in the youth activities of the district. For this we give Him praise!

The district youth council met before camp meeting was over, appointed committees and laid plans for th year's activities. Most of these plans were brought to fulfillment.

The zone organizational meetings were times of real blessing and fellowship, as the pastors and their families of each zone met, not only to organize the zones, but to enjoy a basket dinner or meal together. We visited each zone of the district again to speak at a rally, with the exception of the Ambassador Zone. The zone rallies, for the most part, were very well attended.

On April 30 at the Piqua Y.M.C.A. the District Senior Banquet was held with over 200 in attendance. The banquet committee, with Mrs. Lily Penny as chairman, planned the program around the theme, "Hitch Your Wagon To The Right Star." Dr. George Failing, editor of the Wesleyan Methodist, was the special speaker. The Royals Trio were the special singers. Some 40 seniors were honored by this fine banquet.

The "Teen Talent Quest" was carried out in our district with enthusiasm. The Memorial Day Rally at the West Milton Camp Grounds was attended by a large number of people. At this rally the district winners in the Talent Quest were chosen. Nineteen of these twenty winners were able to participate in the National Contest held in June at Anderson, Indiana. We have every reason to be proud of the way in which they represented our district.

The district youth camps, which were held July 6—9, were attended by a total of 153 young people, and a staff of 35 adults. Rev. and Mrs. Wayne Pruesz, from Lebanon, Indiana were the Senior Camp evangelists, and Rev. and Mrs. M. H. Robbins were the Junior Camp evangelists. The Lord used them to speak to the hearts of the young people, many of whom found help at the altar of prayer. The pastors, their wives and laymen, who served on the youth camp staff, showed the highest kind of co-

operation and earnest effort in trying to make the camps of real value to the youth of our district.

I want to express my appreciation to Dr. Paul Elliott for his ministry in the All Zone Rally held last night, and to the Harold Longfellows for their music and singing. A special note of thanks should also be given to Bro. Felsburg, the District Youth Council, and all others who have helped throughout the past year. YOUTH RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

We recommend that the Executive Committee, and Zone Chairmen be kept within the age limit of 35 as much as practical.

No. 2 COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that the Resolutions Committee and the Ways and Means Committee be standing committees to be appointed by our Executive Committee as soon after the Annual Business Meeting as possible. The Reports of these committees are to be sent to each church thirty days prior to Youth Conference.

No. 3 REPORT BLANK

Be it resolved that the District Youth Council develop a report blank to cover the statistical and financial report of the zones and district.

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather and co-ordinate Youth News for the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 STATISTICIAN

Whereas the Manual in Section 86, Part 2, provides for each local youth president to give a report to the annual youth conference, be it resolved that we have a youth statistician and that said statistician be appointed by the Youth Council, and this report shall not conflict with the present District report.

No. 7 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program, the plans, dates, and administration of which are to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

- A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp begin on Monday of the last full week of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.

No. 8 YOUTH COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times each year, the last Saturday of October and the first Saturday of February, and the officers of the district be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.
- B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council promote an annual tour of one or more of our colleges.

C. Be it resolved that a self-evaluation program be instituted by the District Youth Council.

No. 9 SENIOR BANQUET

A. Be it resolved that a senior Banquet be planned by the Youth Council. The time of said banquet shall be the third Saturday of April, place and price per person to be set by council. It is recommended that the local church pay for the meals for their seniors.

B. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of said banquet.

No. 10 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone twice annually.

No. 11 YOUTH PROJECT

Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids and recreational equipment for the Youth Camp.

No. 12 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed June 10 and the Youth Council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 13 ZONE PROGRAM

A. In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meting with th District Superintendent, the District Youth President, and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.

B. Be it resolved that our District Youth Program include Action Day at Frankfort Pilgrim College to be held each year on the first Saturday of May, and Youth in Action Day at Owosso College.

No. 14 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Dr. P. F. Elliott for his very fine Teadership in this conference.

YOUTH WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.

B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$7.50 a year to maintain the fund.

C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed six cents (6 cts.) per mile for traveling expense.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.50 to be paid by each church.

B. Be it further resolved that the District Youth Treasurer be given the power to draw from this fund for other funds, if necessary, subject to the approval of the Executive Youth Council.

C. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of the Senior Banquet.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

A. Be it resolved that each zone be responsible for raising of \$10.00 per church for the executive and project funds. Said money includes an executive fund of \$7.50 and a project fund of \$2.50, stated under No.1 (B) and No. 2(A).

B. Be it further resolved that each zone endeavor to send at least one-half of the amount to the District Youth Treasurer not later than November 1st, and the final one-half not later than February 1st.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

A. Be it resolved that the price of Youth Camp per family be as follows:

Nine dollars for one young person; eight dollars each for two young persons; and seven dollars each for three or more young persons.

B. Be it further resolved that the amount of 50c be added to the admission fee for all late registrations.

No. 5 YOUTH COUNCIL




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
