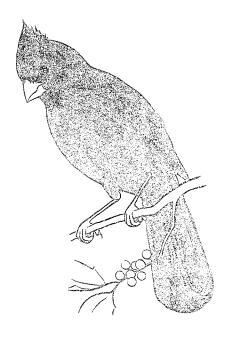

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS First Sitting July 24, 1967

9:00 a.m.

The thirteenth annual conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church convened at 9:00 a.m. at the West Milton Memorial Holiness Camp Ground with General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder presiding.

The conference opened with Rev. Virgil Miller leading the congregation in singing, "I Need Thee Every Hour."

District Suprintendent, Rev. Melroy Ward called upon Rev. William Whitmore to lead in prayer.

After prayer, Rev. Ward introduced the Presiding Officer, and Dr. Snyder addressed the conference, using the theme, "The Time is Now," with scripture readings from John 4:34-38, Luke 21:24, II Cor. 6:2. The speaker emphasized the theme in light of the recent Jewish possession of the whole of Jerusalem, an event that may presage the "soon coming of our Lord." He stressed the fact that God's universal grace makes it possible for all to enjoy a "Now" salvation. There is no pressure that

can destroy the joy of the Lord in the soul. Salvation is present, free, full, and for all. He brought a challenge to all present to be a "now" generation in the service of God and the evangelism of the lost. Dr. Snyder quoted General Eisenhower's statement concerning a general who had a profound influence on the, then, young Lieutenant's life when he advised him, "Take your work very seriously, but never yourself." This, in effect, is what Jesus said to his disciples: "my mind is not on myself, but on the will of the Father and getting that will accomplished.

The roll call was read for ministerial and lay delegates.

Times of sittings was announced, and the conference bar was set.

The District Superintendent's report was read by Rev. Melroy Ward, covering a resume of the district work, his personal report, and a tribute to the Rev. L. T. Brand. The report was received with a rising vote of appreciation, and a hearty "amen."

The Reception Committee introduced the following visitors to the conference: Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Walters of the Eastern Ohio District, Rev. and Mrs. Steinberger of Apache Junction, Arizona, Rev. P. W. Thomas, Jr., and Rev. Lee Haines, who are combining efforts to structure the new discipline for the merged churches, Mrs. David Kushman, and Mrs. Melvin Snyder. After inspiring testimonies from the visitors, they were granted honorary seats within the conference bar.

Assistant Superintendent, Rev. D. R. Close, gave a brief oral report and a few words of appreciation for the Superintendent.

The Auditing Committee's report was read by Mrs. H. C. Walkerand motion to accept the report carried.

Due to expiration of time, only a partial reading was given of the Treasurer's Report by Rev. G. F. Sheridan.

The sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. E. E. Leadingham.

Second Sitting, 1:30 p.m.

The Monday afternoon session was opened with Rev. Nathan Thomas leading the congregation in singing, "How Firm a Foundation."

Rev. L. R. Roberts led the congregation in prayer.

After a few timely remarks by the Chairman warning against glorifying our past and belittling our present, he called the session to order and minutes of the previous sitting were read and approved upon motion.

Rev. and Mrs. A. E. Blann were introduced to the conference and after giving testimonies, were granted a seat within the conference bar.

Dr. Snyder introduced Rev. John Blann, President of Frankfort Pilgrim College, who brought greetings and spoke concerning the needs and progress of the school. He spoke forcefully of the need for more Christian education for more Christian youth. His report was received with a hearty "Amen."

Rev. Sheridan resumed the reading of the treasurer's report which was interrupted by the expiration of time in the previous sitting. The affirmative voice vote to accept the report was an expression of gratitude to God for his prosperity upon our District, and of thankfulness to our treasurer for his fine work.

Mrs. M. H. Robbins, District Missionary Society Secretary, read the report of the President, Mrs. Virginia Ferguson, who was unable to be present due to recent surgery. A motion to receive the report and for the conference to send flowers to Mrs. Ferguson was seconded and carried with an "Amen!"

Rev. C. L. Walker from Menominee Falls, Wisconsin, who is transferring to our District, was introduced to the conference and gave a word of testimony.

A report was given by Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, Treasurer of the District Missionary Society, and upon motion, was accepted.

The Church Extension Committee reported through its secretary, Rev. M. H. Robbins, and the report was accepted with an "amen" of appreciation.

The pastor, Rev. M. L. Bogard, and delegate, Mr. Chauncey Boroff, of the newly organized work at Piqua, were presented to the conference, and the new church was accepted with an expression of praise.

The Statistical report was read by Rev. Stanley Booher, and was accepted by the conference. A motion from the floor prevailed to take last year's figures in the instance of two churches which failed to report, and revise the report accordingly for publication. Clarification was made of the method of arriving at the per capita giving figure.

The Resolutions Committee reported through its secretary, Rev. Stanley Booher, and the following action was taken:

Resolution No. 1 to delete Section 1, C, inasmuch as it is covered by the manual, was adopted.

Resolution No. 2, and Resolution No. 3, regarding the notification of any consideration of building by the local church board or building committee, and discussion with the District Superintendent, Section 2, A, B, C, and D, were adopted.

Resolution No. 4, an addition to Section 7 concerning Vacation Bible School, was adopted.

Section 8, B, was amended by Resolution No. 5 to include telephone numbers and Zip Codes.

Resolution No. 6, concerning corrections in wording of Section 10, District Paper, was approved.

Section 13, A was deleted by Resolution No. 7, this section being covered in the manual.

The approval of Resolution No. 8 revised Section 17, A, Missions, to include the District Treasurer as one of the Council members who will serve on the District Church Extension Committee.

A voice vote being indeterminate on Resolution No. 9, revising Section 20, B (3) concerning pastors' vacations, a standing vote was taken. The resolution carried 50 for, 25 against.

Resolution No. 10 was adopted, thus adding a statement as to the desired action and attitude of all conference members toward the merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Dr. Snyder spoke briefly of the importance of the merger and what it can mean to both groups and for the kingdom of God. Upon request from the floor, he also commented upon the National Federation of churches, and stated that our denomination does not belong. He did state, however, that we belong to the National Association of Evangelicals and the National Holiness Association, which gives us a national voice on the side of evangelical Christianity.

The Ways and Means Committee report was read by Rev. M. L. Bogard, resulting in the following action:

Resolution No. 1 deleted Section 2, C, concerning an obsolete matter of camp operation. It was adopted.

The conference approved Resolution No. 2 which raised the price of District Conference Journal from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per copy.

Resolutions Nos. 3, 4 and 5, revising the mileage expenses of District Officials, and the salary of the District Secretary, were adopted.

Resolution No. 6, replacing No. 14, Stewardship Funds, with a One Figure Budget, was offered for adoption. An amendment to substitute the word "church" for "Sunday" was adopted. A motion to extend the time of the sitting for 10 minutes in order to vote on the question was lost, and the sitting adjourned by expiration of time, with prayer by Rev. Frederick Baker.

Third Sitting, Tuesday, 8:30 a.m.

The third sitting of the conference was opened by Rev. Melroy Ward, District Superintendent. Rev. Virgil Miller led the congregation in singing "Beneath the Cross of Jesus." Rev. J. H. Sherwood led in prayer.

Dr. Snyder asked for quotations of scripture which had been of special value to the individual, and the quick response with promises from the Word was inspirational.

Motion carried to dispense with the reading of the roll call, providing for its revision upon the reporting in of late arrivals.

General Superintendents' Awards were presented to those churches who have paid 100% as well as those paying 90% of their United Stewardship fund. The awards were made by Dr. Snyder, with Rev. Ward assisting.

The recommendations of the Examining Board for District Licenses were read and approved. Included in the report were the following transferring from other denominations or districts: Revs. Nathan Thomas, James Thomas, Delbert Fruth, and Dewey Benedict. These were accepted by the conference, as wll as Revs. George Ware and Earl Weddle, transferring from the Florida and Kentucky Districts, respectively. Recommendations for ordination and advancement in license were also approved by the conference.

Rev. M. L. Bogard again reported on the resolution before the conference from a previous sitting, regarding the adoption of a one-figure budget to cover both district and general needs. The resolution was read as it had been amended. Discussion resulted in a motion to refer the resolution to committee for redrafting, to be represented to the conference in a later sitting. The motion carried.

Resolution from the committee increasing mileage fee for travel of the District Superintendent was presented. An amendment was offered increasing the superintendent's salary to \$125.00 per week. The amendment carried, and the motion as amended was approved.

Rev. Rudolph Moore from the Illinois district was introduced and was given an honorary seat within the conference bar. The camp evangelist, Rev. E. C. Swanson, was also introduced and gave his testimony.

Motion to seat Mr. Richard Gibson as the delegate for the Auburn church was approved.

The Sunday School Promotional Secretary's report was read by Rev. Wayne Goldsmith, and awards for Sunday School gains were presented. The report was approved as corrected.

Dr. Snyder spoke concerning the method of election of delegates for the merger conference and the international conference. A motion was made to make the District Council responsible for nominating lay delegates. Motion also carried that delegates be elected by a majority vote, alternates by plurality.

Dr. Snyder gave further information on the set-up which has been made to form a polity committee to plan for the merger. No actual memorials can be submitted, as there is not as yet a constituted merged church, but suggestions could be made to this committee, if desired. Provision has been made for committees to study the processes and guides for merging conferences when ready. Motion carried to have the District Council serve as this Committee, with the privilege of seeking the advise of any persons they believe can be of assistance.

The next order of business being the election of officers, the chairman spoke of the necessity of the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our voting.

The following tellers were appointed: Revs. Virgil Miller, R. E. Grandstaff, Wm. Salley, Otis Dinkins, Walter Forrester, Boyd Schell, Walter Hicks, Cecil Preston, Wm. Whitmore, Stanley Booher, Wayne Goldsmith, Harold Colen and Mr. James Booher, with Rev. Willis Clock as foreman.

Ballots were cast for district superintendent. Nominees of the District Council for Examining Board Member were Virgil Miller and D. R. Close, and ballots were cast. Educational Board nominees were Wayne Goldsmith and Harold Colen, and ballots were cast for this office.

Report on the ballot for District Superintendent resulted in the election of Rev. Melroy Ward, and the chairman ruled it would be for the two year period.

Ballots were cast for Assistant Superintendent. Nominees for statistician were James and Stanley Bocher, and ballots were cast for this office.

Announcement of results of the Examining Board ballots disclosed the election of Rev. Virgil Miller.

Ballots were cast for Robert Ferguson or E. E. Leadingham for District trustee.

Rev. Goldsmith was elected to the Educational Board. Ballots were cast for District Missionary Society President from nominees Mrs. Virginia Ferguson, Mrs. Rachelle Brand and Mrs. Loretta Morris for CYC Director from nominees Wayne Goldsmith, Cedric Wilson and Rachelle Brand for PELT Director from nominees Harold Colen, Earl Wachenschwanz and Wallace Marshall.

First ballot for assistant superintendent resulted in no election, and a second ballot was cast.

Rev. Stanley Booher was elected as District Statistician.

Rev. Ward made a brief acceptance speech.

Mrs. Rachelle Brand was elected CYC Director.

There was no election on the second ballot for assistant superintendent, and a third ballot was cast. There was no election on the first ballot for Missionary Society President.

Upon request from the floor, further clarification as to the Duties of the Comity Committee was made by Dr. Snyder.

Rev. E. E. Leadingham was elected District Trustee. There was not election of Assistant Superintendent on the third ballot. Motion carried to vote for the three highest, and a fourth ballot was cast. A second ballot was cast for PELT Director, after no election on the first ballot.

Mrs. Virginia Ferguson was re-elected as president of District Missionary Society. The morning sitting adjourned with prayer by Rev. W. L. Fisher.

Fourth Sitting, Tuesday, 1:30 p.m.

The afternoon siting was opened with Rev. George Ware leading the congregation in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." Rev. Otis Dinkins led in prayer.

It was announced that the fourth ballot for Assistant Superintendent resulted in no election. A fifth ballot was cast, following a motion to vote for the two receiving the highest number of votes.

The second ballot was cast for PELT Director, followed by voting for member of the Christian Education Committee. As there was still no election for assistant superintendent, a sixth ballot was cast.

Mr. James Booher was declared elected as member of the Christian Education Committee.

Nominees for Pilgrim Men's Fellowship Director were Revs. D. R. Close, Wallace Marshall and Willis Clock, and ballots were cast.

The sixth ballot for assistant superintendent resulted in no election, and it was necesary to vote again.

The Secretary, Rev. M. H. Robbins, reported that Mrs. Rachelle Brand did not feel that she would be able to serve in the office of CYC Director, and that although she appreciated the confidence of the conference, she wished to resign. Upon motion, the office was given to the nominee with the second highest number of votes, and Rev. Cedric Wilson was declared elected as CYC Director.

Revs. M. H. Robbins, Wallace Marshall and Harold Colen were announced as nominees for the office of District Secretary, and ballots were cast.

The election of Rev. Ted Wilson as assistant superintendent was announced.

Nominees for District Treasurer were Revs. G. F. Sheridan, Stanley Booher and Robert Ferguson. Ballots were cast for this office.

Rev. M. H. Robbins' election as district secretary was announced. Rev. Willis Clock's election as Pilgrim Men's Fellowship Director was announced, and Rev. G. F. Sheridan was elected as District Treasurer.

Ballots were cast for the five additional members of the District Council.

Minutes of the second and third sittings of the conference were read and approved as corrected.

Ballots were cast for five ministerial delegates to the Merger and International Conferences. The District Secretary announced the names of nominees for lay delegates to these conferences. The District Secretary annuaced the names of nominees for lay delegates to these conferences.

Four members of the District Council were elected on the first ballot. They were Revs. Earl Wachenschwanz, Robert Ferguson, D. R. Close, and E. E. Leadingham. Motion carried to vote for the remaining member of council from the three receiving the highest number of votes. These were Revs. Willis Clock, Wallace Marshall and Stanley Booher. Ballots were cast.

The conference cast ballots for lay delegates to the Merger and International Conferences.

Following a fifteen minute recess, it was reported that due to an error, the ballots for the fifth member of the District Council would have to be re-cast. Motion carried to vote for the five who had received the highest number of votes in the earlier balloting. These were Revs. Clock, Marshall, Colen, Goldsmith and Booher.

The result of the first balloting for ministerial delegates to the International and Merger Conferences was the election of one delegate, Rev. Ted Wilson. It was moved and carried that the ten receiving the highest number of votes be used in electing the remaining delegates, and the ballots were cast, using the following names: Revs. Close, Ferguson, Sheridan, Robbins, Marshall, Wachenschwanz, Leadingham, Colen, Clock and Baker.

The report of Committee on Memoirs was read by Mrs. D. R. Close. Memoirs to Mrs. Minnie Reck Bennett, Revs. Chester Jones, R. A. Moon and A. D. Hunt, which had been placed in last years' journal, were read first, due to the omission of this reading to last year's conference. The report was concluded with a memorial to Rev. Lowell Thomas Brand. The conference honored the report by standing for silent prayer, followed by a prayer by Rev. Melroy Ward, District Superintendent.

Western Ohio District Evangelists were introduced by Rev. Ward to the chairman. They were Revs. Raymond Simpson, Wm. Whitmore, Virgil Miller, J. B. Zeits and J. Howard Berridge, and Mrs. Sarah Culpepper, song evangelist. Dr. Snyder then presented them to the conference, and spoke on the need for the churches to be more faithful to these servants of God in the matter of finances.

The balloting for lay delegates to the conferences resulted in two elections. A motion prevailed to elect the remaining delegates by accepting the highest plurality votes already cast. The results were as follows:

International Conference Delegates—Mr. James Booher, Harold Longfellow, Clifford Ward, Mrs. Rachelle Brand and Mary Smack.

International Alternates—Mr. Ernest Goldsmith, Wilson Mahoney, Robert McCoppin, E. P. Roll and Miss Anna Cunningham.

Merger Conference Delegates—Mr. James Booher, Harold Longfellow, Clifford Ward, Ernest Goldsmith, Wilson Mahoney, Mrs. Rachelle Brand and Mary Smack.

Merger Alternates—Mr. Robert McCoppin, E. P. Roll, Miss Anna Cunningham, Mr. Lawrence Longfelow, Robert Johnson, Harold Lavy and Myron Patterson.

Ministerial delegates elected to the International Merger Conferences as result of second ballot were Revs. M. H. Robbins, G. F. Sheridan, E. E. Leadingham, and D. R. Close; Alternates—Revs. Robert Ferguson, Willis Clock, Wallace Marshall, Earl Wachenschwanz, and Frederick Baker.

Ballots were cast for the remaining member of council. There was no election, and a motion carried to vote for the wto receiving the highest number of votes. These were Revs. Willis Clock and Wallace Marshall.

A motion authorizing the District Council to handle any unfinished business of the conference was approved. They were further authorized by motion to approve the minutes of he final sitting of conference.

Rev. Willis Clock was elected as the final member of the District Council.

Ballots were cast for two members of the District Church Extension Committee.

The Ways and Means Committee, through Rev. M. L. Bogard, presented it's redrafted motion concerning the one-figure budget. After some discussion, there was a motion for the previous question. The motion lost, and further discussion was post-poned to the Wednesday morning sitting.

The result of balloting for Church Extension Committee members was no election. The sitting was adjourned with prayer by Rev. Harold Colen.

Tuesday Evening, 7:30 p.m., Ordination Service

The ordination service was opened with Mr. Paul Davis, song evangelist, leading the congregation in singing, "A Charge to Keep I Have." Prayer was offered by Rev. D. R. Close, after which the congregation sang "Rock of Ages."

Rev. Melroy Ward presented the four ordinands to the General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder. They were Revs. Otis Dinkins, J. Nathan Thomas, Paul Berridge and Clair Bailey. Dr. Snyder presented them to the conference.

The following scriptures were read by Revs. E. E. Leadingham, M. H. Robbins, and Wallace Marshall: I Timothy 3:1-13, II Timothy 4:1-8, and Titus 3.

A beautiful rendition of "How Firm a Foundation," followed by "I have Anchored my Soul" and "Wonderful Peace," was given by Mr. and Mrs. Davis.

Dr. Snyder addressed the ordinands and the conference from I Timothy 4:16, and elaborated on Paul's advice to young ministers. He stated that there are three areas in which a minister should continually take heed unto himself. First, take heed unto theyself and unto the doctrine. Be careful of your own soul. Second, a word of exhortation; not only take heed unto them, but continue in them. Keep looking after yourself and after the doctrine. Third, a word of promise—do these things and you shall save not only your own soul, but the souls of those who hear you. The warning is not only for sinners, but for laymen and the clergy as well. Continue in the things of importance to which you have taken heed. Be careful of your mental life, your physical and spiritual needs. Be a man of prayer, not only for self, but others. Stay up-to-date on the doctrine, and the present needs of those to whom you minister. You will have to keep prayed up, not only for yourself, but for some of the members of your flock. Be sure that whatever phase of the doctrine you are emphasizing is always centered around the fact that salvation is in Jesus Christ alone. Believe that you have been called to be a success. If you have been called, it is by the same God that you may have the grace to be faithful, and to be faithful is to be successful,

At the close of Dr. Snyder's address, the ordination ceremony proceeded with the affirmative answers of the ordinands to the questions asked. They, with their wives, then knelt, and prayer was offered for each of them, as follows: Prayer for Rev. Clair Bailey by Rev. Melroy Ward; for Rev. Paul Berridge by E. E. Leadingham; for Rev. Rev. Nathan Thomas by Rev. D. R. Close; and for Rev. Otis Dinkins by Rev. M. H. Robbins. Following the individual prayers, they were each duly ordained to the ministry by Dr. Melvin Snyder.

After their presentation of credentials, the District Council and the congregation extended congratulations to the ministers and their wives, accompanied by the singing of appropriate hymns of the church.

These greetings brought the ordination service to a close.

Sixth Sitting, Wednesday, 8:30 a.m.

The sixth sitting was opened with Rev. Robert Ferguson leading the congregation in singing "He Hideth my Soul." Prayer was offered by Rev. D. R. Close.

Motion to dispense with the reading of the roll call was approved. Minutes of the fourth sitting were read and approved as corrected.

Dr. Snyder spoke to the conference on the Pilgrim Pension Plan, noting the special offer that is presently being made to the churches. He also introduced the Advocate issue which has been prepared for general distribution, after which a motion was adopted to have a letter of appreciation from this conference sent to the editor of the Advocate, for the splendid job he has been doing with the paper.

There was a request from the floor for a report on the district's hospitalization plan for ministers. Inasmuch as the call for such a report had not been anticipated, a few questions were asked and the answers provided by Revs. Marshall and Sheridan.

A report was given of the balloting for Church Extension Committee members, which was done in a previous sitting. There was no election. Motion to elect two members from the four names receiving the highest number of votes carried. These were Revs. Marshall, Goldsmith, Colen and Baker. Ballots were cast.

The resolution of the Ways and Means Committee, which had been read in its redrafted form in the fourth sitting, was re-read to the conference, and discussion proceeded. A motion to amend the resolution, omitting the phrase giving the District Council the right to raise any amount found to be in deficit from the new plan, was approved. A motion to approve the main motion as amended was made and seconded, and carried unanimously.

The report of the second ballot on Church extension committee members showed the election of Revs. Wallace Marshall and Harold Colen.

The committee which was delegated by last year's conference to make a study of the requirements and costs, as well as location, for a nw District parsonage reported through Revs. M. H. Robbins and Earl Wachenschwanz. A motion was approved to take no further action at this time on the matter. It was approved to take no further action at this time on the matter. It was further moved and carried that a letter of appreciation and explanation be sent to the realtor who had assisted the committee. A question from the floor on the resolution from last year concerning repair and/or remodeling of the present parsonage was answered by Rev. Close.

A resolution of appreciation to the General Superintendent, Rev. Melvin H. Snyder, and all others whose efforts had combined to make the conference a success, was adopted.

A question concerning publication of evangelistic campaign advertising through the Pilgrim Publishing House was answered.

A motion by Rev. D. R. Close to make it a practice to take a love offering for the the District Superintendent each year during camp was adopted.

Pastoral appointments were read by the District Superintendent.

Rev. Snyder expressed his appreciation for the spirit of the conference, and requested continued prayers. He also expressed his desire to have a denominational radio program which would be on a nationwide scope, possibly to be called the "Wesleyan Hour," and asked that the constituency pray to this end.

Following announcements by the District Superintendent, the final conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was adjourned with the singing of "Blest be the Tie that Binds" and the "Doxology," with the benediction offered by the General Superintendent, Rev. Snyder.

They are now in the process of building this new church and anticipate a Dedication Service in October. Rev. Boyd Schell is the pastor.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In the Church Leaders Conference held in Indianapolis, Indiana, in December of 1966, the theme, "The Time is Now" was emphasized, relative to the effective outreach of the church, and a deeper loyalty in the church as well as a renewed or restored love for the study of the WORD; soul passion in prayer, and a clear witness concerning our faith in Christ. We therefore recommend that much time be spent in prayer for our merging general conference in June of 1968. Prayer teams could be established in the local churches and times set for meeting together to pray for our leaders as they make preparation for this important event in the life of the church.

We recommend that we make plans to fully co-operate with the joint ministerial convention of the Western and Eastern Ohio Districts of the Pilgrim Holiness churches and the Wesleyan Methodist churches of the Ohio Conference. The convention will be held in the Columbus, Ohio First Pilgrim Holiness church, October 17-19. The general theme of the convention is "United to Serve." Dr. Roy Nicholson will be the principal speaker, speaking twice a day. In the Thursday morning service, he will speak on the benefits of merger. Thursday afternoon will be called the Superintendent's hour, when the theme of the Church Leaders Conference will be emphasized.

We recommend that our Bible School relationship receive greater enthusiasm and concern than ever before. Our Zone School, F.P.C., we feel is our privilege and responsibility to support to the fullest extent. Rev. John Blann, President of F.P.C., is doing a wonderful job at the school.

Let us keep revival fires burning in our churches—be a soul winning church.

CONCLUSION

To our Assistant District Superintendent, Rev. D. R. Close, members of the District Council, District Church Extension Board, Sunday School Promotional Secretary and Committee, District Youth President and other Youth Officers, President of the District Missionary Society and Committee, every other officer and committee member, as well as the dedicated pastors and laymen of the District, we say thank you for your splendid cooperation, confidence, felowship and prayers. Words cannot express the feelings of my heart. May God bless you in your labors of love across the District in the year ahead. It is indeed a pleasure to have our presiding General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, with us in the district conference.

Speaking on behalf of Sister Ward and our children, as well as myself, we express thanks to every pastor and wife who have made our visits to your homes, as well as to the churches, most pleasant. We felt a warm welcome as we came among you and appreciate your many kindnesses and gracious hospitality. Most of all, we give thanks to our wonderful Lord for his watchful care and protection as we covered the District.

DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY PRESIDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent Rev. M. H. Snyder, District Superintendent Rev. Melroy Ward, delegates and friends of the thirteenth annual conference of the Western Ohio District, Greetings:

It is with a note of sadness that I am forced to bring you this fifth annual report of the District Missionary Society of Western Ohio by proxy. But may we again remind ourselves that Romans 8:28 is still in effect and we can say with the Apostle Paul, "And we know that all things work together for good to them who love the Lord." Therefore we rest in His will.

Even though I was very reluctant to take the leadership of this work for the past year, after considerable prayer (and much pressure) I consented to do so. "We are workers together with Him." We began our year with a very brief session with our chosen committee before the termination of camp in 1966. The committee consisted of Mrs. Dorotha Robbins, secretary; Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, treasurer; Mrs. Edith Enlow and Mrs. Velma Wilson, advisors.

We decided to divide the year into quarters—September to November as the fall quarter; December to February as the winter quarter, and March to May as the spring quarter. For each division we majored on one project, which would highlight one particular phase of each missionary endeavor. The fall project was to remember

World Missions by sending chairs to Rev. Wingrove Taylor for the Caribbean Bible College. A wonderful response was made to this as you will see from the treasurer's report. We exceeded our goal of \$300.00 which was the need presented to us.

The winter quarter we designated to help our friends a little closer home than the Caribbean Islands. We came up as far as Miami, Florida and decided to see what some church extension church might need as far as equipment, etc. Rev. Ralph Baynum of Miami, Florida was in need of folding tables. For the winter project we raised enough money to order four folding masonite tables, 30"x72". They are being shipped direct to Florida from the factory.

For our spring project, we decided that "God helps those who help themselves," as so many people enjoy quoting. We decided to make this project one that the entire district could enjoy—that is, if they attend Camp Meeting each year. It is a 3-sectional, flourescent-lighted bulletin board for our camp here. We had hoped to have it installed before camp, but we all learn by experience. We ordered it from the Kelco Church Supply Co., in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and their catalog states that all orders are shipped the day received. When we placed our order, after knowing how much money was available for the bulletin board, we expected to get it in plenty of time, but found out this is a rush season, and that it would have to be sent from the factory. Our last word was that it would be shipped from Chicago July 21, and should arrive this week. We surely trust that it will be a great means of blessing to the entire camp meeting constituency. May God richly bless each society which has donated anything, large or small, to this work of kingdom building.

The committee decided that we would try a little different endeavor regarding our Missionary conventions. Prior to this, we have been having three conventions on different nights at three strategic areas of the district. We felt that often the distance to be raveled for an evening service, and other related involvements including the committee having to attend three nights in succession—we would like to try having one ALL DAY Missionary Convention. We planned to have it about the latter part of May as a conclusion of our yearly work, but since we wanted to have Wingrove Taylor as our featured speaker, we had to have our convention on June 3rd. The Convention was held here on the camp grounds on Saturday, June 3rd, from 10:00 a.m. until approximately 4:30 p.m.

Our morning service was to be devoted to our own missionary activities. Many churches responded with very attractive displays regarding their yearly achievements. All the missionary presidents were recognized, and given a front "seat of honor." The Sheridans led us in the congregational singing, Rev. Wingrove Taylor sang some special numbers, and the final results of our missionary accomplishments for the year were noted. An offering taken in the morning service more than defrayed the cost of renting the grounds for the day. Th noon hour consisted of food, fun and fellowship. No one stuck to the diet properly because of the abundance of food. The noon hour was a wonderful time for all to inspect the displays of other churches, get new ideas, chat with Bro. Taylor, or maybe take that much-need nap. The afternoon session was blessed by having Bro. P. W. Thomas with us to pray, a very inspiring faith message by Rev. Taylor, and a wonderful march love offering for Bro. Taylor and his family personally, which amounted to \$125.00. All of us felt so rewarded that God had come to meet with us in his shekinah glory, and dispelled the rain, and had given us over two hundred in attendance. To Him be the glory!

Personally, I want to thank each church that responded. May God bless your faithful efforts for Him. Next, I want to thank my committee for having cooperated

better than any group, I think, I have ever worked with. Every one has so willingly done every job I have asked her to do. I say a big "Thank You," and may God add His blessings. Due to the physical necessity of my being absent during this camp, I assigned each committee member one job to do during this season, in order that the missionary work might go forward, and not one of them refused the job assigned. Isn't that a wonderful spirit of cooperation! My prayer is that somehow His love shine so bright as a result of our efforts that we may win some for His kingdom in this Laodicean age.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 BUDGETS

- A. Be it resolved that the conference treasurer have cards printed designating what each church is required to raise for the District, Youth and General interests, and said cards forwarded to the pastors as soon after conference as possible.
- B. That all money raised in the local churches for District or General Funds be sent by the local treasurer direct to the District Treasurer, except Pension moneys which are sent directly to the General Headquarters' Pension Office.
- C. That the District Treasurer send a statement to all churches that are in arrears with their Budget at least six weeks prior to the close of the conference year.

No. 2 BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since many of our pastors and churches are not familiar with building progarms and finance, and as a result some of our churches and parsonages are not up to standards required by the state, therefore be it resolved that:

- A. The District Superintendent shall be notified by any local church at the beginning of any building consideration.
- B. The District Superintendent shall appoint a committee of qualified men who shall meet with him and the local church board or building committee for the purpose of counsel and advice at each church or new location where church property is to be erected.
- C. A committee shall be chosen for each zone or section as necessary so that the men may be familiar with the territory.

D. This committee shall report to the Council as to its findings.

No. 3 CAMP AND CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Whereas many of our pastors and laymen who attend the annual conference do not get to attend the camp services due to various demands at home, and due to the added expense of having our conference either ahead of or after the camp; and since we have only a few campers who attend the day services of camp;

- A. Therefore, be it resolved that we request our council to set the camp and conference as follows:
 - (1) That our camp begin on Friday evening before the last full week of July.
- (2) That our district conference begin on the first Monday of camp at 9:00 a.m., with the following schedule: Monday 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; Tuesday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.; in the event business cannot be completed by 5:00 p.m. Tuesday, a further session may be held Wednesday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon.
- (3) That the evening evangelistic camp services continue on schedule during the conference, with the exception of Tuesday evening, which is set aside for the Ordination Service.
- (4) That the District Youth Convention convene as per schedule on Friday, with its conference being held on Saturday.
- (5) That the regular camp service schedule resume after the close of the District Conference.
 - (6) That services be provided for the children during the conference.
- B. All who rent a room or a cot at camp shall furnish their own linens.
- C. Our camp schedule shall be arranged to provide one service for World Missions, one for General Church Extension and one for District Church Extension at times to be set by the District Council.
- D. In order to prevent disturbance on the camp ground during the camp, be it resolved that some one who is acquainted with our people be sworn in as an officer of the law with authority to keep peace. He shall be appointed by the District Council. His duties shall be to enforce the rules laid down by the Camp Ground Committee.
- E. Be it resolved that monitors be provided for each building for the Young People's Convention camp and conference; also that adult supervision be provided for the Young People's convention as well as the camp.

No. 4 CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COUNCIL

In order to promote a better method of coordination of the non-professional teaching interests of the church, including Sunday School, P.Y.S., C.Y.C., and P.E.L.T., and in accordance with the plan set forth by the 1966 International Conference,

- A. Be it resolved that a Christian Education Council be formed in our district with the District Superintendent as chairman and the following membership: Assistant District Superintendent, District Promotional Secretary of Sunday Schools, District Youth President, District Director of PELT, District CYC Director, and one member-atlarge. The latter shall be nominated by the District Council and elected by the conference. It is recommended, where possible, that the member-at-large be a professional educator.
- B. This council shall meet regularly at the call of the chairman, and at its first meeting of the year, shall organize itself with a secretary and other necessary officers.
- C. This council shall be authorized, under the direction of the District Council, to

promote the program of the Department of General Sunday Schools and Youth, and to make long-range plans for the coordination of the interests of the various departments it represents. It shall not supplant any of the various district boards represented by it.

No. 5 CONFERENCE BAR

A. The conference bar shall consist of the two south sections of seats back to the center aisle, and the platform.

No. 6 CONFERENCE YEAR

- A. Inasmuch as our District Statistician must have sufficient time to prepare his report for the Conference, be it resolved that our church fiscal year close May 31st and that all reports be sent to the District Statistician not later than June 10th.
- B. Dates of quarters of the fiscal year shall be June through August, September through November, December through February, and March through May.
- C. Inasmuch as the Conference year closes on May 31st, be it resolved that the District Treasurer's books close on June 5th

No. 7 DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Resolved that churches be urged and encouraged to conduct Daily Vacation Bible School, and we recommend that the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary take measures to emphasize this matter.

No. 8 DECEASE OF MINISTER OR WIFE

- A. Be it resolved that upon the death of a District minister or minister's wife, the District Secretary be given the information immediately; he shall notify by phone or wire the Zone Chairmen and they shall immediately notify all pastors in their Zone; and they shall be reimbursed by the District Treasurer for expense incurred, upon the presentation of a youcher.
- B. Be it further resolved that all minister's phone numbers and zip codes be carried in the Ministerial Directory.

No. 9 DISTRICT COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the District Council be composed of nine members, these being the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, Secretary, Treasurer and five elective members, with five members making a quorum.
- B. Be it resolved that our entire Disrict Council meet bi-monthly, with provision made for special meetings of the entire council in event of emergency.
- C. Be is further resolved that the Camp Committee consist of the entire council.

No. 10 DISTRICT PAPER

Inasmuch as the Western Builder is a district publication, including Sunday School, Youth and other district interests,

BE IT RESOLVED that the District Superintendent supervise the paper as Managing Editor, working with the Sunday School Promotional Secretary, the District Youth President, and others to promote the various district interests.

No. 11 DISTRICT PROGRAMS

A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be requested to meet with each local church at the earliest possible time following conference, for the purpose of setting up a local program that will include all phases of the work, Local, District and General.

- B. Be it resolved that each local church be urged to strive for a ten per cent membership gain this conference year.
- C. Be it further resolved that we establish an honor roll system and that each church reaching its 10% gain in membership be given an honor roll certificate. Be it further resolved that the ten highest in numerical gain and the ten highest in percentage gain be recognized publicly during the conference, and be listed in the conference journal.

No. 12 FRANKFORT PILGRIM COLLEGE

- A. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be one of the two representatives from the Western Ohio District to the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.
- B. The second representative to said Board of Directors shall be appointed by the Council.

No. 13 MERGER

BE IT RESOLVED that every Western Ohio Pilgrim minister and layman direct his praying, planning, and influence toward a smooth and congenial process of merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

No. 14 MINISTERS

- A. Be it resolved that all pastors encourage local preachers to pursue their course of study according to the Manual, Sections 143, 206, 210 and 211. We strongly urge the local preachers to attend the District Conference
- B. We recommend that our licensed ministers present a duplicate of their annual conference report to the Examining Board, at the appointed time of their meeting with this Board.

No. 15 MINISTERS HOSPITALIZATION PLAN

Be it resolved that the District Ministerial Hospitalization Group Plan be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent.

No. 16 MINISTERIAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION

- A. Be it resolved that each pastorate or charge in the Western Ohio District shall enroll its pastor and wife in the Ministerial Benefit Association and pay from the local treasury their membership and call fees. That it shall be the duty of the pastor to turn over to the local church board each call as it is presented to him. That the Conference Secretary notify the secretaries of the local churches of the above action and send application blanks.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent and wife be enrolled in the Ministerial Benefit Association and that the dues be paid by the conference treasurer.

No. 17 MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

- A. Whereas many of our men have limited educational advantages and pastoral appointments are too far apart for close fellowship and study, be it resolved that our Ministerial Convention be of the workshop and institutional type, with a specific provision for inspirational and evangelistic messages.
- B. The date of said institute shall be set by the District Council before the printing of the conference minutes.
- C. The location of this convention should be under the direction of the District Council.

No. 18 MISSIONS

Be it resolved that the District Church Extension Committee be composed of five members, consisting of the District Superintendent, District Treasurer, with one additional District Council member to be appointed by the Council, and two members to be elected by the Conference from outside the Council.

- A. Any pastor serving under the District Church Extension Board shall not be eligible for election or appointment to that Board.
- B. This committee shall be responsible for the execution of the District Church Extension program as approved by the District Council and shall report annually to the District Conference.
- C. This committee shall have authority to give assistance to any existing church.
- D. Each minister shall be available for a two weeks meeting each year.
- E. This committee shall have full supervision of all District Church Extension projects.
- F. This committee shall be responsible for any financial obligations incurred in any District Church Extension Project.
- G. This committee, with the District Council, shall be empowered to place pastors in new fields.
- H. All District Church Extension funds shall be handled through the District Treasurer.
- I. Combined District Church Extension and Missionary Society conventions shall be held in two or three strategic areas in the district, and all monies received during these conventions shall be divided equally, except that which is given for a specific place or department.

No. 19 NAME OF CHURCH

Each church is requested to erect at its place of worship the name of the church and the name and address of the pastor.

No. 20 ORDINATION

Whereas the highest honor that can be given a minister of our church is that of ordination, we recommend that the ordination service be accorded attention equal to its importance.

- A. All ministers being recommended for ordination by the Examining Board and approved by the District Council, subject to the approval of the Conference, shall be so informed at least five days before the ordination service.
- B. The time of ordination shall be the order of business on Tuesday night of Conference.

No. PASTORS

A. Calling of:

- (1) Be it resolved that our Western Ohio Churches, in extending a call for their pastor, shall give first consideration to the members of the Western Ohio District.
- (2) To avoid confusion, be it resolved that no church vote on more than one name for pastor at one time.
- (3) Be it resolved that any pastor failing to get a recall on the first ballot shall not be considered for that church in that specific Conference Year without consent of the District Council.
- (4) Be it resolved the the pastor's term of office shall continue until and including the last Sunday of June.
- (5) Because the present setup in voting on the recall of pastors covers a considerable length of time, making it difficult for the superintendent to make a recommendation when a pastor is not recalled:
 - (a) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent set a date when all churches in

the District, wherever the pastor hopes to continue, shall vote on the recalling of the same, and notify the District Superintendent of the results of the vote. This ruling need not apply where the pastor had notified the District Superintendent and the church that he expects to move, or when the pastor has a call for two or more years with unexpired time.

B. Support of:

- (1) Inasmuch as some of our pastors do not receive adequate salaries to meet the high cost of living; be it resolved that the District Superintendent maintain an interest in the support of the pastors, when he meets with the local church boards.
- (2) Inasmuch as moving pastors are often confronted with the necessity of purchasing new heating equipment for the parsonage, due to varied facilities: Be it resolved that each of our churches furnish all heating facilities in all church owned parsonages.
- (3) Be it resolved that all churches grant their pastors a two week vacation with pay, and that all pastors having ten years service to our denomination in a ministerial capacity be granted a third paid week of vacation, the time to be decided upon by the pastor and church.
- (4) Be it resolved that no pastor take more than two revivals, of not more than 10 or 12 days each, per year away from his church in addition to his vacation.

No. 22 PASTOR CALLS

Be it resolved that each visit to a home, and each person ministered to in a hospital or elsewhere be recorded as a pastoral call.

No. 23 PILGRIM MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Whereas the strength of the church is in her unity, fellowship and common purpose, and

Whereas our attitude toward material needs of the church is a fairly accurate measure of our devotion to God, and

Whereas increasing demands upon both time and ability compel men to reach well beyond their reasonable capacities, and

Whereas the demands of these days call for the best both in qualifications and in dedication, and

Whereas material pressures consistently and sorely limit our leadership in their outreach toward the spiritual needs of our people, which needs are of first and final importance,

Therefore, be it resolved that a Pilgrim Men's Fellowship be organized in the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, in accord with the format of the Miami Valley Pilgrim Men's Fellowship.

Be it further resolved that a District Coordinator be appointed by the District Council, whose duties shall be to help organize the fellowship in churches and/or zones and to coordinate the total program of said organization within the District.

Format of Constitution of Miami Valley Men's Fellowship:

Name of Organization:

- a. Pilgrim Men's Fellowship
- Purpose of Organization:
 - a. To give practical expression to Christian fellowship
 - b. To enlarge the scope of service to Christ and the church
 - c. To emphasize witnessing, especially to men and boys.

Form of government or administration:

- a. This fellowship shall be governed by a Board of Directors.
- b. This Board of Directors shall be comprised of two men from each affiliated church. Said two representatives shall be selected under the direction of the local church board.
- c. The members of the Board of Directors shall elect a President, vice-president, secretary and treasurer from their own ranks, who shall continue in office for one year or until their successor has been elected.
- d. The Board of Directors may delegate routine matters to the Executive Committee comprised of the officers of the Board of Directors.
- e. The local church representatives shall be elected or appointed for the period of one year. They may be elected to succeed themselves, depending on the policy of the local church board.
- f. By virtue of his office it must be recognized that the District Superintendent is ex-officio chairman of the Board of Directors.
- g. An affiliated pastor shall be elected each year to serve as an active member and advisor of the Board of Directors. Said affiliated pastor shall be a member of the executive committee.
- h. Consideration may be given to having a Member-at-large on the Board of Directors to be elected by the body of the fellowship.
- All members of the Board of Directors shall be members in good standing of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Meetings: Preferrably once a month—time and place to be set by the Board of Directors.

No. 24 PILGRIM PENSION PLAN

Be it resolved that the matter of Section 70, Paragraph 2 of the Manual, relative to the Pilgrim Pension Plan, be brought to the attention of the local church boards by the District Superintendent, and that every church be urged to assume its responsibility.

No. 25 RESOLUTIONS AND WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES

Be it resolved that Resolutions and Ways and Means Committees meet at least thirty (30) days prior to Conference and prepare their recommendations in the form of a brochure, these to be in the hands of the delegates and pastors one week prior to conference for their consideration.

No. 26 SALARIES

We recommend that all matters of salaries of conference officials be settled before the election of officers.

No. 27 STANDARDS

- A. Be it resolved that the workers on our camp ground be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference go on record as agreeing with the action of the General Conference as taking our stand against the wearing of all rings.
- C. The local church shall direct all activities of the church toward the spiritual, moral, and social maturity of its people.
- D. Inasmuch as there is definitely danger in, and many evils associated with television: Be it resolved that we urge our ministers and laity to DILIGENTLY guard their hearts and homes against the subtle influence of this modern media.

No. 28 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH PROMOTIONS

A. Whereas there is growing need for concerted effort in our District with respect to Sunday School work, the General Sunday School committee recommends that the state

conferences provide for a District Sunday School committee or board to promote Sunday School interests in the district, and to cooperate with the General Sunday School Committee. We further recommend that said committee be appointed by the council, and that the superintendent be a member of said committee, and

- B. Whereas the "Decade of Progress" is the Sunday School program of our church, and whereas the program is so practical in many areas for every church school, and since it is unfair to the future leaders of our churches and schools for the present leaders to fail to co-operate, Be it resolved that the conference urge our churches to participate.
- C. Inasmuch as our District annually has some type of Sunday School convention, and since it is generally held some time in the fall, therefore, be it resolved that we designate the first week of November as District Sunday School Promotion Week; further, be it resolved that the District Sunday School Convention be held during that week.
- D. Since it is difficult to have a convention which draws a crowd sufficient to merit obtaining an outstanding speaker, therefore be it resolved that all churches be asked to plan their revivals in the future so as not to conflict with the Sunday School week; further, that the District Superintendent remind the church boards of this resolution when he meets with them relative to their local plans.
- E. Inasmuch as our Camp Meeting is a united and cooperative effort of all of our district churches, be it resolved that all Sunday School scholars attending camp be counted in their respective Sunday Schools.
- F. We recommend that a Sunday School Institute date be settled with the General Sunday School Promotional Secretary and given to the pastors as soon as possible after this conference, so that all pastors can plan to be in attendance.
- G. Be it resolved that separate Sunday School Institutes and Youth Institutes be held at different times, in such areas of the District as may be covenient.

No. 29 SUPERINTENDENT

- A, Be it resolved that when the District Superintendent prepares his schedule for visiting churches, he send a copy of said schedule to each pastor in the District.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, be a member of the District Board of Trustees.
- C. The District Superintendent shall supervise all annual church business meetings.
- D. The District Superintendent, by virtue of his office, shall be a member of the Board of Directors of Frankfort Pilgrim College.

No. 30 TITHE

Whereas the Manual provides that our people pay their tithe into the church in which they hold their membership: therefore, we strongly urge that this matter be called to the attention of our people who wish to move to other communities.

No. 31 VOTING

Inasmuch as there is some dissatisfaction with officials receiving office by acclamation, be it resolved that henceforth all officials be elected to office by secret ballot.

No. 32 YOUTH

Be it resolved that matters pertaining to Youth Camp, Youth Conference and Youth Council be referred to the District Youth Conference to be acted upon by that body, such action to be subject to the approval of the District Council and printed in the Conference Journal in the Youth Section.

B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp rent be paid out of the camp and conference fund already voted upon by this conference.

No. 33 APPRECIATION

- A. Be it resolved that we extend to our General Superintendent, Dr. Melvin Snyder, a vote of thanks for his Christlike spirit and efficient manner in which he conducted this conference.
- B. That we extend a vote of thanks to the District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, Members of the District Council, the Camp Ground Committee, Educational and Examining Committees, cooks, and all others who have helped in any way to make the Conference the success and blessing it has been. C. Above all, we do reverently offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us during the Conference.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 ADVOCATE

Inasmuch as the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate is the official paper of our church and its message so sorely needed in all the homes of our constituents, therefore we urge all of our Sunday Schools to give free subscriptions to all families of the Sunday School. No. 2 CAMP AND CONFERENCE

- A. Be it resolved that everyone attending Camp and Conference be given a work assignment by the Camp Registrar, except General Officials, Evangelistic Workers, special guests, delegates to conference, children 13 years of age and under, and any others deemed excusable by the Camp Registrar.
- B. That our active ministers children under the age of 14 be entertained free.
- C. That each church pay the sum of \$5.00 per delegate to the annual conference, this sum to be paid to the registrar; and that each church reimburse their delegate for traveling.
- D. That the charge for rooms and cottages for camp and conference be as follows:
 - (1) \$8.00 and up for the entire time or \$2.00 and up per night.
 - (2) Trailers at the rate of \$6.00 for the entire time, or \$1.00 per day.
 - (3) All campers with trailers shall register and receive parking instructions.
- (4) Renters of cottages for the entire camp shall pay an electricity fee of \$1.00 per cottage.
- E. Be it resolved that the registrar notify cottage renters by the first of May to inquire whether they desire to retain their cottage for the camp. If no reply is received by the registrar within 30 days, the cottage may be rented to others on the waiting list.

No. 3 CAMP PLEDGE SYSTEM

The Camp Pledge system is very simple; enlist throughout the District shares of \$10.00 to be paid any time in the year. This is to be paid into the local church for the maintenance and operation of the camp. The pledge, if not dropped by the individual, will be considered to continue from year to year. The object is to set the goal of the camp and strive to underwrite it during a five year period.

No. 4 CLEAN-UP DAYS

Be it resolved that each church give one days work for clean up of the camp ground, or pay \$5.00 to the district treasurer to secure labor needed. Be it also resolved

that the camp ground manager contact the pastors as to the time determined best by

No. 5 DISTRICT CHURCH EXTENSION LOAN FUND

- A. Be it resolved that the equity from the sale of the Sugar Grove Camp at Springfield, Ohio, in the amount of \$22,040.45 remain in the District Church Extension Loan Fund to further promote Church Extension within the District.
- B. Said fund shall be under the direct jurisdiction of the District Council. It shall be maintained on a sound basis and cannot in any case be diminished by careless lending forgiven interest or principal.
- C. No loan may be made for longer than five (5) years and may be renewed only upon the approval of the District Council.
- D. Principal and interest payments shall be made semi-annually and interest charged at the rate of six per cent per annum.
- E. What The Loan Fund Can Do
- (1) Enable us to have new churches and facilities for furnishing otherwise impossible down payments.
 - (2) Eventually improve some older but promising churches.
- (3) Help get pastors out of shops by giving better facilities, thus freeing them to give full service to the preaching of the gospel.
- (4) This fund, which amounts to a savings deposit to the District, at the same time building churches and winning souls, is to be perpetuated in the Church Extension Loan Fund.

No. 6 DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Be it resolved that a special offering be taken the last Sunday in September for District Home Missions, with a suggested goal of \$3.00 per member. The money will be sent immediately to the district Treasurer and will be applied to the Home Missionary Fund of the Western Ohio District. This offering will not apply on the budget, but each church will receive credit for it on their annual report.

No. 7 DISTRICT MISSIONARY SOCIETY

A. Be it resolved that each local society or church be requested to pay 50 cents per month for the promotion of the District Missionary Society.

No. 8 DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT

Inasmuch as the District Youth President receives only a mileage fee, be it resolved that an offering of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) be given him for each Zone Rally in which he speaks.

No. 9 MINISTERS DUTIES

- A. Be it resolved that no preacher be privileged to pastor a Pilgrim Holiness Church of this district until he has promised to include the various financial activities of the district in the program of his local church.
- B. Be it resolved that all ministers except pastors pay 50% of their tithe into their local church. Pastors are expected to place all their tithe into their local church.

No. 10 MINISTERS HOSPITAL-SURGICAL INSURANCE

A. Be it resolved that the previously adopted operational fund for the above plan be maintained on a percentage basis from the new 15% Budget Plan.

- B. Be it further resolved that we urge each local church to pay the premium for its pastor under this plan.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District pay for the District Superintendent's Hospital-Surgical premium under this plan.

No. 11 MINUTES

- A. Be it resolved that the price of the minutes shall be \$1.50 per copy.
- B. Be it resolved that a stenographer be employed to help the secretary in preparing the minutes that they may be ready for the printer at the close of the conference and that we pay the stenographer \$75.00 for these services.

No. 12 PARSONAGE

Be it resolved that the District Parsonage fund towards the remodeling of the present, or building of a new District parsonage, be continued in operation on a percentage basis of the 15% Budget Plan.

No. 13 SALARIES

- A. District Superintendent
- (1) Be it resolved that the District Superintendent's salary be \$125.00 per week, .08 per mile traveling expense, parsonage, al utilities, and three weeks vacation with pay.
- (2) The Superintendent, when in need of additional help in the administration of the District work shall secure the services of his Assistant, who shall be paid \$10.00 per day, plus .08 per mile traveling expense.
- (3) Be it resolved that the District enroll the District Superintendent in the Pilgrim Pension Plan and Ministerial Benefit as per the plan for local churches and their pastors.
- B. District Council

Be it resolved that 8c permile be given each member of the District Council, and all other officers and committeemen, when traveling in authorized District work.

C. District Treasurer and Secretary

Be it resolved that the District Treasurer's Salary be \$600.00 and the District Secretary's Salary be \$400.00 per year.

D. Statistician and Sunday School Promotional Secretary

Be it resolved that the Statistician and the Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall each receive \$65.00 per year.

No. 14 STEWARDSHIP FUNDS

Be it resolved that our one-figure budget, which shall include District tithe, district budget and United Stewardship fund, shall be 15% of the regular church and Sunday School offerings, excepting all specified offerings such as World Missions, Revival offerings, and building fund money used for or set aside for the purchase of or erection of a parsonage, church or Sunday School unit, or an addition to such a facility, or the purchase of land for the erection of such a facility. This 15% shall be based on the latest annual report, so that a monthly budget can be prefigured by the conference treasurer for each church.

Be it further resolved that all persons generally support the interest of the church by their tithes and offerings, and that the above budget be forwarded monthly to the conference treasurer by each local church treasurer, for channeling into District and General Funds.

A. District Budget

The Conference Treasurer shall allocate 22.5% of the one-figure budget to cover district finances formerly raised by the \$7.75 per member plan. The following approximate percentages will be used in distributing this portion of the budget:

B. District Tithe

Fifty (50%) per cent of the receipts from the one-figure budget shall be used by the District Treasurer for funds formerly provided by the District Tithe.

C. United Stewardship Fund

In accordance with the action of the 1966 International Conference, the United Stewardship fund of \$9.50 per assessable member of the conference shall be allocated by the District Treasurer on a percentage basis which shall amount to 27.5% of the receipts from the new budget plan. The action of the International Conference provides that hese funds be distributed by the General Treasurer as follows:

D. Newly Organized Churches

Be it resolved that our newly organized churches be assessed but one-fourth of the budget quota for the first fiscal year following their organization, one-half for the second year, and three-fourths for the third year. From then on they shall assume the full quota.

E. Unpaid Budget

Be it resolved that any church or pastor failing to meet their district obligations without good reasons shall be denied a voice in the annual conference.

No. 15 SUNDAY SCHOOL AND YOUTH INSTITUTES

Be it resolved that the previously established fund for the assistance of the District Council in providing the above be maintained on a percentage basis from the new District Budget.

No. 16 TREASURER

A. Auditing of Treasurer's Books—Be it resolved that we employ a certified public accountant to audit the books of the District Treasurer, the audit to be made after the books have been closed on June 5, and prior to the convening of the annual conference.

No. 17 YOUTH

- A. Be it resolved that all young people be urged to place all their tithe into their own local church, in the usual way. All money sent to the District Youth Treasurer must be over and above their tithe.
- B. That the expenses of the Youth Convention and Conference be paid from the camp operation fund.
- C. Be it resolved that the young people who receive free entertainment at our District Youth Convention and/or Conference be required to pay a registration fee of \$1.00. Delegates to the Youth conference are to be excluded from the payment of this fee. Be it further resolved that the monitors shall be appointed by the District Council.

IN MEMORIAM

REV. LOWELL THOMAS BRAND was born on March 19, 1934 at Ashley, Indiana. After his conversion at the age of 17, he entered Owosso, Michigan College, then moved on to Marion College, where he received his Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1957. While beginning his ministry, he continued to study for a Bachelor's degree in Education at Bowling Green State University. He taught school for three years while pastoring. He was united in marriage to Rachelle Miller of Defiance, Ohio, August 17, 1957. To bless this home, God gave them Victoria Joy in August, 1961, and John Fietcher in March, 1964.

He pastored five years at Napoleon, Ohio, then accepted a call to the Mulberry Pilgrim Church in August of 1962. After his first year there, the church gave him an indefinite call.

One of the highlights of his life was in January of 1964, when the congregation first worshipped in the new sanctuary constructed under his leadership. The Sunday before his death, attendance at the church set new records of more than 400 both in Sunday School and worship service.

On Saturday morning, April 1, 1967, Rev. Brand was killed instantly in an automobile crash on Ohio 28, four miles east of Blanchester, Ohio. He was only 33 years of age, but he made them rich, full and significant, because of his amazing vitality, ambition, and the love of his Lord.

He was planning his second trip to the Holy Land this summer. On his first trip he met a young man on the streets of Beirut, Lebanon, and disregarding the risk involved, hired a taxi to the young man's home on the other side of the city to meet and talk to the man's family. Wherever he went he was constantly trying to help someone. His ability as an airplane pilot saved much time getting to his appointments. His extra duties included assistant district superintendent of his church and one term as the district youth president.

Funeral services were conducted at the Mulberry, Ohio Pilgrim Church, with Dr. Melvin H. Snyder, Dr. P. F. Elliott, General Superintendents, and Rev. Melroy Ward, District Superintendent, officiating. The District Council were honorary pall bearers. Graveside services were conducted at the Rivrside Cemetery at Defiance, Ohio.

Brother Brand is greatly missed at this conference—but we do not mourn as they who have no hope—for we shall see him again on that great resurrection morning!

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YOUTH CONFERENCE JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Thirteenth Annual Youth Conference of the Western Ohio District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church was opened with Rev. Nathan Thomas leading in singing "The Lily of the Valley."

Rev. Ted Wilson led in prayer.

Rev. O. D. Emery was introduced by the District Youth President Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz. Rev. Emery used as a basis for his message I Timothy 4:12. He spoke to the youth stating that youth should learn to work with older Christians to hold in check youthful tendencies to offset the bad effect of youthful propensities. He left this thought with the conference, "You can be great as you live for Christ."

The Conference was called to order by Rev. Emery and the secretary pro-tem proceeded with the calling of the roll. The following officers were present: Rev. Melroy Ward, District Superintendent; Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, District Youth President; Rev. Ted Wilson, District Youth Vice President; Rev. Stanley Booher, District Youth Treasurer; and Mr. James Booher, Secretary pro-tem.

The following zone chairmen were present: Rev. M. H. Robbins, Rev. Wallace Marshall, and Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz.

The motion then carried that the conference bar consist of the platform, the center and south sections extending back to the aisle.

Rev. L. R. Enlow was granted an honorary seat within the conference bar.

The time for adjournment was set at $12:00\ p.m.$ and the time for re-convening at $1:30\ p.m.$

Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz read his fine report for this past year and was given a standing vote of thanks.

The auditors report was given by Rev. Cecil Preston.

A detailed Treasurer's report was read by the Youth Treasurer, Rev. Stanley Booher. The auditor's report, along with the treasurer's report, was received by the conference.

Reports of the Zone Chairmen were given and received upon motion.

A standing vote of thanks was given to the Youth Society Presidents for their most interesting reports.

The report of the resolutions committee was read by Rev. R. E. Grandstaff, chairman of the committee.

No. 12—Zones: a resolution, involving a new arrangement concerning zones and zone rallies was referred by the conference to the committee for revision and presentation in the afternoon session.

The report of the Ways and Means committee was read by Mr. Jerry Clingerman. Under No. 1-D, Executive Fund, a motion carried that the reimbursement for travel expense of each Youth Council member be equal to that of the District Council.

A motion carried to delete paragraph B, No. 4, Youth Camp.

Another motion carried to delete No. 6, regarding Zones Financial Disbursement. We adjourned at 11:55.

After we reconvened at 1:40 Rev. M. H. Robbins led in singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."

We were led in prayer by Rev. Colen.

Rev. Wachenschwanz urged the payment of Youth Assessments by all Youth Societies.

Rev. O. D. Emery then spoke about "The Way" contrasting the steps of a good man ordered by the Lord and the way of a fool.

The Resolutions Committee presented a plan to create five zones instead of three in our District. This motion carried.

The election of officers followed.

Rev. Stanley Booher was elected District Youth President on the second ballot. Chairman Rev. O. D. Emery called for a recess to allow the District Council to prepare a list of nominees for the newly created zones.

Rev. Nathan Thomas was elected District Youth Treasurer by acclamation, on motion, because of his having a large number of votes on the first ballot following the withdrawal of the other candidates. Rev. Harold Colen was elected District Youth Vice President on the fourth ballot and Mr. James Booher was elected District Youth Secretary on the second ballot.

The Conference was divided into five sections for the purpose of electing Zone Chairmen and other zone officers. These elected were: Northern Zone: Chairman, Rev. Wayne Goldsmith; Vice Chairman, Rev. Hugh Mosher; Secretary, Mrs. M. H. Robbins; Treasurer, Ruth Armstrong. North Central Zone: Chairman, Rev. Verl Light; Vice Chairman, Rev. Walter Hicks; Secretary, Rev. C. L. Walker; Treasurer, Mrs. Pat Knous. Central Zone: Chairman, Rev. Clifford Richardson; Vice Chairman, Rev. Robert Ferguson; Secretary, Miss Hazel Wachenschwanz; Treasurer, Miss Lavonne Sheridan. South Eastern Zone: Chairman, Rev. George Ware; Vice Chairman, Rev. Nathan Thomas; Secretary, Barbara Johnson; Treasurer, Mrs. Betty Ware. Southern Zone: Chairman, Rev. Ted Wilson; Vice Chairman, Mr. Paul Powell; Secretary, Miss Marti Smack; Treasurer, Miss Nancy Wilhite.

Any unfinished buisness was, on motion, referred to the District Executive Youth Council.

A motion to authorize the District Executive Youth Council to read, correct, and approve the minutes was carried.

A love offering for Rev. Earl Wachenschwanz, our District Youth, President was received in appreciation for his fine leadership and concern for our youth.

A resolution of appreciation was submitted by the Resolutions Committee thanking Rev. O. D. Emery for his capable leadership in this 1967 Conference.

The Conference was adjourned at 4:45 by prayer offered by Rev. Stanley Booher.

TO THE 1967 YOUTH CONFERENCE, July 22, 1967

In 1958, I delivered what I thought to be my last report as District Youth President. Here I am again.

This has been a crucial year for all of us in the Western Ohio District. It could well be remembered as the year of transition.

First, of all, because of pressing duties, our District Youth President, Rev. L. T. Brand, resigned. As vice president, I was asked by the District Council to take his place.

Next, our District Superintendent, Rev. Charles Felsburg, resigned to become Superintendent of the Capitol District. While this move was regrettable and epochal, Brother Ward has stepped in with heart and hand to become a loved and respected leader. It would be difficult indeed to find a man who would be Brother Ward's peer in spiritual quality and godliness, and who will deny that this quality is the need of the hour.

The crowning epoch of this year of transition was the sudden home-going of Brother Brand. This fatal accident was so tragic in nature that it seems unreal—impossible to believe. We are aware that our sense of loss as a district is totally eclipsed by the pain of loss suffered by Sister Brand. With a loss of words to say more, we continue to repeat our pledge to pray for her and her children.

There is a sunny side of the street. On April 15, we had a most gratifying Senior Banquet at the Imperial House South, south of Dayton. The "Traveliers" from Michigan sang for us, and Rev. Clyde Dupin, Evansville, Indiana, spoke to our 200 guests. We owe a debt of gratitude to the splendid banquet committee which was co-directed by Rev. Willis Clock and Rev. George Carr.

Our Junior and Senior Youth Camps, held simultaneously, June 19 to 23, are cause for rejoicing. The evening chapel (evangelistic) services were real camp meeting experiences. These Youth Camps are proof-positive that our young people will embrace the Gospel when it is effectively communicated to them. Another overwhelming experience of youth camp that brings this reporter to tears of humility is the dedicated labor of our pastors, pastors' wives, and laymen, who staff this annual project. Surely these "shall shine as the brightness of the firmament . . . and as stars for ever and ever." Daniel 12:3.

Our zone presidents have made a noble endeavor to administer the zone boundary and rally change adopted by our last Youth Conference. In some aspects, the change-over is slow. We believe, basically, the new plan was a good step. However, a resolution will be forthcoming to modify the new plan.

I will never be able to repay or forget our co-workers on the District Youth Council. If you can find better men than those who served in this capacity, as well as many others on the district youth team, I would like to meet them. I am confident there are none better.

Taking a brief look into the new Conference year, I would like to offer my successor and his team some reasonable and reachable projects. I believe more and better local youth organizations are not only a possibility, but also a need. I believe that Western Ohio should see some CYC programs started in some of our churches. This innovation is long overdue. I believe that our youth camp program can be geared to render a more effective ministry to our youth and our district. I believe that our Western Ohio youth need not be one whit behind any district in making the necessary and inevitable adjustments demanded by the merger with the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

For a personal report, I want you to know that I am happy with Jesus, but quite unhappy with my achievements in His service. Any passing compliment I receive for work done is gravely overshadowed by the sobering consciousness of work undone. But for the record, I want you to know:

"I have made my choice forever "Twixt this world and God's dear Son; Nought can change my mind, no never, He my heart has fully won. Take this world with all its pleasures, Take them, take them, great and small; Give me Christ, the blessed Saviour, He is sweeter than them all."

In closing, I would like to say to our young people that in spite of all the beatniks, hippies, rioters, rebels and rascals, you could not have been born in a greater age. It has been said that the world at its worst needs the church at its best. No generation has had a greater opportunity to demonstrate the relevance of the glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is true that the world's image of the church has been defaced. But you can change the image from an ivy-covered museum frequented only by the faithful to that of a battle headquarters with all lines of communication buzzing with meaningful and redemptive activity.

And who knows? You may be that cherished and coveted generation that will be living when Jesus comes, by the grace of God let us be sure that we are among the faithful servants when He returns. Only then can we harmonize in the beautiful benediction, "Even so, come Lord Jesus."

YOUTH RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 AGE LIMIT

No. 4 REPORTER

Be it resolved that the District Youth President gather and co-ordinate Youth News for the WESTERN BUILDER.

No. 5 STANDARDS

Be it resolved that those participating in sponsored activities such as choir, orchestra, camp ground labor, etc., be required to maintain the standards of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Be it further resolved that it be the responsibility of the Youth Executive Committee to enforce this during the Youth Convention.

No. 6 YOUTH CAMP

Inasmuch as our Youth Camps have been widely acclaimed a thrilling success, be it resolved that this Conference continue an annual Youth Camp Program, the plans, dates, and administration of which are to be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the District Youth Council.

- A. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp begin on Monday of the last full week of June each year, unless prevailing circumstances make it impossible.
- B. Be it resolved that the District Youth Council be responsible for the buying at the Youth Camp.

No. 7 YOUTH COUNCIL

- A. Be it resolved that the Youth Council meet at least two times each year, the last Saturday of October and the first Saturday of February, and the officers of the district be privileged to call for additional meetings as is deemed necessary.
- B. Be it resolved that the Youth Council promote annual tours to Frankfort and Owosso Colleges alternately.

No. 8 SENIOR BANQUET

- A. Be it resolved that a senior Banquet be planned by the Youth Council. The time of said banquet shall be the third Saturday of April, place and price per person to be set by the council. It is recommended that the local church pay for the meals for their seniors.
- B. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of said banquet.

No. 9 YOUTH PRESIDENT

Be it resolved that the District Youth President visit each zone once annually. No. 10 YOUTH PROJECT

Be it resolved that our youth project for this year be the buying of some permanent teaching aids and recreational equipment for the Youth Camp.

No. 11 YOUTH TREASURER

Be it resolved that the District Youth Treasurer's books be closed June 10 and the Youth Council appoint an auditing committee.

No. 12 ZONES

- A. In order to enlist the greatest degree of cooperation in our zone work, be it resolved that each zone chairman arrange a meeting with the District Superintendent, the District Youth President, and the pastors of his zone as soon after conference as possible, to plan the program for his zone for the year.
- B. Be it resolved that this conference rezone our district into five youth zones. These zones to be Northern, North Central, Central, Souh Eastern and Southern. Changes may be made by the District Youth Council as thought advisable.
- C. Be it further resolved that quarterly-sociall-inspirational rallies be held in each zone in months when the quarterly rallies are not being held, with number of rallies and dates to be set by the Zone Youth Committee.
- D. We recommend that the quarterly rallies be held in a central location of the zone and that the one-sitting rallies be held in various locations in the zones.

No. 13 APPRECIATION

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. O. D. Emery for his very fine leadership; the capable way in which he has conducted the conference and the good spirit which he has shown throughout the conference.

YOUTH WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE REPORT

No. 1 EXECUTIVE FUND

- A. Be it resolved that an executive fund, to cover expenses incidental to the functioning of the District Youth Council in their official duties, be maintained.
- B. Be it further resolved that each church pay \$7.50 a year to maintain the fund.
- C. Be it further resolved that the District Youth President be reimbursed eight cents (8c) per mile for traveling expense.
- D. Be it further resolved that the reimbursement for travel expense of each Youth Council member be equal that of the District Council.

No. 2 PROJECT FUND

- A. Be it resolved that a special fund be maintained to finance the special project approved by the Youth Conference; this fund to be maintained by an assessment of \$2.50 to be paid by each church.
- B. Be it further resolved that the District Youth Treasurer be given the power to draw from this fund for other funds, if necessary, subject to the approval of the Executive Youth Council.
- C. Be it resolved that the project fund include payment for the speaker of the Senior Banquet.

No. 3 METHOD OF RAISING EXECUTIVE AND PROJECT FUNDS

- A. Be it resolved that each zone be responsible for raising of \$10.00 per church for the executive and project funds. Said money includes an executive fund of \$7.50 and a project fund of \$2.50, stated under No.1 (B) and No. 2(A),
- B. Be it further resolved that each zone endeavor to send at least one-half of the amount to the District Youth Treasurer not later than November 1st, and the final one-half not later than February 1st.

No. 4 YOUTH CAMP

A. Be it resolved that the price of Youth Camp per family be as follows:

Ten dollars for one young person; nine dollars each for two young persons; and eight dollars each for three or more young persons.

B. Be it resolved that this Conference recommend to the District Conference that the rental of the Campgrounds for the District Youth Camp be paid from District Funds, since the Youth Camp did not have a financial obligation for Camp Ground rental, when the Youth Camp was held at Springfield on the Sugar Grove Campground.

No. 5 YOUTH COUNCIL

A. Be it resolved that the admission fee for the Senior Banquet be paid when the reservation is sent (no refund to be given).

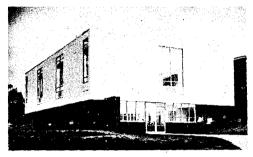
