Conference Proceedings

FIRST SITTING, JULY 27, 1961 — 1:30 P. M.

The fifty-seventh annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness convened at the Camp Ground in Denton, Md., with Rev. Mark H. Bowman presiding. Rev. Earl Watts led the congregational singing with Rev. E. J. Haskins serving as organist. "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" and "Draw Me Nearer", were the songs used to open the conference.

Rev. J. M. Griffin, Pastor of the Salisbury, Md., church read the 23rd Psalm and Rev. P. F. Bean offered prayer.

Rev. Bowman presented General Supt. Wm. H. Neff to the conference as the presiding officer. Bro. Neff gave some very helpful observations about the nature of conferences.

Following the opening devotions, the Secretary proceeded to call the roll, with 59 Ministerial delegates and 41 lay delegates answering the roll call.

The following list of transfers was read and said report was ratified by the conference: Rev. and Mrs. Wm. George, Rev. E. H. Haskins, Rev. Edward Wheatley, Rev. and Mrs. George Culver, Rev. Clifford Chew and Rev. Charles Engrem.

They were given seats within the conference bar.

Visitors to the conference were next introduced namely: 1st. Lt. Wilbur Bubb, Mrs. Clifford Chew, Rev. Finch, and Rev. Garrison.

The next order of business was the reading of reports. Rev. Mark Bowman District Supt., gave his report and it was accepted by a rising vote of appreciation. The District Treasurer gave a very complete report and a motion carried to receive this report. The auditor's report was accepted by the conference. The Statistician's report was given and a motion carried to adopt this report with much gratitude. The Sunday School Promotional Secretary gave his report and a motion prevailed to accept it. The Director of Missionary Societies on the district gave her report and it was accepted.

A letter was read by the Secretary from Mr. John Pizzadilli a layman and a delegate to conference for many years. Bro. Pizzadilli is visiting his native country of Italy at this time.

A motion carried to adjourn. Rev. H. D. Dukes offered the closing prayer.

SECOND SITTING THURSDAY, JULY 27, 1961 — 6:30 P. M.

The Ways and Means committee reported, with Rev. E. J. Haskins serving as Secretary.

The order of business at this time was the Ordination service. Following a five minute recess, Rev. Paul Dieter led in singing, "A Charge To Keep", prayer was offered by the District Secretary, and Rev. Watts, Dukes, and Griffen, read appropriate passages of Scripture. Rev. Wm. H. Neff delivered an excellent message from the writings of Apostle Paul. The following candidates for ordination knelt around the altar of prayer as Rev. Bowman sought the Favor of God in prayer: Rev. Atwood Berry, Rev. Wilson Brown, Rev. Glenn Staehli, Mrs. George Culver, and Mrs. Ruben Murphy. Dr. Neff and the Ordination Committee proceeded to follow the ritual for ordination as outlined in the manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Lay delegates were elected to the General Conference as follows: Olney Ross, Paul Vincent, Graham Price, and Lee Griffin. Alternate delegates are: O. L. Ewell, Roland Melvin, Jr., Reese Hurley, and R. J. Rew.

Resolutions committee offered an expression of gratitude to our Presiding Officer, Dr. Wm. H. Neff, and to our District Superintendent, Rev. Bowman. Rev. Griffin from the Maryland Bible Society and also area representative of the American Bible Society was presented to the conference and spoke briefly of the efforts of that worthy group.

A standing vote of appreciation was offered to the retiring District Secretary by the members of the conference. Prayer was offered as the fifty-seventh annual conference of the Eastern District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church came to a close.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

General Superintendent Dr. William H. Neff, Ministerial and Lay Delegates.

In the good providence of God, we are gathered together to conduct our 57th annual conference. We have convened to conduct business of the greatest import. Ours is a sick world, and we of our generation need to quit ourselves as men, and "occupy till He comes." It is doubtful if there was ever a more serious period in world history than the times in which we live. Brethren, we need to give our consecrated lives, with all our strength, time, talents and all we have to this consuming task. May the blessed faithful Spirit guide and direct our business and lead us step by step in our planning for the fiscal year ahead.

The insidious forces of sin are raging. Satan is not on vacation, neither does he let the natural forces and elements hinder his attacks on the church. We are most grateful to our Heavenly Father for his faithfulness to us, and we also wish to express our appreciation to each loyal one of you, his faithful servants and labourers in His great harvest field. It is because of your "labor of love"

and consecrated devotion to God's call and service that we are doing what we are accomplishing. "Be strong and of a good courage", — "as God was with Moses" so will He be with every Joshua and Caleb He can find.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION

On the whole, I feel that we have cause to Praise the Lord, and sing the doxology. He has given us a good year. There is a splendid wholesome spirit prevailing throughout the District.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS

Many improvements have been made and reported monthly through the pages of the "Eastern Pilgrim", therefore, I shall not enumerate all of them in this report. Among the most outstanding and costly ones are the following:

Cambridge — bought the corner property adjacent to the church at the cost of \$25,000.00 and have spent about \$5,000.00 more in developing the property, into a much needed parking area and additional Sunday School Departments and rooms. Rev. Wm. George and congregation are to be commended for this development.

Glen Burnie, A ground breaking service was held March 25, 1961 and now the new church is almost completed with a present indebtedness of approximately \$20,000.00 A Dedication Service is being planned for Sunday, August 20th, 1961 at 3:00 P. M. The church is lovely and well-built of red brick with white trim, a small steeple, with a cross. It has a full basement which will be used for Sunday School classes. It also embodies a pastor's study and nursery. The church lot also affords spacious parking area. The builder is a Christian gentleman who has used the best of materials and has given them many "extras" for which they are very grateful. The Lord has shown Himself strong in their behalf and has provided more than they "could ask or think."

Greenwood Church worshipped in a very dilapidated building. They really needed a new structure and through the faith and vision of their pastor, the Rev. Etta Clough, and their faithful members and very liberal friends, they have built this church at a very reasonable cost of approximately \$16,000.00. They still owe about \$9,000.00. The dedication date is set at 2:30 P. M., Sunday, September 3rd.

Broomes Island had need of a suitable parsonage to house Rev. Bill Miller and his family, so they erected a new pre-fab house, "The Texan". This house is ordinarily contracted for about \$20,000.00, but by means of donated labor for the most part, they are building it for about \$11,000.00 It is being financed interest free, and will be dedicated in the near future.

Milton and Harrington Churches are both laying plans to expand and build.

Bethlehem Church is building a very nice three (3) bedroom parsonage which will cost them approximately \$7,000.00. Rev. Glen Staehli and his little flock are demonstrating faith and adding work that achieves. The parsonage family hopes to occupy the parsonage by September 1, 1961.

CAMP GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

Increased interest has been demonstrated by the many campers at Denton Camp. The Graham Price Cottage was razed, and a new one was erected and

built by Mr. Price and Rev. Paul D. Dieter. His neighbor, Mr. Clarence Jones made some very definite improvements on his cottage. Rev. and Mrs. Walter Schaltenbrand erected a new cottage in a new area of the camp ground. Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Tyler and The LeCates and Robinsons built a new porch on their cottage. Rev. and Mrs. Charles Baker added a second story room to their cottage. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Love and the Taylors did major repairing on their cottages. Water was put into the cottages of Rev. Etta Mitchell, Rev. Etta Clough, Rev. and Mrs. C. T. Ruark, the Schwartz' cottage, Rev. and Mrs. Dieter's, and your District Superintendents cottage; also into the Brooks Wilhelm and Morris cottages. A new inch and one-quarter pipe line was run over to the new shower buildings. We have also put in a 600 gallon concrete septic tank, and increased our toilet facilities. We have also made possible the bringing of water into a new area of the camp ground, with a drinking fountain and increased pressure for the trailer court.

The shower buildings have eight private shower stalls and eight dressing rooms.

You will also note the increased platform area provided for our growing choir and orchestra. Let's keep our Camp Meeting a singing camp. There is a ministry in song and music.

The Book room operated by the Rev. Earl Watts has a new floor put into it.

We have brought in approximately 20 loads of fill to develop better roads and take care of the low places on our camp ground.

A number of mattresses and pillows were replaced and the missionary societies have come to our rescue and helped restore linen and added a new supply. Our missionary directress, Mrs. Gilmore has done a commendable job.

DISTRICT PARSONAGE FUND

Last year the District Conference set up a District Parsonage Fund, through which we received \$1421.58 and disbursed \$208.58 for repairs and improvements on our present parsonage, leaving a balance of \$1,213.00. The program has been set up for a five (5) year period. We trust every minister will cooperate by paying their 25% of their tithe into this channel. If everyone had done so this past year our balance according to salaries reported would have netted us \$2,242.72.

The District Council plans to review the whole Parsonage proposition.

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

From the very beginning of our conference year, at our first Ministerial Meeting held at Easton, you will remember that we pointed out the grim facts of our past record and urged that we stop the losses sustained for the past two years and do our utmost to make gains in Church membership. We did accomplish this, but just barely so. We do show a slight gain for which we are very thankful but we can do better, and I am sure by the help of the Lord we will do better this coming year. The answer to our problems, spiritually, financially and numerically within our organization is for more of his constraining love and fervent spirit in our hearts, and the dire need of more of us thus motivated. Pilgrims are wonderful people, but we need more Pilgrims. Pray for an increase of well

saved, Spirit-filled members in your church: Set a goal, work toward that end! Secure the aid of spirit-filled, earnest, sensible aggressive evangelists who will help you get the job done.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Our Sunday schools have done quite well. In spite of one of the hardest winters in our history we have suffered a loss of only about one-percent over that of the past year. Keep your shoulder to the wheel and push! The Sunday School is like a baby buggy, it will only move forward as you push it!

YOUTH WORK

Our Youth Director, Rev. Wm. Miller and the Zone leaders have done commendable work throughout the District. An excellent program is planned for our District Youth Camp to convene August 14 — 18th, and we also anticipate a fine Youth service each evening during the Camp Meeting. Let's do our utmost to see every young man and woman thoroughly saved and actively engaged in our church program. They are a real asset to every church.

DISTRICT MISSIONARY PROGRAM

Mrs. Gilmore and the Zone leaders of our Missionary Department have been very active and you will be hearing more about their activities and plans during the Camp Meeting. A missionary minded District will be a spiritual, alert and active one!

DISTRICT HOME MISSIONS

Our project at Seaford and Deal Island have been very encouraging. We regret that we were unable to organize these works this past year. However we are very hopeful of effecting an organization of both these works this fall.

Our Seaford work has been making splendid gains. The Sunday School averaged 49 in June a gain of 10% over that of a year ago. They also average good worship service attendance. An excellent spirit prevails. The Gilmores have done a commendable job.

The Deal Island work began last October the 23rd. with Mrs. Bowman and Mrs. Vickers spending two weeks visiting and inviting folks to the services, and working with the young people and children in special services which were followed with evangelistic messages delivered by members of our Home Missionary Board, and other ministers. During those three weeks of services we averaged about 40 in attendance and a number of souls sought the Lord. We carried on the work all through the winter, each Friday night and on Sunday afternoons, and again this Spring Mrs. Vickers and Bowman went down and lived among the people and called upon them and put on services for the children and young folk, introduced the speakers who were Rev. Marion Griffin and Rev. Marion Walker.

We find these folks to be hungry for the truth, and a spiritual program.

They have been especially appreciative of the ministry of Rev. Marion Walker and he has been supplying their pulpit for a number of weeks.

We are buying the properties in both these places and our budget runs us presently about \$450.00 per month, which includes, payments on properties, interest, insurance, light, heat, mileage and maintainance and salaries. If every member would give us one penny a day we can continue this great work. Please support the Home Missionary Calendar financial plan, and also give us your 5% Budget and we'll not need to set up any further money raising means. We are counting on you! Both these works will need our financial backing at least another year.

HONORABLE MENTION

The Rev. Wilbur W. Bubb is still serving our country as chaplain in the Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas. Chaplain Bubb was the first minister of our denomination to serve in this position.

PERSONAL REPORT

I have preached 140 times, visited each church two or more times, officiated at 4 funerals, assisted in 1, performed 12 baptisms, attended 9 E. P. C. executive committee meetings, 2 E. P. C. Board meetings, 1 Owosso College Board Meeting, presided over 11 council meetings. I have attended one educational and examining board meeting; 3 S. S. Board meetings, and 2 District youth Committee Meetings. I presided over 12 Home Missionary Board meetings.

I also attended 7 sessions of the lecture series, at Eastern Pilgrim College. It was also my pleasure to represent our District on E. P. C. Day. I appreciate the good response of our District, having approximately 110 present.

During the past year I also made 104 calls on pastors, 85 calls on laymen and visited 27 revival meetings.

I sent out 7 circular letters to pastors and ministers.

I travelled 17,450 miles in District and Home Missionary interests.

It was my privilege to plan and attend the three Zone visits our esteemed General Superintendent, Dr. Neff and wife made at our Baltimore, Denton and Salisbury churches.

Presided over our Fall and Spring Ministerial Meetings, which were well attended and very profitable.

My salary was paid in full.

I participated in a note burning service and 3 ground breaking services.

I have worked on our District Headquarters and Camp Meeting property.

It has been a pleasure to labor together with you and those whom you represent.

I appreciate the cooperation of our District Council and Home Missionary Board, Thank you for every kindness you have shown me.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Annual Youth Conference of the Eastern District be changed from the present hour (first Saturday morning of Denton Camp, 8:30 to 12 noon) to Wednesday evening prior to the opening of the District Conference with said Youth Conference convening at 7:30 P.M. THIS RESOLUTION LOST. Substitute motion carried.

honor to be a co-worker with Jesus Christ in the transforming of lives, the dispelling of darkness, misery and sin; the bringing of light, happiness and righteousness to human souls. It is not what our life is in wealth, culture, and attainment, but what our life is in service to others. . . that is the real test of greatness.

2. Another recommendation I feel is needed:

Every Pilgrim Holiness Church in the Eastern District shall support the financial program of the District Youth work.

1. Only 17 churches sent in to the District Youth Treasurer the equivalent of 5% of regular offerings. The total funds sent in amounted to: \$103.84 or an average of \$2.42 per month if we figure on the basis of 43 churches in our district. That amounts to 8c a week from each church if we figure on the basis of 50 meetings conducted during the year. This is a rather small budget on which to operate.

Word is forth coming from the Ways and Means Committee to correct this weakness in our financial structure. Please give it your prayerful consideration.

2. 4 zones contributed \$35.26 on the basis of 10% of zone offerings that are earmarked for the District Youth Treasury. This amount represents an average of \$7.05 per zone for the year.

The Ways and Means Committee will have a resolution to present to the conference along this line also.

And now LOOKING AHEAD in regards to the District Youth Program.

1. First YOUTH CAMP. . . we have set a goal for 150 campers, from every church in the district, and are praying that every camper will yield to Christ. I would like to urge every Pastor to promote this vital ministry and do your best to direct your young people between the ages of 11 and 18 to youth camp. The date is Aug. 11—18.

2. Plans will be laid by the District Youth Officers in the near future for the annual District Wide Youth Leaders Institute. This meeting will be conducted on a night during the last week of Sept.

3. Also a District Wide Youth Rally has been tentatively scheduled for Friday evening, December 29 at the High School auditorium, Greenwood, Delaware. Further plans about this service will be announced later.

I close this report with two verses of Scripture that every youth worker ought to have before him,

"Therefore my beloved brethern, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." 1 Cor. 14:58

"And let us not be weary in well doing for in due season we reap if we faint not." Galatians 6:9

DISTRICT YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

To the 5th Annual Eastern District Youth Conference:

The joys of working with our Eastern District Young People have been rewarded and satisfying. For this privilege, I am sincerely Grateful and "Thank Christ our Lord, who hath enabled me, for that He counted me faithful, putting me into the ministry." 1 Timothy 1:12

I wish to express my appreciation to our District Youth Officers who have cooperated in every way to support the youth program and of course words of commendation are in order for the hard working Zone Leaders in our District who give of their time and energies to plan and promote a vital part of our youth program, namely our Zone Rallies conducted throughout the District each month.

By way of personal report I presided over 5 District Youth Council meetings, conducted business meetings in all 5 zones, endeavored to preach at 6 zone rallies and presided over the Youth Leader's Institute at Delmar Church, Sept. 29, 1960.

In the interest of District Youth work I have traveled approximately 1025 miles, receiving mileage from the District Youth Treasury for 549 miles. A number of hours have been given over to the compiling and mimeographing of letters, announcements and other literature that are related to District Youth Work. So much by way of a personal report on the past year's activities.

At this present time, I would like to make the following recommendations:

1. Every Pilgrim Holiness Church in the Eastern District (whether the youth society is organized or unorganized) conducting a youth meeting each week.

Youth work is not a side-line, it is a major, full time job. Yet only 20 churches in the Eastern District reported as having conducted a youth meeting. 2 Timothy 2:2 States a principle too neglected these days, "The things that thou hast heard of me among many witnessed, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also."

Someone once asked a farmer, "How do you have such beautiful sheep?" "I take good care of the lambs," was his reply.

Youth workers are needed in our church who will feed the lambs. "We are workers together with God." said the great Apostle and that applies to youth work.

"There are many things which God does in which we have no part. God paints the fleecy white clouds, and tints the golden sunset with shades of infinite beauty, He keeps the stars in their orbits, He sends the invigorating sun and the refreshing showers, He paints the fragrant rose and the delicate lily and gives each flower their respective scent of sweetness."

Rev. Paul Pritchett, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, read the two resolutions on record. Resolution No. 1 was adopted. Resolution No. 2 was discussed, amended, and tabled.

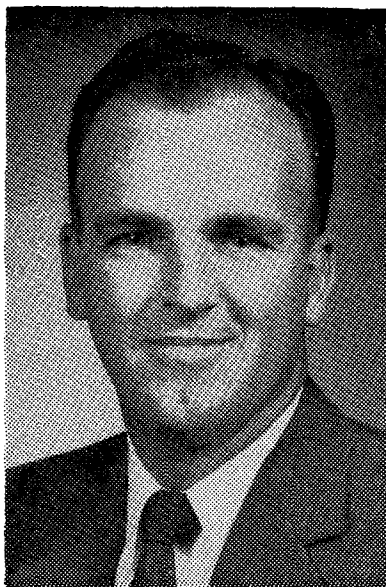

- No. 55. The conference bar shall include the first ten rows in the two center sections of the tabernacle and the platform.

MINUTES

- No. 56 The Manuscript for the district minutes shall be in the hands of the printer within 30 days and churches receiving them send the money to the District Treasurer within 10 days.
- No. 57. The price of the Conference Journal shall be set by the District Council.
- No. 58. The Editing Committee shall delete from the minutes all standing rules deemed obsolete.
- No. 59. Each pastor shall see that the names of deceased members be mailed to the Memoirs Committee when the church books close on June 30.

DISTRICT BUSINESS

- No. 60. Two one-day ministerial conventions shall be held each year.
- No. 61. No annual church business meetings shall be held on Sunday.
- No. 62. Whenever possible each pastor shall hold a meeting within the bounds of his own church within the conference year.
- No. 63. Each pastor shall have a two weeks vacation with pay, other than camp and church related business.
- No. 64. The Revised Standard Version of the Bible shall not be used as pulpit Bible for Scripture readings.
- No. 65. Each pastor is requested to furnish the District Secretary with the name and address of the local paper.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

- No. 66 District Sunday School Rally shall be held on July 4.
- No. 67. Two Sunday School banners shall be awarded at the district rallies, one on the basis of the percentage of enrollment present, and the second one on the basis of the number present in all sessions, multiplied by the number of miles traveled.
- No. 68. The District Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall receive \$50.00 per year as a token of appreciation from the Conference for his services.

- No. 43. Quarterly report blanks shall be prepared and sent to the District Superintendent by each church. Said blanks shall be furnished by the Conference Secretary.
- No. 44. The Ordination Service shall be held on the first evening of the District Conference at 8:00 P. M. and those eligible for full ordination shall be notified not later than 30 days prior to the conference.
- No. 45. There shall be a District Director of Missionary Societies appointed each year by the District Council; whose duty shall be to promote the missionary enterprise of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
- No. 46. The goals for the Conference year shall be 2 new churches, and 95 new members.
- No. 47. Each Pastor shall comprise a mailing list of members and friends of the church as well as those who may be his responsibility.
- No. 48. An Honor Roll shall be provided by the District which shall list the names of the churches that reach their yearly goals, and an appropriate award given to those churches listed thereon at the Annual Conference.
- No. 49. Each Pastor shall conduct a Soul Winning Class and institute a visitation campaign in his church, and where practical set up a Bible study for the young people of the church.
- No. 50. The rate of mileage paid by the District for travel in district interests shall be .07c per mile.
- No. 51. The Examining and Educational Boards shall meet at 9:00 A. M. the first Friday of June of each year at Denton Camp Grounds and all candidates consider this the fixed date of meeting of these boards each year and that this date of meeting will be included in the Conference Journal with the other important dates of meetings.
- No. 52. The Home Missionary Board shall be composed of the members of the District Council with the District Superintendent as the Chairman. The Executive Branch of the Council shall constitute the administrative agency of this Board and the Advisory Members of the Council and the Pastors of the churches on the district receiving support from the District shall meet twice each year with the executive agency in advisory capacity.
- No. 53. The cost of printing EASTERN PILGRIM shall be rotated among the following district funds, namely: District Budget, District Home Missions, District Sunday School, District Youth Fund, and District Camp Fund.
- No. 54. The District Council shall be the District Trustees and the executive

CONFERENCE REGULATIONS

- No. 31 All ministers assuming new pastoral duties shall move before the second Sunday after District Conference.
- No. 32 The District Superintendent as soon after conference as possible shall meet with the membership and official boards of the local churches and that his duties shall further include the strengthening of weaker churches of the district and take an active part in District Home Missionary endeavors.
- No. 33 The Conference year shall close on May 31st and all reports shall be postmarked no later than July 1st, and mailed to the District Superintendent and the District Statistician.
- No. 34 Sitzings of the Annual Conference shall be as follows: Afternoon Session from 1:30 to 4:30; Evening Session from 6:30 to 9:30 Morning Session, 8:30 to 12:00 noon.
- No. 35 As much as possible all resolutions to be considered by the conference shall be in the hands of the committee in typewritten form not later than the Wednesday preceding the opening of Conference.
- No. 36. No individual shall serve as a member of more than one of the following: Council, Examining Board, Education Board, and Resolution Committee.
- No. 37 The District Conference shall be held on Thursday and Friday before camp. The said conference to convene on Thursday at 1:30 P. M. and run until 12:00 Noon on Friday.
- No. 38 The objectives, plans and goals of all District Departments (Sunday School, Youth, Home Missionary, District Missionary Director) shall be in the hands of all District Ministers within 30 days following conference and furthermore that the committees and boards shall have opportunity to promote their program at the District Fall Ministerial Convention.
- No. 39 The District Council in office previous to the conference shall carry through their duties incidental to the camp.
- No. 40 The district secretary shall send, immediately following the district conference, mimeographed copies of the conference actions concerning finances to each minister, evangelist, song evangelist, the District Superintendent and to each local Church Treasurer.
- No. 41 Each zone of our district shall be encouraged to develop under the direction of the Home Missionary Board one new church.
- No. 42 The District Council, District Trustees, and all District Officials are authorized to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consumation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set

- No. 18. A leader shall be appointed by the Council to have charge of the Ring Meeting for the coming year and the same be announced and attendance encouraged from the platform.
- No. 19. The Camp Committee shall build two cottages on the Camp Ground for sale, this practice to be continued.
- No. 20. No buildings shall be constructed in the area that was occupied by two old dormitories which have been moved.
- No. 21. All active district ministers and evangelists shall give 2 eight hour days of work on the camp grounds each year and in the event any minister is unable to participate in this work program, he be assessed at the rate of \$10.00 per day.
- No. 22. Ladies taking part in the services on the platform shall be required to dress modestly.
- No. 23. No tree shall be cut on the Camp Ground without permission of the Camp Committee
- No. 24. One man shall be appointed and deputized to police the grounds with the aid of helpers.
- No. 25. The Family Prayer Hour during camp shall be announced and the keeping of it urged.
- No. 26. All children eating in the dining room, except minister's children, between the ages 6-12 be charged one-half price; all under six be entertained free.
- No. 27. The District Council shall draw up a lease form whereby every property owner will have to renew their lease every ten (10) years and that there shall be no transfer of ground lease or sale of property without the written approval of the District Council; and that the property must be sold, if approval is not granted, to Pilgrim or those in sympathy to the way of holiness. In the event the council is unable to grant a transfer of lease or approval of a sale of property, it shall be bought in by the council at a fair price and offered for sale at the same price paid for the property. If a cottage is not opened and used for three (3) consecutive years the owner shall forfeit their lease and the District Council shall buy in the property and it shall be used by others who are desirous of promoting the Camp.
- No. 28. Any cottage that becomes damaged by storm, or is permitted to run down in appearance, notice shall be given to the cottage owners by the District Council that it must be repaired or torn down within 60 days.
- No. 29 Future building of cottages on Denton Camp Ground shall be required to build in uniformity with those that are already built; said uniformity shall be in regards to size, style and must be at least 10 feet apart for car parking. All future building sites shall be laid off in streets.
- No. 30 The Fiscal Year of Denton Holiness Camp shall be from January 1 through December 31.

- No. 6. The District Secretary and Treasurer shall receive \$85.00 and \$200.00 respectively plus postage per year.
- No 7. The District Statistician shall receive \$50.00 per year.
- No. 8. The following system of financing the District Sunday School program shall be adopted:
- a. Those Sunday Schools with a yearly average of 200 and above shall give \$20.00 yearly.
 - b. Those with an average of 150-199 shall give \$15.00 yearly.
 - c. Those with an average of 100-149 shall give \$12.00 yearly.
 - d. Those with an average of 75-99 shall give \$10.00 yearly.
 - e. Those with an average of 50-74 shall give \$8.00 yearly.
 - f. Those with an average of 30-49 shall give \$5.00 yearly.
 - g. Those with an average of less than 30 shall give \$3.00 yearly.

This assessment shall be based on the past years average attendance.

- No. 9 The District Conference recommends that each church pay the assessment fees of the Pastor and wife, all incapacitated ordained ministers on the membership roll of any given church, and that the District shall pay the assessment fees of the District Superintendent and his wife, as these fees relate to the Ministerial Benefit Association.
- No. 10. Each minister or church in the Eastern District shall pay the equivalent of 25% of the ministerial tithe into a District Parsonage Fund, and be it further resolved that this plan be terminated at the end of 5 years.

CAMP REGULATIONS

- No. 11. Nothing shall be sold at Denton Camp on Sunday.
- No. 12. Ministers children under 12 years of age be entertained free, those over 12 shall work in the dining room and assist with camp work.
- No. 13. All who go to the dining room during our District Camp shall register and be supplied with tickets to be presented upon entrance into the dining room.
- No. 14. All cottage holders shall be encouraged to paint their cottages in uniformity with others.
- No. 15. A Bible College service shall be held the 2nd Saturday of the camp and the representative be allowed to take an offering for the Eastern Pilgrim College.
- No. 16. No other service shall be in progress during Missionary Services at Denton Camp.
- No. 17. A day and hour shall be set for healing services at Denton Camp annually.

Be it further resolved that a committee of four be appointed by the District Council to study ways of achieving this minimal program. This committee should consider the following methods:

1. Place two or more churches on a circuit so that this salary or hopefully more than this could be reached. A full time pastor serving two churches is much preferable to a part time pastor serving a part-time church.
2. Setting up a conference endowment fund to be financed by gifts a percentage of district budget, pastor's tithe or other finance.
3. A graduated conference salary scale which would assure fairer distribution but not equalization.
4. The creation of a climate of opinion and the establishment of a standard of requirements for the churches to follow in matter of salary. Many hesitant churches could do better. A proper approach by this conference could create this power of opinion.

Finally be it resolved that this committee be prepared to give a full report of their studies and conclusions by next conference time. A working plan should be in operation by June 1, 1965.

STANDING RULES

- No. 1. The United Stewardship Fund shall be \$8.00 per member per year and our District Budget shall be set at \$3.25 per member per year and our commitment to Eastern Pilgrim College be set at \$3.00 per member per year making a total of \$14.25 per member per year. Every church in the conference shall set aside one Sunday in each month, preferably the first, to receive the offering for the Annual Budget.
- No. 2. The Conference shall accept the Pension plan on a District Basis. Each church shall raise its 4 per cent on the pastor's salary as it deems best, and each Evangelist take care of the 2 per cent of his salary as he sees fit and send it to the District Treasurer.
- No. 3. Each Church shall pay into the District Treasury 5% of all Regular Offerings (Sunday morning and evening and Prayer meeting). This amount to be sent in monthly. This 5% shall be apportioned as follows: 75% for District Budget, and 25% for District Home Missions.
- No. 4. The District Superintendent's salary shall be \$85.00 per week (\$5.00 of which shall be paid out of the Camp Meeting Fund) and that in addition he shall receive postage, telephone, fuel, electric, full payment of Pilgrim Pension Fund, mileage, two weeks vacation with pay, and he be allowed to conduct not more than 2 revivals or conventions of not more than 4 Sundays each year, with remuneration. All finance to be reported to the District Statistician.
- No. 5. Each Church shall pay the District Superintendent 25c per member each visit.

BE IT RESOLVED, that our men be urged to give themselves to this rewarding ministry. Such writings should be in the form of sermons, tracts, pamphlets, and full-length books. Our church periodicals could carry many of these writings.

4—BE IT RESOLVED, that this conference elect a Secretary of Home Missions, who shall serve as an advisory member of the District Council and whose duties shall be:

1. The promotion of home missions through information and publicity.
2. The recommendation of potential areas of home mission work.
3. The assisting of the district superintendent in any way.

This person shall be elected from a list of two or more persons nominated by the District Council.

5—BE IT RESOLVED, that the annual average attendance of the Sunday School be figured on the basis of 50 Sunday sessions a year and at the end of the year, the pastor in consultation with his S. S. Board shall determine which Sundays shall be eliminated.

6—BE IT RESOLVED, that no Sunday School scholar be counted present who is not present in the session within the first thirty minutes of the session.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

Resolution No. 1 — Whereas additional funds are needed in the amount of \$400.00 for General Conference delegate expense, be it resolved that our District churches be apportioned to meet this expense as follows by Jan. 1, 1962:

Churches of 25 members or less	\$ 7.50
Churches of 25-40 members	\$12.50
Churches of 40 members or more	\$22.50

Resolution No. 2 — Be it resolved that standing rule #4, page 58 of 1960 Conference Journal, in regards to District Superintendent's salary and commitments be as follows: Salary \$85.00 per week, with full payment of Pilgrim Pension Plan.

Resolution No. 3 — Whereas we believe that the Harold D. Dieter Lecture Series at Eastern Pilgrim College provides a retreat of many immeasurable values, which aid in the spiritual, intellectual, and professional growth of the minister, Be it therefore resolved that each church be requested by this conference to pay the tuition cost of approximately \$15.00 to enable its pastor to attend.

Resolution No. 4 — Whereas we are profoundly convinced that the laborer is worthy of his hire and Whereas we are fully cognizant of the continual struggle which many of our ministers face on very limited salaries, be it therefore resolved that this conference call for a program which will guarantee every regular pastor a minimum salary of \$2000.00 per year or \$40.00 per week from his church. (50% of our men receive from \$12.00 to \$35.00 per week)

And whereas there is a current pressure on the clergy to stress the physical building of the kingdom to the subordination of the spiritual church, Therefore, be it resolved that in an effort to help this situation and increase the depth of our ministry, that the conference expects our pastors to attend the Harold Dieter Memorial Lectures conducted annually at E. P. C.

3—Whereas, there is a genuine dearth of literature written by men of the Wesleyan-Arminian tradition and persuasion,

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

To the 57th Annual Conference of the Eastern District assembled on Denton Camp Ground:

Greetings from your Sunday School Department!

In these days of awful pressures and problems we are happy to observe many who are making real progress in the work of the Lord. 20 Sunday Schools of our district made numerical gains which might indicate that they have had some measure of success during the past year. Nevertheless, we are sure many others have worked equally hard without corresponding results and honors. We are thankful for the efforts of everyone who has in anywise aided the Sunday School cause and trust you will be amply rewarded by Him who knows each our records.

It seems fitting, however, that we should take time out to acknowledge those Sunday Schools which have attained their 8% goals that were set by the District Sunday School Board. They are as follows: Bethlehem, 48%; Trappe, 47%; Seaford, 36%; Quinby, 17%; Baltimore II, 10%; Saxis, 10%; Harrington, 9%; and Mardela, 9%. To all of these we give a hearty salute for a year's work well done.

On the other hand, we wish to speak as frankly of our failures. Of the 43 Sunday Schools reporting 19 showed losses and a district total loss of 18. Though this may be less than 1% loss, it is a matter of concern to all of us and each who has come up short should try to analyze his case and correct any shortcomings so his church's future record may read differently. After the most severe winter in years we are all inclined to blame the weatherman, but could it be possible that there were other reasons? At any rate let us not spend too much time bemoaning our loss. Let us redouble our efforts toward success for this year. The month of May closed the conference year with a slight gain, and, as of this writing, the June report, tho' incomplete, holds a tentative gain. Let us try to make this a banner year for the Lord and the Sunday School.

We are happy to report that the Eleventh Annual Fourth of July Convention held here at Denton Camp was one of the best attended in years, having a total attendance of 580 compared with 505 a year ago. Gratifying success was the reward of the program built around the idea of "How We Did It", or How
