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The Seventeenth Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church opened at Pilgrim Park, Salem, Oregon, August 6, 1956 at 9:00 A. M.

Rev. Clarence Jackson led in singing "Jesus Saves", "Rolled Away", and "Amazing Grace".

Rev. Verlie Arnett led in a gracious season of prayer.

Rev. Wm. S. Deal, District Superintendent, introduced our Presiding Officer, Rev. Paul W. Thomas.

Ps. 11 was read by the District Secretary

The roll was called. 19 Ordained ministers, 5 licensed ministers and 4 Ordained deaconess and 14 lay delegates were present.

The time of sessions were set 9:00-12:00, 1:30-5:00, and 7:00-9:00 or until the conference business is finished.

A motion was made and seconded to include the seven seats in center and north side of the tabernacle and the platform constitute the conference bar. Carried.

The District Superintendent gave his report. It was moved and seconded to accept his report. Carried.

The Assistant District Superintendent gave his report. It was moved and seconded to accept his report. Carried.

The auditing committee reported. It was moved and seconded to accept their report. Carried.

The District Treasurer report was given. It was moved and seconded to accept his report. Carried.

The Camp-meeting Treasurer's report was given. It was moved and seconded to accept his report. Carried.

The Young People's Treasurer's report was given. It was moved and seconded to accept this report. Carried.

The Statistical Committee reported. It was moved and seconded to accept their report. Carried.

The Sunday School District Promotional Secretary gave his report. It was moved and seconded that we accept his report. Carried.

The District Missionary President gave her report. It was moved and seconded that we accept her report. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that we recess for 10 minutes. Carried.

The conference continued by singing "What A Friend We Have In Jesus". Rev. James B. Hale led in prayer.

Rev. and Mrs. Don Mack and Wanda were introduced to the conference and gave their testimony. It was moved and seconded that they be given an honorary seat in the conference bar. Carried.

Rev. P. W. Thomas reported on general budget paid by our District to the General Church. We were happy to know we stood fifth among all the Districts of our church in percentage paid.

Rev. P. W. Thomas addressed the Conference reading from Isaiah 54 and using for his Text Isaiah 54:2, "Enlarge the place of thy tent and let them stretch forth the curtains of thy habitation: spare not, lengthen thy cords and strengthen thy stakes." and brought a stirring and challenging message on going Forward. To strengthen the stakes of 1. Personal Devotion 2. Our Faith 3. Our Witness.

Words of appreciation for the message were given by Rev. Wm. S. Deal and a prayer of thanksgiving and appreciation dismissed us.

Second Sitting

The Conference reopened by singing "It Is Truly Wonderful" led by Rev. H. James Kreider.

The Conference was recessed for 10 minutes.

The conference opened with singing "Precious Name". The Resolutions Committee continued reporting.

It was moved and seconded to extend the time to finish the business before us. Carried.

We were adjourned with prayer by Brother Deal.

The third sitting opened at 7:00 P.M. with singing led by Rev. Jim Sheets. Rev. John Connor led in prayer. The Resolutions Committee continued reporting.

The Ways and Means Committee reported.

The Examining and Educational Boards reported. It was moved and seconded to accept their report.

The Memoirs Committee reported. It was moved and seconded their report be received by standing and giving heartfelt thanks to God.

Election of officers became the order of the day.

Rev. Wm. S. Deal appointed tellers as follows: John Price, James Kreider, Dale Duvall, Verlie Arnett, Roy Dworschak.

It was moved and seconded that we excuse Rev. and Mrs. Dale Duvall and A. T. Williams. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the council select the Bible School Board member. Carried.

We were recessed for 10 minutes.

Wm. S. Deal was elected District Superintendent for two year term. John J. Connor was re-elected Assistant District Superintendent. E. W. Burton was re-elected District Secretary. V. G. Story was reelected District Treasurer. Floyd Morgan, Sherman Moore and H. L. Solter were elected council advisory members. E. W. Callar was elected as District Trustee to serve three years. Leo Futrell was elected to the Educational Board. Sherman Moore was elected to the Examining Board. Myrna A. Deal was elected District Missionary President. Mrs. V. G. Story was elected District Missionary Treasurer.

The Resolutions Committee continued reporting.

It was moved and seconded that the District Council make committee appointments and the same be published in the minutes. Carried. The minutes of the second and third sittings were read and approved.

It was moved and seconded that the council take care of all unfinished business. Carried.

A rising vote of appreciation was given our presiding officer, Rev. P. W. Thomas.

We were adjourned with prayer.

To the 17th Annual Conference of the Pacific Northwest District, convened at Salem, Oregon, August 6, 1956:

Christian greetings!

We are deeply grateful to God for His blessings upon our work for another year. All our workers have been spared to us this year, and there are many signs of progress, despite the battles and discouragements along the way at several places.

Spiritual Status of the Work

So far as we can observe in official visits to churches and in revivals in a number of our churches this year there seems to be a good spiritual atmosphere and indications of progress all over the work. Several churches have enjoyed good revivals this year. Many have been saved and sanctified in these efforts as well as in the regular services. A good number of new members have been received into the churches, Portland First topping them all with 22 new ones. Sunday schools have gained in several places, also. While we have had to suffer the loss of some members from our rolls and a few Sunday Schools have not kept pace with the past year's record, yet we are thankful for the gains which will be shown in the reports.

It appears that we are on solid ground now so far as membership is concerned and this year should show considerable gains if we are as successful in soulwinning as we should be.

Grateful acknowledgement is hereby made to Rev. Sherman Moore, Sunday School Promotional Secretary; and Rev. James Kreider, District Young Peoples' Secretary for the past two years; for their good work in these two departments. Brother Kreider is also to be commended for his untiring and efficient services as director of youth camp services and activities.

Temporal Progress

There have been many improvements in church and parsonage properties this year. We shall note briefly some things which have been done.

Aurora has almost completed its parsonage... Central Point has refinished the floors and made improvements in some Sunday school rooms...

Clatskanie has remodeled its auditorium... Eugene was held up in its interior finishing program somewhat until recently when a loan was secured. The auditorium should be ready for occupancy soon... Klamath Falls has done some remodeling in their auditorium... Marysville has painted the parsonage and laid a new tile floor in the church... Medford is clearing its new lots of indebtedness preparatory to the new church building program... Portland Alberta has made repairs on the church and redecorated part of the parsonage and made other improvements on the property.

Portland First has redecorated the church inside and made other improvements. Plans are now under way to construct two new rooms at the front of the church, one for a nursery and the other for an extra class room... Port Angeles has greatly improved the church grounds by a much needed landscaping job... Raymond has made improvements in the parsonage part of the church... Salem has completed a large Sunday school departmental class room and a pastor's study... Plans are in process of formation for a new parsonage also near the church... Silverton has redecorated parsonage, did landscaping, erected a church sign and made other improvements. Svensen has made improvements in the church auditorium and plan to erect new Sunday School class rooms as soon as possible... Tacoma has made improvements on their church and reduced the debt considerably.

Special mention should be made of the fine new three bedroom parsonage erected at Seattle and almost finished now. Rev. Floyd Morgan and the Pilgrims there are to be commended for this excellent new building. It is valued at about \$12,500.00.

Honorable mention also goes to Rev. John Connor and those who have helped him for the hundreds of hours of work which he has done in bringing the Vancouver church nearer completion this year; also, to Mr. Ed Evans who has helped there for the past two years or so. Several Sunday school rooms are now in use and the main auditorium should be completed sometime this year if all goes well. They are working on the pay-as-you-go basis. This new church

will be a credit to the work of God and to our district.

And certainly Rev. Roy Dworschak, who has worked so hard and faithfully, sometimes against the odds of ill health, to bring so near to completion the Eugene basement church, should have a word of commendation as well as those who have assisted him from time to time. This building has five Sunday School rooms, a furnace room and other facilities, and will have a nice auditorium with a seating capacity of over 100. This auditorium space will leave room for several more Sunday School rooms when the main auditorium is erected. Brother Dworschak has done a fine piece of work there.

Camp Grounds Improvements

The Children's Memorial Chapel, erected in memory of little Steve Price, has progressed well toward completion, thanks to the hard work of Rev. John Connor, in charge of the building, and Rev. John Price and others who helped them. This building is proving very useful for a number of purposes besides the object -- children's meetings during camp. This year it was wonderful to see how the children enjoyed the services conducted there. It serves delightfully as a place of prayer and for smaller group meetings, also.

The ladies were grateful for laundry trays donated by a friend of the camp and installed in the ladies' rest room.

The upstairs of the district parsonage was almost completed this year, thanks to the ladies missionary societies and the work of several of our good brethren. Rev. V. G. Story did most of the finish work and will probably complete the task.

Several hundred dollars have been received by Brother Story, our good district treasurer, toward the proposed camp dormitory. There was not enough, however, to warrant the starting of the building. We hope the response may be sufficient for us to begin it this conference year sometime; or, that possibly the conference will grant the privilege of securing a loan to build it, to be repaid later. It constitutes just now our major need on the camp grounds.

Home Missions

We regret that we do not have a fully organized church to present to the conference this year. We are grateful, however, for the progress made by our unorganized works this year.

Roseburg has been prospered this year to pay off one of their main contracts on the property, leaving only one monthly payment of \$45.00 per month instead of about \$90.00 as previously. More adults have been attending the Sunday school, which speaks well for a more substantial prospect. Two new members were received into fellowship this spring. We hope for a full organization this year sometime if we make the hoped for progress. Brother Rockholt will have a teaching position nearby and can serve the work better now.

At Grants Pass Brother Hobson has seen at least one family saved and sanctified and they are working well with him. He has had a hard pull financially but the district home missionary fund has been used to aid some through the summer months and things look better for the future. Rev. and Mrs. Don Mack are coming up from California to assist in the work there this year. We hope to see an organization there this year by the Lord's help.

Keizer Sunday School has done well this year. Brother and Sister Don Johnson and their helpers have worked hard to produce what they have there. The chapel is about completed and is paid for and they are paying off the lots now. The Sunday School attendance has been very good this year. We do not yet have an organization there but it is possible that we may have within this year. Brother Johnson wishes to see the debt wiped out and a pastor invited to help with the work during this year. They have a nice group of young people and the community is beginning to respond to the work.

Lebanon, Oregon is next on our map. Plans are now under way to open a new work there this conference year. We already have some Pilgrims there and wish to get started this summer with a Sunday School and prayer meetings. Brother and Sister McGlasson have offered to assist us in Sunday School work there for awhile until we can get started. A

pastor will be secured in due season. Pray for this our newest attempted project.

Forward Movement

The Forward Movement is essentially a soul-winning effort within our church. Its chief purpose is to deepen our spiritual life, to increase our number of Sunday Schools and new churches and to encourage each district to endeavor to make at least a 25 percent gain in church membership by winning souls to Christ and encouraging them to unite with us. This calls for much prayer and sometimes fasting. We are in this great forward movement to advance the cause of Christ by all spiritual means. We in this district wish to put our shoulder to the wheel of spiritual progress and push with all our might.

As a district our goal for the year should be at least one newly organized church, one new Sunday School opened up and at least a 25 percent increase in church membership if the Lord so prospers us. To accomplish this every pastor and layman will have to pray more earnestly and work diligently, even more so than in the past. Our District Council, as the Forward Movement Committee for the Conference, is behind this soul-winning movement whole-heartedly and we will do all in our power to aid every pastor and church in its promotion.

Camp Meeting

We praise God for a most gracious camp meeting this year. Our workers were of the highest type and their ministry was deeply appreciated. We are also grateful to God for the financial response to all departments of the general church, the camp meeting interests and the district home missionary program. Thanks to everyone who helped to make the camp the success it was this year.

Personal Report

REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF WESTERN PILGRIM COLLEGE

To the members of the Seventeenth Annual Conference of the Pacific-Northwest District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church assembled at Salem, Oregon, August 6, 1956: Greetings! I deem it a privilege to report to you on your college and its affiliate organization, Western Pilgrim Schools.

Our educational interests are among the most important problems facing our church today, because the character and quality of our church college will be reflected in the ministry of our leaders in the immediate future. As a church, we have no surplus of leadership material and unless we give attention to preparing for this need, we shall be embarrassed in the tomorrows.

We have been fortunate in having a consecrated, Godly, and well prepared faculty in our school this part year. Most of our teachers, if they so desired, could double or triple their salaries by turning to secular education, but they have put the Christian education of our youth far above the matter of their personal monetary remuneration.

Our new administration building and campus improvements have proven to be a great asset. Our enrollment and financial situation is not encouraging. To come near to paying current expenses, our school must maintain a maximum enrollment; this we do not have at the present time. During the past year we have had the best faculty and equipment the school has ever had, but there has been little increase in the enrollment over the last five years. Can it be that our high degree of national material prosperity prevents our young people from feeling the urge to prepare themselves for Christian service?

I would like to challenge our District officers, pastors, parents, and other leaders to encourage our young people to enroll in Western Pilgrim College to train themselves for efficient service in God's kingdom as competent Sunday School teachers, youth leaders, ministers, and missionaries. It is the business of the church to discover, evangelize and help guide these young people to live useful Christian lives; it is the business of our Bible Colleges to educate, train, and establish these young people in Christian

Grace, so they may effectively take their places in the Church and make an impact for God.

Rev. H. T. Mills, Secretary of Education of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, has expressed the thinking of the majority of the educators in the church in his last report to the General Board, when he said, "We as a church are at the cross roads educationally and the turn of events in the next five years will largely determine the future course of our church. 'If' we haven't too many schools, one thing is certain, we have too few people seeking a Christian education with us. Are we reaching the young people in our area? If not, why not? Has the Lord ceased to call our sons and daughters into His service? This is not a problem that belongs to our college presidents, but to the whole church."

At the 1956 Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors of W.P.C., definite plans were made for a forward move for the college. The curriculum was enlarged to attract a larger number of students. In keeping with the requirements of the Bible College Accrediting Association, we have added a fifth year of seminarytype of work to our Th.B. Course. Curriculum of the type should attract many of the ministers in our zone. In addition to the courses we have been offering, we have also added a four year Bachelor of Arts Course giving a B.A. Degree in Bible and Religion, which we trust will attract many more of our young people who are interested in Christian Education, but who do not necessarily want to take the ministerial and theological courses.

To further enrich the regular curriculum offered, we are planning to make available, in various fields of study, Fall and Spring Seminars. These seminar courses will consist of one week of concentrated Bible study in vital interest areas of Religion, taught by our own faculty, and other great teachers who are specialists in these fields.

In regard to financial support the Board has recommended to each of the districts in our Western School Zone to pass legislation and put into action a policy of an offering for W.P.C. every month at a major Sunday service. It is hoped that by this regular free-will offering method that approximately \$10.00 per member

per year can be raised. This amount of income from the churches of the zone and a maximum enrollment of 350 to 400 students will enable the school to operate on a sounder financial basis.

We are planning, praying, and working for a better and larger school in the coming year. With your cooperation and God's help we believe we shall see the desires of our heart in the regard.

2. Whereas Rev. P. W. Thomas, who is so ably serving our conference as chairman, be it resolved we express our appreciation to him with rising vote, saying, "May the Lord bless you my brother."

3. Whereas Rev. Wm. S. Deal, our District Superintendent has so faithfully served us another year, be it resolved we give him a rising vote of appreciation with a sincere prayer of God's blessing by saying, "O God bless this thy Servant."

4. Whereas Rev. and Mrs. P. W. Thomas, Rev. and Mrs. Jim Sheets, Rev. and Mrs. Daniel Burch, have contributed so much to the camp, be it resolved we give them a rising vote of thanks and a hearty "God Bless them."

5. Whereas Mrs. C. R. Bennett, Rev. and Mrs. Solter, Rev. James Moore, and their assistants have served so faithfully in the kitchen and dining hall, be it resolved that we show our appreciation by saying, "Thank you and God bless you all."

6. Be it resolved that a letter of appreciation be sent to Mr. Carl Wendt, manager of the City Transit Co. for placing free advertisement of the camp in the city buses; also an expression of thanks to Mrs. Willis for her assistance in placing the advertisements.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

Conference

1. Be it resolved that no minister, evangelist or christian worker, be engaged without approval of the district superintendent.

2. Be it resolved that all District and General funds be sent to the District Treasurer by the tenth of each month.

3. Be it resolved that the pastor's salary or offerings be paid during camp and conference.

4. We recommend where possible that suitable signs of the local church be placed along the highway or highways approaching the city and at the nearest through street.

5. Be it resolved that the retiring pastor shall give to his successor an up to date record of the names and addresses of members and friends of the local church.

6. Be it resolved that "The Quarterly Bulletin, The North West Pilgrim", be edited by the District Superintendent. The Bulletin shall comprise new items from each departmental head. Be it further resolved that means for the publishing of the bulletin be by subscription, the price to be set by the District Council.

7. Whereas the constitution of the United States provides for freedom of worship, Be it resolved that this conference go on record as being opposed to any school system which violates the conscience of our children by any anti-christian requirements which are contrary to the teaching of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

8. Whereas some of our churches pay their pastors by the free will offering method and as this often is a handicap in raising finances; therefore we recommend that each church pay their pastor a salary.

9. Be it resolved that in the event of the death of a District minister or his wife, the District Secretary be notified at once and he shall notify the pastor of each church.

10. We recommend that the editing committee date all standing resolutions in their respective years, from 1952.

11. Be it resolved that no one be elected or appointed to more than one major board or committee, where possible. 1955

12. WHEREAS, the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church has authorized the Pilgrim Pension Plan, Inc., to make loans of Pension Funds to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches under such conditions as require active participation on the Pilgrim Holiness Districts.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Annual Conference of this district that the District Council, District Trustees, and all District officials be, and they are hereby authorized, to do and perform any and all acts required of them in the consummation of authorized loans to local Pilgrim Holiness Churches of this district, subject however, to the limitations and conditions set out in said Resolution of the General Board of the Pilgrim Holiness Church authorizing said loans. We further recommend that foresaid limitations and conditions be on file with the District Superintendent. 1955

13. We recommend that each church grant their pastor a two week vacation, with salary paid. 56

14. Whereas the General Board has asked that each District have a "Forward Movement Committee", Therefore be it resolved that the District Council be named the "Forward Movement Committee." 56

15. Whereas the "Forward Movement Committee" of the General Church has requested each District to open at least one new church a year and whereas the District Council has voted to open a new work at Lebanon, Oregon, soon after conference; Therefore be it resolved that this new work and the work at Keiser, Oregon, be the District project for the year. 56

16. Whereas the Forward Movement Committee of the General Church has set some definite goals for the churches and district to attain each year: Therefore be it resolved that we as a conference urge all our pastors to promote this program, seeking to develop a deeper devotional life among our people and endeavor-ing to make a 25% gain in membership. 56

17. Be it resolved that each pastor send the annual reports to the District statistician by July 15th: Be it further resolved that any pastor failing to send in his report on time, shall make a satisfactory explanation to the District Conference. 1956

18. Whereas the District has been approached by the local Pilgrim Holiness Church at Salem concerning buying the lot behind the church for the building of a parsonage; Therefore be it resolved that the District Council be empowered to negotiate the sale of the same. The price and payments to be arranged by the Council. 56

19. Whereas the District Treasurer has held some \$50.00 for the "North West College", for several years and there seems to be no chance of such a school coming into existence; Be it resolved this money be turned to "Western Pilgrim College", or returned to donors. 56

Camp

1. Be it resolved that Pilgrim Park Camp Meeting Association be governed by the following:

- (1) The association shall be amenable to the District Council, who shall make the rules governing the camp.
- (2) Membership in the association shall be open to any Christian who believes in and wishes to help promote the doctrine of entire sanctification.
- (3) A membership fee of one dollar per year is to be paid during camp or prior thereto; said fees shall be used to promote camp interests.
- (4) The Treasurer shall be charged with the responsibility of all camp funds.
- (5) The Secretary shall provide all camp publicity, and shall send proper advertisement to each pastor and to the membership of the association, not less than thirty days prior to the camp, along with a request urging members to send in their dues at that time.
- (6) The Camp Meeting Board shall be composed of: District Superintendent as chairman; the following to be appointed by the District Council: Secretary, Treasurer, Purchasing Agent, Dining Hall Manager, Registrar and Housing Manager, Electrician and Plumber, and Manager of Ground and Buildings.

2. Be it resolved that the partition of "Pilgrim Park", bounded by Williams Ave. on the East and Stortz St. on the North, be divided into lots 20×24 feet for the purpose of building cottages, "A" plat of the same to be maintained with adequate space alloted for erection of dormitories. The lots shall be leased on a uniform contract drawn up by the District Council, said contract to include these provisions:

- (1) A uniform building code of type and size of buildings, adequate wiring and necessary considerations for plumbing shall be observed.
- (2) Cottages shall not be occupied, except for camp and conference, without the permission of the District Council.
- (3) Leases shall not be transferred to another party without approval of the District Council.
- (4) If the lease contract be broken the lease shall forfeit all rights, and the lot or lots, with existing improvements, shall revert to the Camp Meeting Association.
- (5) In event the owner shall be absent from the camp, he shall notify the Camp Meeting Secretary and the cottage or cottages shall be utilized by the Housing Manager during camp and conference.

3. Be it resolved that the District Council care for the landscaping and maintenance of Pilgrim Park and secure a caretaker on contract.

4. We recommend that, whenever possible, each local church provide a cottage at Pilgrim Park to be used by its pastor during camp and conference.

5. Be it resolved that those desiring the privilege of working for their entertainment during camp shall be given an assignment at the time of registration.

6. Be it resolved that those desiring to use utilities or appliances during camp shall pay the fee at time of registration.

7. Be it resolved that the District Council shall schedule the annual camp and conference.

8. Be it resolved that those other than ministers and their dependent families, delegates and workers at conference shall pay for their entertainment the same as during camp.

9. We recommend, if the District Council deem it possible, that four new tables be built for the dining hall.

10. Be it resolved that the Bible School Meeting be held at another time than Sunday afternoon.

11. Be it resolved that the District Council make immediate plans to erect a dormitory, which shall include laundry, showers and toilet facilities. Be it further resolved that the District Council be empowered to negotiate a loan, if necessary, to finish the project.

Sunday School

1. Be it resolved that each Sunday School of the District count as present those who are attending the camp.

2. We recommend that time during the camp be given to the District Sunday School Promotional Secretary to present the Sunday School work. 54

3. We recommend that each zone have a SundaySchool convention, having a General official as speaker, if possible; the schedule to be arranged by the District Superintendent, and the District PromotionalSecretary. 56

4. Be it resolved that each pastor send to the promotional Sunday School Secretary on Monday following the last Sunday of the month, a report of his Sunday School attendance with that of the same month of the preceding year. The Sunday School Promotional Secretary shall send a monthly report of the same to each pastor. 56

Youth

1. Be it resolved there be a District Youth Board, composed of the District Superintendent, District Youth Executive Secretary and District Youth Treasurer; the purpose of this Board to promote District youth work.

2. Whereas the young people have an important part in our District, therefore to promote youth activity, be it resolved that a District Youth Rally be held during the year; the District Youth Board shall have charge of arrangements.

3. Be it resolved that the District Youth Camp be held immediately preceding the District Camp. The camp shall begin on Wednesday evening, continuing through Saturday. The governing rules for the camp shall be provided by the District Council. Be it further resolved that all young people attending the Youth Camp shall register, and shall abide by all the rules; they shall be under supervision of counselors appointed by the District Council. 54 4. Be it resolved that the Zone Chairmen be appointed at the annual Youth Business Meeting, to facilitate the work of the Young Peoples Executive Secretary. 56

Zone

1. Be it resolved there be one Zone Chairman in each zone appointed by the District Council; he shall promote all zone interests.

2. We recommend that at least six zone meetings be conducted during the conference year under the direction of the Zone Chairman.

Missionary

1. Whereas there is a need of promoting the work of our missionary societies on the district; Be it resolved that a District Missionary President and a Secretary-Treasurer be elected. Two or more names shall be nominated for the offices by the District Council.

2. Be it resolved that the project of the Missionary Society for this conference year, be as follows: The completion of the upstairs of the District Parsonage, any money left over be used to purchase utensils for the camp kitchen.

Educational and Examining Boards 1. We recommend that all candidates who are to come before the Educational and Examining Boards shall do so on Friday or Saturday before conference convenes, if possible.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE'S REPORT

1. Be it resolved that each church treasurer be authorized to send 10 per cent of all regular church offerings plus 10 per cent of Sunday School offerings to the District Treasurer for District expenses, exempting property payments, missionary and building fund offerings.

2. Be it resolved that each church take a special offering each month to be divided by the local treasurer as follows: 50 percent District Home Missions, 50 percent General Budget.

3. Whereas we are now a fully organized District and are obligated to pay three-quarters of General Budget assessment which amounts to \$4.50 per member this year, be it resolved that each Church Treasurer be instructed to send in that amount to the District Treasurer.

4. Be it resolved that each Church Treasurer be instructed to send 25¢ per member per year to the District Treasurer for General Conference expense.

5. Be it resolved that we continue the call card plan of \$1.00 per call for District interests.

6. Be it resolved that the District Superintendent be paid \$200.00 per month plus \$50.00 per month traveling expense. Be it further resolved that he be allowed five revivals per year either on or off the District from which he may keep the offerings.

7. Be it resolved that the District Statistician be paid \$15.00 per year plus supplies.

8. Be it resolved that the supplies of the District Sun-Day School Promotional Secretary be paid from District Funds.

9. Be it resolved that the District Treasurer be paid \$75.00 per year plus stationery and postage.

10. Be it resolved that the District Secretary be paid \$15.00 per year plus stationery and postage.

11. Should the sale of the building lot to the Salem Church be consummated, we recommend that the proceeds be applied to the building of the camp dormitory or other camp improvements. 12. Be it resolved that each Young People's Society be instructed to pay \$15.00 or more on the Stephen Connor Price Memorial Chapel as their project for this year.

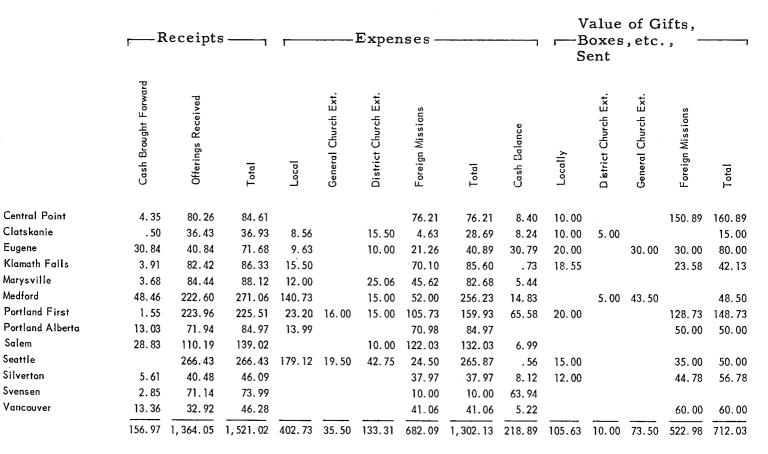

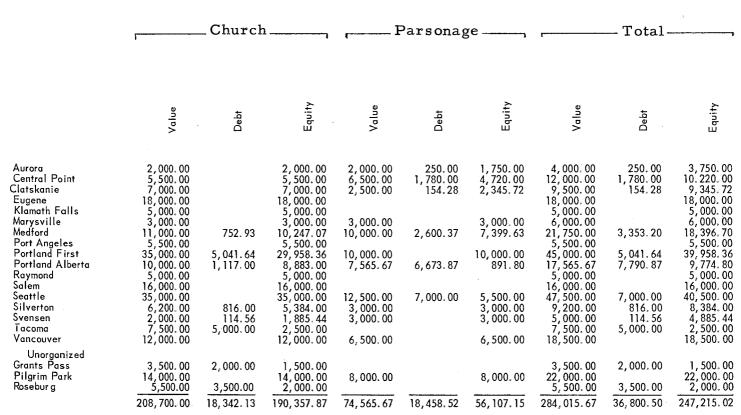
