# Journal of Proceedings.

## FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

Orleans. Ind., Oct. 6, 1915.

The twelfth annual convention of the Apostolic Holiness Church of Indiana convened in the A. H. Church of Orleans, Ind. The first business session was called to order by W. J. Crider, State Supt., at 8:30 A. M., after song and prayer the preachers and delegates were asked to enroll, regular business was then taken up.

Motioned and seconded, that the first three front and two side rows of seats be reserved for the conference bar. Carried.

Motion made and carried that all visitors be invited into the conference bar as honorary members.

Motion made and carried that Chair appoint the different committees.

Committees appointed. Resolution Committee, G. E. Williams, H. L. Holden and H. W. Cochran. Finance Committee, Floyd Honchell and L. A. Mathers. Editing Committee, L. A. Mathers and James Booth. Auditing Committee, G. W. Groshart and J. S. Hayhurst.

Moved and seconded that we hold our election of State officers Friday A. M. Carried.

Motion made and carried that we have our Articles of Faith printed in tract form.

Moved and seconded that we not have our Articles of Faith published until after the General Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Chair act as a member of the Editing committee. Carried.

Moved and seconded that a boundary committee be appointed. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that the State board act as boundary committee. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet again at 2 p. m. Carried.

## SECOND BUSINESS SESSION

Oct. 6, 2 p. m. Second business session opened with song and prayer. After the roll call the newly arrived delegates were enrolled.

Minutes read and adopted.

Moved and seconded that we have annual report blanks printed for our churches and preachers. Carried.

Moved and seconded that in case our State Sup. is occasioned to visit one of our churches and has not the funds on hand for expenses that he draw on the State Treasurer. Carried.

Moved and seconded that when our State Supt. visits one of our churches that the church take an offering towards his expenses. Carried.

*This was in 1915 and the church at Georgetown was under 5 years at that time*

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet again at 8:30 a. m.,  
Oct. 7.

**THIRD BUSINESS SESSION**

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Oct. 7. The third business session was called to order by the State Supt. at 8:30 a. m. After song and prayer the roll was called, followed by enrollment of newly arrived delegates and visitors.

The minutes of last session were then read and adopted.

After discussion a motion was made and carried that each pastor request the church of which he is in charge to get out a new deed to their church property dropping the word "Union" and substitute "Church."

Moved and seconded that the Chair appoint a Committee to act with the Chair in investigating the matter of State incorporation papers and concerning church deeds. Carried. Bro. L. A. Mathers was appointed as this committee.

Moved and seconded that we provide a new State corporate seal. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the letter from Bro. E. D. Joy which was read before the convention be published in the minutes. Carried.

Moved and seconded that ballots be prepared to vote as to where our next annual convention will be held. Carried.

The ballot falling in favor of Evansville, Ind., on motion made and carried the secretary was instructed to record an unanimous vote that our next convention be held at Evansville, Ind.

Moved and seconded that the date of our next convention be Aug. 25, 1916 to Sept. 3, 1916. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the morning of Aug. 29, 1916 be set as the time of our first business session and that all preachers and delegates be urged to be present by that time. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we instruct our delegate to the General Assembly to ask that some article be put in the manual that our Sunday Schools do not have a person to teach in the school that does not belong to some church. Motion lost.

Moved and seconded that we recommend to the General Assembly that "Article 127, page 49 of our manual" be changed to read "That all persons who do not teach our cardinal doctrines be excluded from teaching or holding office in our Sunday Schools. Carried.

On motion the meeting was adjourned to meet again at 8:30, Oct. 8.

**FOURTH BUSINESS SESSION**

Oct. 8, 8:30 a. m. Fourth business session was opened with song and prayer, midst the out-pouring of the Spirit of God. Amen.

After the roll call and the enrollment of newly arrived delegates and visitors the minutes of last session were read and accepted.

The chair then called for reports of the committees. The report of the Resolution and Finance committees were submitted to the convention and on motion were accepted.

Moved and seconded that we have 300 copies of the minutes of this convention printed. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the Obituary of our deceased Bro. Grover Hayhurst be printed in our minutes. Carried.

As this was the time set for our election of State officers for the ensuing year, a motion was made and carried that the Chair appoint tellers for the election. Bros. E. E. Davis and Floyd Honchell were appointed.

As a result of the ballot cast the secretary was instructed to record unanimous ballots for the following as State officers.

W. J. Crider, State Superintendent, H. W. Cochran, Assistant Superintendent, James Booth, Secretary, L. A. Mathers, Treasurer, E. E. Davis, Mrs. E. E. Davis and Floyd Honchell as Advisory members of State Council.

Moved and seconded that Chair appoint State Evangelist. Carried. Bro. H. W. Cochran and Bro. John W. Williams were appointed.

Moved and seconded that Bros. Crider and Mathers be empowered to employ an attorney to investigate and get out new incorporation papers and form of church deeds. Carried.

Moved and seconded that our State Supt. be our delegate and that the State pay his expenses to the General Assembly. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we retain the Foreign Missionary Board that we had last year. Carried.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet again at 1 p. m.

#### FIFTH BUSINESS SESSION

Fifth business session was called to order at 1 p. m. by the State Supt. and was opened with song and prayer while Heavenly Fire fell upon our souls. Amen. Roll call. Enrolment of newly arrived delegates and visitors. Minutes of last session read and accepted. The reports of committees were then called for. The committee on Resolutions responded.

Moved and seconded that the report of the Resolution Committee be accepted. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the report of the Board of Examination be accepted and that license to preach the gospel be granted to Bro. Jesse Hayhurst, Otto Bennett, Zeno Price and Grover Bemis. Carried.

Report of Medora Church was read by Chas. Hall, delegate, and accepted.

Report of West Terre Haute Church, G. E. Williams, delegate, read and accepted.

Report of Mt. Zion Church, Smith Hayhurst, delegate, read and accepted.

Report of Muncie Church, J. W. Williams. Pastor read and accepted.

Report of Madison. no delegate, read by Grover Wright, accepted.

Report of Grantsburg Church read by Floyd Honchell, Pastor and delegate accepted.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet again at 8:30 a. m., Oct. 9. Carried.

### SIXTH BUSINESS SESSION

Oct. 9. The sixth business session was called to order at 8:30 a. m. by the State Supt. and was opened with song, Bro. H. B. Jackson led in prayer, the Spirit of God prevailing.

On motion made and carried Bro. H. W. Cochran was appointed as Secy. Pro. Tem., in the absence of the State Sec'y.

Moved and seconded that the poems read by Bro. Jackson before the convention be printed in our minutes accompanied with a short paragraph of introduction by Bro. Jackson. Carried.

Moved and seconded that a Chief Cook be allowed a dollar a day for their services at this and all following conventions. Carried.

Moved and seconded that in case a body of people desiring to organize into an Apostolic Holiness church, the State Supt. be sent for and investigation be made first. Carried. ✓

Moved and seconded that the report of the committee on examination be accepted and that Bro. Grover Wright be granted license to preach. Carried.

Report of Newton Stewart read and accepted, Bro. Geo. Spears delegate.

Report of Brownstown read and accepted, Elijah Pruitt delegate.

Report of Nelson Chapel read and accepted Mrs. Lulla Robison delegate.

Report of East Enterprise read and accepted, H. C. Cole delegate.

Report of College Corner read and accepted. Report read by Sec'y.

Report of North Vernon read and accepted. Chas. May delegate.

Report of Evansville read and accepted. Alice Brady delegate.

Report of Orleans read and accepted. Mrs. L. A. Mathers delegate.

Report of Jasonville read and accepted. Zeno Price delegate.

Report of Coalmont read and accepted. Grover Bemis delegate.

Moved and accepted that we adjourn to meet again at 2:30 p. m.

### SEVENTH BUSINESS SESSION

Seventh business session opened with song and prayer. After the roll call the minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The committees were then called on to report and the Committees on Finance and Resolution were heard and reports accepted.

Moved and seconded that the Fiance Committee be ordered to pay all out-standing bills against this convention. Carried.

The matter of fixing on a plan to help our sister Hester Bowman, who because of ill health has been hindered from engaging in active work and has incurred some indebtedness at the Hospital, to meet her obligation and to contribute towards her support, was discussed.

Moved and seconded that the pastor of each church and each evangelist send in an offering once a month for the above mentioned purpose. Carried. Said offerings to be sent to Bro. L. A. Mathers, our State Treas. An offering was taken at this time for the purpose above mentioned and the preachers and delegates responded heartily. Amen.

Moved and seconded that we adjourn to meet again Aug. 29, 1916 at

Evansville in which our convention will be held in connection with a ten days' revival. The convention closed by repeating the 23d Psalm in concert and with an old fashioned hand-shake in which the Lord poured out his Spirit upon us thus putting His seal on our feeble effort to carry on His work. Amen.

### EVANGELISTIC SERVICES

The evangelistic services were times of refreshings and were blessed and owned of God. Several souls bowed at the altar of prayer and were reconciled to God.

Tuesday night, the opening service, the Superintendent called on the following brethren to give short talks: H. W. Cochran, G. W. Groshart and Floyd Honchell. These brethren were blessed of the Lord and their talks were food to the souls of those who were in spiritual condition to be fed.

Oct. 6. Bro. G. W. Groshart brought us a very encouraging message from Isa. 35:8, speaking of the characteristics of the way of the Redeemer. Oct. 7, 2:30 p. m., Bro. J. N. Perry gave our souls another heavenly lift with a Holy Ghost inspired message from Rom. 12:9, "Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is good." He made that which is good look so good that we can't see why anybody would not abhor that which is evil if they had been present. Oct. 7, 7:30 p. m., Bro. Cochran brought the message from Hosea 7:9, and there wasn't much to be hit that he didn't hit. Oct. 8, 7:30, Bro. F. T. **COALMONT:** Report of the Coalmont church to the twelfth annual Convention held at Orleans, Ind., Oct. 5-10, 1915. Spiritual condition good. Present membership 14. Held two revivals during the year. Number of souls that professed to be saved or sanctified during the year, 23. Amount of offerings for the year, \$131.05. Amount paid out, \$126.20, as follows: For evangelistic service, \$60.45; for running expenses of the church, \$42.00; for pastoral support, \$23.75. Balance in Treasury, \$4.85. Offering sent towards Convention expenses, \$2.25. Grover Bemis, Delegate.

**MIDDLETOWN:** Mount Zion Church, we are glad to report our church in good spiritual condition. We have held two revivals during the year, while there were no souls saved in either meeting we feel the church was revived and built up in Christ. Total expenses for the year \$476.73. Have an average attendance at Sunday School of 27. We use the Apostolic Holiness Literature. Our prayer is that the church may be built up and God glorified. J. **EAST ENTERPRISE:** Report of Fairmount A. H. Church for the year ending Oct. 3, '15. Bro. J. H. Corroll has been our pastor since April. The church is gaining ground, the Lord is blessing and we are looking for greater things in the future. We have two regular preaching services, and two prayer meetings each week. We own our church property and have it clear of debt. We have bought a camp ground at East Enterprise at a cost of \$175.00. We hold regular services at

the Tabernacle on the camp ground during the summer season. We have conducted one revival and one Camp Meeting during the year, in which the Lord blessed and a number of souls prayed through. Amount of tithes and offerings paid in during the year to pastor, \$215.46; for missions, \$18.02; for sister Bowman, \$19.00; to State Supt., \$13.00; for Convention expenses, \$3.00. **NEWTON STEWART:** Report of church to the twelfth annual convention of the A. H. Church of Ind., held at Orleans. Floyd Honchell has been our pastor the past year. We have held no revival during the year. There have been two converted and two sanctified during the year. Paid to our pastor for the eleven months \$55.10. Other expenses about \$15.00. Total expenses for the year, \$70.10. Geo. T. Spears, Delegate.

**NEW PHILADELPHIA:** Nelson Chapple Church. Our pastor, M. V. Compton, has preached the third Saturday and Sunday of each month with exception of two times when he was hindered by his health from coming. He has faithfully discharged his duty and we feel grateful to him for his counsel, help and faithfulness to us. We have had prayer meeting every Thursday night except one since July. Bro. H. W. Cochran and wife, Bro. Earl Davis and sister, Laura Goff held one tent meeting for us June 18-July 4. There were some saved and reclaimed and some sanctified and much conviction on the people when the meeting closed. God's children were much strengthened by their preaching, prayers and testimonies. We are few in number and weak financially. We own our church building and have it free of debt. #### A LETTER FROM E. D. JOY

Ebenezer Mission Station, Stegi, Via Mbabane, Swaziland, So. Africa.  
To the State Convention:—

Greetings in Jesus' Precious name, Amen. May the blessings and glory of our heavenly Father rest upon you and make this the best convention that you have ever had is our prayer. We would like so much to be with you in the battle but our blessed Lord has seen fit to order our steps otherwise. Four years have slipped by since we last met with you and this is the fifth convention. In this time I have remembered you in prayer and have never lost interest in the work in Indiana. I love the brethren and enjoyed the work in that State. I have been made to rejoice by the good news of advance made for God and holiness. We must oush the battle, Jesus will soon come and souls are perishing. I have been made to rejoice to learn of the unity of purpose shown in the work, and this is a necessary thing if we are to have success. We need and must have revivals and greater ones and the staying kind but too, we must keep the fish we catch and I believe you are doing it. May God bless you all.

Three years ago last March we reached Swaziland and spent two years, then were down in Cape Colony a year and last March returned. We fell in love with the Swazies when we came and ever since to be a blessing to them has been the cry of our hearts. They are of course quite different to white people but one can find out by being in their

midst the many customs and habits of living so peculiar to themselves. To me there is a pathos in heathen life that touches a sympathetic cord in my soul.

Then too, our parish is large containing about 24 to 30 thousand people living lives of heathenism and sin too dark to mention, and a bad feature of it is they have lived in sin so long it has lost the sinfulness and to them seems quite lawful and right. Of course the Holy Ghost is faithful and they soon realize the sinfulness, but are so bound they can't easily get away from it. The burden of these thousands of souls is on our hearts and we want to ask you to take them on your hearts to pray for us that we may have divine wisdom to carry out our responsibility and strength and health to do our best for them. I wish I might make you acquainted with them but a letter is too short to do that.

Last week one of our christian girls was persuaded to go to a most wicked man who had already nearly ten wives. She was bought with so many cattle and her father threatened to kill himself if she did not and with their threats and talk, fearing he would do it, she went despite all the persuading we did to the contrary. One unacquainted with their native ways would not pity as one who is, does. She is nevertheless to blame for doing a thing which the government will help her from doing if she will but ask for help, a thing she did not do. Her future will be a life of drudgery and submission to a wicked man who has bought her with so many cattle.

Many girls do not become Christians because they know what it will mean when they are of a marriagable age. We want you to take upon your hearts these thousands of souls. Your prayers will help to bear their burdens, to lighten their sorrows, to increase their joys in our Christ. They will give us the much needed evangelists and our Father's blessings upon them in their work. We are needing two evangelists but do not have them even had we their support. We have one in view but do not know too much of him and can't send him out. Pray that God will from these Swazies call out men to work for Him among their own people. We in reality need all the evangelists we can get, but we have two places needing workers at the present moment.

Mrs. Joy has had a severe attack of malarial fever and for a time we almost despaired of her life but God saw fit to spare her at this time. She is now in Natal recuperating while I am alone for the time. She is improving and will we trust in a few weeks' time be back with us in the battle.

May God bless you very much. We want by way of testimony to say "Jesus is more real and precious to us than ever. Trials, tests and battles are drawing us nearer, still nearer and we are proving that He helps when we trust. In a marvelous way has He helped and answered prayer. The Holy Ghost abides, the Blood cleanses and we are looking for our Lord to come. We love the fight and are going through."

Rev. Grover Hayhurst, the subject of this sketch, was born Aug. 5, 1886 and passed to his final reward April the 16, 1915, at the Union Hospital in Terre Haute, Ind., at the age of 28 years, 6 months and 11 days. He was married to Naoma Davis, Dec. 11, 1907. To this union was born two children, Kendall H., and Clifford M. There is a vacancy in that home that can never be filled, the voice we loved to hear is still, the steps we have heard approaching and have turned to meet have ceased to come, the chair is vacant, our hearts are sad, but we thank God he left the assurance he has gone to heaven. We can go to meet him. He said "You know where to find me." His last message to the Apostolic Holiness Church of which he was a member and which he loved so well, was, "Tell them I love them all and have prayed for them all."

He leaves to mourn their loss, the wife and two little boys, a mother, six brothers and six sisters, and a host of friends and relatives. Our loss is heaven's gain.
