DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-Fourth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, convened on the District Camp Grounds at Kernersville, N. C., August 28th, 1944, Greetings in Christ Jesus our Lord!

It is with praise to God for His abundant goodness which has accompanied all of us through the strains, trials and triumphs of another year that we here present a brief survey of the District work in general, together with the report of my year's work.

SPIRITUAL PROGRESS: Gas rationing, an unusually bad winter, epidemics of various sorts, shortages in materials for church construction and other obstacles have beset our churches along the way this year. But notwithstanding these hindrances, the work of God has made excellent spiritual gains this year in the District in general. Triumphs of Grace, out-pourings of the Holy Ghost in gracious revivals, reaching many sinners and believers with needed blessings and numerous answers to prayer both in spiritual and temporal ways have been in evidence throughout the year. We have not only held our own but made gains. Many of the churches have received new members during the year, and the depth of spirituality in the work in general is to be very much appreciated.

MATERIAL GAINS: In this field there is also much for which to praise the Lord. Splendid progress has been made practically all over the District. Beautiful new churches, brick structures, have been erected this year at Albemarle, Gold Hill and Spray. Pastors Rev. U. N. Freeman, Rev. Roy J. Rummage and Rev. F. R. Cooper, respectively, have worked hard, sacrificed and led their people on to victory in these building programs, and both pastors and people are to be highly commended for their noble work.

Brother Wm. Scercy has practically completed the new church at Bethel this year. Rev. W. F. Page and the Kannapolis Pilgrims have made about \$1700.00 worth of improvements on their church and parsonage. At Elkin, where Brother Wallace is the pastor,

they have lifted their load of indebtedness entirely. Due credit goes to Brother Loman who, during his revival there, pushed the money-raising campaign for the church debt, thus making possible its early payment in full. Also, Brother Loman was instrumental in raising considerable funds at the Sprav church during his spring revival there. The Biscoe church where Brother M. T. Cockman was pastor for the last two years and the Thurmond church where Brother J. F. Talbirt is pastor, have been completed this year and are practically free of debt. The church at Franklinton where Brother Charles Apple has pastored the past two years was dedicated free of debt this year, and likewise the parsonage at Franklinville where Brother Frank Kernodle pastors. Brother H. R. Helms and the Liberty Pilgrims (Harmony Circuit) plan to build a new parsonage near the Liberty church as soon as conditions permit. "And the time would fail me to tell of" the 12 or 15 charges on the District where church debts have been lifted, new additions or improvements made, pastor's salaries raised and general progress registered.

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOLS: Our average attendance schedule may show some setback for the year from very bad weather for almost two months of the winter, and especially from the dreadful poliomyelitis (infantile paralysis) plague which swept large portions of our District, in some places cutting our attendance nearly to half its normal average. Yet, our statistics show splendid records on the whole despite all this.

OUR YOUNG PEOPLE: Under the excellent leadership of our Y. P. Executive Secretary for the year, Rev. T. P. Ragland, good progress has been made. Three splendid rallies have been held, including the one at the opening of the Camp Meeting, with very gratifying attendance and results. Thank God for our fine young people. They are spiritual and aggressive, many of them have gracious talents for Christian work and a vision for the Lord's cause.

CAMP-MEETING: The camp this year was a gracious one, owned and blessed of God, under the capable and efficient ministries of Rev. Wm. H. Neff, District Superintendent of the California District, evangelist, and other ministerial brethren; Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Masterman, of the New York District, singers and musicians, and Rev. U. N. Freeman of our own District in charge of the Young Peoples' services.

The District Grounds property has been increased several thousand dollars in valuation by the erection and equipment of the

nice dormitory and other equipment added during this Conference year. We are especially indebted to our Pilgrim contractor, Brother L. B. Gallimore, of Greensboro, for his large share in this work financially and for his kindness in personally supervising the construction of the dormitory and installation of other equipment. To our faithful pastors, who spent many long hard hours of labor donated to the cause, the District owes a debt of gratitude, as well as to the Council, Camp-meeting board and the numerous committees who have worked so ardently at the tasks assigned to them in getting this work accomplished.

I have enjoyed my work this year in the District and wish to express my deepest gratitude to God and my brethren for the gracious spirit of cooperation shown me by the Council, the Campmeeting board and the various committees as well as the District at large. There have been a number of pastoral changes but a lovely spirit has prevailed during this period.

During the year I have preached 187 times; prayed with 138 seekers for salvation and sanctification; dealt personally with more than 300 souls about salvation; visited or prayed in 205 homes; prayed with 7 for healing; dedicated 14 children; baptized 5 persons; conducted 6 prayer meetings; assisted in a number of radio programs for our pastors; secured 86 subscriptions to the Advocate. I have held one revival, one camp-meeting and served as guest speaker at one Ministerial Convention off the District, and have held 8 week-end conventions in home missionary work. Also, we have dedicated one church and one parsonage, attended and took part in four opening rallies in new churches, and all the Young Peoples' Rallies. I have made 147 visits to the churches and home missionary projects of the District; conducted 128 business meetings, 15 District Council meetings, 8 Camp-meeting Board meetings and have organized four new churches.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

To the Thirty-Fourth Annual Conference of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, I hereby submit the report of the home missionary work of the District:

As a large share of my time has been employed in this work of the District, it appears only reasonable that a separate report of this department's activities and the status of its projects should be rendered to the Conference. This report includes some older churches still considered in the Home Missionary stage.

We have four new churches to offer the Conference this year:

1. DRAPER: Upon the resignation of Rev. F. R. Cooper as pastor here for 18 months in order to give full time to his work at Spray, Rev. R. L. Bowling was placed in charge last spring. A Pilgrim Fellowship had been organized before Brother Cooper left, and at the close of a revival conducted by Rev. Mrs. Bertha L. Nations and Misses Mary Bost and Ila Beck, assisting Brother Bowling, we were able to effect the complete organization of a church with an excellent group of members. They voted to bring their property into the Conference—a lovely brick church with a nice S. S. department.

2. MORGANTON: Sister Lapish Nations and Sisters Mary Bost and Mary Keller were placed here temporarily last fall after Conference. Upon their release by request, the Lord has sent along Brother and Sister L. E. Taylor from Michigan just in time to take over. Through the hard work of all these workers, God gave us a hold on things here, and in January a Pilgrim Fellowship was organized with a nice group, which finally resulted in a completed church organization. Plans are under way to purchase a permanent place of worship. We have some real saints of God here.

3. LIBERTY: Following Conference last fall, Brother Harold Loman took charge of this preaching point until this spring when Rev. C. P. Richey was appointed pastor. Sunday School attendance

has held up well through the year. Brothers Vaughn and Richey held a very successful tent meeting there this spring, with assisting singers from Randleman and Greensboro and local talent, which resulted in the formation of another Pilgrim Fellowship, and finally into a completed church organization with a fine group of Pilgrims. They are planning to build a church as soon as conditions permit.

4. BROWER MEMORIAL: Out from Asheboro about four miles is the nice little church known as Brower Memorial. It resulted from a tent meeting conducted there last fall by Rev. E. M. Fowler and others who assisted him, after which the church was built out of their loving sacrifice and labors. Brother Fowler contacted me some time ago and arrangements were made to organize this work into a Pilgrim Holiness Church which was effected the first part of August. Rev. Marvin Cockman held a very helpful three days' convention there during which we organized. They are also bringing their property with them into the Conference. The pastors and delegates from these churches are here to be received into this Conference at the proper time.

Following is a report of unorganized work in process of development:

MIDWAY CHAPEL: Out on the Bessemer-McLeansville Road about five miles from Greensboro stands this lovely little chapel which Rev. T. A. Wyrick and his loyal supporters have built. Sunday School and church attendance is good, and we are working our way forward toward a Pilgrim church here, in the near future we trust.

WELCOME: Brother Barger has done an excellent work here in connection with his pastorate. They have a faithful and loyal group here, though small. They have their lot purchased and hope to build when conditions permit. This task may fall to Brother Lange, the new pastor at Erlanger and Welcome.

WESTERN N. C. CHURCHES: By the faithful labors of Brother Norman Nations the new church at Whittier has been developed far enough to be in use for services which are now being held regularly. Also, the Wilmot church has been painted inside, thanks to Sister Mae Bumgardner who raised the money and the pastor who did the work. The church at Bryson City, too, is doing quite well.

STATESVILLE: In January the writer and Brother Bowling went to Statesville to see about opening a work there. Finally a

nice building was secured, a revival held and a Sunday School opened. Brother Bowling worked there for a while and took care of the work. Following this, Brother Carey Bulla was placed in charge. Recently we have secured the Jewish Synagogue at a very reasonable rate and for an indefinite time for our services. Our summer revival was postponed because of the polio situation but we plan one for the early fall, and trust that a church will result here in the coming year from the faithful labors of our workers.

HARKER'S ISLAND: Here we have a very fine spiritual group of people with a lovely church building, who are pastored by a Pilgrim pastor, Rev. James M. Smith of Hertford, N. C. Brothers Covington and Vaughn have had good revivals here during the year. The folk are now supporting our missions and are considering future union with us.

CONCORD: Early in the summer our District Home Missionary evangelistic party, Rev. and Mrs. J. B. Fulp and Misses Faye Linton and Lola Dragoo, went to Concord to conduct a campaign with Rev. Wm. Scercy, our worker in charge there. God blessed the meeting and a good start was made. A building was secured and a Sunday School has been begun. We trust it will blossom into a church in the coming year. Brothers Scercy and Linebarrier recently held another meeting there.

LENOIR: Last fall God put Lenoir on our hearts. In January, we found that Brother Taylor, pastor at Morganton, 15 miles away, had a similar burden. After investigation we arranged for Brother Taylor to conduct weekly cottage meetings in which he was often assisted by Brother Smith from the Hickory work. Our evangelistic party, moving up from Concord, pitched their tent there for what proved a very successful meeting resulting again in the developing of a Pilgrim Fellowship with an excellent membership which we trust in due season will materialize into a church. Rev. Ebenezer Myers, retired Methodist-holiness preacher, has proved himself a real friend of our work and through his influence and that of the board of directors of a mission he was operating, we fall heirs to the furnishings and with an option to buy the property if we so desire.

BENEFIT: Brother Carlee Bost has been working up a new work at the old church known as Benefit some miles out of Kernersville. It is hoped that in the coming year we may see a definite work established here. Besides these, there are several other places which appear very favorable for new work, among

which are Star, where Brother Fowler already has a building to open a Sunday School, Central Falls, where he plans a revival campaign soon, and Cedar Falls where Brother Charles Stout plans to open up new work this fall.

I wish to express my deepest appreciation for the cooperation of the District Council in this year's home missionary work, and for the excellent services of our tent campaign party, Brother and Sister Fulp and Sisters Linton and Dragoo, and the Home Missionary workers who have so loyally and faithfully labored this year in this work.

May God grant the District the greatest year of increase and deepening spiritually we have ever had!

RESOLUTIONS

No. 1. Whereas, New churches have a struggle sometimes to get started and have many financial needs,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That new churches shall pay District budget on the following plan: one-fourth the first year, one-half the second year, three-fourths the third year, the full amount of the budget the fourth year and thereafter.

No. 2. Whereas, There is some confusion in making out the annual reports by the local church treasurer,

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the District Treasurer mail a letter of instruction to each local church treasurer detailing the items required in the annual report.

No. 3. Whereas, The Manual provides that a district of fifty churches, or more, is entitled to nine Council members,

Therefore Be Is Resolved, That these additional members be elected in this Conference.

No. 4. Whereas, It would be a good way to diffuse the knowledge of our doctrines among our people and create in them a broader understanding and more loyalty to the church,

Therefore Be It Resolved, That the churches of our district be requested to create a fund for the purpose of giving one year's subscription free to the Pilgrim Holiness Advocate and a copy of the Manual of our church to each member joining our churches.

No. 5. Whereas, Standing Rule No. 4, 1943 Minutes, works a handicap upon the churches and District Superintendent as it now stands, as the District grows, and the fact that the camp meeting deducts ten days or more from this period,

Therefore Be It Resolved, That this rule be changed to read, "That no church meeting for the purpose of calling a pastor be held earlier than ninety days prior to the close of the Conference fiscal year."

No. 6. Resolved, That the expense of the workers for the Ministerial Convention be paid from funds in the District treasury.

No. 7. Resolved, That the Ways and Means committee and committee on Resolutions have available mimeographed copies of resolutions and recommendations and have same in the hands of the ministers and delegates before being presented on the Conference floor.

No. 8. Resolved, That since the District report and the local church treasurer's report do not always correspond, the District Treasurer send to the church treasurer before he makes his report a copy of the amount be sent in.

No. 9. Be It Resolved, That the District Superintendent and Council appoint three men as a Bible School Committee to assist the Superintendent and Council in furthering the work of the school.

No. 10. Be It Resolved, That we appoint Rev. O. L. Ruth as a Field Representative for our Bible School and that his salary and duties are to be outlined by the District Council.

No. 11. In view of the fact that the General Superintendent's salary has not been raised in proportion to the increase in the cost of living expenses,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That we go on record as petitioning the General Board to give him a substantial increase in salary.

No. 12. Resolved, That the names of all local licensed ministers appear in the Minutes.

No. 13. Resolved, That we send a letter of appreciation to the Kernersville News for their publicity in the interest of the Pilgrim Camp and Conference.

Resolved Further, That we send a letter of appreciation to the Russell Funeral Home, of Thomasville for the use of their sound system during the Camp and Conference.

No. 14. Resolved, That we give an expression of appreciation to the Camp meeting and Conference workers:

To Dr. W. L. Surbrook for his timely instruction and the splendid manner in which he conducted the business of the Conference, and

To our District Superintendent, Rev. Wm. S. Deal for his untiring efforts in directing the affairs pertaining to the Conference. To the office workers, Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Grout,

To the kitchen and dining room managers, Rev. H. B. Barger and Rev. O. T. Gaither, and those assisting them,

To the tent committee, Rev. W. L. Cockman, and assistants, To the lunch stand workers, Rev. and Mrs. T. C. Vaughn, and Mrs. C. C. McMasters,

To the camp and conference buyer, Rev. C. C. McMasters, To the book stand workers, Rev. W. F. Page and Miss Faye Linton,

Special mention of appreciation is hereby made to all the ministers and their wives, and laymen, who came in to help clean the buildings and grounds.

No. 15. Resolved, Also that we express our appreciation to Miss Anthony for her splendid services to the Conference for the past twenty-two years, as District Secretary.

No. 16. Resolved, That as Rev. Wm. R. Phillips is leaving us to work in the Virginia District, we express our appreciation to him for his godly life, his good judgment as a member of the District Council, his sweet spirit, and the fine work he did for the church during his thirteen years as District Treasurer.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

No. 1. Whereas, There has been some delinquency on the parsonage assessment of last year, we recommend that the pastors bring up their assessment of \$1.00 per member during the first month after Conference.

No. 2. We recommend that the District Superintendent on his first visit to the churches appoint some one to assist him in taking

a special offering on Sunday to defray the debt on the parsonage.

No. 3. Whereas, There is a shortage in our Home Missionary fund, and, Whereas, There is a surplus in our District budget,

We, therefore, recommend that the District budget read as follows: District Home Missions 2 per cent, District Loan Fund 1 per cent, Bible School 2 per cent, District budget 8 per cent, total 13 per cent.

STANDING RULES

1. Whereas the Manual provides that the pastor may hold two revivals a year, be it resolved, that we grant the same privilege to our District Superintendent and that he retain the offerings received from same and that all other offerings from church extension coming in the line of his duty be turned over to the District Treasurer. (1943).

2. The Council is authorized to formulate rules and regulations for the Camp Meeting and Conference. (1943).

3. The District Superintendent is the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Board. (1943).

4. We recommend that we pay at the rate of five cents per member per year for the Delegate Expense Fund to the General Conference. (1938).

5. As there is some expense in the performance of the duties of the District officials, we recommend that they be allowed three cents per mile when traveling in the interest of the District. (1941).

6. Be It Resolved: That this Conference organize a Camp Meeting Association by electing a Secretary-Treasurer and secure members who shall pay \$2.00 each for the first year, and \$1.00 per year thereafter. The duty of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be to keep a correct record of the membership, finances, etc., and disburse same as directed by the District Council. He shall make a report at each District Assembly. He shall also write to each member of the Association before the Camp opens, advising them of the date of the Camp, the evangelists and singers, and ask them for their dues. 1941).

8. Be It Resolved: That our Ministerial Convention shall convene on Tuesday after the first Sunday in April each year until said date shall be changed by the District Conference. (1940).

9. We recommend that the birthday offerings be used for the purpose of Church Extension, and that each pastor explain, encourage, and push the offering; however, we still retain the call card. (1942).

10. A Home Missionary Association shall be formed, made up of members to be secured by the District Superintendent as he makes his rounds. Each member is to pay \$1.00 when called upon, and not more than two calls be made per year. (1940).

11. Motion carried that we give our District Superintendent and also ask the Churches to give the pastors a two week's vacation with pay. (1941).

12. Be It Resolved: That this Conference set a date for the camp meeting. (The Conference set the date for the camp to begin on Friday night before the last two Sundays in August.) (1941).

13. Be Is Resolved: That this Conference elect a Camp Meeting Board by secret ballot, said board to have authority to secure workers, and raise money and promote the interest of the Camp meeting. The District Superintendent shall be Chairman of said Board.

Since there is no stated time when the term of the Camp Meeting Board expires: therefore, be it resolved that a Camp Meeting Secretary and Treasurer be elected by this Conference and that his term shall expire at the next Annual Conference.

Be it further resolved, that eight additional members be elected for a one-year term, or until their successors are elected, and that this Board shall have power to raise and disburse finances in the interest of the Camp Meeting.

14. Be it resolved, that the District Council elect a Sunday School Board of four including the Sunday School Director. The duties of the District Sunday School Board, in harmony with the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, shall be as follows:

1. The District Sunday School Board shall arrange for an Annual Sunday School Convention to be held some time during the year.

2. To promote and encourage the Sunday School work throughout the District.

3. To present an annual report to the District Conference which shall include the following:

a. A statement of the work accomplished during the year.

b. A statement of the general condition of the Sunday School work on the District.

c. To recommend to the District Conference through the Ways and Means Committee the amount considered necessary to finance the District Sunday School work.

4. The District Sunday School Board shall be amenable to the District Council.

5. The District Council shall have the right to remove, or cause to be removed, any member of the District Sunday School Board who, in the judgment of such Council, is not in harmony with the teaching of the Manual of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

6. If for any reason there is a vacancy on the District Sunday School Board, the District Council, by a majority vote may fill the vacancy.

7. The District Sunday School Board shall work in conjunction with the General Sunday School Committee in promoting the Annual Rally Day, etc., etc.

8. To have published each month a District Sunday School sheet showing the attendance of each Sunday School on the District for the month, the preceding month, and the attendance for the same month a year ago, as well as the average attendance for the year—this sheet to be sent to each pastor and Sunday School superintendent in the District. (1943).

The Pilgrims of the North Carolina District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church are faithful to duty, as attested by the fact that on Monday, Aug. 28, 1944, at 10:00 a. m., practically every delegate, minister and worker were in their places when the roll was called on this Thirty-Fourth Annual Conference of the District, which is being held on our camp meeting grounds, which was formerly Dunlap Springs, where we are enjoying the fine mineral water.

After song, and prayer by J. F. Talbirt, pastor of our Thurmond church, the Conference was called to order by Rev. Wm. S. Deal, District Superintendent, who introduced Dr. W. L. Surbrook, of Indianapolis, Ind., General Superintendent of our denomination, who preached the annual conference sermon, and also presided over the business sessions of the Conference. He talked on wast-

ing our lives on the world and missing the best things. His warnings to our people and churches to maintain the American way of life were potent; his Scripture lesson, the Shepherd Psalm, was dealt with forcefully.

The Conference bar was fixed to include the first eight seats from the front on either side and back to center pole in the center.

Recessed.

MONDAY EVENING

The Conference reassembled with song and prayer. The Indiana girls sang "God Bridged That Stream."

Motion carried that the following ministers be received into the Conference:

Rev. L. E. Taylor, from the Michigan District.

Rev. Otho Jennings, from the Congregational Methodist Church.

Rev. E. M. Fowler, who has been working with the Wesleyans.

Rev. and Mrs. C. M. Andrews, from the Immanuel Missionary Church.

Rev. Paul E. Uhrig, from the Pennsylvania-New Jersey District.

The Ways and Means committee brought in three recommendations which were accepted.

The Conference adjourned for the day.

TUESDAY MORNING

After song and prayer, Dr. Surbrook resumed the exposition of the 23rd Psalm to the edification and spiritual enjoyment of the people. Business was again resumed amidst the shouts of the redeemed.

The roll call was dispensed with for the remainder of the Conference.
